Over the past two years, he has been on leave serving as the director of New Mexico's Forest and Watershed Restoration Institute where he worked on a variety of natural resource and watershed issues throughout the state. He returns sues throughout the state.
Before going to New Mexico,Smith served one year on SUD's board; he also spent five years as chairman of Sewanee's Environmental Studies Program and as the University Forester.
Prior to coming to Sewanee, Smith worked on forest management and research projects in West Africa, Brazil, Canada, and throughout the western United States.

His past research interests in Sewanee were focused on exurban development patterns in farmland and forest on the Cumberland Plateau and in the Sequatchie Valley Smith has also worked with Sewanee
students to examine how wastewater has affected soil properties in SUD's spray fields, and in the fall of 2005 his Forest Soils class developed a semester-long project at the facility with a presentation to the SUD Board and SUD consultants.

## Strong Analytical and Problem Solving Skills No. 1 Criteria in Survey Results for New Director of Schools

At its Dec. 11 meeting, the Franklin County Board of Education received the results of a survey administered on Dec. 2 by the Tennessee School Boards Association (TSBA), presented by Randall Bennett, the TSBA's deputy executive director and general counsel. The bound document is titled "Franklin County: Search for a Director of Schools, Interim Report." Bennett conducted the survey, and the TSBA staff compiled all verbal and written responses given in meetings of district teachers, staff members, administrators, community leaders, school board members and comschool board mem
In each of the Dec. 2 meet ings with district employees and community members, Bennett described the steps of the director
selection process and asked for selection process and asked for
comments on three questions: 1) comments on three questions: 1) F.C. school district? 2) What are the major challenges/problems the new director will face in the district? 3) What are the characteristics and qualities that the new director of schools should possess? A secre-
ary recorded all verbal answers to these questions. The most common responses to the question regarding challenges facing the new director were related to budget constraints, negative media attention, low mo rale and local political pressures.

Participants at the meetings were then given a printed survey to fill out that listed 27 qualities expected of a new director with a rating scale from "not important" to "essential." Additional comments could be written on the surveys, including recommendations of particular individuals for the posipartic

Candidates will be evaluated with an emphasis on the following 11 qualities, ranked according to the composite results of the writ ten surveys:
1.Strong analytical and problem solving skills: ... makes decisions that show fairness, mature judgment, appropriate analysis and sensitivity for those affected by the decisions.
2. Good listener: . . . understands the concerns of people who

## Sewanee 2008-09 Domain Deer Cull Hunt Begins Friday

The annual deer cull for herd and community safety will be held Dec. 19 through Jan. 10, 2009 There will be no hunting on Christmas Eve or Christmas Day. Hunting will begin at sunrise and end at sunset. There will be no hunting between 10 a.m. and 2 p.m. Bow hunters will be located at least 100 yards from trails and firelanes.

Hunting during the deer cull is archery only-with no exception.In addition to the cull map published on page 13 in this paper, maps are posted at duPont Library, the SPO and the community bulletin board at the Sewanee Market. Warning signs will
be posted at the main access points
Hunters are required to attend training sessions and are selected from a pool of University faculty staff and students, and their family members.

A number of hiking trails will NOT be affected by the deer cull and will be open and usable at all times. They are: Tennessee Avenue trail, the Rails-toTrails bike path, the entire Perimeter Trail, Piney Point trail, Beckwith's Point trail and Solomon's Temple trail in Thumping Dick Hollow.

Cull dates are: Dec. 19, 20, 21, 22, $23,26,27,28,29,30$ and 31 ; Jan. 1, 2 $3,4,5,6,7,8,9$ and 10 .

## Good Books: Good Gifts

An online search of major retailers for children's gifts reveals hundreds of items in the "learning" category. One item is conspicuously absent: books. We all know children who take deep pleasure in books, in old-fashioned printed pages with tales of wonder and delight, in vivid illustrations that don't blink or beep.

Any visitor to the SES library will see children listening intently to a story or happily checking out books. University students in my Children's Literature class who assisted Cowan teachers tell of children begging for another story or wanting to hear the same one again and again. Reliable shopping guides are the books that have won major children's book awards, or try the best source of all: ask a child.

