Caverns Cave Tours: History, Geology, Myth, Magic

Many cultures have creation and enlightenment stories associated with caves. "I was born again inside a cave," said Todd Mayo. "My life changed forever." Mayo owns the world-famous Pelham music venue The Caverns, located in Big Mouth Cave. He told his story leading a tour of his latest underground undertaking, the opening of the breathtaking neighboring cave, Big Room. Formerly accessible only to experienced cavers via a rappel, visitors can now walk into the vast, enchanting underground chamber backpacking a toddler if they choose. Creating a second entrance to Big Room took ingenuity, caution, and Mayo's mission driven determination.

Proposed Monteagle Travel Center Faces Hurdles

Rodney Kilgore appeared before the Monteagle Planning Commission July 7, requesting permission for a project prerequisite to opening a travel center along I-24, exit 135. The request was denied. The proposed travel center may also

encounter zoning issues.

Kilgore and co-franchisees Tammy Graber and Brian Graber entered into a franchise agreement with TravelCenters of America to open a Petro Shopping Center, expected to begin business in the first quarter of 2021.

Kilgore, who owns Monteagle Wrecker Service, presented the planning commission with a site plan for adding two bays to his shop. The proposed travel center would incorporate Kilgore's current

"It will all be combined together later on," Kilgore said. "We're trying to get approval for Petro. We need two more bays to get approved to be a truck stop."

Garret Haynes with the Southeast Tennessee Development District recommended the commission deny the request.

'There are multiple requirements that are still outstanding," Haynes said. "My primary issue with it is that the property is still four different properties and needs to be consolidated into one lot. This needs to come before a site plan is presented. Outside of that, the level of intensity of revisions that need to be made leads me to not recommend approval."

Planning Commission Chair David Oliver advised Kilgore his site plan would need to meet

University Fall Planning Update

As previously communicated, the University will begin classes earlier in August than in previous years and will complete classes before Thanksgiving. Students will return home before Thanksgiving break for the remainder of the semester. Finding Your Place is planned to begin Aug. 3 and Orientation on Aug. 13. Family members will not stay in Sewanee after dropping off their students; all family Orientation activities will occur remotely. Classes will begin Aug. 17.

Returning student arrivals on campus will be scheduled and staggered, with about 200 arriving each day, in order to reduce density on campus and allow for COVID-19 testing. The University has recommended a 14-day at-home quarantine period prior to traveling to campus, and will test all students upon arrival in Sewanee.

Students who receive a positive test result for COVID-19 and who live within driving distance will return home for at least 14 days of isolation and recovery. Students who are unable to return home quickly and safely will isolate and recover on campus; the University has housing options and a plan for their care.

The University also plans for regular surveillance testing of students, faculty, and staff throughout the semester.

Students are discouraged from bringing a vehicle to campus this fall. Those who do bring a vehicle to campus will be asked to limit their use to only local and essential purposes.

Student social events will be smaller than usual and they will usually take place outside. Proper physical distancing and masking will be required.

Lectures, exhibits, concerts, plays, and recitals are part of a typical semester. This will not be a traditional fall on campus in any respect, including for many of these activities. Students and faculty continue to make art and we will share the results with the community through new modes of presentation. Look for more details to come.

Planning is underway to reconfigure the Fowler Center to allow for social distancing, to adjust hours to allow for cleaning, and to determine ideal capacity to stay healthy. More information will follow.

University-wide events like Family Weekend and Homecoming have been cancelled, and others may be held virtually. All Office of Admission group events for prospective students will take place online.

Two Sales Tax Holidays

For 2020 only, the Tennessee General Assembly has approved two sales tax holiday weekends to help Tennesseans save money and support the economy amid the COVID-19 pandemic.

The first tax-free holiday weekend focuses on clothing and other back-to-school items. It begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 31, and ends Sunday, Aug. 2, at 11:59 p.m. During this time, consumers may purchase clothing, school supplies, and computers and other qualifying electronic devices without paying sales tax. Certain price restrictions apply. For school supplies and clothing, the threshold for qualifying items is \$200 or less. For computers and other electronics, the price threshold is \$3,000 or less.

