David Goodpaster

Goodpaster Next Director of CAC

Otey Memorial Parish has announced the next Director of Community Action Committee will be David Goodpaster. Goodpaster has just finished his M.Div. at the School of Theology, and is to be ordained transitional deacon in June by the Bishop of Lexington. He brings extensive experience to the position, including with the Appalachia Service Project in Johnson City, Tenn., and with the Peace Corps in Malawi. He has worked to assist and empower persons with disabilities, and as a classroom teacher, he helped challenged/at-risk students to succeed. Goodpaster has a record of working effectively with volunteers, and has spent significant time face-to-face with extreme poverty. He is married to Lauren Goodpaster, and is the father of Sam and Max.

Several months ago, Deacon Betty Carpenter conveyed her intention to retire as Director of the Community Action Committee at the end of this school year. Her achievements have been numerous, and Otey will celebrate them at the end of this month when she finishes work at the CAC. Carpenter will remain a Deacon at Otey.

"The CAC board welcomes David Goodpaster to the position of Director," said Sandy Rice, board chair. "Many know David and his family since moving here for him to begin his studies with the School of Theology where he completed his degree this week. He will begin his training with Betty ASAP and the board when our current times allow."

'What a wonderful job I have had as Director of CAĆ, and my decision to retire from this position preneurs, it is devastating. was not an easy one but the right one for me," said Deacon Betty Carpenter. "I leave knowing that all will be well with David Goodpaster at the helm. He completely understands the mission of CAC and has my full support as this important work goes on."

Goodpaster will begin work on Monday, May 18, so as to overlap with Deacon Betty for a period of two weeks, ensuring continuity and a seamless transition in this vitally important ministry during this time of change.


New Dean of the School of Theology

Vice-Chancellor John McCardell announced the appointment of the Rev. Canon James F. Turrell, Ph.D., as dean of the School of Theology at the University of the South. Turrell is the current Norma and Olan Mills Professor of Divinity, professor of liturgy, associate dean for academic affairs, and sub-dean of the Chapel of the Apostles. He will assume his new duties on July 1, 2020.

"I am delighted that Jim Turrell

has accepted this appointment," said McCardell. "Not only is he well acquainted with the School of Theology and its mission, but he is also a respected scholar and participant in the life of the wider Church. I know that the Sewanee family will join me in welcoming Jim to his new duties with great enthusiasm."

For the past 17 years, Turrell has

"From my perspective as a member of the faculty, an administrator, and a participant in the wider work of The Episcopal Church, the School of Theology is well positioned to thrive," stated Turrell. "As an Episcopal seminary that is also embedded in a larger university, a unique commitment and accountability to both the Church and the academy distinguish the School, making it more than the sum of its parts. I am thrilled to accept this appointment as we look to the future.

Turrell studied history as an undergraduate at Yale (B.A., 1991) before pursuing a divinity degree there (M.Div., 1996). He was ordained a priest in the Episcopal Diocese of Bethlehem (Pennsylvania) in 1996. After arish work, he studied history at Vanderbilt University (Ph.D., 2002), ocusing on religion in early modern Britain.

Rebecca Abts Wright, professor of Old Testament, senior faculty member, and search committee member, has worked with Turrell as a fellow teacher and during his service as the academic dean. "The faculty has seen Jim's academic life in the classroom and publications, his patient and pastoral character tending to administrative details, and his depth of skill and love for liturgy. We trust his leadership in this time of pandemic change and look forward to what he will bring to the School when we emerge into whatever will be our new 'normal.' Jim is a person for whom 'esteemed colleague' is more than a polite title; it is statement of our shared reality.'

The Rt. Rev. J. Neil Alexander, dean of the School of Theology since 2012, will step down from that position on June 30, 2020; however, he will return after a sabbatical period and resume teaching. He expressed that he couldn't be more pleased that the University has chosen Turrell to be the next dean. "As fellow scholars in the field of liturgy, I have know Jim for many years and I can vouch for his commitment to theological education and to the Church. Working alongside him during the last eight years, I can attest to the fact that he is eminently qualified to carry forward the mission of the School of Theology. I look forward to working with him as a member of the faculty in the years to come."

