Council Approves New Duck River Electric Office Discusses Future of 41A Development

The Sewanee Community Council voted Monday to approve the construction of a new office building and equipment yard for the Duck River Electric Membership Corporation on U.S. Highway 41A at Trimble Lane. One council member voted in opposition to the project, raising concerns about development along the 41A corridor.

The council also discussed cell phone service in the community, the reconfigured entrance to University Avenue from 41A, road conditions in foggy weather, and the prospect of a dog park in Sewanee. It also considered a request to modify a Lease Committee policy, reviewed the deer cull policies for December and January and safety issues surrounding bow-hunting, and heard a report about the Sewanee Police Department.

Ierry Forster, chief financial officer of the University, reviewed the Duck River Electric project's movement through the approval process: in August, the Lease Committee granted preliminary approval for Duck River's site plan; in September, the proposal was presented to the Community Council, and the Franklin County Planning Commission approved the site plan; in October, the Franklin County Board of Commissioners approved rezoning the site to residential-commercial mixed use; in

November, the Lease Committee approved the plan.
Duck River District Manager Bill Elliott presented council members with information about the project, including answers to frequently asked questions, the DREMC's new office site is 2.4 acres on Highway 41A. The architect's illustrations of the proposed facility and aerial photographs of the 2.4 acre site.

The building will be constructed of stacked stone and brick veneer with a dark metal roof. The office will face Highway 41A, with customer parking in front and a drive-through window on the corner of the building. The equipment yard will be located behind the building, secluded from adjoining leases by a forest buffer. Plans call for landscaping with small trees and shrubs in front. Customers will enter the site from Trimble Lane and exit on Highway 41A. Utility trucks will enter and exit the site at a separate Highway 41A access point. Duck Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT); they do not anticipate a low-visibility lane being required on



brick and stacked stone facility will include 3,000 square feet of customer service/office area and 3,800 square feet of warehouse and truck bay area which will be secluded from adjoining leases by a forest buffer and planned landscaping improvements.

Council Representative Phil White proposed a motion to commend Duck River and Elliott for the carefully thought-out building and site plan. The council unanimously voted to approve this motion.

The council then voted to approve the project, with one council member voting against the project. Council River will need to acquire driveway permits from the representative David Coe said his opposition was based (Continued on page 6)







stressing that it was "less safe" than the bolt was shed by a deer and was the former entrance. Flynn noted that visibility was restricted at times for residents to be alert to the possibility individuals turning east toward Monteagle. Director of Physical Plant Services John Vineyard went with Flynn to observe traffic flow and agreed to discuss the problem with Miller-McCoy, Inc., the consulting engineers who Council Representative John Flynn designed the new entrance. Vineyard will report back to the council about possible remedies.

Flynn also introduced a discussion about a recent Lease Committee decision to refuse to allow a faculty leaseholder on sabbatical to rent to a student. After a lengthy discussion, Vice-Chancellor John McCardell suggested that the Community Council was not the appropriate vehicle for affecting change in Lease Committee policy. Provost Linda Lankewicz said individuals could bring requests ily to students as well as enforcing state before the Lease Committee at its regularly scheduled meetings.

Coe expressed concerns about restricted visibility on Airport Road in foggy conditions. Coe noted that the road does not have reflectors on the center line and the fluorescent lines along the edge of the road need to be repainted. Police Chief Robert White will relay the concerns to the Superintendant of the Highway Department and TDOT.

Director of Sustainability Marvin Pate reported that 52 deer had been taken so far in the pre-cull deer hunting, a 40% increase over last year at this time. The holiday cull will begin at noon on Dec. 17 and end on Jan. 9, Pate said. There will be no hunting from 2 a.m. to 2 p.m. and no hunting on Christmas. In addition to bow hunting, muzzle-loader hunting will be allowed in the outer zones, marked in red on community maps. Pate noted that muzzle loaders were limited range firearms, and that hunting with muzzle loaders will be from deer stands only, shooting toward the ground.

Pate explained that the yellow zones were residential areas. Hunters were to be 100 yards from homes and trails, unless the homeowner requested closer-in hunting. If hunters are observed too close to homes or trails, Pate said persons should notify the police. Abbo's Alley and Lake Cheston are no longer hunting zones, Pate said.

