## Sewanee Crew Team Brings Home Boatload of Medals

Sewanee's crew team competed Oct. 29–30 in the Secret City 5000-meter race in Oak Ridge, sponsored by the University of Tennessee. The regatta included teams from Louisiana State University, Georgia State, UT, UT-Chattanooga, Murray State, and Vanderbilt University. The final medal count for Sewanee: 17 silver and 10 bronze.

Silver medal events were: the Open 8 (Sewanee students Paul Blakeslee, Wolfgang Boehm, Nathan Bourne, Cameron Graham, Jenny Robb, Sara Hildebrand, Ashley Clay, Emily

Noggle and coxswain Becky Price); the Light Weight 4 (Linus Billings, Matt Hagler, Norris Epps, Vincent Leray and coxswain Seth Morris); and the Open 4 (Parker Stoker, Annie Taliaferro, Heather Thacker and coxswain Alexandria Higdon).

Bronze medal events were Novice Men's 4 (Parker Stoker, Rowan Jones, Malcolm Taylor, Peter Sidrys and coxswain: Seth Morris) and the Open 4 (Corinne Summs, Justin Riopelle, Alex Sacchini, Chelsea Harrison and coxswain Becky Price).

## Wiegand One-Man Show Friday

In a performance that will leave audiences believing they have just heard from the Rough Rider President, actor and historian Joe Wiegand will bring Theodore Roosevelt to life in his one-man performance in St. Andrew's-Sewanee School's McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts on Friday, Nov. 12, at 7 p.m. Wiegand, an SAS parent and Sewanee alumnus of the Class of 1987, has entertained audiences nationwide with the wit and wisdom that endeared Roosevelt to the American people.

Wiegand is donating this McCrory Hall performance to the community. The show is free and open to the public. As a one-man theater show, Wiegand shares stories full of adventure, laughter and inspiration. "Audiences will enjoy hearing stories from T.R.'s youth, his time in the Badlands, his adventures in Cuba and Africa and the delightful time he had in the White House," says Wiegand. "Did you know

that T.R. and his wife, Edith, reared six children in the White House?"

Wiegand will describe how his Teddy Roosevelt character evolved at the Nov. 17 meeting of the Sewanee Civic Association, held at 6:30 p.m. in the main dining room of the Sewanee Inn. [Story on page 6.]

## Webb Addresses Emeritus Today

Mark Webb, Sewanee's athletic director, will address "The Present and Future of Sewanee Athletics" at today's meeting of the Emeritus Association in the Hearth Room of the Sewanee Inn at 3:30 p.m. The community is welcome.

Webb will describe some of the growth and changes in athletic programs at the College during the 16 years he has served as director. There are now 24 intercollegiate sports teams involving some 450 students of the College. The staff of the athletic department numbers about 50. Webb came to Sewanee from Vanderbilt University, where he first coached track and cross-country and later became assistant athletic director.

## SUD Board Reviews Proposed Budget and Developer's Appeal

The Board of Commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties held its regular monthly business meeting on Oct. 26 at 5 p.m. in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road.

Updating the commissioners on the operation of the utility, SUD Manager Ben Beavers reported that Lake O'Donnell's water level is down by five feet, and Lake Jackson's level is down by eight feet. According to the U.S. Department of Agriculture, this means the region is "in first stage drought," Beavers said, but "we're nowhere near levels to be alarmed. We have more usable water now than in 2007." Due to dry conditions, the leak in Lake Jackson's dam has slowed to 50 gallons per minute, and water entering the sewer system from outside sources has dropped 20 percent. Total revenue is 6.5 percent above budget projections, and expenses are 8 percent below the projected amount.

Beavers presented the board with

a proposed operating budget for 2011. He noted that the budget does not include capital improvement projects, such as the estimated cost of the new water plant, because the capital improvements budget for 2011 was set, for the most part, based on what the board approved last year.

Similarly, Beavers said that the proposed 2011 operating budget is almost identical to the 2010 operating budget, with only a 0.3 percent increase in expenses (\$3,075) and some shifting of allocations among categories. "I'm trying to get the budget to where the district is not compelled to raise rates," Beavers said.

