While Sewanee's Advent carol services date back to 1933, the more formal Lessons and Carols services began in 1960 in the then newly completed All Saints' Chapel. The service is based on one that has been sung annually since 1918 in King's College Chapel in Cambridge, England. At once solemn and joyful, the Festival of Lessons and Carols evokes the meaning of the Advent season through the radiant music of the University Choir and selected readings by members of the University community.

### KUDOS TO FRANKLIN COUNTY GENERAL SESSIONS COURT To the Editor,

I was denied a Tennessee Handgun Carry Permit based on an erroneous finding by the Tennessee Bureau of

Investigation that I was a felon. I am not. I filed a timely appeal with the Franklin County General Sessions Court, and a hearing was scheduled for Nov. 30, 2010. The filing fee was \$130.50. On the following Monday, Nov. 8, I received a telephone call from the Tennessee Department of Safety. Their official informed me that they had discovered the error, and that the denial had been reversed, and that my Handgun Carry Permit would be issued immediately. Since there was no longer any need for a hearing, I wrote and requested a refund of my filing fee from Circuit Court Clerk Robert Baggett. He met with General Sessions Judge Thomas Farris, and they collectively determined that my request was "highly unusual" because an appeal had already been filed and a hearing scheduled. I want to publicly thank these two gentlemen for allowing common sense to triumph in Franklin County

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


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## **Overtime with Coach Shack**

My college tennis coach used to remind us often that the most certain thing in life was change. Yet I often come back to the story of the scorpion and the tortoise. The scorpion comes to the edge of the Rio Grande and realizes he can go no further. After asking the tortoise for a ride across, he is told that it would be foolish. The tortoise tells him that if he allows him on his back he will surely be bitten. "No, no," says the scorpion. "If I bite you we will both drown." So the tortoise agrees, and they head across the river. Halfway into the swim the scorpion strikes, and as they begin to go down, the tortoise asks, "Why?" "Because I am a scorpion" is the only reply.

Coaches are in the business of change. We fix backhands, poor free throws, blocking assignments and stride lengths. We hope for change that will translate into success. That seems to make perfect sense, but somehow we all have a level of resistance to change. It is hard to leave your comfort zone and try the unknown. A player who is having a certain degree of success and is promised even more by staying the course will often continue to beat against the wall without much success. What is required is the ability to risk taking a step backward and finding a new path around the river to get where we want.

We face a divide these days between those who want change and those who resist. Coaches know that they must bring their locker room together and develop team chemistry among different types of athletes that creates an atmosphere of willingness to move in the same direction. Interestingly, like the scorpion, we rarely are the ones to change. It's the landscape we face, the opponents moving toward us, the speed of the game that is continually in motion. Try as we may, we cannot hold back the tide. (That is not a reference to the boys in crimson.) That sapling that bends as the wind blows is still standing when the mighty oak falls. My college roommate was a Marine who used to quote General George Patton. "Flexibility is the key to success in the battlefield. Improvise, adapt and overcome."

For athletes to become more successful they must accept that responsibility—adapting to the needs at hand, risking failure for a greater reward. As the playing field around us becomes seemingly more complex, know that it is much easier to cross that river by sharing the ride.

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# Nature Notes

### Wild Turkey Behavior

During late summer and fall, Turkey Gobblers are able to gather without fighting each other. Five adult males have been eating acorns, berries, nuts and grass seed in Harry and Jean Yeatmans' pasture for two months. They have big black beards hanging from their chests



and will not establish territories of dominance by fighting each other until spring. They will then fight each other for the females. Jean and Harry witnessed one of these battles a few years ago, and will be looking for the conflicts this coming spring. These fights are

described here. First, two males approach each other, chest to chest (top, left). They then lock bills and wrestle with entwined necks, with bills still "locked" together (below, right). A third gobbler will frequently come up to the fighting pair to take on the victor of the two contestants. Pic-

tured is a pair of Rio Grande Turkeys, a subspecies which shows much white in the tail base and rump, but otherwise resembles our Eastern Turkeys.

Incidentally, some old females of all subspecies of turkeys sometimes have a skinny black beard on the chest. John James Audubon painted a female with a



skinny beard leading a flock of her babies. Young turkeys with small beards and small spurs are called "Jakes" by the hunters, who prefer older males with very long, heavy black beards. Turkeys are fun to watch, and are good flyers over lakes, trees and grassy pastures. Their gizzards are so muscular that they can crack hickory nuts that they have swallowed. This ability has been proven by experiments of feeding turkeys these hard nuts and then opening the gizzards of these birds.
