Community Council to Participate in Community E-mail Pilot Program

At the May 17 Sewanee Community Council meeting, Vicki Sells, associate provost and University librarian, reported on her investigation into establishing an e-mail distribution list for announcing University events to non-University affiliated community members. Sells reiterated that because of the University's nonprofit status there were rules regarding what could be posted, especially with respect to commercial and political messages. Sells said she was still investigating options and mentioned alternatives such as social networking sites like Facebook and Craigslist.

In response to Vice Chancellor Joel Cunningham's question about specific problems associated with setting up a one-way "community list," Sells stressed that the biggest "burden" would be getting faculty members to remember to post events. Sells, however, agreed that, "We could try it."

Cunningham noted that "authorship" (i.e. who could post events) would need to be limited and that community members who wished to receive event notices would need to sign up for the service.

Sells pointed out that people signing up for a "trial" program should be made aware that the program might not continue if it proved to be too problematic.

Provost Linda Lankewicz suggested a limited pilot program, in which event announcements posted by faculty were sent to a community list consisting of Community Council members. The council voted to participate in the pilot program for the period of the summer. If the program is successful, community members will be invited to subscribe to the service through an announcement in the Messenger.

Lankewicz reminded the council that it was time to set the process in motion for election of members to serve on the Community Council. Reviewing the procedures, Lankewicz said elections are held every two years on the first Tuesday in November. Council members are elected to serve a four-year term. Six council seats are open for the fall election: the District One seat of David Coe (term expiring); the District Two seats of Chet Seigmund (term expiring) and one vacant seat; the District Three seat of Chet Chellman, who resigned

This is a reminder that someone else is standing guard and facing fire for us. Please keep the following individuals, their families and all those who fight for freedom in your prayers:

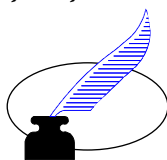

SUPPORT OF GUN BILL To the Editor:

I agree with Rep. George Fraley's vote in favor of HB3125. This law allows Tennessee Handgun Permit holders to carry guns in restaurants that serve alcohol, as long as the holder does not drink alcohol, and the premises is not "posted" near the entrance prohibiting the weapon.

1. Permit holders are the Good Guys (male and female).

2. Criminals are not going to obey the law (a piece of paper) declaring any "gun-free zone," and may even be attracted to areas where they know people will be unarmed. Reflect a moment on the atrocities committed in the recent past; most were in these "safe" areas (even the soldiers were defenseless at Ft. Hood, Texas—a gun-free zone).

3. Permit holders as a group are very law-abiding. Though the return of each facet of self-defense and self-reliance is met with dire predictions of chaotic gunfire, it never comes to pass.

4. There are benefits to society as a whole when unknown members own firearms. Criminals don't know who is

helpless. This may explain why there aren't many (any?) yard signs bragging of gun-free households. Also note that the highest death counts are held by societies with very strict gun control, e.g. millions dead under Mao, Stalin, Hitler and Pol Pot.

Since I much prefer to have armed Good Guys around me, I will resume my avoidance of "posted" restaurants when this new law takes effect.

POSTMASTER GIVES DOG BITE WARNING To the Editor:

I wish to share the following article concerning "National Dog Bite Prevention Week" (May 16-22) in an effort to educate our community concerning dog bite prevention.

For every letter carrier bitten, hundreds of children needlessly suffer the pain and trauma of dog bites. Whatever the reasons, dog bites are a serious problem for the entire community and not just our letter carriers. There were almost 3,000 dog bites last year of postal letter carriers. That's an average of 11 dog attacks every delivery day and that figure does not include the number of threatening incidents that did not result in injury. These numbers pale in comparison with the more than 4.7 million people (mostly children and the elderly) who suffer injuries from dog attacks each year.

Nationally, the number of carriers bitten by dogs has declined over the years. This is because of greater cooperation from dog owners, stricter leash laws, and stepped-up efforts to educate letter carriers and the public about dealing with the problem. Our letter carriers are vigilant and dedicated, but we may be forced to stop mail delivery at an address if a letter carrier is threatened by a vicious dog in some instances. Postal service employees have sued and collected damages for dog bite injuries. We can't control people's dogs; only dog owners can do that.