Franklin County Schools Resume Sports, Cancel ESP

will resume athletic activities on June 1, while the Extended School Program (ESP) will remain closed for the duration of the summer. At the May 11 school board meeting, board members expressed doubts and reservations about both decisions. Likewise, concerns weighed heavy in the board's decision to approve the 2020-21 budget.

resume athletics June 1, Director of Schools Stanley Bean said neighboring school districts would resume sports then. "Both our high school principals want our athletes on the same playing field as other schools." Bean initially proposed June 15 to resume athletics.

Bean's startup plan dictates students' temperatures will be taken on arrival, and students with a temperature above 100.4 degrees will be sent home. Students must observe social distancing. No more than 10 students will be allowed to interact. Weight training equip-

The Franklin County Schools ment will be wiped down. Until June 15, student athletes will be forbidden to leave the county for sports activities Bean said.

Bean stressed all summer activities would be voluntary.

Board member Sarah Marhevsky expressed concern students would feel pressured to participate, ravy in the board's decision to prove the 2020-21 budget.

In announcing the decision to recommended delaying resuming athletics until at least June 15. "This would give us time to see how it worked out with other districts."

Board member Linda Jones concurred. Jones pointed out students would have the opportunity to interact at close range in groups

larger than 10 in the parking lot.
In deciding not to reopen the ESP, the board weighed data from ESP coordinator Kim Nuckolls. Nuckolls poled caregivers and site directors. Of the six school sites with summer programs, only Clark Memorial and Rock Creek voted







Eligible Voters Can Now Request an Absentee By-Mail Ballot for August Election

Eligible Tennesseans can request a ballot to vote absentee by-mail for the Aug. 6 State and Federal Primary and County General election without ever leaving their home.

"Election offices are already accepting absentee by-mail ballot requests for the August election. One of the most popular reasons to vote absentee is being 60 years or older," said Tennessee Secretary of State Tre Hargett. "I encourage those voting absentee by-mail this year to make their request now."

Tennessee state law provides numerous ways to vote absentee by-mail. In addition to a voter being sixty (60) or older, other popular reasons allowed under state law to vote absentee by-mail are as follows:

The voter will be outside the county where they vote during the early voting period and all day on Election Day.

The voter or the voter's spouse is enrolled as a full-time student in an accredited college or university outside the county of registration.

accredited college or university outside the county of registration.

The voter will be unable to vote in person due to service as a juror.

The voter is hospitalized, ill or physically disabled and because of such condition, cannot vote in person.

The voter is a caretaker of a person who is hospitalized, ill or disabled. The voter will be working as a poll official.

The voter is a member of the military and out of the county where they vote.

For a more exhaustive list of statutory reasons to vote absentee by-mail go to <GoVoteTN.com>. Voters who meet a reason under Tennessee law to vote absentee by-mail can submit a written request to their local election commission by mail, fax or email.

Your written request must include:

Your name

Address where you live

Full social security number

Date of birth

The address to mail the ballot to, if different than your home address For the August election, to receive a primary ballot, you must request either a Republican or Democratic primary ballot. If a party is not specified, you will only receive the general election ballot.

Which of the qualifying reasons you meet to vote absentee by-mail. For example, I am 60 years old.

Your signature

While not required, a phone number is recommended in case your election commission needs any additional information.

To submit a request by email, attach a document with all the necessary information and your scanned signature.

Requests must be received by your local election commission no later than seven (7) days before the election. For the Aug. 6 State and Federal Primary and County General Election, complete absentee by-mail requests must be received by July 30.

"I encourage eligible Tennessee voters to take a moment to double-check that they've provided all of the required information and to make their request to vote absentee by-mail as soon as possible. By making sure your request is complete and sending it in early, you will not have to worry about missing the upcoming election," said Tennessee Coordinator of Elections Mark Goins.

Responding to the Census

The 2020 Census is happening now. You can complete your questionnaire online, by phone, or by mail.

Most households received their invitation to respond to the 2020 Census between March 12–20. These official Census Bureau mailings will include detailed information and a Census ID for completing the Census online.

The 2020 Census will ask a few simple questions about you and everyone who is living with you on April 1, 2020. You have the option of completing the questionnaire by phone. To begin, call 844-330-2020.

The 2020 Census counts everyone living in the United States and its five territories. One person should respond for each home. They should live in the home or place of residence themselves and know general information about each person living there.

You should be counted where you are living and sleeping most of the time as of April 1, 2020. If you are responding for your home, count everyone who lives and sleeps there most of the time as of April 1, 2020. This includes young children, foster children, roommates, and any family members or friends who are living with you, even temporarily.

