

Elliott Park Ground-Breaking & Work Day

A special community work day to install the required surface material to complete the new playground at Elliott Park, will begin at 1 p.m., Saturday, Nov. 7. This will be followed by a grand opening of the renovated Elliott Park, with a celebration and ribbon cutting.

The Sewanee Civic Association (SCA), in partnership with the University of the South, has brought to completion the second project in the Sewanee community parks system. The Phil White Dog Park was the first park that SCA sponsored in the community.

The community, along with the South Cumberland Community Fund, the Sewanee Community Council Funding Project, the Kaj Krogstad Memorial Fund, the Joel and Trudy Cunningham Charitable Fund, the Monteagle Sewanee Rotary and donations through a designated fund with the Sewanee Community Chest, donated more than \$56,000 to purchase and install the new playground equipment, which is located in Elliott Park on University Avenue adjacent to the bookstore.

The mulch-like fiber surface material needs to be installed; community members are asked to sign up for shifts, as well as bring wheelbarrows, rakes and pitchforks to lend for the event.

Volunteers should wear gloves and closed-toe shoes when working and

The University Avenue corridor is defined as the area from Georgia Avenue to the University Book and Supply Store and Print Services along both sides of the street—including the Rebel's Rest site, Convocation Hall, the Quad, Fulford Hall, Thompson Union, All Saints' Chapel, McClurg, the bookstore and Chen Hall.

Attendees of the public meetings should come prepared to discuss these questions: Where should the University locate the University Commons? What are the best and most appropriate uses for the University Avenue corridor to serve the long-term interests of the University and its community?

Council Discusses Transfer Fee & Ground Rent

Local Trick-or-Treating Set for Oct. 31

On behalf of the Sewanee Leaseholders, Louise Irwin addressed the Sewanee Community Council at the Oct. 26 meeting, ushering in a discussion about hardship posed by the transfer fee and ground rent, especially for non-university employees. The council also received an update from the Project Funding Committee.

Chartered in 1986, Sewanee Leaseholders, Inc., is in the process of re-instituting its corporation, Irwin said. The group's goals are to promote the interests of leaseholders, to assist the University in arriving at a lease policy and to provide a platform for discussing grievances. At a public meeting scheduled for 6 p.m., Monday, Nov. 9, at the Sewanee Senior Center, Irwin anticipates discussion about plans to establish a Welcome Wagon and concerns about the transfer fee.

"I hope the University will consider re-evaluating the transfer fee," Irwin said. "It's a big issue with many people." The ground rent and transfer fee policies differ for University employees and non-employees.

"Some people can't afford to live here," one community resident said, pointing to the increase in ground rent for a person who lost University employee status. He also cited potential hardship imposed by the transfer fee in inheritance circumstances involving

non-employees.

Council representative John Flynn concurred, saying black residents were leaving the community because of the transfer fee's impact on inheritance decisions. The policy "divides people on economic grounds."

Another resident said the ground rent posed an even bigger burden than the transfer fee, especially for low- and low-to-middle income residents, because it increases on an ongoing basis relative to the increase in assessed property values. "In 20 years, I will pay the entire value of my house in ground rent," he said. He recommended a fixed fee for ground rent.

Council representative Drew Sampson reminded the council that the University committed to revisit the transfer fee in the future following a decision five years ago to lower the fee from 6 percent to 4 percent.

Vice-Chancellor John McCardell agreed with the need for reviewing the ground rent and transfer fee and said the committee charged with examining the fees impacting residents should give due diligence to the issues raised.

The committee made its first report to the council last March, Provost John Swallow said. Complexity associated with evaluating the municipal service fee data has prolonged the review process, Swallow said.