A resident of Wiggins Creek mentioned finding a crossbow bolt, an arrow, in his yard. He assumed that not fired into his yard. Pate cautioned of shed bolts, noting that crossbow bolts were very sharp and could pose a danger to persons finding them.

Forster presented an overview of the Sewanee Police Department. According to Forster, 82% (\$734,000) of the Police Department's budget comes from the University and 18% (\$161,000) comes from leaseholders. Wages and benefits for the SPD staff (nine full-time officers, four full-time dispatchers and two part-time dispatchers) make up 90% of the expense budget, while vehicles, equipment and supplies make up the remaining portion.

Chief White pointed out that the SPD wears "two hats," enforcing University regulations that apply primarregulations that apply to everyone. SPD often relies on the Franklin County Sheriff's Department to assist with investigations, White noted. In order for the SPD to respond to calls off the Domain, the SPD must receive a "mutual-aid assist request" from the other jurisdiction. White encouraged residents with concerns to "Please come to my office."


Economist to Speak on Food Ethics and Policy



Lessons and Carols: Two guests and a new composition

The annual Lessons and Carols services are this weekend at All Saints' Chapel. The carillon can be heard before and after each of the three services: Saturday afternoon, Sunday afternoon and Sunday evening. Saturday's service will be Robbe Delcamp's 100th Lessons and Carols performance.

Donna King, instructor of music and carillonneur at Lipscomb University in Nashville, will perform a number of pieces before the Saturday afternoon service on Saturday. Donna filled in for me and played for the annual Delta Kappa Gamma sorority memorial service in June.

Before the Sunday afternoon service, new carillon student Ray Gotko will perform several pieces. Ray has a Ph.D. in music and taught at the University of Georgia before attending seminary in Sewanee in the late 1980s. He retired from the Diocese of Atlanta in 2009 and now lives in our community. Ray has many interests, including learning the carillon. He has arranged some pieces for the carillon and has composed a duet for the two of us. He has other carillon composition projects in mind for the future.

I commissioned a new Advent triptych for the 2010 Lessons and Carols that I will play before each service. You may have heard some of the other arrangements that I play by the composer, Ennis Fruhauf: "Simple Gifts," "America, God of our Fathers," "Greensleeves" and "Rosa Mystica." This triptych is based on three tunes from the Episcopal Hymnal: St. Stephen (The King shall come when morning dawns); Herald, Sound (Herald, sound the note of judgment); and Psalm 42 (Comfort, comfort ye my people). The triptych includes several of Fruhauf's typical techniques: soprano melodies over tenor offbeats, canons and mirrored melodies. The pieces are harder to play than I had imagined! Ray Gotko was a tremendous help this past Saturday when he listened with a score in hand. He made some very useful comments on tempos and making sure that the melodies were distinct.



One ALA Notable: "Listen to the Wind: The Story of Dr. Greg and Three Cups of Tea" written by Greg Mortenson, illustrated by Susan Roth (Dial). Interesting mixed-media collage enhances the story from the point of view of Pakistani children who helped build a school for their village. (Ages 5–9)

Jane Addams Children's Book Awards for quality writing with themes of peace and justice: "Sojourner Truth's Step-Stomp Stride" by Andrea Davis Pinkney and Brian Pinkney (Disney-Jump at the Sun). Art and narrative blend in this honor book about a woman "meant for speaking, meant for preaching, meant for teaching about freedom." (Ages 5–9)

After giving books from these lists throughout the year, I'm giving pop-ups by the award winning team of Matthew Rinehart and Robert Sabuda. Three of their treasures are:

"Encyclopedia Mythologica: Fairies and Magical Creatures" (Candlewick, 2008). Pages are filled with creatures to enchant children, and all ages enjoy the paper engineering and lore. My students in a Children's Literature course loved the book, now on its way to girls ages 7 and 9. A local 5-year-old's parents should know that it was my husband's idea. (Ages 4–11)

"Encyclopedia Prehistorica: Dinosaurs" (Candlewick, 2005). This collection of paper sculpture and information features dramatic double spreads with creatures lurching right at us. Smaller foldouts and pop-ups present more information. (Ages 5 and up)

"The Night before Christmas," original by Clement C. Moore (Little Simon, 2002). Santa's red suit and silver pipe shine against a white background, and reindeer leap from the page as we savor this version of a family classic. (All

Reading aloud can work for all ages, and often older children enjoy books that we assume too young for them.