While some attribute attacks on letter carriers to dogs' inbred aversion to uniforms, experts say the psychol-

Re: Request for Sewer project bids

The Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties (SUD) is soliciting bids for our ongoing sewer repair and replacement program. SUD anticipates the repair and/or replacement of several thousand feet of main and lateral sewer lines, as well as rehabbing the related manholes in accordance with our CMOM plan. The winning bid will remain valid for a period of 1 (one) year from the date of acceptance and should be priced accordingly. All line item prices should be the complete price from mobilization to restoring the job site to its original condition, including all taxes, fees, overhead, etc. The contractor understands that the Sewanee Utility District's Standard Specifications for Sewer Lines will be followed and the contractor must warrant all work performed for SUD for a period of 1 (one) year from the date of substantial completion of each job. The contractor must hold the proper licensing, insurance, etc. to do the proposed work in the State of Tennessee and be able to provide references of past similar work if requested.

A copy of the bid form and Standard specification can be picked up at SUD's office between the hours of 8AM - 4PM, Monday through Friday, or downloaded from our website, <www.sewaneutility.org/sewerdocs.htm>.

The completed bid form must be returned to SUD's offices in person, by mail, fax, or email by close of business May 21, 2010. IDENTIFYING HEARING LOSS

To help identify hearing loss, try answering the following questions: Do you have problems hearing over the telephone? Do you have trouble following the conversation when two or more people are talking at one time? Do people complain that you turn the volume of the radio or television too high? Do you have to strain to understand conversation? Do you have trouble hearing against a noisy background? Do you often ask people to repeat themselves? Do many people you talk to seem to mumble or not speak clearly? Do you misunderstand what others are saying and respond inappropriately? Do you have trouble understanding women and children? Do people get annoyed because you misunderstand what they say? If you answered yes to three or more of these questions, you should have your hearing evaluated.

Having your hearing tested is the second step toward better hearing. The first step is recognizing that a problem exists. 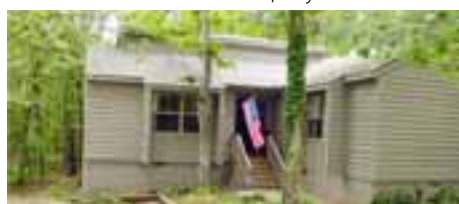

midterm; and the District Four seats of Annie Armour (term expiring) and Dennis Meeks (term expiring). All of the council members whose terms are expiring are eligible to run again if they choose.

The council voted to approve the appointment of Dennis Meeks to serve as election officer and Michael Hurst to serve as deputy election officer. Individuals interested in serving on the Community Council should submit a nominating petition signed by 10 registered voters who live in the Sewanee community. The deadline for submitting a nominating petition is October 15. Petitions are available from Meeks (598-0159) and Hurst (598-0588), and signed petitions should be returned to them.

Meeks asked if Sewanee business owners who resided elsewhere were eligible to serve on the council. Cunningham replied that the by-laws indicate that council members must "reside" in Sewanee. The council will revisit this issue at the June meeting and discuss whether the by-laws should be changed to allow nonresident business owners to

serve. Lankewicz noted that a by-laws change required the approval of a two-thirds majority and that a proposed by-laws change needed to be announced at the meeting prior to the vote.

Updating the council on garbage collection services, Jerry Forster, chief financial officer, said that the community was entering into the fifth year of a five-year contract with Joe B. Long's company, Sewanee Sanitation. The contract will expire in July 2011. The customer's rate for the coming year will remain the same, \$24.85. Long will receive a 1.5 percent increase, but this will be offset by a slight decrease in landfill costs, Forster explained. In addition to garbage collection, Sewanee Sanitation also provides curbside recycling service to residents.

Council representative Pam Byerly posed an inquiry on behalf of a community member who believed the Sewanee police were patrolling less frequently. Police Chief Robert White responded that the number of miles patrolled has not changed and that the police department typi-

cally patrols 5,000 miles per month. At the minimum, two officers are on duty, White said, with that number increasing to three on-duty officers on weekends. The Sewanee police department also makes routine "checks" on 300 buildings and businesses each month. White invites input and suggestions on how to maximize the police department's effectiveness in making Sewanee a safe community in which to live.