Exempt items sold online are also eligible. Consumers must purchase items for personal use, not business or trade.

The second sales tax holiday weekend focuses on restaurant sales. It begins at 12:01 a.m. on Aug. 7 and ends Sunday, Aug. 9, at 11:59 p.m. During this time the retail sale of food and drink by restaurants and limited service restaurants, as defined in Tenn. Code Ann. § 57-4-102, is exempt from sales tax.

"The COVID-19 pandemic has caused immense economic strain on Tennessee families. These sales tax holidays will allow them to keep more of their hard-earned money and support Tennessee businesses," said Tennessee Governor Bill Lee.

"We want to remind everyone about these opportunities for tax relief," Revenue Commissioner David Gerregano said. "It's a good opportunity to save money during these difficult times."

The Department of Revenue is responsible for the administration of state tax laws and motor vehicle title and registration laws, as well as the collection of taxes and fees associated with those laws. The Department collects around 87 percent of total state revenue. During the 2019 fiscal year, it collected \$15.3 billion in state taxes and fees and more than \$3 billion in taxes and fees for local governments. The Sewanee Village: A **Historical Perspective**

At the July 4 Sewanee Village virtual open house, host Frank Gladu walked guests through the history of envisioning downtown Sewanee as part of the University Master Plan. Gladu opened the gathering with the U.S. Marine Band performing "Stars and Stripes Forever," a fitting tribute to both the holiday and how recollection challenges the imagination as it did John Philip Sousa who composed the march.

Gladu heads up the Sewanee Village Plan tasked with revisioning and revitalizing the downtown area. "The history of village planning goes way back," Gladu said. "University land use studies in 1979 and 1992 identified downtown and the village as areas important for the university to develop and vitalize." The University Master Plans of 2005 and 2011 stressed the importance of the Village. In 2012, a Vision and Program Study followed and then an Action Plan in 2014. "In 2016, our current town planner Town Planning and Urban Design Collaborative developed the Sewanee Village Implementation Plan that we're following today."

Outlining the land area scope of the project, Gladu said the Sewanee Village encompassed 200 acres with the focus being on the 45-acre downtown section. The greatest commercial development is projected to occur on the south side of Highway 41A. All the Village is zoned mixed use.

The Implementation Plan was described as a 100-year plan," Gladu said, "But we identified five priority projects to be completed by 2022." Gladu provided updates on the five projects status.

The two projects with the most momentum are the new bookstore and the plan to narrow Highway 41A to calm traffic. The bookstore hopes to have a soft opening at the end of July. Construction to narrow Highway 41A could begin as early as next spring. The project incorporates extending the Mountain Goat Trail in the design and calls for planting strips and sidewalks.

Sewanee Village development partner BP Construction has temporarily put plans for a mixed-use building on hold due to COVID-19," Gladu said. The building design calls for a grocery on the ground floor and apartments on the second floor. The anticipated site is the current Hair Depot lot.

Housing is likewise "on pause." A 2018 Housing Study demonstrated the demand. "There is plenty of opportunity," Gladu stressed, "but just not the right combination of capital interests yet."

Financial considerations also come into play in creating a downtown Village Green. "We have a design," Gladu said. "But the Village Green is not an income producing project. We need to develop a capital campaign to raise funds."

Studies done in conjunction with the Sewanee Village Project addressed the need for parking, mitigating storm water, and the importance of promoting tourism and how best to do so.

Recently the parking opportunities were enhanced at Woody's Bicycles and behind the American Legion Hall. On the tourism front, new billboards on I-24 celebrate Sewanee's charm and the highway side of Taylor's Mercantile displays a Sewanee welcome wall banner.

Guests pointed to the need for better signage and Sewanee maps. Gladu championed both ideas.

Gladu hosts a Sewanee Village update meeting on the first Tuesday of each month.

