Sewanee Community Chest Meets Its Goal

Because of the generosity of this community, the Sewanee Community Chest has surpassed its 2012–13 fund-raising goal. As of Jan. 8, the campaign reached \$91,848 in donations and pledges.

"The Sewanee Civic Association is grateful to all who made a commitment to help us first meet and then exceed our goal for this year," said Theresa Shackelford, association president. "The support for the 25 area organizations is very much appreciated."

Each year the Community Chest raises funds for organizations that serve the common good. Sponsored by the Sewanee Civic Association, the Sewanee Community Chest supports youth sports, outreach, community and educational programs in the tri-county area. Requests to the Community Chest this year totaled approximately \$118,000.

"The need to help fund local organizations is apparent," said Shackelford. "Given the state of the economy at the time, the board approved a more attainable goal to reach." The Community Chest fund raising campaign began in October and officially ends on Feb. 28

"If you have not made your gift to the Community Chest this year, it is not too late. Any money that exceeds the goal will be used to support the park fund and emergency funding requests as they arise," said Shackelford. Last year, the Community Chest was able to grant an additional \$5,000 to help the Sewanee Children's Center with relocation expenses.

Bryan Publishes First Novel

The Rev. Christopher Bryan, author of seven well-reviewed academic texts and the editor of the Sewanee Theological Review, has just released a novel "Siding Star" (published by the Diamond Press), which is available in paperback and Kindle e-book editions. Bryan is the C.K. Benedict Professor of New Testament, emeritus, at the School of Theology in Sewanee.

"Siding Star," which will appeal to fans of authors as diverse as Dan Brown and Frank Peretti, weaves the Christian symbolism of Bryan's profession into a complex thriller. The story ties together a British policewoman's investigation into a secret, power-hungry society and a quiet astronomer's unexpected discovery of something even more

threatening: an exploded star that is hurtling toward Earth.

The novel received a starred Kirkus review: "Bryan's heroes aren't just likable but lovable: intelligent, amusing, hard-working, even kind to animals. In contrast, the novel's villains are truly spooky and disturbing; readers are always aware of the urgency of stopping their evil plans. An enjoyable novel of spiritual mystery and adventure—well plotted, intelligent and deeply moving."

Robinson Reading on Thursday

Pulitzer Prize-winning author Marilynne Robinson will give a reading from her new collection of essays, "When I Was a Child I Read Books," at 4 p.m., Thursday, Jan. 17, in Gailor Auditorium. The public is welcome, and a book signing will follow.

Robinson is on the Sewanee campus to give the Convocation address and receive an honorary degree on Friday, Jan. 18. During her visit, she will also meet with students and facthe School of Theology.

She is a professor of creative writing at the Iowa Writers' Workshop and the author of three highly acclaimed novels: "Housekeeping" (1980), "Gilead" (2004) and "Home" (2008). Robinson has served as writer-in-residence and visiting professor at many colleges and universities, including the University of Kent in England and Amherst College. Her second book, "Mother Country: Britain, The Welfare State and Nuclear Pollution," evolved from an essay that she wrote for Harper's Review and was a finalist for the National Book Award. Her most recent collection of essays, "When I Was a Child I Read Books" was published last March. "Housekeeping" was a finalist for the 1982 Pulitzer Prize for Fiction, "Gilead" was awarded the 2005 Pulitzer and "Home" received the 2009 Orange Prize for Fiction.

Stan Brock is the founder and president of Remote Area Medical, Inc. (RAM), a corps of volunteers providing free medical, visual, dental, and veterinary care to uninsured and under-insured individuals in the U.S. and the developing world. An Englishman by birth, Brock spent 15 years with the Wapishana Indians in the Central Amazon Basin, becoming

general manager of the world's largest tropical cattle ranch. He is a bush pilot and former star of the popular television program "Wild Kingdom." Brock's experiences living and working in the Amazon basin, witnessing the suffering of those without access to medical services, inspired him to create RAM in 1985. RAM clinics are held in the U.S. and worldwide, and have inspired more than 70,000 volunteers to provide care to more than a half million people. A clinic at Sewanee last May served more than 500 area residents.

The Rt. Rev. Jacob W. Owensby, Ph.D., T'97, was ordained on July 21 as the fourth bishop of the Episcopal Diocese of Western Louisiana. Owensby has served as dean of St. Mark's Cathedral, the seat of the Western Louisiana diocese, since January 2009. He previously served as rector of Emmanuel Church, Webster Groves, Mo.; as rector of St. Stephen's

Korean War Veteran Honored 62 Years After Death

Private First Class Glenn Schoenmann will be laid to rest today, 62 years after his death. Tennessee Gov. Bill Haslam has ordered flags be lowered to half-staff on Saturday, Jan. 12, in honor of the Tracy City man who died while serving in the Korean War.

Schoenmann was born in Palmer and grew up in Tracy City where he attended James Shook School and worked on the Werner Farm with his family. He was assigned to Company M, 3rd Battalion, 31st Infantry Regiment,

7th Infantry Division in the U.S. Army where he was at the Battle of Chosin Reservoir in North Korea on Nov. 28, 1950. The Grundy County native reportedly died as a prisoner of war on Dec. 29, 1950. Schoenmann was 20 years old when he was killed. Family members say Schoenmann's remains were recovered in 2004, but the identification process was not finalized until this December.