Byerly raised another issue brought to her by a community member who asked if curbside leaf pickup could be made available in the fall. Under the present arrangement, Byerly acknowledged, residents could arrange for physical plant services to pick up their leaves for a fee. Byerly asked if there might be a day designated for communitywide curbside leaf pickup free of charge. John Vineyard, director of physical plant services, will research the proposal.

Council representative Meeks voiced a complaint made by community residents that housecats were being killed by coyotes in the Wiggins Creek area. Other council members confirmed reports of local coyote sightings and observed that the number of coyotes has been increasing nationwide. Forster proposed checking with the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency to determine if the number of coyotes in the area was increasing.

The next meeting of the Sewanee Community Council is scheduled for 7 p.m., Monday, June 28, in the Sewanee Senior Citizens' Center. All Community Council meetings are open to the public.

SAS Seniors Look to Graduation and Beyond

"It ain't over, 'til it's over." St. Andrew's-Sewanee School students hear this throughout the year as teachers and advisors encourage them to stave off 'senioritis' and run through, not just to, the finish line of their high school careers. The 40 members of the Class of 2010 have spent their last weeks busy making college decisions, reinforcing the bonds among their classmates through a senior retreat, composing personal creedal statements and enduring one final week of exams.

Along the way, the class has received numerous honors and awards, including more than \$2.9 million in merit awards from colleges and universities across the country. In addition to tuition breaks, students received offers of computers and membership in school honors programs. The schools represent a wide range of choices including, among others, Earlham College, the University of Vermont, Brigham Young University, Bryn Mawr College, SMU, Auburn and Sewanee.

The offer of the Rod Serling Award in Communications at Ithaca College helped Scott Owsley overcome his disinterest in heading to colder climes for college. "I said I wanted someplace warm," said Scott, "but when I toured their facilities and saw all that they had to offer, I realized that a great program would keep me so busy that I wouldn't care what the weather was." Scott plans to pursue filmmaking at IC.

The last few weeks have been filled with reflection and the beginnings of nostalgia for many of the seniors. "Coming to SAS was the best choice of my life," said Caroline Martin, a senior from Decatur, Ala. "I have made lifelong friends, and learned so much about myself, and my schoolwork, as well. It is so wonderful to have teachers who care about their work, and really enjoy teaching."

University Baccalaureate Service

The second of three ceremonies marking the University's commencement weekend began Saturday morning, May 15, as the approximately 340 members of the class of 2010—led by valedictorian Corey French (salutatorian Max Smith led the University choir)—followed the University faculty in procession into the baccalaureate service in All Saints' Chapel.

Three honorary degrees were presented during the service. David Beckmann, president of Bread for the World, and former First Lady Barbara Pierce Bush received honorary Doctor of Civil Law degrees. Jon Meacham, C'91, received an honorary Doctor of Letters.

Meacham, editor of Newsweek magazine, co-anchor of "Need to Know," and Pulitzer Prize-winning author, gave the address. In introducing Meacham, Vice Chancellor Joel Cunningham noted his "brilliant mind, trenchant pen, and compelling wit" before welcoming him home as a son of Sewanee.

Meacham recalled his Sewanee ties for the crowd of undergraduates, families, faculty, staff and guests that filled the Chapel and two overflow

auditoriums. In an address that was by turns reminiscence, media analysis and sermon, he said he has been privileged to spend time with the powerful and famous (and infamous), but has yet to find a situation for which he was not prepared by Sewanee.

Reviewing changes occurring since members of the class of 2010 were born, Meacham declared that confrontation has made civilization seem quaint, and the Internet in some ways has divorced the power of words from the responsibility for them. He expressed hope that the students' generation would be the one to say "enough."

Meacham hailed the University's belief that faith and reason are not incompatible, and its preparation of students to live not "the good life" but "a good life." He spoke of the gift of reason; "without reason, we cannot appreciate complexity—and without an appreciation of complexity, we cannot appreciate the mystery of God."

He concluded with a personal word to the soon-to-be graduates, telling them that when they go astray, one way to set things right again is to remember the virtues and values learned at Sewanee: grace, strength, and love.

Corey French has been named a Lilly Graduate Fellow; seniors Amanda Conrad and Emily Lemon have been awarded Fulbrights; and 14 seniors and seven juniors were initiated into Phi Beta Kappa this spring.
