“Sewanee Remembers” Offers Range of Events to Commemorate Holocaust

“Sewanee Remembers” is a week-long commemoration of Yom Ha’Shoah (Holocaust Remembrance Day) to be held Monday, March 30, through Friday, April 3. Events planned include public performances, student research and lectures. All events are free and open to the public. For a complete schedule of events and information about locations, go to <<http://yomhashoah.sewanee.edu>>. This year is the 70th anniversary of the end of the Holocaust.

At 7:30 p.m., Monday, March 30, at Proctor Hill Theater in the Tennessee Williams Center, University of the South professors David Meola (history), Dan Backlund and Peter Smith (theatre arts), along with their classes, will present a spoken-word project bringing short, meaningful writings of people involved in the Holocaust. More than just a dramatic reading of victim’s diaries and memoirs, this project will weave together the stories of numerous personalities, including perpetrators and bystanders.

The week’s keynote speaker is Dagmar Herzog, distinguished professor of history and the Daniel Rose Faculty Scholar at the Graduate Center, City University of New York. Her talk will take place at 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, April 1, in Gailor Auditorium. She will lecture on her current research titled “Post-Holocaust Anti-Semitism and the Psychiatry of Trauma.” Herzog writes on the histories of religion, the Holocaust and its aftermath, and gender and sexuality. Her most recent book is “Sexuality in Europe: A Twentieth-Century History,”

Noted Author to Speak at SAS

This year’s Bishop Reynolds Forum speaker will be author and journalist Richard Louv. Louv will be speaking to the St. Andrew’s-Sewanee community at 8 a.m., Friday, April 10, in McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts. The public is invited to attend.

Louv is the author of eight books, including “Last Child in the Woods: Saving Our Children from Nature-Deficit Disorder” and “The Nature Principle: Reconnecting with Life in a Virtual Age.”

As co-founder and chairman emeritus of the Children & Nature Network, Louv has catalyzed the creation of an international movement to connect people and communities to the natural world.

Louv appears frequently on national radio and television programs, including the Today Show, CBS Evening News, and NPR’s Fresh Air, and often addresses national and international gatherings. In 2010, he delivered the plenary keynote at the national conference of the American Academy of Pediatrics, and in 2012 was keynote speaker at the first White House Summit on Environmental Education.

In 2008, he received the Audubon Medal; past recipients include Rachel Carson, E.O. Wilson and Jimmy Carter.

The South Cumberland Community Fund (SCCF) welcomes grant requests from nonprofit organizations to support initiatives that strengthen community and improve lives in the region.

The deadline for applications is May 1; final selection of grant recipients will be made by August 1.

“Grant funding is one of the main ways that the South Cumberland Community Fund cultivates leadership and resources across the Plateau. We’re proud of our collaborations with about 30 community organizations, and our almost \$300,000 in direct grants,” said Margaret Woods, SCCF board chair.

Innovative Chamber Music Comes to Sewanee

The University of the South Performing Arts Series presents an evening of innovative chamber music with Stewart Copeland, drummer and founding member of The Police, and internationally renowned pianist Jon Kimura Parker. Copeland and Parker will perform in Sewanee’s Guerry Auditorium at 7:30 p.m., Saturday, March 28.

Stewart Copeland, rock-star drummer turned acclaimed film composer and filmmaker, was ranked by Rolling Stone magazine as the fifth greatest drummer of all time. He will be joined by pianist Jon Kimura Parker, media personality and veteran of the international concert stage, to produce engaging and cutting-edge chamber music. The project features Copeland’s compositions, as well as standard classical repertoire, including Parker’s brilliant suite based on Stravinsky’s “Rite of Spring.”

Together, Copeland and Parker explore the role of improvisation in classical music. Instrumentation includes piano, violin, double-bass and percussion, as well as the electronic valve instrument.

Stewart Copeland has spent three decades in the forefront of contemporary music as a rock star, acclaimed film composer and filmmaker, and a much sought-after collaborator in the disparate worlds of opera, ballet, world music and chamber music composition. His career includes the sale of more than 60 million records worldwide and numerous awards, including five Grammys.