'The Schoenmann family has waited 62 years to give Glenn a proper burial, and we join them in remembering his service and sacrifice," Haslam said. "As a state we mourn the loss of PFC Schoenmann, but we are grateful for his

of Creave Coure, Ill., Raymond Schoenmann of Tracy City and Carl Schoenmann of Winchester.

"It just means a lot that he will be buried in the same cemetery with our mother, father and grandparents," Raymond Schoenmann said. "It's finally uniting the family back together.'



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
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CCJP Receives Grant

SPD December & 2012 Reports

The Sewanee Police Department recently issued its report on its activities for the month of December 2012 and the totals for the entire year Last month, the SPD patrolled 4,223 miles, investigated three vehicle accidents and issued three moving violations. It also issued 245 nonmoving traffic violations and 15 warnings.

It made three arrests for drug law violations, 10 arrests for liquor law violations, and filed three theft reports. One DUI arrest was made in

SPD responded to three 911 calls. Officers offered mutual aid to Franklin County seven times last month and to other jurisdictions on two occasions.

SPD physically checked buildings on 429 occasions and assisted with locking or unlocking buildings 56 times.

For the year, SPD investigated 37 vehicle accidents and issued 44 moving violations. It made 63 arrests for drug law violations, 162 arrests for liquor law violations and filed 41 theft reports. Officers responded to 22 911 calls. Eight DUI arrests were made in 2012.

In December 2012, the Sewanee Volunteer Fire Department answered 15 calls: 12 to University dorms, fraternity or sorority houses (all with no apparent cause, burnt food or trivial) and one fire at a small outbuilding at a community residence.



As I rolled down Kentucky Avenue one morning this past week with the tree branches barren and the grass no longer any shade of green, the bright red Stop sign jumped out at me as never before. It is a sign I see almost daily but rarely notice. Like many residents, I tend to roll through a stop (don't tell Police Chief Marie!) with the knowledge that it is highly unlikely anyone else is coming down the road. On that day, however, the true message of the sign seemed so clear to me that I knew I was required

to come to a full and complete stop and look for what was to come. Like many of you, I am still deeply affected by the events at Sandy Hook Elementary School in Newtown, Conn. The terror of 9/11 seemed far away and took place in a high-rise world of planes, glass and steel I could only imagine. But those young children in a first-grade classroom in a small school in a quiet town could have been our own. The faces on the news programs seem so familiar and their stories of soccer games and football heroes echo the lives of children that I know.

Each time a terrible shooting like this happens, we as a society re-open an argument about guns and mental health. We each hold up the banner of the cause we support. Some people suggest we should add more guns to deter the terror while others argue we should legislate the sale of certain types of firearms. Some point fingers at those in our society who are afflicted with a daily struggle inside their own minds. The people who we are talking about and pointing fingers at and blaming could be our loved ones or our neighbors. It is more complicated than slogans or quick fixes.

The only message we need to hear is STOP. Stop this madness. Stop this silly argument over Second Amendment rights that allow us weapons that are tearing up young children. Stop debating about the sense of having guns in bars, or guns locked in your car, or guns on college campuses, or guns to defend our homes. The redcoats are not coming. A child is more likely to die from an accidental gunshot blast in his home than be saved from some unnamed predator by his parent wielding a lethal handgun.

I was at basketball practice at Sewanee Elementary School today. The girls I coach are fourth- and fifth-graders. Two of my players forgot to bring their shoes. Precious 10-year-old girls sliding around and laughing on a gym floor in their bare feet. The only thing they should have to worry about is stubbing their toes.

Every time we reach a crisis in this country, we roll through the Stop sign with the naïve belief that nothing else will happen. We allow time to soften our memory and we roll on with a confidence that those truths we think we know will stand the test of time. Perhaps we need to see the signs more clearly. Let's wrap our children in hugs rather than bulletproof vests and create a world where no one is carrying anything more lethal than their math homework. And if they are, Marie and her fellow officers can pull them over and remind them they have to come to a complete and full STOP.

Raptors and Sandhill Cranes

Jean Yeatman reports that on Saturday, Jan. 5, she and Harry made a raptor run of 54 miles down Sherwood Road to Stevenson, Ala., and over to Mud Creek Fish Camp. Hawks, Eagles and Vultures are considered raptors. The Yeatmans saw none on the trip down, but on their way back they saw three Kestrels, one Red-shouldered Hawk and one Golden Eagle. To make a raptor report you do the same run for two or more months on the same day of the month.

While in Stevenson, they went to the park and saw many ducks flying, dabbling and swimming about. The biggest surprise was when they set up the spotting scope, and on the far bank were more than 100 Sandhill Cranes. Some were spreading their wings and leaping into the air dancing. This is a bonding act between pairs. A man came up to them at one point and asked to use their binoculars to examine a small floating wood platform in the water. It turned out he was a muskrat trapper, and wanted to see if he had caught anything. Jean asked him what he got for a skin, and he said, "six dollars." It would take a lot of skins to make a living that way, and he did not look very prosperous, Jean said.
