## Council Reviews Garbage Pick-up Options and Community E-mail Proposals

At its April 25 meeting, the Sewanee Community Council considered alternatives to the current garbage pickup service on the Domain and heard an update on the proposed community e-mail service.

Leaseholder Tyler Cooney introduced the garbage pickup discussion, raising two questions: why was the cost for garbage pickup substantially higher in Sewanee than in neighboring communities, and why were absentee leaseholders required to pay for garbage service?

Chief Financial Officer Jerry Forster explained that, unlike neighboring communities, Sewanee was unincorporated so garbage pickup was not subsidized by municipal taxes. In Sewanee, garbage service was provided by an independent contractor, Joe B. Long, and Long set the fee, Forster said. With regard to absentee leaseholders, Forster said that leaseholders who anticipated an extended absence could opt out of pickup service, and the fee would be waived.

Council representative Chet Seigmund said that garbage pickup in Cowan was not subsidized by municipal taxes. Forster said he would investigate to determine if the contractor providing service in Cowan could provide lower-cost service in Sewanee.

Seigmund also noted that curb-

side recycling added \$2.50/month to Sewanee residents' garbage bills, and that a referendum could be held to determine if residents wanted to keep paying for that service. Vice-Chancellor John McCardell pointed out that the next election cycle allowing for a referendum was not until November 2012 and that in the time intervening the council could research the question and solicit input from residents.

Council representative David Coe updated the council on the proposed community e-mail service. Coe met with Elizabeth Clark Duncan, who oversees the current community e-mail service, and with Associate Provost Vicki Sells, who oversees the University affiliated e-mail services. Coe outlined the goals of the proposed service: to serve the community's needs without overburdening Sells' office with the task of vetting posts; to make public safety information available; and to make non-University affiliates on an equal footing with University affiliates with regard to the information available to them. Coe said he envisions a subscriber service where members can select from a menu of information options (e.g., safety, University events, classified listings). He anticipates that the service is probably at least a year away from being available.

The University has initiated a community-wide e-mail, text message and voice mail alert system for

## Saturday in Sewanee

Items available for purchase will include Mandevilla, Dracaena, Lenten Rose, Angelface, Cordyline, Jack-in-the-pulpit, Dianthus, Zebra Grass, Diascia and other plants, trailer loads of hardwood bark mulch and 20-pound bags of worm castings (\$6/bag) to help the new plants thrive their first year. The troop is working to earn funds for summer camp in North Carolina and several canoe trips.

### Book Sale

Thurmond Library will have huge bargains on books and Sewanee Woman's Club will have homemade treats for sale Saturday at the Otey parish hall behind the church.

The Highland Rim bookmobile made its quarterly visit to Thurmond Library recently. New books include a bounty of large-print mysteries.

In addition to the Highland Rim selections, Thurmond Library is adding new books every week. They have many of the current New York Times best sellers, lots of new fiction, and a greatly expanded audio book section.

## Orchestra Offers "Russian Revolution"

The Sewanee Symphony Orchestra will have its spring concert at 7:30 p.m., tonight (Friday, April 29) in Guerry Auditorium. The concert is free and all are invited to attend.

The program is called "Russian Revolution" and will consist of "In the Steppes of Central Asia" by Borodin; "Piano Concerto No. 1" by Liszt, featuring visiting professor of music In-Sook Park; and "Scheherazade" by Rimsky-Korsakov.

Artistic director and conductor Joseph Lee offered this description of the program:

"This concert features two Russian masterpieces (and one Hungarian work). The Liszt 'Piano Concerto' will feature Sewanee's new piano faculty member In-Sook Park. Ms. Park plays not only with grace and beauty, but also with power and technical mastery that will bring the audience to its feet!

"The second half of the program is Rimsky-Korsakov's 'Scheherazade,' a symphonic suite based on 'The Arabian Nights.' Considered his most popular work, the piece combines a dazzling, colorful orchestration and an interest in the Far East. Many orchestra members will be featured in some of the most famous solos in the orchestral repertoire."

## Automated Alert System Now in Place

The entire Sewanee community can now be contacted by the Sewanee Police Department in case of emergency or severe weather. By registering at the alert system website, people can be contacted in whatever way they choose: e-mail, voice mail, text message to a cell phone or all three.