The budget reflects a 3 percent cost of living raise for employees to help offset an 11.5 percent increase in health insurance costs. (SUD employees pay 20 percent of their health insurance premiums.) The allocation for electricity costs has increased due to higher electrical usage at the new

Sewanee Utility District commissioner Karen Singer will serve as election officer for the upcoming commissioner election. Early voting will begin Jan. 3, 2011, in the SUD office during regular business hours. Voting ends at 5 p.m. on Jan. 25, the date of the annual meeting.

Interested candidates must submit a petition signed by 10 SUD customers by Dec. 12. Petitions are available at the SUD office. Prospective candidates must be SUD customers, and candidates for the Marion County seat must reside in Marion County.

## Student Research Symposium: Pharmaceuticals in Treated Wastewater

A student presentation by Erica Teasley about pharmaceuticals in treated wastewater and streams draining into the Sewanee Utility District watershed and the potential for water reuse in Sewanee will be given on Nov. 19, at 3 p.m. in Blackman Auditorium. This is the first presentation of the Student Research Symposia, an annual series featuring students discussing their research and scholarly work in a variety of fields.

Two Sewanee students, Teasley and Julie Bennett, supervised by professors Deborah McGrath and Ken Smith, spent last summer conducting research on the potential for reuse of SUD-treated wastewater in times of drought. This is a cooperative project among the University of the South, SUD and Tennessee Tech University.

The students first looked at vegetative cover and soil depths around Lake O'Donnell and Lake Jackson. Then they collected wastewater samples at SUD from various locations and analyzed them at Tennessee Tech for a variety of chemicals, including pharmaceuticals.

The project's goal was to understand what kinds of chemicals exist after going through SUD's current wastewater treatment process. If wastewater were reused to irrigate the watersheds surrounding area reservoirs during times of drought, we would know what kinds of contaminants might be present.

Student Research Symposia presentations are a low-key, collegial way for the campus community to learn about the work being done by students and their faculty mentors. The talks will be given on Fridays at 3 p.m., and all are invited to attend.

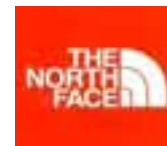

Since 1937, Sewanee has made the Algernon Sydney Sullivan medallion the highest honor bestowed on a graduating senior. For much of the period from 1937 to present, the foundation has also supported Sewanee students through its scholarship program. Now, Sewanee and the foundation will be partners in a new endeavor.

"We are encouraged by the overwhelming response we received from our partner schools interested in beginning and expanding projects on social entrepreneurship, and are delighted to have selected nine schools to participate in the program," McDavid said. "We are delighted that Sewanee is one of those schools and look forward to working closely together to make Sewanee a powerful hub of social innovation."

The program began with a week-end retreat in November, where a team of students, faculty and staff

met with their peers from the other selected colleges.

In 2011 and following years, participating campuses will launch a week-long celebration of social entrepreneurship in the spring, offer a social entrepreneurship course in the summer, and launch an active project the following fall that uses business principles to solve social problems.

"Social entrepreneurship is a growing field, both as a business model and a course of study in higher education. It's an emerging field of study that is becoming increasingly important in academia

and the corporate sector," said Yasmeen Mohiuddin, Ralph Owen Distinguished Professor of Economics and Sewanee's project director. "We have a growing number of models to study, from microfinance institutions to social businesses to nonprofits that are formed with a philanthropic purpose in mind. This is a superb field of study for a Sewanee student, and we feel very fortunate to be partners with the Sullivan Foundation and the other institutions that have been selected to work on this project. We will learn much from the project, and we also will have something we can teach to

share information about Sewanee's Social Entrepreneurship Education (SEED) program with our peers. We are ready to be a 'change-making' campus."

## TINTINNABULATION

### A Request—Lady Gaga

I received a request about a month ago, only the second one I remember getting since I started playing the carillon in 2001. This one was from a former student. A Sewanee friend of hers had heard a carillon rendition of Lady Gaga's "Bad Romance" on YouTube and wondered if I would play it for Homecoming. I had never heard of Lady Gaga, much less this particular piece. However, I asked the carillonneur at Iowa State University, the one whose recording is available on YouTube, where to get the music. She told me, and I ordered it and have been practicing the piece. I have listened to the carillon version again and to Lady Gaga's version, also available on YouTube, to get some sense of it all. By the way, as of Monday, 303 million people had watched the Lady Gaga version on YouTube and 639,000 had watched the carillon version.

