The University of the South (Sewanee) in partnership with the South Cumberland Community Fund announce their sponsorship of the 2017 Summer Food Service Program (SFSP), which is administered in Tennessee by the Department of Human Services under an agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The program is known as the South Cumberland Summer Meal Program.

Meals will be provided to all children without charge who come from low-income families. Acceptance and participation requirements for the program and all activities are the same for all regardless of race, color, national origin, sex, age or disability. There will be no discrimination in the



"I am honored to be able to participate in a very small way to help uncover some of those hidden secrets. 



Is my drinking water safe?

Yes, our water meets all of EPA's health standards. We have conducted numerous tests for over 80 contaminants that may be in drinking water. As you'll see in the chart on the back, we only detected 11 of these contaminants. We found all of these contaminants at safe levels.

What is the source of my water?

Your water, which is surface water, comes from Lakes O'Donnell and Jackson. Our goal is to protect our water from contaminants and we are working with the State to determine the vulnerability of our water source to *potential* contamination. The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC) has prepared a Source Water Assessment Program (SWAP) Report for the untreated water sources serving this water system. The SWAP Report assesses the susceptibility of untreated water sources to *potential* contamination. To ensure safe drinking water, all public water systems treat and routinely test their water. Water sources have been rated as reasonably susceptible, moderately susceptible or slightly susceptible based on geologic factors and human activities in the vicinity of the water source. The Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties (SUD) sources rated as slightly susceptible to potential contamination.

An explanation of Tennessee's Source Water Assessment Program, the Source Water Assessment summaries, susceptibility scorings and the overall TDEC report to EPA can be viewed online at www.state.tn.us/environment/dws/dwassess.shtml or you may contact the Water System to obtain copies of specific assessments.

Why are there contaminants in my water?

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. Community water systems are required to disclose the detection of contaminants; however, bottled water companies are not required to comply with this regulation. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the Environmental Protection Agency's Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

How can I get involved?

Our Board of Commissioners meets on the fourth Tuesday of every month at 5:00 PM at the Utility Office. Please feel free to participate in these meetings. Decisions by the Board on customer complaints brought before the Board under the District's complaint policy may be reviewed by the Utility Management Review Board of the Tennessee Department of Environment of Conservation pursuant to Section 7-82-703 (7) of Tennessee Code Annotated. Is our water system meeting other rules that govern our operations?

The State and EPA require us to test and report on our water on a regular basis to ensure its safety. We have met all of these requirements. Results of unregulated contaminant analysis are available upon request. We want you to know that we pay attention to all the rules.

Other Information

The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

Contaminants that may be present in source water:

- Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife.
- · Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban stormwater runoff, industrial, or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming.
- Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban stormwater runoff, and residential uses.
- · Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban stormwater runoff, and septic systems.
- Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA and the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation prescribe regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. SUD's water treatment processes are designed to reduce any such substances to levels well below any health concern. FDA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Due to all water containing dissolved contaminants, occasionally your water may exhibit slight discoloration. We strive to maintain the standards to prevent this. We at SUD work around the clock to provide top quality water to every tap. We ask that all our customers help us protect our water sources, which are the heart of our community, our way of life and our children's future.

Do I Need To Take Special Precautions?

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population. Immuno-compromised persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have under-gone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly, and infants can be particularly at risk from infections. These people should seek advice about not only their drinking water, but food preparation, personal hygiene, and precautions in handling infants and pets from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbiological contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-4791).

Lead in Drinking Water

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. The Sewanee Utility District is responsible for providing high quality drinking water, but cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. Water System Security

Following the events of September 2001, we realize that our customers are concerned about the security of their drinking water. We urge the public to report any suspicious activities at any utility facilities, including treatment plants, pumping stations, tanks, fire hydrants, etc. to 598-5611

Water Quality Data

What does this chart mean?

- MCLG Maximum Contaminant Level Goal, or the level of a contaminant in drinking water below which there is no known or expected risk to health. MCLGs allow for a margin of safety.
- MCL Maximum Contaminant Level, or the highest level of a contaminant that is allowed in drinking water. MCLs are set as close to the MCLGs as feasible using the best available treatment technology. To understand the possible health effects described for many regulated constituents, a person would have to drink 2 liters of water every day at the MCL level for a lifetime to have a one-in-a-million chance of having the described health effect.
- MRDL: Maximum Residual Disinfectant Level or MRDL: The highest level of a disinfectant allowed in drinking water. There is convincing evidence that addition of a disinfectant is necessary for the control of microbial contaminants.