"This new system frees our dispatchers so they can deal with emergency issues when they arise," said Marie Eldridge, assistant police chief, who has spearheaded the implementation of this system.

All University employees, college students and theology students were automatically entered into the system to receive voice messages to their campus phones and e-mail messages to their <sewanee.edu> accounts. Employees and students who want to receive text messages or voice messages on their private cell phones must register through the website to receive those messages.

The new system is operated through software from DeltAlert, which provides an accurate and affordable method to send thousands of messages in a matter of minutes. It is a web-based system, but has 24-hour staff in case the Internet is down, Eldridge said. Sewanee dispatchers will still set in motion the alert messages, providing DeltAlert with the information needed to make the messages as useful as possible, such as the length of the weather watch or the nature of the emergency. The voice message left on telephones will then be automated and delivered to telephones.

"We are really happy with the way the system is already working with our existing e-mail lists," she said. "Now, with the system fully in place, we can offer it to the entire community, not just to people on campus."

Eldridge pointed out that the system has been in trial for the last few weeks.

"If you are already receiving weather alerts through e-mail, such as the 'classifieds' or 'bulletin' or 'fac/staff' e-mail lists, you should not sign up for e-mail notification," she said. "If you want to receive the messages to your home phone or by text, please sign up for that portion of the system." Standard text message rates will apply when applicable.

Chief Robert White said that this alert system, in combination with

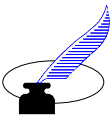
## Choral Evensong at All Saints'

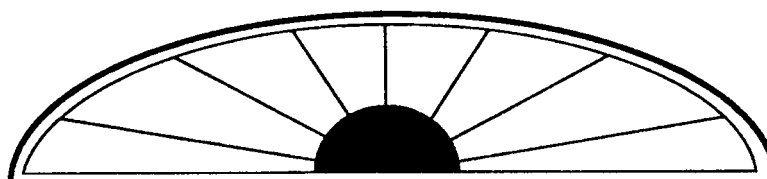
Household hazardous waste is defined as corrosive, flammable, toxic or reactive materials.

## Grundy County Farmers Market Opens Today

The Grundy County Farmers' Market opens today for the spring and summer season. Located in front of the old high school in Tracy City, it is open 2:30–5:30 p.m. on Fridays and 8–11 a.m. on Saturdays.

This year's new additions to the market include locally grown, grass-fed, grain-finished beef raised without hormones or antibiotics processed in a USDA-inspected facility, vacuum-sealed in freezer bags and packaged by the cut. The prices are reasonable, with ground beef priced at \$2.69 a pound. This producer, like many at the market, is able to take credit cards.

Also new this year are USDA commercially-certified eggs from local free-range chickens. These eggs have been carefully inspected and washed three times in an approved facility to insure food safety.

Many vendors from last year will be back, but other new ones include one who will be selling critters (small farm animals in cages). Crafts, crops and homemade goods are welcome. No resale items and only locally made and/or locally grown items are allowed. Eager customers are requested to observe the starting time, let the vendors get set up, and wait for the bell before approaching the goods.

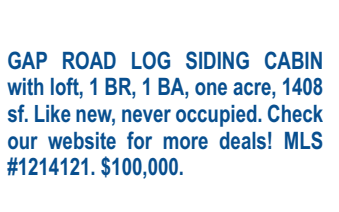

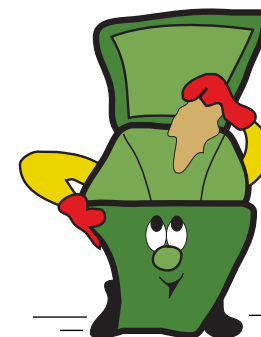

emergencies and severe weather situations. Anyone can join this service. (See article on page 1.)

Provost Linda Lankewicz reviewed the suggested meeting dates for the 2011-12 academic year. By the proposed calendar, the council will meet on the fourth Monday of each month, except for January, May and June, when the projected meeting dates are January 9, May 21, and June 18 or 25. The council does not meet in July.

On behalf of her constituents, Pam Byerly expressed concerns about excessive tree removal at the site of the new Duck River Electric facility. Domain Manager Nate Wilson reassured Byerly that the tree removal was in keeping with the site plan, and that the plan called for "flooding the site with vegetation" once construction was completed.

