SUD Board Reviews Proposed Budget and Developer's Appeal

Updating the commissioners on the operation of the utility, SUD Manager Ben Beavers reported that Lake O'Donnell's water level is down by five feet, and Lake Jackson's level is down by eight feet. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, this means the region is "in first stage drought," Beavers said, but "we're nowhere near levels to be alarmed. We have more usable water now than in 2007." The Board of Commissioners a proposed operating budget for 2011. He noted that the budget does not such as the estimated cost of the new water plant, because the capital improvements budget for 2011 was set, for the most part, based on what the board approved last year.

Similarly, Beavers said that the proposed 2011 operating budget is almost identical to the 2010 operating budget, with only a 0.3 percent increase in expenses (\$3,075) and some shifting of allocations among categories. "I'm trying to get the budget to where the district is not compelled to raise rates," Beavers said.

The budget reflects a 3 percent cost of living raise for employees to help offset an 11.5 percent increase to higher electrical usage at the new

Sewanee Utility District commissioner Karen Singer will serve as election officer for the upcoming commissioner election. Early voting will begin Jan. 3, 2011, in the SUD office during regular business hours. Voting ends at 5 p.m. on Jan. 25, the date of the annual meeting.

Interested candidates must submit a petition signed by 10 SUD customers by Dec. 12. Petitions are available at the SUD office. Prospective candidates must be SUD customers, and candidates for the Marion County seat must reside in Marion County.

Two commissioners will be elected—one representing Marion County for a full four-year term, and one representing the entire district for a partial three-year-term, completing the term for the seat currently held by Randall Henley. (Henley was appointed by the board to fill a vacancy last February.) Henley and the current Marion County commissioner, Cliff Huffman, anticipate running for the seats they now hold.

The newly elected commissioners will be sworn in at the Feb. 22 meeting. The SUD Board of Commissioners also includes Doug Cameron, Ken Smith and Rick Sommer.


The Monteagle Rotary Club is accepting orders for a variety of trees to be enjoyed this Christmas season. "We are pleased to continue the



Student Research Symposium: Pharmaceuticals in Treated Wastewater

A student presentation by Erica Teasley about pharmaceuticals in treated wastewater and streams draining into the Sewanee Utility District watershed and the potential for water reuse in Sewanee will be given on Nov. 19, at 3 p.m. in Blackman Auditorium. This is the first presentation of the Student Research Symposia, an annual series featuring students discussing their research and scholarly work in a variety of fields.

Two Sewanee students, Teasley and Julie Bennett, supervised by professors Deborah McGrath and Ken Smith, spent last summer conducting research on the potential for reuse of SUD-treated wastewater in times of drought. This is a cooperative project among the University of the South, SUD and Tennesse Tech University.

The students first looked at vegetative cover and soil depths around Lake O'Donnell and Lake Jackson. Then they collected wastewater samples at SUD from various locations and analyzed them at Tennessee Tech for a variety of chemicals, including pharmaceuticals.

The project's goal was to understand what kinds of chemicals exist after going through SUD's current wastewater treatment process. If wastewater were reused to irrigate the watersheds surrounding area reservoirs during times of drought, we would know what kinds of contaminants might be present.

Student Research Symposia presentations are a low-key, collegial way for the campus community to learn about the work being done by students and their faculty mentors. The talks will be given on Fridays at 3 p.m., and all are invited to attend.

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



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

Before WW I ended, the women in a small Episcopal church in Morristown, N.J., began collecting money to send chocolates to American soldiers overseas. When the war ended, they decided to donate the balance of their "War Time Chocolate Fund" to some other worthy cause. Through one of the church's parishioners, they heard about St. Andrew's School, an Episcopal boarding school that had recently built a chapel but lacked money for bells in the belltower.

The churchwomen sent St. Andrew's School funds to buy three bells as an Armistice Thanksgiving and asked that the bells be dedicated to three archangels—Uriel, Raphael and Michael. In return, the school agreed to ring the bells for 11 minutes on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at 11:11 a.m. every year in memory of those who died in World War I and as a prayer for peace. This is the 90th year the bells will ring out to remember those who perished in what everyone at that time believed was "the war to end all wars."

