County Commissioners Change Votes, Budget Approved

At the Aug. 19 special called meeting, the Franklin County Commission approved the 2019-20 budget and the 20.5 cent property tax increase needed to support county expenses. Three weeks before, at the July 29 special called meeting, the commission rejected the same budget. Three commissioners changed their votes, giving the proposed budget the majority needed to pass.

On July 29, the commission voted to reduce expenses by \$358,000. This reduced the tax increase needed from 24 cents to 20.5 cents. The oudget still failed to receive enough votes.

On Aug. 5, the Finance Committee reviewed the budget and decided to return it to the commission unchanged from the July 29 version.

On Aug. 19, three commissioners who voted against the budget on July 29 changed their votes—Gene Snead, Lydia Curtis Johnson, and Carolyn Wiseman.

Prior to the vote, Snead said, "We received a letter today from the state comptroller stressing the necessity of and our responsibility to pass a budget so we can provide services to the citizens of the county." If the county had failed to pass a budget by Aug. 31, the state would

"The budgeting process has been arduous," Snead said. Among controversial issues were the raises received by all county employees except school system employees. Snead suggested going forward, all county employees should receive raises. He also argued the percentage basis for

Rotaract Club in Action

Last year, the Rotaract Club of Sewanee had a goal of raising \$20,000 for the American Cancer Society. After working for months to prepare for the event, the group was able to donate more than \$37,000. Planning is currently underway for the second annual Relay for Life, which is scheduled for Oct. 26 on Hardee-McGee Field at Harris Stadium, Sewanee.

The Relay for Life honors those who have passed from or are battling cancer, cancer survivors and their caregivers. Though the club prioritizes planning for the relay, they are busy year-round working to raise money and awareness for other causes as well.

Last year, the club partnered with the Monteagle-Sewanee Rotary Club to support the work of the Hunger Walk. This raised more than \$25,000 for the Community Action Committee (CAC) in Sewanee and the Morton Memorial UMC Food Ministry in Monteagle.

Jenna Land, who serves as the community service chair for the Rotaract Club, works to bridge the gap between the Sewanee community and those on campus. One of the projects she found to be a success is Treats for Troops.

Caroline Sweetin, president of the Rotaract club, said in the past, the club has raised money for Global Health Charities, which works to prevent deaths that occur in mothers and newborns who do not have access to hospitals, healthcare resources and clean supplies.

"I think it's really important for younger generations to know the effects that cancer has on our families and friends and our communities. In a community as tightly-knit as Sewanee, it seems that it has a farther reach. They're placing the



The Fall Heritage Festival returns to Cowan, Sept. 20-22, filling the town with art, history, music, food, and free activities for



Oehmig to Lead Labyrinth Retreat at St. Mary's Sewanee

"When external events compel us to look outward, it is precisely the time when we need to look inward," according to Margy Oehmig, who will lead the retreat, "A Labyrinth Journey: Connecting Your Creativity through Walking and Writing," Sept. 6-8, at St. Mary's Sewanee. Joining her to lead the retreat will be Terry Price.

Through a blend of walking the St. Mary's Sewanee labyrinth, creative writing and journaling, and time for quiet and reflection, the retreat will help participants learn new ways to incorporate the labyrinth into their life. Although no writing experience is necessary, seasoned writers will learn how the labyrinth can enhance their practice.

The labyrinth is a meditative tool, Oehmig said, that offers healing and transformation within its path toward integration and wholeness. Unlike a maze which is designed to block the way and cause confusion, the labyrinth has a single, circuitous path that leads to the center and back out. A metaphor for life and the spiritual journey, it is full of twists and turns as it, time after time, winds its way close to the middle before returning to the outer perimeter.

This retreat is a chance to "come together with others of like mind, to get away in an idyllic setting, away from the routine, the requirements, the numbing repetition of existence, to find and reclaim our art and, therefore, ultimately our lives," Price said.

Oehmig, who lives in Chattanooga, received her training as a labyrinth facilitator at Chartres Cathedral under the tutelage of Lauren Artress, author of "Walking a Sacred Path." She has long been drawn to the labyrinth as a contemplative tool and uses it in combination with her Centering Prayer practice to quiet the mind, still the body, and listen to the quiet voice within. She holds a master's in fine arts in art history.

Price is a writer, photographer, and labyrinth facilitator who holds a master's in fine arts in writing from Spalding University in Louisville. His writing has appeared in many publications including The Trunk, The Tennessee Writer, the Timber Creek Review, New Southerner, The Best of New Southerner and 2nd & Church. His essays have been nominated twice for the Pushcart Prize.



Imagination Library **Continues** to Improve Children's **Reading Skills**

As of August, 78.53 percent of children in Grundy County who are age 0 to 5 are receiving an Imagination Library book every month. This number is much higher than the statewide average of 70 percent. One year of enrollment in himself to be a key champion for the program with 12 books mailed to a child's home costs \$26 per child. The Governor's Books from Birth Foundation pays 50 percent of the cost and the remaining 50 percent is funded by donations to the Rotary Club's Imagination Library Program by local citizens, businesses, and charitable foundations. Tax-deductible donations to the Grundy County Imagination Library may be made to the Grundy Rotary Service Fund, P. O. Box 1903, Tracy City, TN 37387. To donate online, go to <GovernorsFoundation.org/Give>. Be sure to designate Grundy County books for one year. A \$65 donation provides a child with the entire program of books until age five.