Council representatives Drew Sampson presented a petition drafted by him and the two other District Four representatives, Dennis Meeks and Phil White. The council will take up the issue at the June 9 meeting. (The petition is printed at right.)

A guest at the meeting proposed that an "Emergency vehicles entering highway" sign be posted at the junction of Finney Lane and Highway 41A. Police Chief Robert White will contact state officials about the suggested signage. White will also follow up on a request to post a hazardous curve sign and to reduce the speed limit to 20 mph on Kennerly Road.

Vice-Chancellor McCardell thanked student council representative Robert Rosamond, who will graduate in May. McCardell noted that Rosamond had attended every council meeting since his appointment.

Unless otherwise announced, the Sewanee Community Council meets at the Sewanee Senior Center. The next meeting is scheduled for 7 p.m., May 16.

## Petition about Lease Transfer Fee

We hereby petition the President and Vice Chancellor of the University of the South to reconsider the propriety and ethics of the lease transfer fee applied only to non-employees on the purchase of a permanent residence—a revenue source that bears no monetary relationship to the actual cost of transferring the land lease. The current chief financial officer [of the University] has stated that, originally, the transfer fee was "to give employees a purchase price advantage when purchasing a house on the Domain." Clearly, that objective has not been realized.

In the last 10 years, the number of employees of the college has grown significantly, but the number of employee leaseholders has increased by only one. At the same time, employee leaseholders are finding it difficult and sometimes virtually impossible to sell their property to a market that is primarily non-employee. And if sales are made, they usually occur by the sellers' accepting roughly 6 percent less than they had anticipated.

Historically, virtually all professors lived in and around the central campus. Now, many professors find it financially impossible to purchase a home on the Domain.

If the University deems it useful, once again, to have the professors live on the campus where they may be more accessible to students and one another, the corporation should find an alternative method to encourage faculty on-campus housing—one that neither constitutes a point-of-sale penalty to both employees and non-employees, nor creates yet another wedge between the college and the community.