A veteran of the international concert stage, Jon Kimura Parker has performed as guest soloist with the Philadelphia Orchestra, toured Europe with the Royal Philharmonic Orchestra and André Previn, and shared the stage with Jessye Norman at Berlin’s Philharmonie.

Tickets are \$25/adults, \$20/seniors, \$10/students. (Sewanee students, faculty and staff are free with a University ID card.)

TVA POWER OUTAGE To the Editor:

On March 15, the Tennessee Valley Authority completed maintenance and repairs on the transmission side of Duck River Electric Membership Corporation's substation serving all of Sewanee. This work—replacement of switches, upgrades and preventive maintenance—required an eight-hour planned power outage, from 10 p.m. on Saturday to 6 a.m. on Sunday.

The Sewanee substation is critical to providing reliable electric service to Duck River EMC members in the area. The length of the outage was necessary due to the scope of work. This posed an inconvenience for the community, but it was necessary to avoid future problems with the power supply on which everyone depends.

On behalf of the board of directors of Duck River EMC, we want to extend appreciation to our co-op members in and around Sewanee. Their patience and understanding allowed this project to be finished within the planned time frame.

Larger Electric Bills on the Way

The "Frigid February of 2015" brought two ice storms and a heavy snowfall to DREMC's service territory. But the thermometer delivered extended low temperatures, making February colder than January and boosting demand for electricity to heat homes and buildings.

Member Services Director Steve Oden explains that heating degree days for the month were greater than January's total.

"February was the coldest month of the winter, and electric bills will reflect the higher use," he says.

DREMC offers a variety of programs to help members become more energy-efficient and better manage their use of electricity.

"Levelized billing is a great way to avoid spikes in the size of your monthly bill," Oden notes, "and we now have a prepay program called PowerUP that gives the member a new tool for managing electricity use."

Partnering with the Tennessee Valley Authority, DREMC is part of the eScore program, through which rebates and financing are available to make residences more energy-efficient.

More than 13,800 DREMC members participate in "Beat the Peak." This is a voluntary residential demand response program aimed at helping the co-op avoid higher wholesale energy costs during periods of extreme cold or heat.

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Health Insurance Marketplace

For those who have not enrolled to buy private health care insurance, with possible tax credit support, the Health Insurance Marketplace will reopen for enrollment through April 30. This period is open only of those who recently became aware of the tax penalty they have been subject to for not having a qualified insurance plan.

The best way to enroll is to get free help from the American Exchange at (888) 995-1674.

The Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services (CMS) announced a special enrollment period (SEP) for individuals and families in Federally Facilitated Marketplace (FFM) states (including Tennessee) who did not have health coverage in 2014 and are subject to the penalty when they file their 2014 taxes.

CMS will provide consumers with an opportunity to purchase health insurance coverage from March 15 to April 30. Consumers who qualify must select a plan by 11:59 p.m. EDT on April 30.

Those eligible for this special enrollment period live in FFM states and:
—are not currently enrolled in 2015 coverage (whether through the FFM, an employer or other source like the individual marketplace);

—attest that they are or will be subject to the fee for not having health coverage for all or part of 2014 when they file their 2014 taxes; and

—attest that they first became aware of, or understood the implications of the requirement to maintain minimum essential coverage (MEC) after the end of open enrollment (February 15, 2015) in connection with preparing their 2014 taxes.

and she is currently working on a transatlantic study of psychoanalysis, trauma and desire in the postwar era.

Tom Lenda, a survivor of the Terezin (Theresienstadt) ghetto-concentration camp (located in what is now the Czech Republic), will be in Sewanee to give a talk at 6 p.m., Thursday, April 2, in the University Arts Gallery. Lenda is a noted Holocaust speaker and he has also written a memoir, "Children on Death Row: Holocaust and Beyond." It will take audience members through Lenda's memories of living in the dystopian world of the Nazi camps. Music, narration (performed by David Landon, theatre arts), and dance will create a performance unlike others before.