Theresa Shackelford updated the council on the distributions made by

To the Editor:

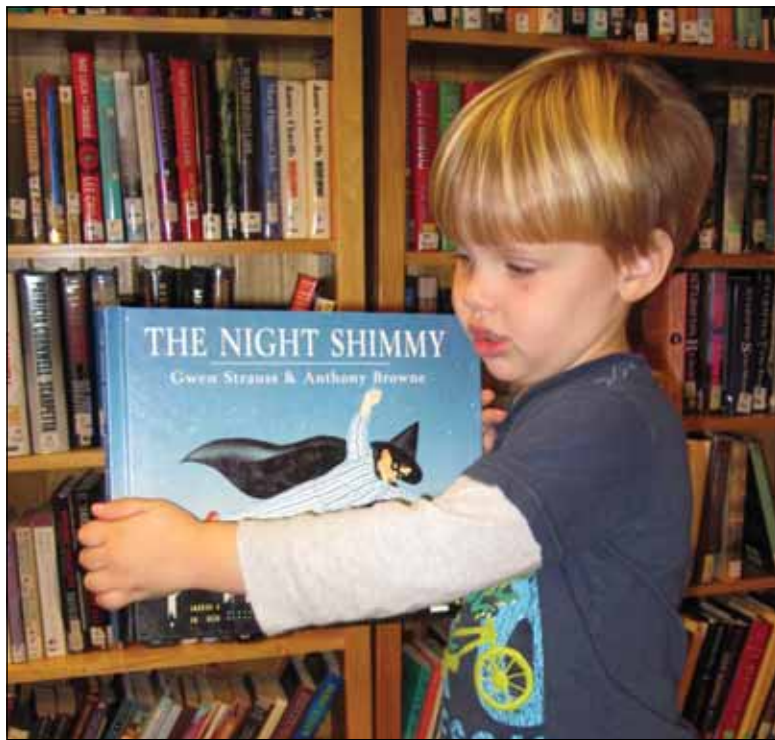

SUD Looks to 2016

At the Oct. 27 meeting, the Board of Commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties reviewed capital improvement needs for 2016, calling for a projected increase in the capital improvement budget of nearly \$100,000. Reporting on behalf of SUD Manager Ben Beavers, commissioner Ken Smith said the big drivers in the \$233,000 budget were painting the water tank (\$60,000) and the Midway pressure-boosting station (\$45,000).

Much-needed repair and rehabilitation of the aging wastewater collection system will add another \$90,000 to the budget. The budget for wastewater collection repair and rehab is less than initially anticipated. The Mikell Lane pumping station and Alto Road pumping station can both be rehabilitated for \$50,000, according to Beavers. He initially estimated it would cost \$50,000 for rehab of the Mikell Lane station alone.

SUD's expenses for Sept. were 9.5 percent over budget, largely due to unanticipated wastewater collection and treatment costs. In his report to the board, Beavers cited the high cost of replacing grinder pumps in the collection system and an unforeseen \$9,800 expense for rebuilding all the spray pumps at the wastewater treatment plant (WWTP).

For the year, SUD's expenses remain under budget, while revenue is 3.2 percent higher than expected.

Smith reviewed progress on plans to construct a trial wetlands at SUD's WWTP. The research project, being undertaken jointly by the University of the South and the University of Georgia, will examine using wetlands to treat wastewater. Contract negotiations are nearly final, Smith said. Construction should begin in November and be completed by April.

Contributing to the project, SUD rebuilt the supply pump for the wetlands with funds from the capital improvement budget. SUD will also supply the labor and technical expertise needed to integrate the pump into its control and data acquisition system.

Updating the board on the Midway pressure-boosting station, which will provide much-needed increase in water pressure for Midway residents, Commissioner Randall Henley said a new site had been selected. The Midway road location is the highest point in the service line east of the airport and also offers the advantage of requiring only one property easement.

The SUD board meets next on Nov. 24.

IDENTIFYING HEARING LOSS

To help identify hearing loss, try answering the following questions:

- Do you have trouble following the conversation when two or more people are talking at one time?
- Do people complain that you turn the volume of the radio or television too high?
- Do you have trouble hearing in a noisy background?
- Do you often ask people to repeat themselves?
- Do people you talk to seem to mumble or not speak clearly?
- Do you misunderstand what others are saying and respond inappropriately?
- Do you have trouble understanding women and children?

If you answered yes to three or more of these questions you should have your hearing evaluated.

