## Lessons and Carols 50th Anniversary, Two Services Sunday

The 50th annual Festival of Lessons and Carols will take place on Sunday, Dec. 6, in All Saints' Chapel Two services are offered, one at 5 p.m., with doors opening at 4 p.m., and another at 8 p.m., with doors opening at $7 \mathrm{p} . \mathrm{m}$.

Both services are open to the public at no charge and are on a firstcome, first-seated basis. Lines may be long, especially for the 5 p.m. service. Reservations are neither needed nor accepted. Requests for handicapped access and seating should be directed to the chapel office at 598-1274.
The service is based on one that has been sung annually at King's College Chapel in Cambridge, England, since 1918. It features the University choir under the direction of University Organist and Choirmaster Robert Delcamp, professor of music at the University, and Assistant University Organist Daniel Stipe.
The music for 2009 includes a setting of "Adam lay ybounden" by the British organist David Briggs, which was commissioned by the University choir in 2006; Richard Shephard's arrangement of the traditional English folk melody "The truth sent from above, Sleepers, wake!" by the composer Felix Mendelssohn; a setting of the traditional melody "A Maiden most gentle" arranged by the British composer Andrew Carter.
"Welcome, Lord Jesus," by Richard Shephard, was commissioned for the 50th anniversary of the services of Nine Lessons and Carols by Gina Lodge, Sarah and Trey Tally, and Richard Lodge in honor of Dick Lodge (C'71), a choir alum and former University regent.

The beloved carol "O Holy Night" will be heard in a newly published arrangement by the American composer Brian Luckner, as well as a setting of William Blake's poem"The

Community Council revisited issues regarding the Highway 41A speed limit and wheelchair accessibility to Guerry Auditorium.
Council Rep. Pam Byerly submitted a proposal that the Hwy. 41A speed limit be lowered to 35 mph from Sewanee to the St. Andrew'sSewanee School entrance.Vice-Chancellor Joel Cunningham said that several years ago the council passed a resolution recommending that the 55 mph speed limit section of highway between Sewanee and Monteagle be changed to a 45 mph speed limit. Monteagle supported the resolution. Rep. John Flynn made a motion that the council circulate a petition in support of Byerly's proposal but here was no second Sewanee Police here was no secon. Sewanee Police Chief Rob the wrier who is pursuing reviving the earfer resolution, said he request would need to be made through the state traffic engineer and that the state would likely conduct a study of this section of highway.
University Director of Physical Plant Services Marvin Pate reported that he had consulted with the University architect about options for wheelchair accommodations in Guerry Auditorium and that four locations have been identified where space could be made for a wheelchair and an attendant. To meet slope require ments of state codes, the wheelchair accommodations would need to be in the first three rows or the back row, Pate said, and the University is ready to move forward with the renovation. 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## More Help for Low-Income Customers Under Review by SUD

The Board of Commissioners of he Sewanee Utility District (SUD) of Franklin and Marion Counties held their regular monthly business meeting Nov. 17 in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road.
In a discussion about bill paying assistance for low-income customers SUD Manager Ben Beavers reviewed the mechanisms already in place. In 2008 and 2009, SUD's Project Help initiative gave the Community Action Committee (CAC) \$5,000 to be used to pay the water utility bills of those customers the CAC identified as needing assistance. SUD also makes quarterly distributions to the CAC from funds received from customers who make monthly bill-payingassistance donations. A customer desiring to set up an automatic monthly donation should phone the SUD office (598-5611), Beavers said. He plans to include a donation reminder in the next utility bill
Board President Doug Cameron observed that the number of people receiving food assistance from the CAC has doubled in the past year and that many of those people are probably water customers. Commissioner Cliff Huffman suggested that customer bill amounts be rounded up to the next dollar and that the increase go to help low-income customers. Huffman proposed the program be announced in customer bills and that all customers who did not opt-
out would automatically participate. Commissioner Ken Smith said h would prefer an opt-in program. Beavers will draft a motion on the roundup donation proposal and present at the December meeting.
Reporting on the operation of the utility, Beavers said Lake Jackson was overflowing and that on some day Lake O'Donnell was overflowing as well. Last year at this time, Lake Jackson was down 14 feet and Lake O'Donnell was down two feet. Due to the heavy rainfall, the lagoon levels were also up, Beavers added, and the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP) was operating seven days a week to draw down the lagoons. Updating the board on the Collection System Assessment, Beavers said the assess ment was complete, and the data was ready to be logged in the computer and analyzed a process he hoped to and analyzed, a process he hoped to Beavers will present the 2010 Beavers will present the 2010 bud get for the board's approval at the De cember meeting. ## Book Signing for Patterson's "The Liberal Arts at Sewanee"