Through generous support, 40 children's drawings from Terezin will be on display, on loan from the Jewish Museum of Prague. These images will be displayed from Sunday, March 29, through Thursday, April 30, in duPont Library. These images are not located in a central area, but have been distributed throughout this public space.

Four University of the South students will present their individual research on the Holocaust at 9:30 a.m., Thursday, April 2, in Gailor Auditorium.

A public discussion on anti-Semitism will be held at 4:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 31, on the campus of Middle Tennessee State University in Murfreesboro. Meola will give a short lecture on the "History of Anti-Semitism before the Nazi Era," and Herzog will speak on "Nazi Anti-Semitism and the Holocaust."

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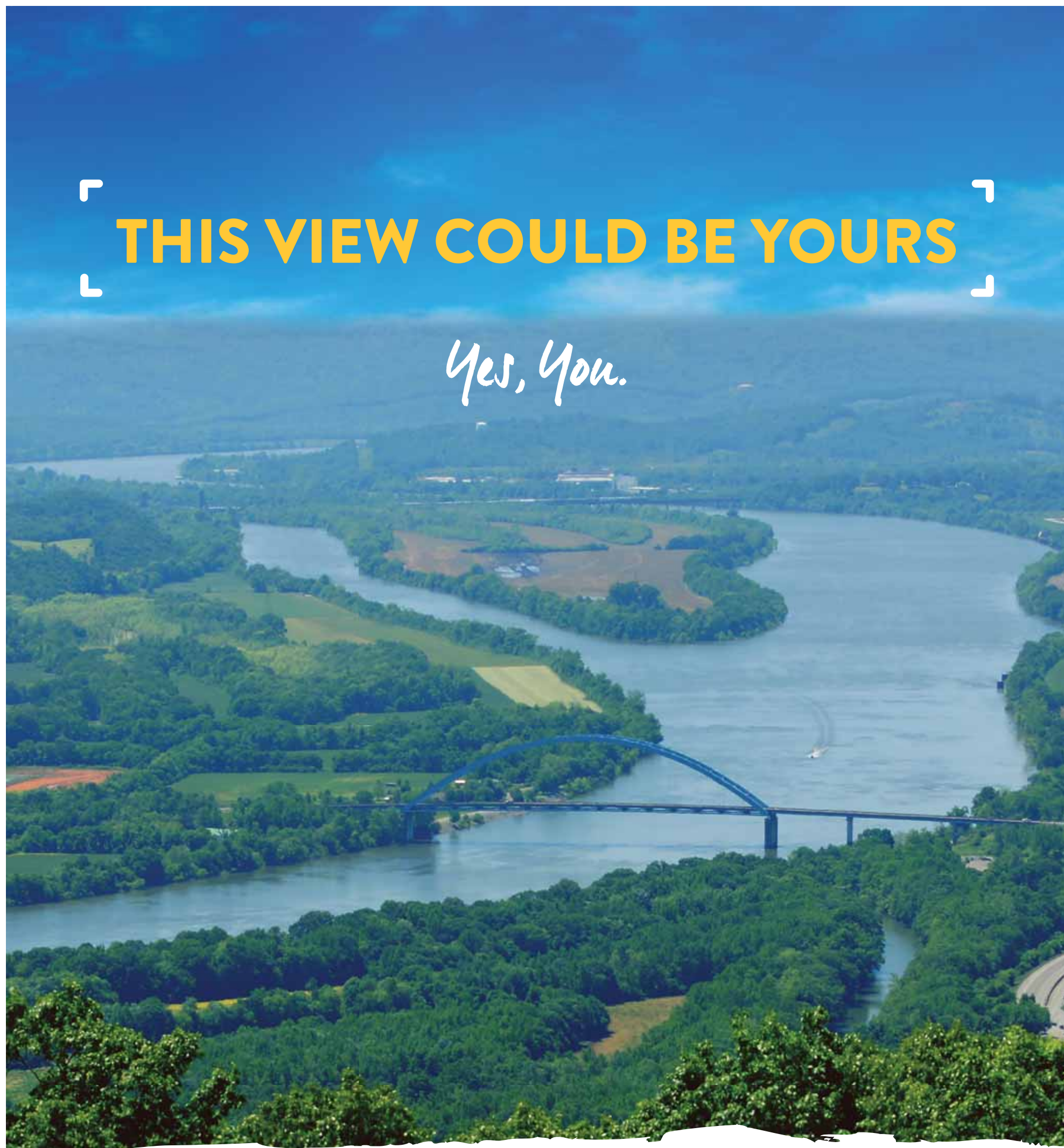
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THE INSATIABLE CRITIC