Monday's paper brought more news. In this year's MTV Europe Music Awards, Lady Gaga won the award as Best Female, and "Bad Romance" won as Best Song. I will play the Bordley version of Lady Gaga's "Bad Romance" Saturday as part of my Homecoming concert. The concert is from noon until 12:30, and I think I will treat the listeners to this new piece at about 12:15. Let me know what you think!

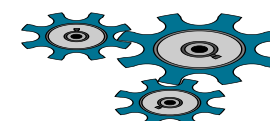

## SAS Celebrates 90th Ringing of the “Chocolate Bells”

Every year at St. Andrew’s-Sewanee School, the chapel’s “Chocolate Bells” are rung at 11:11 a.m. on Armistice Day as a remembrance of all who died in World War I. Today, Nov. 11, SAS students will gather and walk to the chapel for the ceremonial ringing. Everyone is welcome to attend.

Before WW I ended, the women in a small Episcopal church in Morristown, N.J., began collecting money to send chocolates to American soldiers overseas. When the war ended, they decided to donate the balance of their “War Time Chocolate Fund” to some other worthy cause. Through one of the church’s parishioners, they heard about St. Andrew’s School, an Episcopal boarding school that had recently built a chapel but lacked money for bells in the belltower.

The churchwomen sent St. Andrew’s School funds to buy three bells as an Armistice Thanksgiving and asked that the bells be dedicated to three archangels—Uriel, Raphael and Michael. In return, the school agreed to ring the bells for 11 minutes on the eleventh day of the eleventh month at 11:11 a.m. every year in memory of those who died in World War I and as a prayer for peace. This is the 90th year the bells will ring out to remember those who perished in what everyone at that time believed was “the war to end all wars.”

Built in 1913, St. Andrew’s Chapel is the institution’s oldest extant structure and dates to the earliest days of the school. Designed by a prominent Philadelphia architect who based his concept on the Presidio Church in Monterrey, Calif., the edifice is a striking example of the Spanish mission style of architecture. The focal point of the chapel’s interior is the historic

reredos, a large ornamental wood screen located behind the altar. The walnut and carved-oak reredos features hand-painted panels depicting 12 Christian saints encircling a portrait of the Madonna and child. It is a

copy of the altarpiece painted by Italian painter Cario Crivelli for the San Domenico Chapel in Ascoli Piceno in east central Italy. The original is in the National Gallery in London.

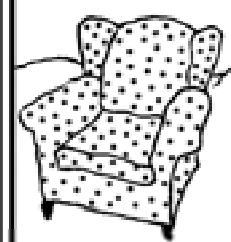

## Field Hockey Team Loses to Hendrix

water plant. Beavers also increased the allocation for grinder pump repairs, noting that the utility had been experiencing grinder pump problems. The first round of grinder pumps are now 20 years old; for the second generation pumps, parts are available, and the units can be repaired.

Beavers decreased the allocation for legal fees from \$15,000 to \$2,600, as legal fees for 2010 to date have been \$1,000. Legal fees were at their highest (\$11,000-\$12,000) when SUD was crafting a developers' policy several years ago. The utility's annual average for legal fees is \$2,500.

The 2010 operating budget also covers a fee for new commissioners' training. In June, a state law went into effect requiring new commissioners to have 12 hours of training when they first take office and an additional 12 hours of training over the course of their four-year term. The cost for a commissioner to attend training is approximately \$380.

SUD commissioner Karen Singer will serve as election officer for the upcoming commissioner election. Two commissioners will be elected, one representing Marion County for a full four-year term and one representing the entire district for a partial three-year-term, completing the term for the seat held by Randall Henley. (In February 2010, Henley was appointed by the board to fill a vacancy.) Henley and the current Marion County commissioner, Cliff Huffman, anticipate running for the seats they now hold. Prospective candidates must be SUD customers, and candidates for the Marion County seat must reside in Marion County. Prospective candidates must submit a petition signed by 10 SUD customers by Dec. 12. Petitions have been available at the SUD office since Nov. 6. Early voting will begin Jan. 3, 2011, in the SUD office during regular business hours. Voting will end at 5 p.m. on Jan. 25, the date of the annual meeting. The newly elected commissioners will be sworn in at the Feb. 22 meeting.

