Poetry Reading Featured at School of Letters

The School of Letters lecture series continues with a poetry reading by Jessica Jacobs, at 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, July 3, in Gailor Auditorium. A reception will follow.

Jessica Jacobs is the 2019 John Grammer Fellow at the School of Letters. Made possible by a generous donation from the Blake & Bailey Family Fund, the award brings a noted writer or scholar to Sewanee for an extended visit each summer during the School's academic term.

Jessica is the author of "Take Me with You, Wherever You're Going," Four Way Books. The memoir-in-poems focuses on coming-of-age in Florida and the complexities and joys of early marriage between Jacobs and her wife, fellow poet Nickole Brown. Ada Limón, author of "Bright Dead Things," notes that "All great love stories deserve to be written down for history's sake. With 'Take Me with You, Wherever You're Going,' Jessica Jacobs gives us an intimate, sensual, desirous book full of real life hardships and an epic love story of surrender and survival. Rooted in landscape and written with a rich lyrical line, these gorgeous poems pay necessary homage to what truly matters."

Jessica's debut collection, "Pelvis with Distance," a biography-in-poems of Georgia O'Keeffe, was winner of the New Mexico Book Award in Poetry and a finalist for the Lambda Literary Award. Meticulously researched and richly imagined, these vibrant personal poems push past O'Keeffe's legend to tell the artist's story in her own voice. Interwoven throughout are lyric prose meditations from the poet's month spent alone in a primitive desert cabin. A narrative-driven collection that reads like a novel, this book delves into issues of creativity, feminism, and relationships, while allowing a reader to travel to turn-of-the last century New York City; the wilds of Canyon, Texas; and the New Mexico high desert of the 1930s and today.

Jessica's poetry, essays, and fiction have appeared in publications including Orion, New England Review, Crazyhorse, Guernica, and The Missouri Review. An avid long-distance runner, Jessica has worked as a rock climbing instructor, bartender, and professor, and serves as the Associate Editor of the Beloit Poetry Journal.

She lives with her wife, the poet Nickole Brown, in Asheville, with their dogs.

Changes at the Sewanee Police Department

Marie Ferguson is stepping down from her position as chief of police in Sewanee, effective July 15. Vice-Chancellor John McCardell has asked Assistant Chief Troy Huffines to assume the duties of acting chief as of July 15. Huffines has been with the police department since 2017.

Chief Ferguson joined the Sewanee Police Department in 1999 and became chief in late 2012. During her tenure, she improved the department's use of technology, implemented the use of the LiveSafe app by dispatchers, and established training and mentorship in the department.

"Marie has served with distinction in a most challenging position. Her leadership, her judgment, and her utter professionalism have earned the respect of the entire Sewanee community," said McCardell. "While we will sorely miss Chief Marie's leadership on campus, I am pleased that she will remain an active part of the Sewanee community. And I am confident that the SPD will continue to function smoothly under Troy's leadership while we determine the appropriate next steps."

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Monteagle Grapples with Water Loss, Road Repair; Two New Restaurants Opening

At the June 24 meeting, the Monteagle City Council revisited an 8,000-gallon-per-day water loss issue, and grappled with the need for paving an easement, which provides access to the medical emergency helipad and ballpark. During regular business, the council approved business licenses for two new restaurants and announced plans for three days of July Fourth festivities.

Utility Manager John Condra explained the water loss occurs because the water department must leave water running at the Marshall Graves property to avoid rust. The waterline dead-ends at the Graves property served by 80-year-old cast iron pipe. The city delayed replacing the line due to negotiations with

During this weekend, certain goods may be purchased tax free. The 2019 tax-free holiday weekend begins at 12:01 a.m., Friday, July 26 and ends Sunday, July 28 at 11:59 p.m.

Consumers will not pay state or local sales tax on clothing, school and art supplies that cost \$100 or less per item and computers that cost \$1,500 or less.

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New 'Hands Free Law'

Don't use your cell phone while you are driving. The state's new "Hands Free Law," known as Public Chapter No. 412, takes effect on July 1, 2019. This new law requires drivers to put down their phones and focus on the road.