Sir Toby

Big Hero 6
7:30 p.m., Friday—MONDAY, March 20–23
2014, Rated PG, 102 minutes

Winner of this year's Oscar for Best Animated Picture, Disney's latest animated full-length feature plumbs the depths of mech anime (slang for Japanese animation) and sci-fi genres. Taking place in the fictional city of San Fransokyo, a young prodigy Hiro Hamada forms a very special relationship with Baymax, an inflatable robot created by Hiro's late brother, Tedashi. When a great evil befalls the city, Baymax, Hamada, and his ragtag group of friends pull together to save their hometown from harm. Gorgeous animation in bright colors, a heartfelt plot and high-speed action make this an enjoyable ride for adults and children alike.

Moolaadé
7:30 p.m., Tuesday, March 24 • 2014, Unrated, 124 minutes

In some tribes in Africa, there has been a historical practice of "cutting," a purification ritual that involves severely injuring the genitals of girls from ages 4 to 9 years old. This film, set in Burkina Faso near Ghana, focuses on a woman named Colle who stands up to this horrific tradition of her tribe by invoking the sacred right of moolaadé, a form of sanctuary, to shield her own daughter, as well as the daughters of others, from this abusive practice. Because it is a deep taboo to violate the sanctuary, dissension begins to fall on the village as men and women of the tribe pressure Colle to revoke her protection. Director Ousmane Sembene took home two awards from the 2004 Cannes Film Festival for his work, and critical praise for raising awareness of this plight of African women. Though unrated, the intense subject material is best suited for older teens and adults.

Blade Runner
7:30 p.m., Wednesday, March 25 • 1982, Rated R, 117 minutes

Quite possibly one of the best American sci-fi films ever made, this film is director Ridley Scott's ingenious adaptation of the Philip K. Dick novel, sporting the less edgy title of "Do Androids Dream of Electric Sheep?" Set in Los Angeles of 2019, Harrison Ford stars as Rick Deckard, a man whose job it is to hunt down and terminate "replicants," humanoids that have been deemed treacherous due to a bloody uprising years ago. Deckard hopes to get out of the barbarous business, but is drawn back in when he finds out that four replicants have hijacked a ship back to Earth. Nominated for two Oscars for Best Set Decoration and Best Visual Effects, the film plunges the viewer into a grungy, cyber-punk world that is all-encompassing. Though rated R for violence and brief nudity, by today's standards I think sci-fi loving families of older children and teenagers could easily enjoy this film together.

The Hobbit: The Battle of the Five Armies

2014, Rated PG-13, 144 minutes



The final chapter in the Middle Earth saga and prequel to the Lord of the Rings trilogy, Peter Jackson takes the helm one last time directing J.R.R. Tolkien's enduring masterpiece of "The Hobbit." What this film lacks in substance it certainly makes up for in panache, as it sets the stage for the re-emergence of the Dark Lord Sauron. We pick up where we left Bilbo and our band of dwarves, reclaiming the Lonely Mountain as their own—but with deep consequences. The unassuming folks of nearby Laketown fall subject to dethroned dragon Smaug's rage, meanwhile King of the Dwarves Thorin Oakenshield quickly becomes no help at all as he obsesses over the reclaimed spoils of gold Smaug had been hoarding. Bilbo is torn between helping Thorin see reason and doing what needs to be done for the greater good, and it soon becomes apparent the only person with a lick of sense, as usual, is the Wizard Gandalf the Grey. Running a somewhat exhausting two hours and 24 minutes, it is rated PG-13 for extended sequences of intense fantasy action violence and some frightening images. It might be a bit lengthy for small kiddies to sit through, but is perfectly suited for adults and families of older children who can appreciate a good epic fantasy.