In other business the board considered an appeal from Myers Point developer John Goodson. Goodson requested

that Myers Point be included under the previous developers' policy. The Myers Point development will consist of 18 home sites on 480 acres, 75 percent of which (330 acres) is set up as a land trust preserve designated as common property. All the houses are required to be LEED (Leaders in Energy and Environmental Design) certified, qualifying the developer for a SUD tap fee discount in keeping with anticipated reductions in water use.

According to the SUD developers' policy provisions, the developer must pay all applicable tap fees at the time the contract is signed. Goodson said he was not asking for a fee waiver or reduction; he was requesting that the fees be assigned to the builder at the time of home construction, rather than Goodson paying the fees when he signed the contract. Goodson pointed out that his 2006 engineering plan was drafted prior to the establishment of the new policy, which requires up-front payment of fees by all developers who put in a water line that connects to the SUD main. (In developments where builders can connect a home's water line directly to the SUD main, the home builder pays the fees.) Goodson said that up-front payment of the fees, totaling \$1,830 per tap, would impinge on his ability to keep charitable commitments to initiatives like the Lost Cove project.

SUD Board President Doug Cameron praised Goodson for his land trust preservation work and explained that the SUD developers' policy is based on real costs to SUD, as determined by a study conducted by Raftelis Financial, Inc. When SUD reached 80 percent capacity, the utility was required by law to seek new water sources, Cameron said. Commenting on the rationale for the policy, Beavers said that the water resources development charge was designed to offset the cost of acquiring new water supply sources. The water system development charge was designed to offset infrastructure expenses (for example, the cost of water tanks). Beavers noted that while Goodson's plan was drafted in 2006, Goodson did not apply for service until 2010.

Commissioner Ken Smith said that another developer had previously appealed to the board to grandfather in his project under the old policy, and the board had denied the request.

Goodson suggested that the board might consider a revised policy, waiving up-front tap fee payments for small developments with fewer than 20 home sites.

Cameron said the board would need to seek legal advice before making any such policy revisions. Commissioner Huffman anticipated difficulty in arbitrarily determining the threshold number of home sites in a revised policy and pointed out that revising the policy could involve expenditures for legal advice and possibly for a new rate study.

Following a long discussion, the board voted to deny Goodson's appeal.

Commissioner Smith, who heads up water recycling research for SUD, announced that a University student presentation on the chemicals in treated wastewater is scheduled for Nov. 19, at 3 p.m., in Blackman Auditorium in Woods Lab.

The next meeting of the SUD Board of Commissioners is scheduled for Nov. 30 at 5 p.m. in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road. The meeting will be held on the fifth Tuesday instead of on the fourth due to the Thanksgiving holiday.

## Nature Notes

### Tiny Winter Visitors

On Nov. 3, **Jean Yeatman** reported a male Ruby-crowned Kinglet in the small magnolia tree in her yard. Kinglets are tiny winter visitors in Sewanee. They nest in the boreal forests of Canada. The nest is a large hanging basket-like structure of grasses, rootlets and moss lining. The female lays six to 10 eggs, which is unusual for so small a bird. How does the adult cover such a brood? Survival is good in subarctic weather. The male has a grayish olive body with a red crown (third from top in illustration), lifted to a crest to ward off rivals and attract females (which have no red crown). The wings are banded with white bars and a white eye ring is conspicuous. Food consists of small insects and insect eggs found between the grooves of bark. **Arthur Allen** (Harry Yeatman's teacher at Cornell University) describes the song as "See-see-see, just look at me, just look at me, just look at me, see-see-see." This song is loud and beautiful and can be heard from a good distance in the shrubbery. Its relative, the Golden-crowned Kinglet, will come in late November to Sewanee. That bird likes to feed in flocks, high in tall trees. Both sexes (top two in illustration) have crowns—yellow in the female and yellow and red in the male. A dark band surrounds the crown and extends to the bill. Its song is a weak "li, li, li." Both species of the tiny birds spend the winter here.



## F.C. Humane Society Pets of the Week Meet Eclipse & Pretty