W. Brown Patterson, the author of "The Liberal Arts at Sewanee: A History of Teaching and Learning at the University of the South,' wil sign copies of his recently published book on Sunday, Dec. 6, at 2 p.m. in the University Bookstore.
The book traces the development of the curriculum during times of prosperity, as well as desperate need. The focus of the book is on the undergraduate curriculum, though the graduate and professional curriculum of the School of Theology is also given considerable attention. The author contends that a balanced and academically rigorous liberal arts curriculum is needed at the heart of American higher education and should be available to greater numbers of students.
The book is part of the history project marking the Sesquicentennial of the University of the South directed by Samuel Williamson and Gerald Smith. Patterson acknowledges in his preface the immense assistance provided by other members of the team of scholars associated with the project. He also recognizes the significant part played by the 10 students and four faculty members who made up a seminar in the spring semester of 2008 on "The Liberal Arts: Tradition and Innovation." They provided a critical and wellinformed commentary on his work Other faculty members provided valuable accounts of their departments' earlier history and recent activities.

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Among the books themes is that the liberal arts as conceived at Sewanee include mathematics and the social and natural sciences, as well as the humanities. A second theme is that up-to-date technology is essen ial to the advancemer of all disciplines. A further theming th religion, both in class discussion that camp life pross discussions and in campus life, provides a stimulus to the search for truth that is at the hear of a liberal education. A final theme is that the curriculum at Sewanee amidst the changes that have oc curred over a span of 150 years, has preserved its integrity and yet has remained open to new ideas.

beside a sloping sidewalk leading into an entrance to the building could be constructed.
University Domain Manager Richard Winslow announced that a state review of the airport has mandated the removal of 150 trees on the Mid way end of the runway because the trees pose an air-traffic because the ditional tree removal will likely be necessary at the Sewanee end, Winslow added. The number of problem trees identified in the annual review
was much higher than usual. The state will pay 90 percent of the cost of removal, Winslow said. Finding a logger to harvest the trees for profit is unlikely, according to Winslow, who cited the weak timber market and stressed that many of the trees are too small for harvest A suggestion was made that residents be allowed to cut the trees for firewood but Winslow expressed concerns but liability issues, concerns about involved in felling given the dangers the tree in felling trees. Flynn raised three issues brought to his attention by constituents Christmas decorations in Sewanee, low-volume trash collection rates and hospital and police department signage.

Cunningham commented that given the economic climate, it is unlikely the University would bear the expense of Christmas decorations in downtown Sewanee, that this would need to be a community or merchant effort. Leaseholders' Association President Steven Burnett offered to introduce the issue at the next Leaseholders' Association meet ing and speculated that downtown decorations might take the form of a community Christmas tree decorated by residents. University Chief Financial Officer Jerry Forster suggested working with the Business Owners' Association, adding that the group is pursuing locating a pocket (mini) park and additional parking in the downtown area.
On the subject of low-volume trash collection rates, Flynn proposed that low-volume customers could have a smaller trash container and pay a lower rate. Approving of the idea, White suggested that residents with smaller containers be responsible for disposing of any additional trash they generated by taking it to the convenience center. Forster pointed out that the rates of trash collector Joe B. Long are based on his overhead; any changes to the rate structure would need to take his costs into account. Long's five-year contract is subject to annual financial review, Forster said, with the calendar year running from July through June Forster will follow up on this with Rep. Annie Armour, who expressed support for the low-volume rate idea She heads up a committee investigating locating recycling receptacles in the downtown area.

Flynn's third proposal was to | post signs at the entrance points of University Avenue, directing motorists to Emerald-Hodgson Hospital and the Sewanee police department. Cunningham observed that hospital signs were typical in other communities but police department sign were not; he asked Forster whether hospital signs were feasible. Forster replied in the affirmative, noting that the signs would need to be located off the state right-of-way unless the state were to give permission for the signage on its property. Forster wil

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## investigate the options.

