SUD Board Approves Dam Repair and Myers Point Contract

At its Nov. 30 business meeting, the board of commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District voted to authorize funding for repairs to the Lake Jackson Dam and to approve the contract for supplying service to the Myers Point development. They also reviewed the proposed 2011-15 capital expense budget, cost factors related to water recycling and the regional drought plan proposed by area utility managers.

Commenting on the recent heavy rainfall, SUD manager Ben Beavers said Lake Jackson rose five feet in three-and-a-half hours and was almost overflowing. Near drought conditions in October had slowed the leak in the Lake Jackson dam, but with the rain the leak had returned to the normal pool water loss level of 65 gallons per minute. The board approved Beaver's authorization request for \$60,000 to repair the leak. The initial estimated cost was \$32,000, but Beavers cautioned that he did not want to run out of money on the project.

The board also voted to approve the contract for supplying service to the Myers Point project being developed by John Goodson. In keeping with SUD policy, the new contract grants a LEED (Leaders in Energy and Environmental Design) credit for each water-tap connection because the development covenants stipulate all homes must be LEED-certified. (LEED-certified homes use substantially less water.) The contract stipulates that if a home fails to meet LEED certification requirements, the homeowner must pay SUD the amount of the credit.

Reporting on finances, Beavers said year-to-date income was 10 percent above 2009 and expenses were down 13 percent. Beavers based the 2011 budget on the 2010 budget figures.

Beavers reviewed the capital improvements budget, which anticipates capital needs through 2015. Among the items included in this budget are: inflow and infiltration repairs over five years (\$675,000), lift station rehabilitation over three years (\$155,000), replacing grinder pumps over five years (\$120,000), new vehicle for the meter readers in 2011 (\$20,000), new vehicle for the wastewater treatment plant in 2012 (\$22,500), replacing the excavator in 2014 (\$45,000) and repainting the farm water tank in 2015 (\$60,000).

Inflow and infiltration (I&I), when rainwater enters the sewer system, puts undue strain on the wastewater treatment plant and wastewater collection system. During the recent heavy rain, two lift stations overflowed. Emphasizing the need for I&I repairs, Beavers said the \$675,000 budgeted would reduce I&I by 20–30 percent. He estimated it would cost another \$1 million to substantially reduce I&I in the system.



After election of officers and new board members, John Tilford will lead a walk-through of the new facility, which is nearly ready to receive the archive material currently stored on the third floor of duPont.



Raftelis Financial, Inc., a water and wastewater consulting firm, is in the process of reviewing SUD's rates.

In discussing water recycling research, SUD Board President Doug Cameron pointed out that the pump system for water reuse would cost \$25,000, suggesting this was a reasonable investment given that SUD is paying the University \$10,000 a year for the right to use Lake Dimmick in the event of a water shortage. Beavers stressed that a cost analysis of SUD's water supply options was necessary in order to evaluate the efficacy of water recycling. Beavers added that the 2010 budget included \$50,000 for water-recycling research and only \$15,000 of that amount was spent thus far; moving the unspent sum to next year's budget would increase the 2011 allocation for water-recycling research to \$55,000.

Beavers updated the board on the regional drought plan he drafted with the managers of the Tracy City, Monteagle and Big Creek water utilities. The managers used the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) template. The draft plan stipulates that if any two utilities impose drought conservation measures, the other two utilities will impose water-use restrictions as well. The individual utilities will designate the water-shortage trigger level for mandating conservation in their district. Beavers said TDEC wants the utilities to hold a public meeting to discuss the plan.

The next meeting of the SUD board will be at 5 p.m., Wednesday, Dec. 22, at the SUD office building on Sherwood Road.



Composting System Launched by University Students

Sewanee students have formed a new organization to reduce food waste on campus. Team Compost is composed of 10 students who daily collect and weigh all the food waste from the McClurg Dining Hall loading dock, drive the collected waste to the composting area and mix it with decomposing leaves from campus leaf collections, then wash and return containers to McClurg.

The relevant state regulators and the university's Physical Plant Services and guests can register to win a varistaff have inspected the system.

Daily compost pickups have averaged 200 pounds so far this semester, which means that the group will divert approximately 6,000 pounds of food waste from the landfill per month. Ultimately, this waste will turn into usable compost for campus plantings. The team hopes to increase the percentage of waste recovered in campus dining areas and kitchens and hopes to reduce the amount over time as low-waste practices are adopted in kitchens and

Team Compost contributes approximately 100 hours of volunteer work per month in support of this effort.

Students interested in composting and waste reduction also are monitoring and testing the progress of the current wire bin-based compost system and are researching composting operations at other schools and municipalities. They will make recommendations about the best future composting plans for Sewanee. In addition, they are working to raise awareness about food waste among McClurg diners, and considering how best to include composting from Stirling's and residence halls.

Past composting efforts received little or no institutional support. This semester, due to the concerted volunteer efforts of students, staff and faculty members, this composting system surpasses previous efforts and establishes an official composting site and mechanism on the Sewanee campus.