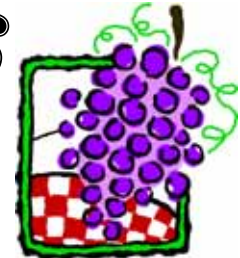

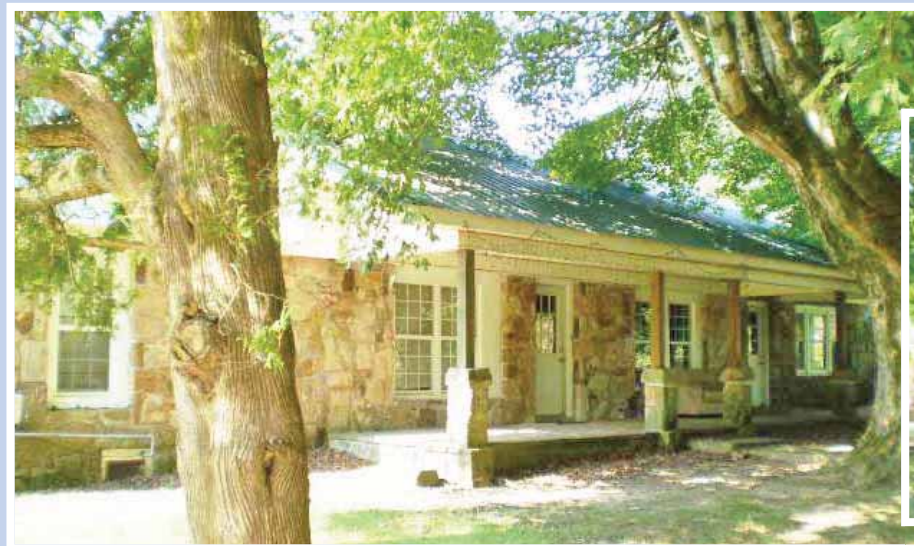

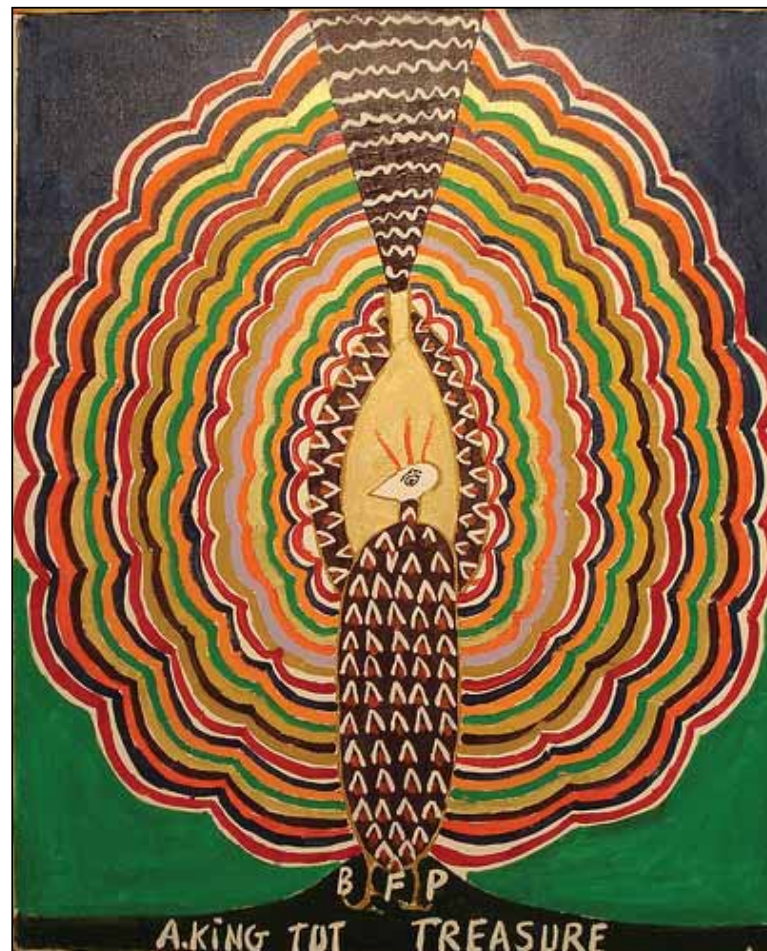
## Self-Taught Artists Show

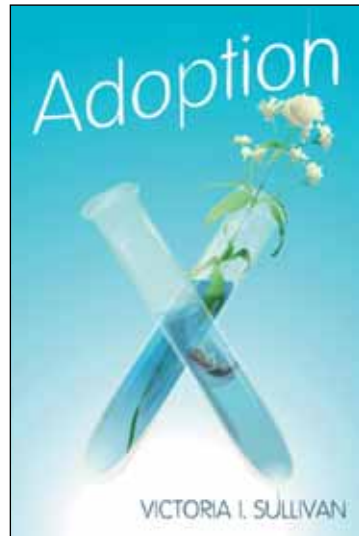
## Reishman Featured at Shenanigans Gallery in May