Having your hearing tested is the second step toward better hearing. The first step is recognizing a hearing problem. the Project Funding Committee. The committee was established to review proposals for community enhancement projects on behalf of the council and to make allocations of up to \$10,000 annually. In March of 2015 the committee recommended and the council approved awarding \$9,975 to fund or partially fund seven projects. The committee has distributed just under \$8,000, Shackelford said. Two grant recipients did not undertake the goals outlined in their proposals, leaving an additional \$2,000 to be awarded in 2016. Community Chest Spotlight Scouting in Sewanee

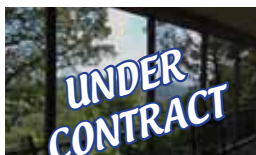

Mission Impossible: Rogue Nation

Tom Cruise is back as the famed Ethan Hunt and proves he's still got what it takes to make a mission possible. With his team disbanded, he now finds he must take on a group of special agents called "The Syndicate," who are looking to create a new justice system through fear and intimidation. Their calling card is a series of terrorist attacks happening worldwide. Hunt finds a dubious ally in British agent Ilsa Faust, played by the lethally lovely Rebecca Ferguson. Jeremy Renner returns as William Brandt, one of Hunt's associates. Fans of this series can expect the usual car chases and shoot-outs, but what is most admirable about this film is Cruise, at 53, still does many of his own stunts, most notably, a scene where Hunt is clinging to the outside of an Airbus A400M upon takeoff is done without a double or visual effects. At times, Cruise was suspended on the aircraft at 5,000 feet in the air during filming! Rated PG-13 for sequences of action and violence and brief partial nudity, parents of very young children should be cautioned, but otherwise it proves to be a heart-pounding thrill ride for most audiences.



No Country for Old Men

Directed by the Coen Brothers, this relentlessly tense realization of Cormac McCarthy's novel of murder and mayhem in rural Texas won Best Picture in the 2008 Academy Awards and solidified Javier Bardem as an actor for the ages. Bardem, who also won Best Supporting Actor, plays Anton Chigurh, a psychopath with a terrible haircut who will casually kill anyone who stands in the way of what he's after. When Vietnam veteran Llewelyn Moss (Josh Brolin) finds a stack of bodies near the Rio Grande and a pristine case of \$2 million in cash, he takes the money with no questions. Unfortunately for Moss, this puts him directly in the scope of Anton's lethal gaze, as he begins to realize he can only run so far. The supporting all-star cast includes Tommy Lee Jones, Woody Harrelson and Kelly Macdonald. Rated R for strong graphic violence and some language, this heavy drama is suitable for older teens and adults.

Comedienne Amy Schumer stars as lead writer and actress in this unapologetically crude comedy with Bill Hader about a woman who believes in living the wild life with no strings attached. Schumer's character (also named Amy) is a journalist who fully commits to the work-hard, play-hard lifestyle. Taking the advice from her bitter divorcee Dad that monogamy is unrealistic, Schumer's love life is a series of one-night stands until she starts falling for Aaron, a handsome sports doctor who is the subject of a feature she is writing. Never one to fall into destiny, Schumer immediately begins to recite her personal credo regarding commitment and lack thereof, but this may be the first situation of her life she can't walk away from. Directed by Judd Apatow, who is known for such hits as "Knocked Up" and "Bridesmaids," audiences can relate to the realistic characters. And the chemistry between Schumer and Hader is real. But the broad, no-holds-barred humor may not be to everyone's taste. Rated R for strong sexual content, nudity, language and some drug use, this feature is best suited for older teens and adults.

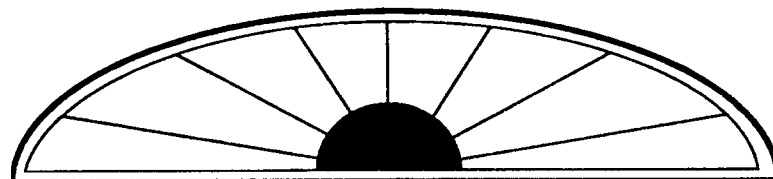