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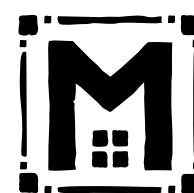
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ANGELWITH AN ATTITUDE

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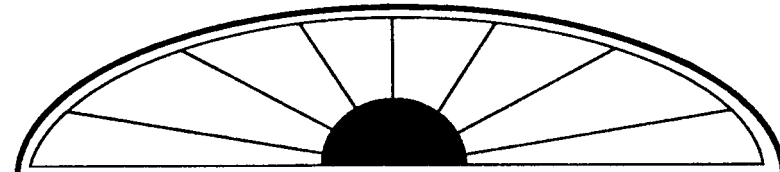
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OUTSIDEIN

Outside in 38

If you go out often enough, even to the same old places, new things can happen.

I've found that out during the recent warming and thawing here on the Mountain. The unusual cold and weeks of snow and ice saturated the ground, so that the rising temps turned the trails into super-boggy messes.

Streams trickled down the middle of usually dry paths. Once-small puddles overtook entire stretches of fire lanes. There was no high ridge on which to walk, no solid island to hop to. Walking these daily routes suddenly was impossible—forget running or cycling.

Suddenly, unexpectedly, everything was changed about my relationship to these places. When every step alters the landscape, one is not just visiting, just seeing, just enjoying or using a place. One is inevitably changing it, in visible and meaningful ways.

You have to decide whether or not to use the place as you normally can. Whether your effect on it will be more than you think appropriate. Whether your conscience can live with what it will look like once you've passed through.

In that instant, the relationship changes and deepens. It is a micro version of a larger conversation: how lightly to live on the earth. What ways of living to choose and what to give up out of concern for what will be left behind. The difference, though, is that here it's not theoretical. The coal-burning power plants and Arctic ice are far away; the trail is right here, right now, every afternoon around 2:30 p.m.

If one chooses to go out, regardless, in these conditions, the shoe-sized impacts, the gouges into the land, are right there on the trail. Will they be permanent, or even long-lasting? Will the passage of time, the drying and warming of a Sewanee summer, smooth out the trail, erode my footprints back into a flat surface for all who pass by?

Or will my choices, added to the decisions of others, add up to a pitted, potholed mess, a blight in the woods?

It's possible that these trails have gone through this cycle dozens if not hundreds of times: that the flat, dry paths I have used were at various times rutted, puddled, detoured around, chewed up, but then over time, by the natural eroding and filling of dirt, sand, rocks, have settled down again, like leaves in a windstorm, finding equilibrium again. Someone with more experience might know. Later, in May and June, I'll try to remember to look at the worst places, where people (including me) hopped around the edges of the trail mess, to see what they're like.

It will be comforting if I find that the trails have indeed healed themselves. We humans are on an unprecedented experiment, changing the planet more thoroughly than has ever been done in recorded history. We don't know what will heal itself, and what is irreparably changed. Every instance of a place being able to return to some sort of good condition, even if it's not 'pure'—whatever that means—will bring a sigh of relief.

Meanwhile, I decided to stay off the trails and wait out the drying of the worst, boggiest areas. I walked the dog in town and left the mountain bike in the shed. I'll hope that others make similar decisions, and avoid the worst areas. If they do, we'll all be enjoying the trails soon enough.