Please note that if someone is staying with you temporarily on April 1 due to the COVID-19 situation, they should be counted where they usually live. This includes college students, who should still be counted at school, even if they are home early because of the COVID-19 situation. If they live in student housing, the college will count them. If they live off campus, they should respond for the off-campus address and include any roommates or other people living there.

If someone is staying with you on April 1 who doesn't have a usual home elsewhere, please include them in your response.

People in some living situations—including students, service members, and people in health care facilities—may have questions about how to respond or where they should count themselves. You may also have questions if you are moving, have multiple residences, or have no permanent address.


Support Food Banks and Farms

usual activity of people, and the goal was to help Sewanee businesses survive," Welch said. "This project began in early March, after the adequate supplies to perform the required disinfecting procedures. 
Funds have been distributed to Sewanee businesses by a small com- Lance Williams. mittee in charge of reviewing applications that include a description of the needs of each business.

"The bottom line is that in the best of times, all the businesses in town have a hard time making ends meet because so few people live here. Now that our sales are a small fraction of what they were, the SBA General Fund means some people will be able to meet obligations that Deputy Finance Director Cindy Latham said her new calculations allow their business to stay open another month and look towards the future," said Katherine Evans, owner of the Lemon Fair.


Opened in 1972, the Lemon Fair has long been a fixture of the Sewanee community. Evans and her family have weathered the ups and downs that come with being business owners for nearly 50 years. But this time, things feel a bit different.

"In the best of days, The Lemon Fair business is roughly 75 percent from out of town. Of the 25 percent of local sales, about 10 percent of them are usually students. I would guess that those numbers are still consistent, but our total sales are down to a trickle at a time of year that is typically busy with graduation and Mother's Day sales," Evans said. "We are in a better position to weather this new world than some of the newer businesses, but we still have overhead to pay. If tourism doesn't safely return to the Mountain, we are all doomed."

'We should let the sites open if they want," said board Vice Chair

Marhevsky pointed out having childcare could be a necessity for parents who want to go back to work.

Ultimately the board concurred with Nuckolls recommendation to remain closed for the summer.

Revisiting the May 4 discussion about the 2020-21 budget, County showed decreased expenses due to eliminating four positions. The draw on the reserve fund balance dropped from \$500,000 to \$400,000. However, Latham also cautioned the board might not receive the full \$388,000 in anticipated tax revenue from the county. Latham estimated the current tax revenue as \$224,000, although there are some delinquent accounts and two months remaining in the fiscal year.

Expressing concern, Williams stressed the health insurance premium increase was still unknown. He also objected to paying raises from the fund balance, which could eventually reduce the reserve fund to zero.

"You can't pay anyone less next year," Foster concurred. The budget calls for \$346,561 in raises: step increases for certified employees based on years of service (\$259, 882) and a 1.6 percent wage increase for classified employees plus step increase (\$86,679). The wage increases exceed new money from the state by \$108,000.

Without more money from the county, the options are to take the raises from the fund balance or take the raises out of the budget," Bean

The two groups receiving raises, certified employees with 21-25 years' experience and classified employees, did not receive raises last year," Foster noted.

Guess pointed out the draw on the fund balance had been steadily decreasing. "Two years ago the draw was almost two million."

The board voted unanimously to approve the budget and send it on to the county commission.





Virtual Spring Pilgrimage iNaturalist Event

Since the 70th annual Smokies Wildflower Pilgrimage was canceled this year, the only time in its 70 year history, the organizers have set up a Virtual Spring Pilgrimage iNaturalist Event, May 11-17. Joey Shaw, who is one of the heads of the event, reports for the first day: "886 observations of 495 species! 396 plant species (they don't run, but some do hide!), 28 insects, four reptiles (the pile of Northern water snakes was really cool to see!), two amphibians (including a tadpole in a hand and a Plethodon party that still need ID to species), four spiders, 39 birds (that picture of the indigo bunting – so blue against fresh green vegetation is a great pic), six mammals, and nine fungi. The most observed species today were Lyre-leaved sage, Eastern gray squirrel, Eastern bluebird, and Northern mockingbird." Also Christmas fern and poison ivy. I finally installed the iNaturalist app and am making very modest additions to the count-only a humble Phildelphia feabane the first day, as I learned how to use the app.

The suet box is especially busy, turning over every 24 hours. All the birds mentioned in last week's column appear there with the Pileated woodpecker returning daily after a year's absence.