PC0412 makes it illegal for a driver to:

- hold a cellphone or mobile device with any part of their body;
- write, send, or read any text-based communication;
- reach for a cellphone or mobile device in a manner that requires the driver to no longer be in a seated driving position or properly restrained by a seat belt;
- watch a video or movie on a cellphone or mobile device; and
- record or broadcast video on a cellphone or mobile device.

Peterman Presents Dialogue Across Differences at July Academy

Jim Peterman will address the subject of Dialogue Across Differences at the Academy for Lifelong Learning at noon, Thursday, July 11, in Lower Cravens Hall, 439 Kentucky Ave., on the Sewanee campus.

In the lead up to Thanksgiving, newspapers discuss how to face contentious political conversations with family members on the other side of the political spectrum. Too, reports of surveys abound indicating a high level of political and moral polarization in our country. In this Lifelong Learning session, Peterman will address the question of whether it is morally okay to opt out of difficult political conversations. Why do these disagreements arise? Are we free to avoid them? Discussion of these questions will incorporate both religious and secular arguments for there being a moral requirement for dialogue across political differences.

Jim Peterman is a professor of philosophy at the University of the South, director of the University's Office of Civic Engagement and is a board member of the South Cumberland Community Fund. He is the author of "Philosophy as Therapy: An Interpretation and Defense of Wittgenstein's Later Philosophical Project and Whose Tradition? Which Dao?: Confucius and Wittgenstein on Moral Learning and Reflection."

In addition to her online community, the Geranium Farm, she has served a number of churches, including historic Trinity Church, Wall Street, St. John's-in-the-Village in Greenwich Village, St. Clement's in Manhattan's theatre district and St. James Church in Florence, Italy. She was a maritime chaplain on the New York waterfront, and served as a chaplain at Ground Zero after the attack on the World Trade Center.

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Graves. Graves wants to develop the property, which would require a larger service line.

Graves recently agreed to pay for the larger line, but asked the city to pay for the meter and a fire hydrant.

Condra objected to Graves proposal.

"We haven't done this for anyone else," observed alderwoman Rebecca Byers.

"Water customers pay \$18 to \$20 dollars for each 2,000-gallons of water. We're losing money from the water dumping out," said alderman Tony Gilliam. On Gilliam's suggestion, the council will consult with city attorney Harvey Cameron and invite Graves to the next workshop to attempt to resolve the issue.

Codes Enforcement officer John Knost brought to the council's attention the need to pave the road adjacent to and owned by Shan's Chinese Buffet. The city has an easement to use the road to access the ballpark and helipad.

"There are potholes as big as cars," said alderwoman Jessica Blalock.

"If we have an easement for use of the road, isn't it partly our responsibility to keep it up?" asked alderman Kenneth Gipson.

Knost said the owner estimated the paving cost at \$38,000. Knost expressed concern about dust from vehicle traffic and has asked the state to perform an air quality assessment. The air quality assessment could result in the state requiring the restaurant to address the dust nuisance.

Knost also brought to the council's attention tree rubbish being dumped within the city limits by Bob Lowrie. Lowrie claimed to have permission to dump the refuse with the intention of burning it. Knost said Lowrie did not have a permit for dumping and objected to the burning due to overhead power lines and the close proximity of the lake watershed.

"Lowrie can either clean up the mess or tell the judge why he hasn't," Knost said.

Turning to routine matters, the council approved business licenses for The Big Porch and Dixie Lee Diner restaurants. Both establishments will serve beer, and The Big Porch will also serve wine. The Big Porch, located on Main Street, will feature southern comfort food. Catering to a 1950s-1960s theme, the Dixie Lee Diner on Dixie Lee Avenue will offer milkshakes, Chicago hotdogs, Philly cheese fries, burgers, and perhaps a jukebox.

Parks and Recreation Chair Blalock announced three days of July Fourth festivities. On Wednesday, July 3, at Dubose Conference Center, the community is invited for free food, a bounce house, swimming, and evening fireworks, an event organized by mayor David Sampley. Monteagle's parade will begin at 10 a.m. July 4. Friday, July 5 at the ballpark, the city will host a homemade ice cream making contest at 6 p.m. and fireworks at dark.