Team Compost grew out of the food working group of the university's sustainability steering committee and is organized and run by student volunteers. The biology department provides logistical support through use of its truck for evening transportation of compost. Marvin Pate and David Haskell are informal advisors to the group; Rocco Calandruccio and Laurie Kianka provide additional advice and support. Team Compost has coordinated its work with Aramark executive chef Rick Wright.

• Before you use your fireplace, make sure the chimney has been professionally cleaned to remove the buildup of combustible materials that accumulate inside the flue.

• Be sure any kerosene-fueled heating device is installed with yuletide cheer. proper ventilation. A portable kerosene heater must be filled in a wellventilated area, free of flame and other heat sources, and only when the device has cooled completely.

• Never leave a fire, space heater or flame unattended.

Additionally, make sure furniture, clothing and other combustible materials are not placed in front of permanently mounted heaters.



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

Overtime with Coach Shack

My daughter Tessa and I had a great father-daughter date on Saturday night. We drove down to Huntsville after her sisters' basketball game and went to see Disney's "Princesses on Ice." We got to see Jasmine, Mulan, Ariel, Snow White and Belle—all her favorite Disney stories twirling around the ice to songs she had memorized over the years. After the intermission the show was solely dedicated to the story of Cinderella, the true "queen" of all princesses.

On the way home Tessa asked me why this was so. "Why is Cinderella the most important of all the girls?" My thought was that everyone loves that story. Rags to riches. We fight to protect the "American dream" where the little guy has a chance to make it to the castle. Those are always my favorite moments in sports, as well. When the underdog pulls off the improbable and wins the title. As I think back on my most fond memories of coaching, they usually involve an upset win over a big school like an Emory University that may have an advantage over us of a few more thousand students and a few billion dollars in the bank. A coach can't ever concede when the odds are against his team. You just have to look for new ways to overcome the problem. You have to look for a way to level the playing field.

If you are looking for a good game to watch this season, the real blood sport being played is in Washington, D.C. The gladiators in politics are grappling over that Cinderella story. Arguing over that gap between the wealthiest Americans and those that are struggling. It is more certain that you and I will have to pay taxes next spring than the fact it will snow on the Packers in Lambeau Field. I am not sure if you have glanced at the scoreboard lately, but we are behind. Those two teams up in D.C. are battling over who is going to pay more and how we get back into this game. Any volunteers? Anyone want to pay more? I didn't think so. How about good roads, better pay for our teachers and police, making sure everyone can go to the doctor and that our children get the best possible education? Those are all games worth winning, better than any trophy, a championship for all.

In major league baseball the New York Yankees live in the castle. They have a moat made of money, the fan base, the TV contract and the market to get richer. Meanwhile, the Florida Marlins have a guy standing on the street corner spinning a cardboard arrow and hawking a cheap seat to the game. The NFL owners share their revenue and have rules designed to create parity where everyone has an equal shot at the throne. This year, for the first time, an NFL team may make the playoffs with a losing record. That too, is not a workable model. The success we crave is based on hard work, achievement, overcoming the odds.

Sports are not about balance. The opposite is true. Sports are imbalance. Winning and losing. A champion-ship season versus "wait till next year." It is a fact, however, that the gap between the "haves" and "have nots" is growing in this country and if we want David to take his shot at Goliath, we

need to at least give him a pebble and sling.

So if I am coaching this game, I am in the locker room looking for a path to victory. I am looking at Peyton Manning and Drew Brees, my \$10 million-a-year-guys, players who have worked hard, done all the right things, made it to the top, and I am going to ask them for more. 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Nature Notes

Loggerhead Shrike

On the telephone line of a country road near Cowan, Jean and Harry Yeatman and Joy Dog observed a Loggerhead Shrike. This bird resembles a slender Mockingbird and is often misidentified. The Loggerhead Shrike is well-named, as its head is quite thick with a black streak from its hawklike bill along the side of its head. The upper parts of the body are gray with a lighter gray chest and body. Its wings



are jet black with a few light spots near the edge. Its tail is black with some white outer feathers. This is a very unusual bird because it is hawklike with sparrowlike legs, unfit for catching prey and tearing flesh. Its hooked, powerful beak impales the prey on long thorns, barbed wire points or even wooden spikes. These sharp pointed 'tools" enable the shrike to hold its prey for butchering and also for storing in case of bad weather.

Back in 1933, Harry watched a shrike attack an adult cardinal at his bird feeder and peck open its

hind skull. It was wintertime, and the shrike was hungry. Harry photographed the shrike stomping over its prey on a board in the snow

Swallowed victims can be butchered or swallowed whole. Even mice can be swallowed, with the flesh digested along with bones and fur or feathers. Undigested parts are ejected from the mouth as pellets, similar to the pellets of hawks and owls. Shrikes build a nest of twigs and vegetable fibers, with finer material at the center. The shrike lives in low trees, tall shrubs, etc. Its three to five eggs are creamy with brown spots. The voice of the Loggerhead Shrike consists of harsh gurgles,

creaking noises, etc., as if the bird were trying hard to sing.

Unfortunately, pesticides sprayed on crops and fields by farmers have poisoned many of our interesting shrikes, and they have become scarce.

This taking of bird prey is not usual, so forgive the shrike. They eat mice and grasshoppers, too.