The McClurg Dining team unexpectedly became available to support a large-scale summer meal program. "It was truly a fortunate coincidence," said Chef Rick Wright, Director of Dining Services. "It's one of those rare moments when much good comes out of an otherwise negative situation."

One big challenge was finding a way to work together safely, said Wright. The McClurg management team put a number of CDC-approved and recommended safety precautions in place including staggered shifts and plenty of PPE. The McClurg staff is busy this summer and though it's difficult to calculate, "Our food suppliers, their delivery teams and our employees certainly have more work, thanks to the large-volume orders," said Wright.

The summer meal program is a true team effort and a morale booster in very difficult times. It's rewarding for us all to be making such a large impact in the community, in which most of us live. Everyone wins— kids, families, employees, VISTAS, community volunteers and our suppliers. It's work everyone feels good about," said Wright.

All children 18 years old and under are welcome to receive free meals. Children need not be present during meal distribution, which means parents or other adults may pick-up meals for children who are at home. At most locations meals are distributed in grab-and-go fashion with as many as 10 meals per child distributed at one time.

The University of the South in partnership with the South Cumberland Community Fund encourages all plateau families with children to participate in this free meal program. All children 18 years and younger are welcome to receive meals at no charge regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability.





Eligible Voters Can Now Request an Absentee By-Mail **Ballot for August Election**

Pursuant to the June 4, 2020 Order of the Davidson County Chancery Court, if you are a registered voter and do not wish to vote in-person due to the COVID-19 situation, you are eligible to request an absentee ballot or on Election Day. Eligible Tennesseans can request a ballot to vote in-person during early voting or on Election Day. absentee by-mail for the Aug. 6 State and Federal Primary and County General election without ever leaving their home.

You are sixty (60) years of age or older.

You are hospitalized, ill or physically disabled and unable to appear at your polling place to vote; and/or you have determined it is impossible or

You are the caretaker of a person who is hospitalized, ill, or disabled, and/or you have determined it is impossible or unreasonable to vote inperson due to the COVID-19 situation.

You are a candidate for office in the election.

You serve as an Election Day official or as a member or employee of

You are observing a religious holiday that prevents you from voting in person during the early voting period and on Election Day.

You or your spouse possess a valid commercial drivers license (CDL) or Transportation Worker Identification Credential (TWIC) card and you will be working outside the state or county of registration during the open hours of early voting and Election Day and have no specific outof-county or out-of-state address to which mail may be sent or received during such time.

You are a member of the military or are an overseas citizen. For a more exhaustive list of statutory reasons to vote absentee by-mail go to <GoVoteTN.com>. Voters who meet a reason under Tennessee law to vote absentee by-mail can submit a written request to their local election commission by mail, fax or email.

Address where you live

Full social security number

Date of birth

The address to mail the ballot to, if different than your home address For the August election, to receive a primary ballot, you must request either a Republican or Democratic primary ballot. If a party is not specified, you will only receive the general election ballot.

While not required, a phone number is recommended in case your election commission needs any additional information.

To submit a request by email, attach a document with all the necessary information and your scanned signature.

Requests must be received by your local election commission no later than seven (7) days before the election. For the Aug. 6 State and Federal Primary and County General Election, complete absentee by-mail requests must be received by July 30.

Gov. Lee **Grants Mayors Authority** to Issue COVID-19 Mask Requirements

On July 3, Tennessee Governor Bill Lee signed Executive Order 54 to grant county mayors in 89 counties the authority to issue local mask requirements in the event of a significant rise in COVID-19 cases.

'While our densely populated urban areas continue to have the highest COVID-19 case rates, our local governments expressed a need for greater flexibility in addressing a rise in cases and that includes setting stronger expectations around masks," said Gov. Lee. "This targeted approach ensures we protect both lives and livelihoods and safely keep our economy open in Tennessee. We encourage every Tennessean across the state to use a face covering or mask, make sure to socially distance and wash hands frequently."

The six counties with locally run health departments including Sullivan, Knox, Hamilton, Davidson, Madison and Shelby counties retain the existing authority to issue mask requirements as needed.