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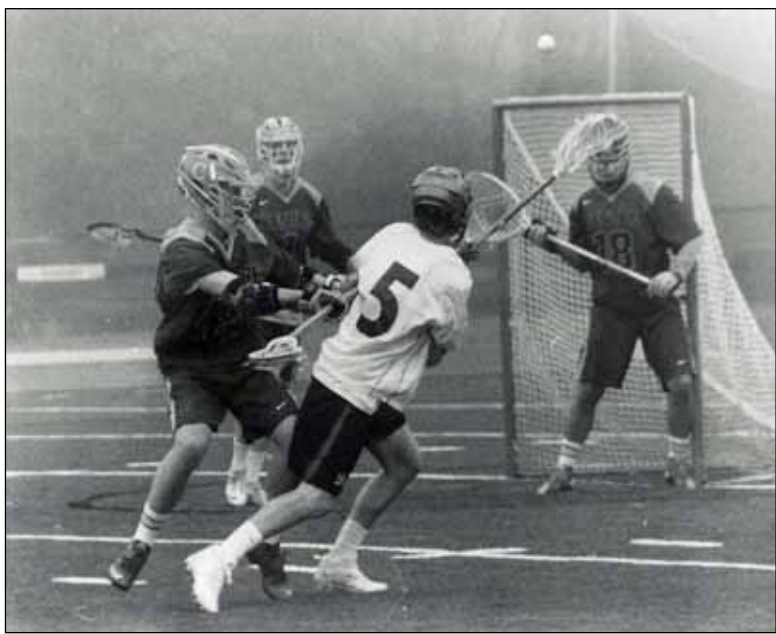

Men's Lacrosse Defeats Centre

Seven goals in the second period helped the Sewanee men's lacrosse team defeat Southern Athletic Association (SAA) rival Centre 15-8 on March 14.

The Tigers are now 4-1 overall and 1-0 in league play.

After Centre jumped out to an early 2-0 lead, Sewanee answered back, scoring four straight times to end the first period. Matthew Stiefel, Robbie Berndt and Hayden Byrd all ripped home goals during a two-and-a-half minute stretch.

With a 4-2 lead to start the second, Sewanee's attack exploded for seven goals and 18 shots over the next 15 minutes. Berndt opened with a goal off an assist from Jimmy Parker. After Seth Gray scored for Centre, George Bukawyn, Berndt, Stiefel, and Cotter Brown extended the Sewanee lead to 11-3 by halftime.

Centre would rally in the third period with five goals to pull to within six, 14-8. The Tigers answered with third-period goals from Parker, Berndt and Stiefel.

The Tigers then shut out Centre in the fourth, while Stiefel netted his fourth goal off a pass from Berndt.

Overall, Sewanee had more face-offs, ground balls and shots than the Colonels.

Individually, Berndt finished with a career-high five goals and two assists. Stiefel also continued his outstanding week with four goals and an assist. Hal Smith also played well with 20 face-off wins and 12 ground balls.

Baseball Rips Alfred State

Behind its second-best offensive output of the season, the Sewanee baseball team opened its Florida trip with a 17-1 win over Alfred State on March 16 in Winter Haven, Fla.

The Tigers are now 5-7 overall, while snapping their six-game losing streak.

Sewanee jumped out quickly, scoring four runs in the bottom of the first, three in the bottom of the fourth, four more in the fifth, two in the sixth and four in the eighth.

Overall, Sewanee pounded out 13 hits, which included two doubles and a triple.

Jackson Cooper led the offense with a three-for-four performance, four RBIs and three runs scored. Cooper also walked once and had the Tigers' triple that scored Jack Whaley,

Blake Bays and Nathan Warren in the bottom of the fifth.

Ben Clune, Tyler Minkinen, and Brett Polston also had multiple hits for Sewanee. On the mound, reliever Drew Mancuso tossed four innings of scoreless relief for the win.

Women's Tennis Rallies for Win, Blanks Biola

Despite being down 2-1 after doubles, the No. 14 Sewanee women's tennis team rallied for a 6-3 win at No. 22 Redlands, March 14, on the Verdick Courts in California.

The Tigers' lone doubles win came at No. 3, as Annie Veron and Maggie Crumbliss earned an 8-4 win over Gabriela Vasquez and Maddie Morton.

Despite its early deficit, Sewanee responded in a big way as singles play began. The Tigers won at No. 1, No. 2, No. 3, No. 5 and No. 6.