Overtime with Coach Shack

Like most of us on Thanksgiving Day, I consumed a gluttonous amount of food and then found room for two or six desserts. To treat myself for such a tough day, I accepted a gracious invitation from good friends to attend a true southern cathedral, Bryant-Denny Stadium in Tuscaloosa, Alabama on Friday. 102,000 crazed fans were in attendance that day for this year's rendition of the Alabama-Auburn rivalry, with another 50,000 camped outside in tents equipped with TVs and barbecue grills. A rumor of 50-yard-line tickets going for as high as \$5,000 apiece was whispered throughout the stands.

It was November weather in our seats, but I was fortunate enough, thanks to the generous hospitality of my hosts, to be able to walk into a glass enclosure equipped with buffet lines and an endless supply of refreshments and a full view of this magnificent field. 80,000 people were wearing Crimson, and every female seemed to have a houndstooth scarf and matching bracelet. The remaining 20,000 people wore navy and orange and screamed loudly for their beloved and undefeated Auburn Tigers. Passions ran high, and the noise level in the stadium was nothing like I had ever experienced. This sound was aided by four enormous flat screen TVs located on every corner of the coliseum, each roughly the size of a basketball court, which showed every replay and had video of an assistant coach urging all Tide fans to yell even louder. Rock music blared from the speakers during timeouts, and the fans danced to stay warm and celebrate the shifting score.

The coaches that paced the sideline are among the very best in the business. Both Nick Saban and Gene Chizik can motivate their 100-member teams like no other and at the same time have the ability to lead half their state in any direction they want. These are both good men who care about the character of their players and teach them more skills than just what the NFL requires. They are paid handsomely for their efforts. Coaches Saban and Chizik have a combined salary of over \$6.5 million. Economically, it's apparently a bargain. Both of these coaches are master problem-solvers, fund raising machines and essentially CEOs of small corporations. And yet they also find time to lead their teams in community service projects. These schools are projected to rake in approximately \$18 million for a BCS bowl appearance during the New Year. I was feeling a little smug and self-satisfied that I had been able to watch the defending national champions play their instate rivals—the number one team in the land in a thrilling one-point game—until I opened the newspaper.

read in the Birmingham News that the state of Alabama also ranked number one in the nation in one more startlingly grim statistic. Alabama led the nation in the number of families that went hungry

over the past three years. The University of Alabama student body led a "Beat Auburn-Beat Hunger" canned food drive before the game. And while they failed to defeat the Tigers on the field, the drive brought in 100,000 pounds of food before kickoff.

It's a good reminder to me that I could curtail my gluttony during this next holiday season and ensure that my own family has at least one less gift under the tree and that my less fortunate neighbors have at least one more.

Snowbirds Visit Sewanee

Jean Yeatman spied some northern birds at the bird feeder and called Harry to enjoy the visitors. There were a few Purple Finches, one Hermit Thrush and a bunch of Juncos. The Hermit Thrush (top) had a speckled, whitish chest, a brown back and a red tail. It nests on the ground up north, but winters down south. It has a beautiful song in spring and summer. The male Purple Finch (middle, at top) has a rosy head, chest and back and rosy chest streaks. The female is brown with a streaked chest. Juncos (bottom) are easily identified because of a black tail with outer feathers, white chest and a rosy body. It is often called a Snowbird. The great naturalist John Burrows wrote, "From out the white and pulsing storm, I hear the snow birds calling; The sheeted winds stalk over the hills, and fast the snow is falling. On twinkling wings they eddy past, at home amid the drifting, Or seek the hills and weedy fields, where fast the snow is sifting." The female Junco is a lighter gray than the male; otherwise, they are patterned alike. Look for these birds and our common Sewanee birds at your feeders. They love black sunflower seed; sprinkle some on the ground below the bird feeders.