Updating the council on police activities, Sergeant William Barker reported Monteagle's 2018 crime rate was under five percent. Pointing to the 16 percent crime rate in Memphis, Barker said only two other communities in the area had crime rates as low as Monteagle.

Second Week of SSMF Featured Two Female Conductors

Guest conductors for the second week at the Sewanee Summer Music Festival include Janna Hymes of the Carmel Symphony Orchestra and Maine Pro Musica, and JoAnn Falletta of the Buffalo Philharmonic and the Virginia Symphony.

Hymes and Falletta are two of three female conductors at the festival this year. The third, Gemma New, will be conducting during the third week of the festival.

Falletta returns for her third year on the Mountain to work with the festival's largest group of student musicians yet.

John Kilkenny, artistic director of the Sewanee Summer Music Festival, said the festival has a record-breaking 231 students, as well as an additional 20 students participating in the clarinet and strings program.

"Both Janna and JoAnn are really pioneers as women in the world of conducting, and we are thrilled to have them on the Mountain," Kilkenny said.

Falletta, who has worked as the music director of the Buffalo Philharmonic Orchestra since 1999, said her time on the Mountain always brings with it a renewed inspiration.

"I really love working with talented young musicians, and I always feel very inspired by their energy, optimism and love of music," Falletta said.

For Hymes, who has only been on the Mountain since Monday, the students inspire her as they sharpen their skills and delve further into understanding their own approaches to the craft.

"One of my passions is education. Here in Sewanee, it is thrilling. The learning curve is tremendous, the student musicians are so eager and excited to be working on music they have likely never played before," Hymes said.

Falletta said her experience watching the students transform into confident musicians over the course of the summer is always inspiring, and there is no better place for that transformation than on the Mountain.

"Sewanee has long had a great reputation, and the festival is a transformative experience for these young musicians. They simply are not the same person as they were when they arrived. They know so much more about themselves, have learned so much challenging music and have grown tremendously in experience and in strength," Falletta said.

Hymes said it is her hope that this time of transformation for the students allows the next generation to pursue a passion in classical music.

before the end of the year. Mills praised SUD for addressing another criticism which had appeared on its audit since 2013. To avoid an “inadequate segregation of duties” citation, SUD employed Tennessee Utility Assistance to perform a monthly review of financial accounts. The “inadequate segregation of duties” finding is common for small utilities that lack the staff to provide the required degree of financial oversight and lack the resources to hire additional full-time staff.

Mills said his firm the MG Group could perform the oversight function “a little more cost efficiently.”

“If we go with another auditor, we could look at switching the oversight provider as well,” said Beavers. On the recommendation of the state, SUD switches auditors every five years. For the audit and oversight to be provided by the same entity would be a conflict of interest. SUD typically selects an auditor in October.

Board President Charlie Smith brought to Mills’ attention the audit’s inaccurate reference to SUD board member term lengths and how board members are selected. Mills will correct the error before submitting the audit to the state comptroller.

Looking ahead to Capital Improvement Projects needing addressed, Beavers cited replacement of old deteriorating cast iron water lines on Tennessee Avenue and at St. Andrew’s-Sewanee School. Identifying the constricted sections on Tennessee Avenue and replacing only those could cut the cost by half, Beavers said. At SAS, he proposed eliminating the old section of line and tying into the new line already there. SUD could do both projects “in-house,” Beavers noted, meaning additional cost savings.

Asked about the need for replacing old constricted, leak-prone waterlines versus addressing inflow and infiltration into the sewer system, Beavers observed the cost of losing treated drinking water due to leaks was greater than the cost of treating increased wastewater due to inflow and infiltration (I&I). Also significant, SUD had already cut I&I by half and has not exceeded its Wastewater Treatment Plant spray limit in years.

Pointing to another upcoming capital expense, Beavers said the two membrane filters at the water treatment plant would need to be replaced in the next three or four years, estimated cost \$50,000.

Commenting on operations and lower water sales, Beavers said, “The trend in the past five years has been for decreased water use in the state and across the country.” Beavers attributed much of the decline in water use to low flow toilets.