At No. 1, Bronte Goodhue outlasted Natalie Etchegaray 3-6, 6-1, 6-4. Lindsey Liles earned a 6-2, 6-1 victory over Ceara Sumida at No. 2.

Then a court over, Christina Merchant defeated Emily Murnin by a dominant 6-2, 6-3 win.

At No. 5, Clementina Davila blasted Vasquez 6-2, 6-4, while Veron had little trouble against Julia Pollak with 6-3, 6-1.

Davila then swept at No. 3 with a perfect 6-0, 6-0 score, while Crumbliss dominated her match with another 6-0, 6-0 victory.

Facing another ranked team for the fourth straight day, the Sewanee men's tennis team bounced back with a strong 6-3 win over No. 28 Denison on March 17.

Sewanee opened by sweeping all three doubles matches. At No. 1, Roddy and Cooper defeated Grant Veitman and Casey Cempre, 8-4. At No. 2, Avery Schober and Connor Winkler topped Jackson O'Gorman Bean and Jeffrey LoDuca by another 8-4 win.

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NATURENOTES

Reporting from Oregon

When we left Sewanee March 9, reports **Yolande Gottfried**, the last of the most recent snow was melting, and winter was still in full force. Arriving in Bend, Ore., we found spring well underway, to our surprise. Daffodils, hyacinths and forsythia are in full bloom, as well as ornamental flowering fruit trees. Maples are red with young fruits. Alders have already shed their pollen. The manzanita blooms very early with dangling bright pink flowers among the evergreen leaves and twisted mahogany-colored branches. It is in the same family as our blueberries, and the flowers are similar. We also had the opportunity to see the pygmy nuthatch, acting much like our white-breasted nuthatches, but calling with a high, twittering call. It is found in ponderosa-pine-dominated forests from the eastern slopes of the Cascades eastward into the Blue and Warner mountains. And east of the Cascades is where we are, in their rain shadow in central Oregon in the area known as the high desert. Yearly rainfall here is measured in the single digits, and the landscape is dominated by drought-resistant shrubs and grasses, along with juniper, amongst boulders and soil derived from lava flows. But the snow-covered peaks of the Cascades on the horizon delight us daily.

Another Use for the Messenger

At a recent meeting of the Tennessee Naturalists Program, **Harriet Runkle** learned of another important use for the Sewanee Mountain Messenger. The class focused on how to lead a hike, and Ranger Jessie brought his backpack filled with the essentials. Along with water, flashlight, safety blanket and bandaids was a copy of the Messenger. He said he always carries one in his pack to use as a plant press. Of course, any good leader of a hike would also have some sort of wildflower or plant guide. You put your plant(s) between the pages of the Messenger and slip it inside the guidebook which acts as the press and there you have a handy plant press.

Squirrels

Our bare winter trees give us a good view of squirrel nests, reports **Yolande Gottfried**. I counted 12 in the front 5 acres or so of our property, all in oaks, since most of the trees there are white and scarlet oaks. Interestingly, none were within 100 feet or so of the road. Some may have been summer nests, built at the ends of branches and more loosely since the overhead foliage provided protection from rain. Sturdier-looking ones built in the crotch between the trunk and a major branch may be winter nests, with the entrance toward the trunk for protection. Although they look like a messy ball of leaves, they are rather well-constructed. The squirrel begins with a platform of twigs, on which is built a base of compacted leaves and moss. Then a somewhat spherical skeleton of more twigs and vines is erected, with leaves and other materials on the outside and a soft lining of shredded bark, moss, leaves and/or pine needles. A squirrel can build a nest in one day. Twelve nests doesn't necessarily mean twelve squirrels; one squirrel may have two or three nests, rotating among them as needed due to predators or infestation by mites, fleas, etc. Nests are used for rest, warmth and to raise the young; except for the latter, there is usually one squirrel per nest. Of course, it could be that the squirrels on our property are living in tree dens for the winter—certainly better protection, but not as easy to observe.