Federal Pandemic Unemployment **Program Ending in July**

FPUC provided \$600 per week in federal assistance, in addition to benefits from other unemployment insurance programs, including Tennessee Unemployment Compensation and Pandemic Unem-

The CARES Act requires states to provide FPUC through July 31. Tennessee, like many other states, ends its benefit week on Saturdays. July 25 is the last Saturday in the month. Federal law does not allow the state to pay this particular benefit through Saturday, Aug. 1.

Eligible claimants still unemployed as of July 26 will receive benefits that do not include the additional \$600 FPUC payment

starting Monday, Aug. 3. If an eligible claim is in pending status, and the claimant has completed all weekly certifications prior to July 25, they will retroactively receive their benefits, including the FPUC payments, on the date the claim processes.

The additional unemployment programs outlined in the CARES Act; PUA and Pandemic Emergency Unemployment Compensation, will continue through Dec. 26, 2020, the last Saturday of that month.

Deadline Extended to **Apply for COVID-19 Food Assistance**

Families across Tennessee still have time to apply for an important program designed to help support them through the COVID-19 pandemic. The Tennessee Department of Human Services (TDHS) has extended the deadline to apply for the Pandemic Electronic Benefit Transfer (P-EBT) program until Monday, July 13, at 4:30 p.m. Central Time.

Families can apply online http://tdhs.service-now.com

P-EBT provides parents with \$5.70 in food benefits per child for mation. each day that child qualifies. To be eligible, children must receive free or reduced meals at school or attend a Community Eligibility Provision school. Families who receive Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP) or Temporary Assistance for Needy Families (TANF) benefits do not need to apply as their benefits will be automatically applied to their existing EBT cards.

P-EBT is designed to replace meals lost during the months of March, April, and May due to COVID-19 school closures. Qualifying families who do not receive SNAP or TANF will receive a P-EBT card in the mail in July that can be used to purchase food at any establishment that accepts EBT or online with Amazon and Walmart.

Individuals who need assistance completing their P-EBT application or have general questions about the program are encouraged to call the TDHS hotline at 1-833-496-0661.

The Families First Coronavirus Response Act authorized the U.S. Department of Agriculture to approve states for Pandemic EBT (P-EBT). Approved state agencies may operate P-EBT when a school is closed for at least five consecutive days during a public health emergency designation when the school would otherwise be in session. Tennessee is among the more than 40 states that have received P-EBT approval.



NATURENOTES

Pine-sap

Victoria I. Sullivan sent in this Nature Note.

A solitary Pine-sap (Monotropa hypopithys L. in the blueberry family) stalk of flowers sprang up in our backyard under a persimmon tree at the edge of the woods near Fairbanks Circle. This pale inconspicuous inflorescence with its many dull colored flowers is not accompanied by leaves or other green parts. The lack of chlorophyll bearing leaves and/or stems begs the question: How does it obtain food? Most plant species make food through photosynthesis using green chlorophylls pigments. Pine-sap are heterotrophs (feed on others), specifically mycoheterotrophs (myco means fungus) that attach to a mycorrhizal fungus attached to the roots of a photosynthetic plant. The fungus acts as a bridge between the plant and the mycoheterotroph. Carbon nutrients flow from the plant root to the fungus and on to the mycoheterotroph.

Registration is now open for the 2020-21 Tennessee Naturalist Program (TNP), sponsored by the Friends of the South Cumberland.

TNP is a series of 10, four-hour classes that are designed to introduce adult learners to the natural history of Tennessee. Graduates join a critical corps of volunteers providing nature education, outreach and service to the South Cumberland State Park (SCSP).

Classes are scheduled in two semesters, from September to November and February to May, and are usually held on Saturday mornings. The classwork is divided between lectures, hands-on activities and many hours of outdoor immersion. Topics include geology, forests, plants, mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians, aquatic ecosystems, trail building and interpretation.

The cost for the classes is \$250 per person for current members of the Friends of South Cumberland State Park. For those who are not current members, the fee is \$275 per person, which includes a one-year individual membership in the Friends.