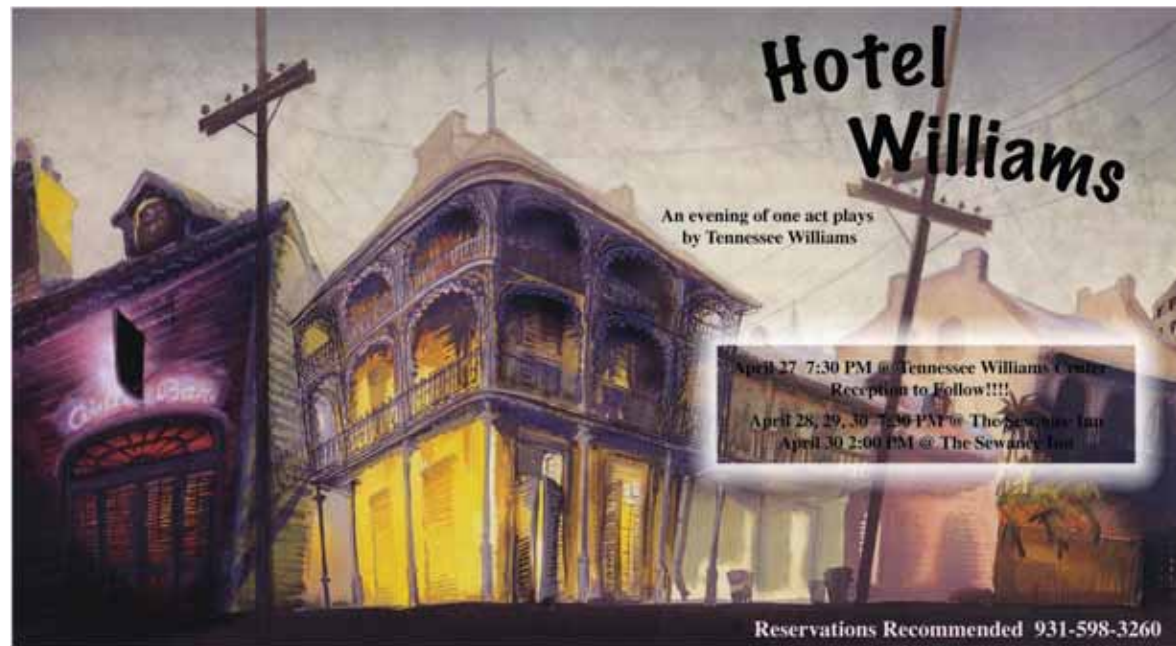
## Book Signing at Lorena's May 7

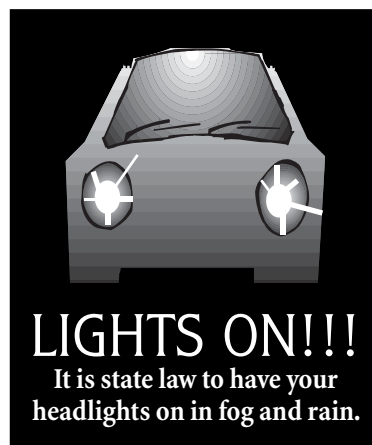

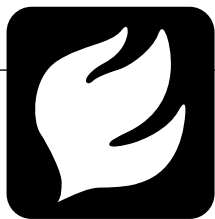

## Sewanee Women's Lacrosse Wins SCAC Title

The Sewanee women's lacrosse team picked up a trio of wins last week, culminating in the program's first SCAC Championship.

On April 19, the Tigers traveled to Birmingham-Southern for a makeup date and rolled over the Panthers, 23-11, on their way to an undefeated regular season in conference play. Molly Arnold paced the Tigers with six goals and one assist, while goalkeeper Amy Nusbaum collected 11 saves in the win.

Heading into the tournament, Sewanee, who earned the No. 1 seed in the inaugural SCAC women's lacrosse tournament, had a bye on Friday before facing Birmingham-Southern for the second time in five days on April 23.

In the rematch with the Panthers, 10 different Tigers found the back of the net on the way to a 20-11 victory. Arnold notched five goals, as Sewanee earned 23 of 32 draw controls in the contest.

In the championship game against Colorado College on April 26, the Colorado Tigers struck first, but Sewanee scored six unanswered goals before taking a 7-4 lead into halftime. Colorado struck first again in the second half, and the two teams traded goals until Colorado College inched within one, 10-9, with just nine minutes left to play. Sewanee scored four of the last six goals, including a pair of back-to-back goals, to make it 14-10, before Colorado added a late goal to make the final score 14-11.

Arnold once again led the Tigers, tallying six goals and one assist, bringing her week totals to 16 goals and two assists, while Nusbaum notched her third double-digit save game of the week with 10 saves and one ground ball. The Tigers end their season 13-5 overall after claiming the SCAC crown.

### Men's Lacrosse

The Sewanee men's lacrosse team faced Birmingham-Southern on April 19 and April 22 and came out on the losing end both times. The Tigers squared off with the Panthers on April 19 in a makeup game to determine seeding at the SCAC Championships. B-S jumped out to a quick 7-1 lead before Sewanee crawled their way back in to make it 9-8 Panthers just five minutes into the third quarter. But the visiting Panthers held on, scoring seven of the last nine goals, to take home a 16-10 victory. Jack Thomasson and Michael Morris each notched three goals in the loss, while goalkeeper Tommy Healy collected 18 saves for the Tigers.

On April 22, B-S jumped out to a 2-0 lead before Sewanee took a 5-4 lead early in the third quarter. Over the next quarter-and-a-half, the Tigers and the Panthers traded goals before Sewanee found itself trailing 8-7 with 2:52 to play. B-S's Matt Ivie netted his fourth goal of the night with just 10 seconds left to put the game out of reach and give Birmingham-Southern the 9-7 win. Thomasson and Carson Pfeifer each picked up two goals for Sewanee,

while Healy earned 14 saves in the loss. The Tigers are 6-8 overall and will face Berry College on April 30 in their final contest of the season.