Cunningham introduced the subject of voice sirens to alert residents of emergencies, a topic brought to his attention by community resident Laurence Alvarez. According to Forster, the University reviewed emergency procedures two years ago and made several changes, including an upgrade to emergency radio, installing emergency on-campus phones and implementing emergency text messaging, e-mail and voice mail announcements. The weather siren system alerts residents to seek information about hazardous weather conditions, Forster said. (The weather siren is tested at noon every Saturday.) A voice siren would communicate specific information to those outdoors. Two voice siren locations have been considered: Elliott Hall on University Avenue and the football field. Chief White has investigated use of voice sirens at other universities and will give an update at the January meeting. Rep. David Coe suggested that the Messenger publish an annual reminder to explain the function of he weather siren.
Cunningham announced that Rep. Chet Chellman is moving to Asheville, N.C., and would resign his District 3 council seat. Provost Linda Lankewicz explained that council members could nominate and elect a replacement to serve out the remainder of Chellman's term, to expire in December 2010. District 3 is the area on the south side of Tennessee Avenue
and the west side of Sherwood Road Lankewicz said that another counci seat is vacant in District 2, and there is no University student representative at this time. Cunningham added that the Student Assembly is charged with electing a Community Council representative and had not done so The council will revisit the issue of positions to be filled at its January meeting.

The Community Council does not meet in December. To avoid scheduling conflicts, the next meeting will be on Tuesday, Jan. 19, at 7 p.m., rather than on the regular meeting date (the fourth Monday of the month) Agenda items should be submitted to Provost Lankewicz no later than one week prior to the meeting date

could have different rates for different seasons.Commissioner Rick Sommer emphasized that the goal of such pricing should be water conservation not to increase revenues. Beavers will seek input on the seasonal pricing idea from Raftelis Financials, Inc. the consulting firm under contract with SUD.
Turning to the SUD investigation into water recycling, Beavers gave an overview of the pilot study to be conducted by Dennis George, environmental engineer and director of the Tennessee Tech Water Resources Center. George plans to implement a green sand filter wetlands project at SUD's WWTP, as a way of treating wastewater for reuse. Beavers budgeted $\$ 50,000$ for the project, but the cost will be much less-estimated at $\$ 10,000$ to compensate a graduate student research assistant. Under the direction of SUD Commissioner Ken Smith, University students will conduct a watershed assessment of the chemicals and pharmaceuticalssuch as caffeine and estrogen-in the water treated at SUD's WWTP. Beavers stressed that George will investigate other water recycling treatment methods and do a cost analysis of all the alternatives

Reporting on construction progess at hew water plant, engineer George Garden, with Barge, Waggoner, Sumner, and Cannon,Inc., said he expected the building to be closed in and ready to receive the filters by mid-January. He presented the board with a change order for several items related to the construction: a modification to the electric service, addition of a fire hydrant, deletion of an unnecessary line to the existing sanitary pump station, and a two-week extenpurn to the projected completion dat secause of work slowdown due to heavy rainfall).

Beavers pointed out that the fire hydrant would make it possible to recapture the water treated during the new plant testing phase and, subsequently, to treat that water in the existing plant, rather than discarding the test-phase water. Garden projected the total cost associated with the change order at under $\$ 8,000$ and said that approving the change order would not increase the new water plant budget, since the contin ater fund ( $\$ 110,000$ ) set aside for gency fund $(\$ 110,000)$ set aside fo such circumstances would cover the expense. The board voted to approve the change order. Garden gave the revised completion date for the new water plant as July 20, 2010

## Nature Notes

Yellow-Bellied Sapsuckers Return to Sewanee Harry and Jean Yeatman report one of the pretty woodpeckers spending the winter now in Sewanee is the Yellow-bellied Sapsucker (pictured below) that nests in cavities in living trees in our northern states and flies south where food is easy to find in the winter. Its usual fare is sugar sap that it obtains by pecking rows of holes in a variety of trees, especially Sugar Maples. It also eats some of the inner or cambium layer of trees. (Many other kinds trees. (Many other kind lina Chickadees, Titmice Wha Chickadees, Iitmice White-breasted Nut hatches, Carolina Wrens and even Gray Squirrels and chipmunks partake of the sweet bounty.) Our sapsuckers also eat the red berries of Dogwood, Hercules Club, etc., trees. Some come to suet in bird feeders and catch mall beetles, wasps,
 ants and midges.
The male has a red throat and the female a white throat. Both sexes have red caps and black and white body markings. The yellow belly is faint and difficult to see. Most of the females fly to Caribbean islands for the winter, and most of the males reside in our Southern states.
Sapsuckers cause damage by their boring, which can girdle small trees and shrubs and cause blemishes on the outer bark of larger trees. Nevertheless, they are a pretty addition to our winter bird life, and they expose sugar sap for many other birds. Their call is a sort of mewing note or squeal. Look for this bird now.