Eighty percent of the brain development of a child occurs before age three. Learning to read during this period increases the chances of success for the child in later life. Reading with the child increases parent involvement with the child which results in better family relationships and less behavioral problems for the child. Children who have been engaged in the program also have better relations with classmates when they start school. A child who is read to by a parent three or more times a week is twice as likely to achieve reading scores in the top 25 percent of students. Teachers praise the program, saying the reading skills with which children are beginning school are substantially better. Children who have gotten these books read better in higher grades and also seem to get along better with classmates. Reading skills are essential to the success of individuals, regardless of trade or career choice. Nearly one-half of correctional facility inmates cannot read or write and 85 percent of juvenile offenders have reading problems.



allocating raises was unfair to "employees who make the least and have the most difficult time paying bills," and he proposed the county consider not replacing employees who retired or resigned, reducing the number

of employees by relying on technological efficiency.

Prefacing her vote, Wiseman said, "Because I am an employee of a Franklin County Department, I have a conflict of interest in the proposal about to be voted on. However, I declare that my argument and my vote answer only to my conscience, and to my constituents, and to the citizens this body represents."

Commissioners Scottie Riddle and Chuck Stines, likewise county employees who voted for the budget, prefaced their votes with a similar conflict-of-interest statement.

Commissioners Johnny Hughes, Helen Stapleton, Barbara Finney, Doug Goodman, David Eldridge, and Dale Shultz also voted to approve

Commissioners Sam Hiles, Adam Casey, and Greg King voted, "no." Commissioner Angie Fuller passed.

Before the vote on the property tax increase, Commissioner David Eldridge, who serves on the Finance Committee, said, "Many commissioners were in favor of a sales tax increase rather than a property tax increase. A sales tax increase must be approved by a referendum. It is not off the table. It just wasn't an option we could look at."

The same commissioners who voted to approve the budget voted in favor of the 20.5 cent property tax increase, with Hiles, Casey, and King opposed and Fuller passing.

Property is taxed at 25 percent of assessed value. For a \$100,000 home, 25 percent of assessed value is \$25,000. For every \$100 of that \$25,000 the tax will increase 20.5 cents, for a total increase of \$51.25.

Following the meeting Fuller, chair pro tempore, said she would have voted if necessary to achieve a majority. She stressed her constituents for the most part supported the 11 cents of the tax increase needed for the new middle schools and would have gone along with as much as a 15 cent increase, but 20 cents was too much. Citing objections to the budget, she pointed to \$2 million being allocated to complete the new jail when only \$700,000 was needed.

'Our Own Hunger: Photographs of Kitchens' and Workshop at SAS

The SAS Gallery at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School will open the 2019-20 gallery season with photographs by Pradip Malde. Malde's show "Our Own Hunger: Photographs of Kitchens" will be in the SAS Gallery through September 30, with a public artist's reception from 4 to 6 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 5.

Malde's masterful photographs depict kitchens from Haiti, Jamaica, Cuba and Tanzania. As Malde explains, "Kitchens are the center of any home and can present indicators of economic and social position." These photographs are both lush and starkly beautiful. They honor the families whose nourishment grows from these kitchens, and yet they point to the injustices of systematic poverty within their communities. The work in this show invites the viewer to contemplate this disparity. St. Andrew's-Sewanee School Gallery is delighted to offer the first public viewing of this new and on-going body of work that Malde began in 2010.

Pradip Malde is a photographer and professor at the University of the South. Much of his work considers the experience of loss and how it serves as a catalyst for regeneration. He is currently working in rural communities in Haiti, Tanzania, and Tennessee, designing models for community development through photography. Works are held in the collections of the Museum of the Art Institute, Chicago; Princeton University Museum; Victoria & Albert Museum, London; Yale University Museum; and the Scottish National Portrait Gallery, Edinburgh, among others. He was won many awards including a Guggenheim Fellowship for the Creative Arts in 2018.

Malde was born in Arusha, Tanzania in 1957. His parents were the children of Indians who emigrated to East Africa, and after having established a privileged life in Tanzania, fled from the turmoil that spread through that region in the 1970s. Concerned about loss and belonging since then, he has come to think of artifacts as membranes, where what may be explicit and immutable begins to lead us into the realms of memory and meaning, and ultimately, understanding the experiences of others.

In conjunction with the SAS exhibit, Pradip Malde will offer a one-day public photography workshop, Photographic Vision: Bringing What We Imagine into an Image, on Saturday, Sept.7, 9 a.m.–3 p.m. In the workshop, participants will consider the fundamental controls of photography and how a photograph can be made to be eloquent. One should bring a camera (smart phone or DSL) to use and all necessary connectors. The \$25 fee includes lunch. 



Registration Open for Tennessee Naturalist Program

The Friends of South Cumberland are now enrolling students in the 2019–20 Tennessee Naturalist Program (TNP), which begins in September.

TNP is a series of 10 four-hour classes, designed to introduce adult learners to the natural history of Tennessee. Graduates will join a group of volunteers who provide nature education, outreach and service to the South Cumberland State Park.

Classes are offered from September to November, and from February to May, and are usually held on Saturday mornings. Classwork is divided between lectures, hands-on activities and many hours of outdoor immersion. Topics include geology, forests, plants, mammals, birds, reptiles and amphibians, aquatic ecosystems, trail building and interpretation. In addition to classwork, 40 hours of volunteer work are required to receive the Tennessee Naturalist certification. The fieldwork portion of the course can be physically demanding, with off-trail hikes on steep hills and rough terrain, and some night activities.

The class of 22 is expected to fill quickly. Registration is on a first-come, first-served basis. Cost of the program is \$250 per person for current Friends members. Nonmembers may participate for \$275, which includes a year's membership in the Friends. Participants receive a field notebook, hand lens, and a jump drive containing all class materials.