Revisiting the discussion at the June 17 special called meeting about Beavers salary, Smith said the board reviewed Tennessee Association of Utility Districts data on utility managers’ salaries. Beavers’ current salary falls at the midpoint for other utilities of the same size. Beavers hasn’t received a wage increase since 2017.

The board approved board member Ronnie Hoosier’s proposal to give Beavers a 3 percent salary increase for 2018, with the portion for the first half the year paid as a bonus.

The board meets next on July 23.

Changes Coming to Public Access at the End of Breakfield

By the end of the summer, the University of the South plans to limit vehicular access to the unpaved section of Breakfield Road past the Equestrian Center. Bicycle, pedestrian, and equestrian access will not be affected.

The University remains committed to encouraging recreational, educational, and research uses on the Domain, balancing that demand with the need to protect the natural environment and ongoing academic teaching and research areas. University employees and current students will continue to have vehicular access to the end of Breakfield Road; recreational hikers and bikers will be able to walk in. Leaseholders and alumni will also retain access for camping.

How will this work?

The University is installing a new electronic gate on Breakfield Road—where the asphalt becomes a gravel road—with access provided by key code or swiping an ID card. Some initial hardware will be located over the next few weeks, though the gate will not be operational until later in the summer.

Why is the gate needed?

The gate will allow the Univer-

sity to reduce the inappropriate use of vehicles on Breakfield Road, protect research and teaching areas, reduce road erosion and associated expense, and improve safety and security efforts.

Can visitors still hike on the Domain?

Yes! In order to realize the potential of the Domain as a resource for recreation and research, Sewanee’s Office of Environmental Stewardship and Sustainability has upgraded parking areas so that they are functional and attractive to visitors and provide directed areas for traffic, with kiosks that provide trail and liability information. These include Green’s View, the University Gates, Lake Cheston, and the Memorial Cross. Trails have been classified according to difficulty and appropriate signage has been installed at intersections, providing helpful information for recreational use. The recreational trail map is being revamped currently and the new and improved version will be launched in the fall.

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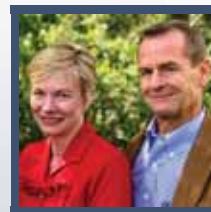
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Summer Meal Program

Tennessee State Museum Explores Southern Food

The Tennessee State Museum will explore the rich and diverse history of Tennessee's food through a new exhibition, Let's Eat! Origins and Evolutions of Tennessee Food, set to open on Aug. 9, at the Museum's Bicentennial Capitol Mall State Park location in Nashville and run through Feb. 2, 2020.

"Whether barbecued, fried, roasted, pickled or chilled, the food of Tennessee, and the southern United States, is a meeting of Southeastern Indian, West European and West African cultural groups," says Rob DeHart, the exhibition's curator. "Many cooks, who were primarily women, took the proteins, vegetables and cooking traditions of each group, then experimented, taste-tested and created delicious meals. The evolution of Tennessee food continues as foreign-born recent arrivals inspire new flavors."

The exhibition will be presented through eight sections that trace the state's food from its Southeastern Indian origins to contemporary food festival celebrations. All are complemented by artifacts from the Museum's collection, digital storytelling, graphics and location photography.

"The Three Sisters" begins with the story of how Southeastern Indians cultivated crops during the Woodland Cultural Period, planting together beans, corn and squash—referred to as the "three sisters." This section also highlights the role of strawberries and corn in Native American traditions, tells the story of the state's Strawberry Festivals and highlights South Pittsburg, Tennessee, the site of Lodge Cast Iron's headquarters and the National Cornbread Festival. "The Buckle of the Barbecue Belt" looks at West European influences on Tennessee Food—the introduction of cattle, pigs and chickens to North America—with visits to Ridgewood Barbecue, Memphis in May and the Kosher BBQ Fest.

In "A Love for Spices," West African influences on the state are explored, along with the foods prepared by enslaved persons at the Hermitage. Visitors will be introduced to Prince's Hot Chicken Shack in Nashville and the Four-Way Soul Food Restaurant in Memphis.

