'March On!' Is Ready for **Purchase**

After years in the making, "March On!" a 280-page hardbound history of the preparatory school divisions of the University of the South, is complete.

Author Nathan Schults first started the project as a university student, and after graduation, he stayed on to complete the book.

"The whole book came from Nathan. His history is solid and accurate, and I think corrected any inaccuracies that may have come up over the years," said Phil White, one of the book's editors. White also wrote the section on the Sewanee Academy.

"Waring McCrady, another editor, did a wonderful job making it flow smoothly, and together we worked to make it a bit more readable. It really was a joint effort," said White.

The book begins with the 1868 beginning of preparatory education on the Sewanee Mountain, which predates the college. It continues with the equally fascinating history when it transformed into the Sewanee Military Academy (1908), and its final incarnation, the Sewanee Academy (1971-1981).

White said all the proceeds from book sales would go directly to the Sewanee Trust for Historical Preservation.

"Everyone who has worked on the project has done so pro bono, so all the proceeds go to the Trust," he said.

Matens Menagerie Supported by Children's Book

For more than 25 years, Margaret Matens has served the community and the surrounding area as a wildlife rehabilitation and educator, permitted by TWRA. This volunteer effort means that when people find an injured or orphaned wild animal, they have someone to call instead of driving to a Chattanooga or Nashville nature center. Residents rely on Margaret's expertise and willingness to help. She goes out in her pajamas to take in an owl hit with a car, removes a rat snake caught in a berry net, and is on speed dial with the Sewanee police and the park rangers, who call her when they have wildlife needs. As the only permitted rehabber in three counties, she responds to calls promotes all handmade crafts in Tennessee. from a wide geographic area, all as a volunteer.



Hospitality Shop Holiday Hours





Monteagle: Silent Auction, Leaf Pickup, Disaster Planning

At the Nov. 25 Monteagle City Council meeting, librarian Karen Tittle announced the ongoing silent auction at the May Justus Memorial Library in Monteagle. The council also heard updates on leaf pickup, disaster planning and construction of the new fire hall.

The library's silent auction funds the summer reading programs, which typically attract as many as 100 area youth and their families, Tittle said. The auction features theme baskets offering games and toys, kitchenwares, craft items, and more. Bidding ends at noon today, Dec. 6.

Addressing concerns about leaves clogging the gutters, Vice Mayor Tony Gilliam said the city would pick up leaves on city property and select problem locations. Due to the cost and manpower demands, the city discontinued leaf pick up this fall, but will make exceptions to prevent drainage issues.

Reporting on the Planning Commission's disaster readiness efforts, Gilliam said the commission met with Marion County Emergency es the Reptiles and Amphibians Management Director Steve Lamb. "We're getting on board with those folks so the next time we have a disaster, we don't have to go through FEMA and will have people in our own county who can help us."

The Planning Commission is also looking into pursuing block grants to assist with the purchase of two fire trucks.

"The new fire hall is 96 percent complete," Gilliam said. The fire department is expected to occupy the building in early December.







No team had more than a two-possession lead in the first 30 minutes. The Tigers made it a five-point affair, 13-8, 3:01 left in the opening quarter thanks to a three-point play by Abby Young. However, it was Émory that took a 14-13 lead after 10 minutes of play.

Sewanee took a 26-24 lead with a little over a minute left in the second stanza on a Bella Bombassi jumper, but after two free throws by the

The Sewanee men's basketball team used 51 rebounds and 36 points in the paint to power its way to a 69-62 win over the Wasps of Emory & Henry College on Dec. 3, from Juhan Gymnasium.

Despite the struggles from the field from both teams in the contest, the Tigers scored the first eight points of the game, six by Adrian Thomas, before the Wasps struck for points at 6:47 into the contest.

Trailing 15-4 at the 10:44 mark in the first half, Emory & Henry drained two straight shots from beyond the arc to cut the deficit to 15-10

with over nine minutes left in the half. Sewanee was able to get the lead back to double digits, as the hosts lead, 35-19, at the break.

In the first 20 minutes, the Tigers out-rebounded the Wasps, 26-13 and limited the visitors to 22.2 percent (6-of-27) from the field.

Emory & Henry was able to cut the deficit from as high as 20 points with 15:23 left in the game to a two-possession game with 17 seconds left, but Sewanee held off the visitors to earn its third straight win.

The Tigers held the visitors to 34.9 percent from the field and 62 points. Prior to Tuesday's contest, the Wasps averaged 84.6 points per

Joey Knox led the Tigers with 17 points and eight rebounds, while drian Thomas scored 14 points on 7-of-13 shooting with eight boards. Ryan Starr scored 11 points, corralled five boards, and attributed

NATURENOTES

Greening of All Saints' Chapel

The greening of All Saints' Chapel for Lessons and Carols this weekend uses many plant materials gathered locally on the Domain under the careful direction of the grounds manager, reports Yolande Gottfried. Among the plants used are a number of those mentioned in Nature Notes a couple of issues ago.

The gingko "roses" are one of Ken Taylor's signature decorations, and volunteers spend hours fashioning them from the distinctive yellow gingko leaves that just fell a week or so ago. The fan-like vein pattern in their leaves is unlike any other living tree. That and other features make it unique among "modern" plants, a living fossil.

Much of the greenery includes native evergreens, specifically white pine, Virginia pine and eastern red cedar or juniper. Arborvitae and the broad-leaf evergreen southern magnolia (Magnolia grandiflora) are also used, collected from populations that are planted or escaped from cultivation, though they are part of native plant communities elsewhere in the United States.

Nandina is used for its red berries, which helps keep this potentially invasive exotic from spreading through seed dispersal. Another invasive exotic being used this year is Asian bittersweet, a vine notable for its orange-red fruits but classified as a severe threat by the Tennessee Exotic Pest Plant Council. Other greenery is gathered from campus plantings of spruce, fir, and cherry or skip laurel.

It has been suggested that the University consider creating a cutting garden for the purpose of having these greens available without having to collect them from other sources—an idea worth discussing as we admire the chapel's adornment this year.