Built in 1913, St. Andrew's Chapel is the institution's oldest extant structure and dates to the earliest days of the school. Designed by a prominent Philadelphia architect who based his concept on the Presidio Church in Monterrey, Calif., the edifice is a striking example of the Spanish mission style of architecture. The focal point of the chapel's interior is the historic

I am writing this from an American Airlines jet on my way back to Sewanee from a recruiting trip to the Northeast. Fortunately, in an effort to save the University a few dollars by buying my ticket online from the cheapest bidder, I was able to snare this great seat in the middle row between a retired Sumo wrestler who clearly owns the armrest, and an exhausted mother holding a toddler with an apparently painful earache and wandering left leg.



for legal fees from \$15,000 to \$2,600, as legal fees for 2010 to date have been \$1,000. Legal fees were at their highest (\$11,000-\$12,000) when SUD was crafting a developers' policy several years ago. The utility's annual average for legal fees is \$2,500.

The 2010 operating budget also covers a fee for new commissioners' training. In June, a state law went into effect requiring new commissioners to have 12 hours of training when they first take office and an additional 12 hours of training over the course of their four-year term. The cost for a commissioner to attend training is approximately \$380.

SUD commissioner Karen Singer upcoming commissioner election. Two commissioners will be elected, one representing Marion County for a full four-year term and one representing the entire district for a partial threeyear-term, completing the term for the seat held by Randall Henley. According to the SUD developers' policy provisions, the developer must pay all applicable tap fees at the time the contract is signed. Goodson said he was not asking for a fee waiver or reduction; he was requesting that the fees be assigned to the builder at the time of home construction, rather than Goodson paying the fees when he signed the contract. Goodson pointed out that his 2006 engineering plan was drafted prior to the establishment of the new policy, which requires up-front payment of fees by all developers who put will serve as election officer for the in a water line that connects to the SUD main. (In developments where builders can connect a home's water line directly to the SUD main, the home builder pays the fees.) Goodson said that up-front payment of the fees, totaling \$1,830 per tap, would impinge on his ability to keep charitable commitments to initiatives like the Lost Cove project.

SUD Board President Doug Cameron praised Goodson for his land trust preservation work and explained that the SUD developers' policy is based on real costs to SUD, as determined by a study conducted by Raftelis Financial, Inc. When SUD reached 80 percent capacity, the utility was required by law to seek new water sources, Cameron said. Commenting on the rationale for the policy, Beavers said that the water resources development charge was designed to offset the cost of acquiring new water supply sources. The water system development charge was designed to offset infrastructure expenses (for example, the cost of water tanks). Beavers noted that while Goodson's plan was drafted in 2006, Goodson did not apply for service

Commissioner Ken Smith said that another developer had previously appealed to the board to grandfather in is project under the old policy, and the board had denied the request.

Goodson suggested that the board night consider a revised policy, waiving up-front tap fee payments for small developments with fewer than 20 home

Cameron said the board would need to seek legal advice before making any such policy revisions. Commissioner Huffman anticipated difficulty in arbitrarily determining the threshold number of home sites in a revised policy and pointed out that revising the policy could nvolve expenditures for legal advice and ossibly for a new rate study.

Following a long discussion, the board voted to deny Goodson's appeal.

Commissioner Smith, who heads up water recycling research for SUD, announced that a University student presentation on the chemicals in treated wastewater is scheduled for Nov. 19, at 3 p.m., in Blackman Auditorium in Woods Lab.

The next meeting of the SUD Board of Commissioners is scheduled for Nov. 30 at 5 p.m. in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road. The meeting will be held on the fifth Tuesday instead of on the fourth due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

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Nature Notes

Tiny Winter Visitors

On Nov. 3, Jean Yeatman reported a male Ruby-crowned Kinglet in the small magnolia tree in her yard. Kinglets are tiny winter visitors

in Sewanee. They nest in the boreal forests of Canada. The nest is a large hanging basketlike structure of grasses, rootlets and moss lining. The female lays six to 10 eggs, which is unusual for so small a bird. How does the adult cover such a brood? Survival is good in subarctic weather. The male has a grayish olive body with a red crown (third from top in illustration), lifted to a crest to ward off rivals and attract females (which have no red crown). The wings are banded with white bars and a white eye ring is conspicuous. Food consists of small insects and insect eggs



found between the grooves of bark. Arthur Allen (Harry Yeatman's teacher at Cornell University) describes the song as "See-see-see, just look at me, just look at me, just look at me, see-see-see." This song is loud and beautiful and can be heard from a good distance in the shrubbery. Its relative, the Golden-crowned Kinglet, will come in late November to Sewanee. That bird likes to feed in flocks, high in tall trees. Both sexes (top two in illustration) have crowns—yellow in the female and yellow and red in the male. A dark band surrounds the crown and extends to the bill. Its song is a weak "li, li, li." Both species of the tiny birds spend the winter here.