The New York Times Notable Children's Books of 2008 include several for the very young. "Wabi Sabi" is the story of a little cat in Japan who goes on a journey to learn the meaning of her name. Told in spare text and haiku, Mark Relbstein's gentle story is illustrated by the talented Ed Young (Little, Brown Young Readers, 4 years and up, \$16.99).Also on the Times list is "Ten Little Fingers and Ten Little Toes" by Mem Fox, a rhyming introduction to little ones around the world. Featuring watercolors by Helen Oxenbury, this is an entertaining treasure for babies, toddlers and parents (Harcourt Children's Books, \$16.00).

A school librarian won this year's Newbery Award for distinguished writing for children. In"Good Masters! Sweet Ladies! Voices from a Medieval Village," Laura Amy Schlitz brings 13th-century England to life with 21 beautifully illustrated dramatic narratives (Candlewick, 9 life with 2 beautifuly illustrated dram
years and up, $\$ 19.99$; paperback, $\$ 9.99$ ).

The Caldecott Medal for outstanding illustrations in a children's book went to Brian Selznik for "The Invention of Hugo Cabret", a story of an orphan secretly living in the walls of a train station, where he works on an incomplete invention left by his father. The black and white illustrations in this 544 page book begin with an image of the full moon setting over an awakening Paris in 1931 (Scholastic Press, 8-12 years and older, \$22.99).
The Coretta Scott King Award for distinguished writing by an African American writer went to "Elijah of Buxton" by Christopher Paul Curtis. A mischievous 11 -year-old who lives in a Canadian colony for escaped slaves decides to risk his freedom and follow a thief into Michigan (Scholastic Press, 9-12 years, \$16.99; paperback, \$9.99).
The Jane Addams Children's Book Awards recognize quality works with themes of peace and justice. An award-winning picture book is "The Escape of Oney Judge: Martha Washington’s Slave Finds Freedom," written and illustrated by Emily Arnold McCully. The brave Oney believed Mrs. Washington's declaration that she was a member of the family until she was forbidden to learn to read (Farrar Straus Giroux, 7-9 years, \$16) An honor also went to "One Thousand Tracings: Healing the Wounds of World War II, written and illustrated by Lita judge. Upon discovering 1,000 paper foot tracings in her late grandmother's attic, Judge learned that they had been used to find shoes to fit needy Germans after World War II.Paintings and original photographs underscore the compassion at the heart of this family story. (Hyperion Books for Children, 8-12 years, of interest to older folks, $\$ 15.99$ ).

## Nature Notes

Where Do Sewanee Birds Spend Winter Nights?
Songbirds need food, water and shelter to survive. Where do our Sewanee birds spend cold winter nights? Rain and snow can add to their troubles. A Carolina Wren comes every dusk to stay in a small fiber bird house hanging on Harry and Jean Yeatman's porch. It sings all year, even when snow is on the ground.
Birds that nest in tree holes or in barns have a survival advantage over those that roost on tree limbs. Woodpeckers use nesting holes that they have cut into trees and telephone poles. Carolina Chickadees often peck their own holes in the soft wood of dead trees for nesting and winter shelter. Tufted Titmice, White-breasted Nuthatches and some Carolina Wrens use holes made by woodpeckers or birdhouses put up by humans. Boston ivy vines on buildings are frequently used for shelter by House Finches and Northern Cardinals.

Robins, grackles and crows roost in thick evergreen trees, such as pines and red cedars, as do hawks. Some large owls use hollow trees damaged by storms, but Screech Owls roost in woodpecker holes, natural tree holes and birdhouses with large openings. Pileated Woodpeckers tree holes and birdhouses with large openings. Pileated Woodpeckers

Ducks for nesting and by Screech Owls for living quarters.

Our Turkey and Black Vultures tend to flock in large groups on tree limbs and in rock crevices. They have a hard time in bad weather, but now are feasting on the remains of deer left by hunters and road kills. Red-tailed Hawks and Golden Eagles have been seen scavenging on dead deer on the side of JumpOff Road.

Bobwhite Quail (pictured at right) roost on the ground in groups of 15 or more with their heads facing out to make a quick getaway from predators. Our native sparrows, towhees, finches, Winter Wrens and other small birds roost in under brush near the ground. Dark-eyed Juncos prefer to roost in boxwood shrubs. Harry Yeatman advises ob serving and recording where birds find shelter in winter to add to our knowledge of ornithology.