- <u>Below Detection Level (BDL)</u> laboratory analysis indicates that the contaminant is not present at a level that can be detected.
- <u>AL</u> Action Level, or the concentration of a contaminant which, when exceeded, triggers treatment or other requirements which a water system must follow.

SAS Res Opens June 5, **Pass Required**

The St. Andrew's-Sewanee School campus is home to a beautiful man-made lake created decades ago by the monks and students of St. Andrew's School. The "Res," as it is called, is restricted to school use during most of the year. However, for a small portion of the summer (this year June 5 through July 31) members of the extended SAS community may use the Res if they have a permit.

To be eligible to apply for and purchase a Res pass and parking permit, community members must have an SAS sponsor employed by the school (signature will be required) and be at least 18 years old. Application can be made at the SAS $\,$ Administrative Offices in Langford Hall between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., Monday -Friday, after May 22. Please note that the office will be closed on Memorial Day, Monday May 29. Season permits are \$75. A one weekend permit may be purchased for \$25. SAS alumni and current parents may purchase a season permit for \$25. The Res may not be used by permit holders until June 5.

Group rates for those not affiliated with SAS or the University of the South will be \$150 per half day for up to 25 individuals. Groups must provide lifeguards and proof of insurance. To apply for group use, contact Andrea Booher, abooher@sasweb.org.

In addition to having a permit and parking pass, all Res users must abide by the regulations below:

No one may swim alone.

No rope swings may be installed or used.

Use is permitted only between dawn and dusk each day.

Minor guests must be accompanied by someone over 21.

No glass containers, alcoholic beverages or any illegal substance may be brought to or consumed at the Res.

Fireworks, firearms and other weapons are not permitted.

Smoking and fires are prohibited.

Trash is not to be thrown in the water or left on the grounds.

Conduct befitting a school environment will be displayed at all times. Res pass holder must have pass with him/her when at the Res and display a Visitor's Parking Permit in the left rear window of their vehicle.

The Res will be patrolled for proper use but lifeguards are not present. Users swim and use the Res at their own risk.

DREMC Members Warned of Bill Payment Scam

A power bill payment scam has hit the Shelbyville area of Duck River Electric Iembership Corporation's service area.

This fraud appears to be aimed at members and originates from an (866) area code. The scammer informs the member that their DREMC bill is overdue, and the service is subject to immediate disconnection unless they call the number back to pay over the phone and the meter box will be removed from their home.

The member recognized it was a scam immediately when the caller stated he was from Middle Tennessee Electric. "The member did the right thing by calling us to let us know so that we could warn other members," commented Shelbyville District Manager Mike Bayne. "If you ever have any question about your bill or recent payment, dial your local DREMC office yourself to ensure that you are talking to an actual DREMC employee working in one of our local offices," advised Bayne. "You just can't be too careful these days."

DREMC members will receive mail notices of bills past due and scheduled disconnection. There also are a variety of ways to pay bills, including in the local offices, by phone talking to a DREMC representative on lines manned 24/7, online at dremc.com and by using the co-op's mobile app (a free download).

The Birds and the Bees

"Let me tell you 'bout the birds and the bees and the flowers and the trees, the stars in the sky..." (Dean Martin). Three flycatchers are now singing and calling around our house. The eastern phoebe serenades us all morning with its distinctive "phoebe" song and is quite visible, darting from open perches to catch insects, as is the flycatcher habit. The eastern wood-pewee has returned from its wintering grounds further south and is delighting us with its "pee-a-weee" and "peeyoo" calls. We don't see it, though, as it forages higher in the trees. And we are now hearing the loud "wheep" call of the great crested flycatcher, also having returned from southern regions and also hard to catch a glimpse of.

The yearly battle with the carpenter bees continues as they tunnel into the wood beams of our porches. They can be distinguished from bumble bees by their bare, shiny abdomens.

The oxeye-daisy blooms gaily in May, so widespread that it may be taken for a native wildflower, but it came over with the early European settlers. To reach Europe, though, it had already spread over much of the northern hemisphere from its native China. Linnaeus named it Chrysanthemum leucanthemum and it is indeed closely related to the endless variety of cultivated chrysanthemums.



Sirius, the dog star in Canis Major, is now gone from view, but a few are still visible for an hour or two in the west-Procyon form Canis Minor, Castor and Pollux, the twins, and Capella in Auriga, the Charioteer.