### Women's and Men's Tennis

In a rematch of the 2010 SCAC Women's Tennis title match, DePauw University topped Sewanee 7-2 to take home the 2011 SCAC Championship on April 24. Jenny Liles and Michelle Flume earned wins in singles, but DePauw earned close wins in every other spot to take home the crown. DePauw swept all three doubles matches, but not before fighting tight battles in all three slots. The women's tennis team finished their season with an overall record of 19-6.

The Sewanee men's tennis team earned fifth place in the 2011 SCAC Championships after a 5-4 victory over Millsaps College April 24.

The Tigers won two of three doubles matches before sweeping the bottom half of the singles matches to secure fifth place in the conference tournament. Philip Kuntz and Will Holloway topped Millsaps' Bastain brothers 8-4 in the No. 2 spot, while Oliver Crawford and Grant Hopkins

were 8-1 winners.

The Sewanee men's tennis advanced to the consolation round after an 8-1 win over Centre College on April 23. The team ended the season with a 14-7 record.

### Track and Field

The Sewanee Tigers wrapped up the 2011 SCAC Track and Field Championships April 22-23 with a pair of all-conference performances and one record-breaking relay run.

Senior Chalankis Brown repeated as an All-SCAC performer in the men's 100 meter, while the men's 4x100 relay team earned All-Conference honors with a third-place finish. The women's 4x100 relay team broke the Sewanee school record set in 1995 after a fifth-place finish in the competition.

In the team competition, Sewanee's women finished tenth, while the men finished seventh. Rhodes College captured the women's title, while on the men's side, Centre College took home the championships.

In the men's 4x100 meter relay, Brown teamed up with Bexter Richardson, John Ugorji and Josh Hirakawa to finish third. In the

women's equivalent, the Tigers' 4x100 meter relay team of Jourdan Cooney, Faith Spencer, Danielle McIntyre and La'Toyia Slay broke a 16-year-old school record after a fifth-place finish.

Several Tigers earned top-ten finishes on the day and just missed out on All-Conference honors.

### Men's and Women's Golf

Led by Chris Beveridge's 27th-place finish, the Sewanee men's golf team wrapped up the 2011 season with a ninth-place finish at the SCAC Championships held at the Horseshoe Bay Resort in Texas on April 24. Oglethorpe University took home the team title, while Centre's Chris Morris was crowned the individual champion.

Beveridge led the Tigers with a three-day score of 261, including an 86 on Sunday, the final day of competition. Neil Dyer was next for the Tigers, finishing 30th with a 266. Dyer shot the Tigers' lowest round of the tournament on Sunday, shooting an 80.

The Sewanee women's golf team captured eighth place on April 24 in the 2011 SCAC Championships held this weekend at Horseshoe Bay Resort in Texas. DePauw University took home the team title, while DePauw's Paige Gooch earned top honors.

Ellen Ruppert led the Tigers with a three-day total of 358, good enough for 34th place. Lauren Gould was next for Sewanee with a 54-hole score of 375, while Sarah Laycock carded a three-day total of 430. Emily Raines rounded out the Tiger attack with a total score of 458.

## Nature Notes

### Rose-Breasted Grosbeaks Migrate

The Rose-breasted Grosbeak is passing through Sewanee on its way to northern states, Canada and the Smoky Mountains of Tennessee, where it will build nests in shrubbery and small trees. Many bird identification books show only the adult male, resplendent in its black head and body with white blotches, white belly and red, and very thick bill. The female looks like a different kind of bird, with brown instead of black feathers, brown stripes on its white breast, white line above its eye, and thick bill. The young male resembles the female for several months, but may show mixtures of male and female plumage that confuses bird observers. When the bird flies, try to see the undersides of the wings. All males, even the young, have pink underwings, whereas the females show yellow underwings in all stages of development. **Harry Yeatman** has a fine collection of road-killed birds that show the underwing feather colors of both sexes. These Grosbeaks are singing now and sound like an American Robin that **Roger Tory Peterson** described as "like a robin's song that had voice lessons." The call of these birds is a loud "Tink." Listen for these birds' song and call now.