"Making Do" looks at some of the dishes that emerged when Tennesseans had to feed their families from limited resources in their kitchens. Their stories live on in many foods we eat today. Visitors will learn about Florence Mathai and beaten biscuits, festivals that celebrate the wild pungent ramp, "slugburgers" from Pat's Café in Selmer and renowned fermenter, Sandor Katz. In "Cooking for Others," the exhibition introduces visitors to significant Tennessee cooks Melinda Russell and Rufus Estes and boarding house operator Mary Bobo.

Illustrative of the "evolutions" aspect of the show's subtitle, the influence of immigrants figures heavily in the exhibition. In the "Immigration and Tennessee Food" section, the Museum takes visitors to several significant locations in Tennessee, including the Swiss Colony of Gruetli, the Hola Hora Latina Festival in Knoxville, the Global Café in Memphis, Varallo's Chili and the Conexión Américas Communal Kitchen in Nashville.

Of course, there are plenty of farms and restaurants preserving iconic methods of food production statewide, and "Preserving Tennessee Food Traditions" introduces visitors to several, including Muddy Pond Sorghum, Helen's Barbecue, Benton's Smoky Mountain Country Hams, Boyette's Dining Room, Vegan Soy Dairy and Book Publishing at The Farm and Cruze Farms Buttermilk.

Museum visitors will wrap up their adventure to the exhibition with a survey of food festivals throughout the state.

The Tennessee State Museum, on the corner of Rosa L. Parks Blvd. and Jefferson Street, is free and open to the public from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. on Tuesdays, Wednesdays, Fridays and Saturdays, from 10 a.m. to 8 p.m. on Thursdays, and from 1 p.m. to 5 p.m. on Sundays. Another activity in the Village is the Friday Nights in the Park series. Four Friday nights make up this festive annual summer Sewanee activity. Tonight, the second edition will take place and it will be followed by two more in July, on July 12 and the last one on July 19. These events are held at Angel Park on University Avenue, which is closed off to vehicle traffic for the event. These are great family and community gathering opportunities with music, food and fun. Back to the priority projects. The food market and apartments continue to identify the site work needed for the project in the location on the corner of Hwy. 41A and Lake O'Donnell Road. The renderings of the building along with conceptual layouts of the apartments will be on display at the "See Sewanee's Future" as part of the Sewanee Fourth of July festivities. The road project is nearing completion of the design and the Village Green project is seeking proposals for the start of its design. We hope to have a conceptual design by the end of 2019.

'All That Blooms and Grows'

During the month of July, In-Town Gallery features "All That Blooms and Grows," a joint show by potter Laurie Graham and painter Julie Turner. "All That Blooms and Grows" is on display through the month of July with a reception July 5, 5-8 p.m.

Their love of nature and of Chattanooga's colorful and textured landscapes are the inspiration for their artistic creations. This show combines Graham's creative and often whimsical pottery with Turner's dramatic large scale paintings, resulting in a feast for the eye and the imagination.

Potter Laurie Graham received her bachelor's degree from Tennessee Technological University Appalachian Center for Crafts. Although she has worked in other media, she says, "After my first clay class I knew I was called to be a potter." She loves the way clay feels in her hands and creates her pottery on both the wheel and by hand building. Not feeling bound to a narrow approach when working in clay, she will often press leaves and other organic materials into the clay as part of the creative process.

Examples of Graham's whimsical way with pottery are seen in her bowl which seems more a large joyous sunflower than pottery, or the lidded vessel decorated with a delightful little fish.

Julie Turner's passion for art started at age five with drawings she made to adorn her love letters to Elvis. Throughout her life, she continued creating art in her free time even as she pursued a successful corporate career. However, Turner truly began following her journey as an artist after surviving breast cancer. Largely self-taught as a fine artist, in 2003 she began taking art workshops at the studios of artists she admires.

"My life experiences," she says, "and my study of the perspectives of other artists helped me to see my subjects in a new way and to translate this vision into highly personal paintings." Her artwork centers on subjects meant to bring joy and a sense of wonder to the viewer.

Flowers truly come to life in Turner's striking paintings. Rich in color, boldly stated, and brimming with energy, she paints her subjects in a dynamic style that communicates her fascination with nature.

Celebration of Composer Samuel Barber at State Museum

The Tennessee State Museum, in partnership with Nashville Opera, will present a free performance for voice and piano of American composer Samuel Barber's 1947 classic, "Knoxville: Summer of 1915," in the Grand Hall of the Museum on Sunday, July 7, at 2 p.m.

The composition, based on James Agee's 1938 prose poem of the same name, will help mark the final day of the Museum exhibition, Between the Layers: Art and Story in Tennessee Quilts. An excerpt of Agee's piece appears in the exhibition.

"On the rough wet grass of the back yard my father and mother have spread quilts. We all lie there, my mother, my father, my uncle, my aunt, and I too am lying there ... They are not talking much, and the talk is quiet, of nothing in particular, of nothing at all in particular, of nothing at all. The stars are wide and alive, they seem each like a smile of great sweetness, and they seem very near." -- James Agee, "Knoxville: Summer of 1915"

"Agee is one of Tennessee's most significant writers," said Ashley Howell, the Museum's executive director. "Knoxville: Summer of 1915" is a beautiful, lyrical piece, and one we knew would be perfect

to complement the exhibition. Barber, in his own words, turns it in a "lyric rhapsody" that is sure to inspire delight for our visitors in the Grand Hall and be an apt way to close out this wonderful exhibition."

Agee's work, originally written in 1938, serves as the preamble to his 1957 novel, A Death in the Family. Published posthumously after his death in 1955 at age 45, the book won the Pulitzer Prize for fiction in 1958.

Barber's music was championed by a remarkable range of renowned artists, musicians, and conductors, according to his bio at G. Schirmer, including Vladimir Horowitz, John Browning, Martha Graham, Arturo Toscanini, Dmitri Mitropoulos, Jennie Tourel, and Eleanor Steber. His "Antony and Cleopatra" was commissioned to open the new Metropolitan Opera House at Lincoln Center in 1966. Barber was the recipient of numerous awards and prizes including the American Prix de Rome, two Pulitzers, and election to the American Academy of Arts and Letters.

Mockers


Look and listen for the Gray Catbird when you are near damp, overgrown, brushy areas like between Stirling's and the Bishop's Common or at the bottom of Shedd Lane (know where that is?), where I saw and heard one recently, singing its "mocking" song in a call and response with another catbird. If you get a good look, you can see its black cap and reddish undertail feathers, while the rest of it is gray.

More often, you are likely to hear its "mewing" call, which gives the catbird its name. Catbirds are summer residents of much of the United States and one of three Mimids that are found in our area. The name "Mimid" indicates that they can mimic the songs of other birds, and sometimes other noises, in their songs. The catbird is the least skilled of the three in this area, usually singing each phrase once in the series.

Earlier in the spring, you may have heard another Mimid, the Brown Thrasher, also singing between the B.C. and Stirling's, as well as elsewhere. It has a more musical and mimicking song, and usually repeats each phrase twice. Both these birds are often hidden in the brushy undergrowth they prefer, but the Brown Thrasher may be detected by its activity of tossing through fallen leaves in search of insects and other invertebrates.

The third Mimid is the very familiar Northern Mockingbird, the most eloquent and ubiquitous singer of them all, mimicking the songs of numerous other species. It sings from an open perch and at all hours of the day and night. The mockingbird usually repeats phrases more than twice. The mockingbird is a year-round resident in the Southeast and some other parts of the country.

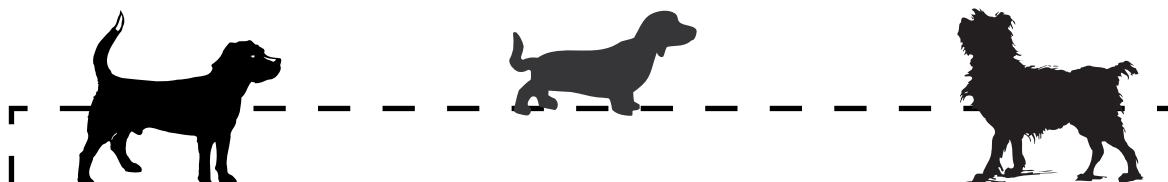
