

Jean and Harry Yeatman Honored by Civic Assn.

Community Chest Fund Drive Complete

Jean and Harry Yeatman were presented the Community Service Award by the Sewanee Civic Association at its final meeting of the academic year on May 12. The Yeatmans were cited for protecting, preserving and fostering appreciation of the natural world. Community Chest co-chair Susan Askew announced that the fund drive was complete and had exceeded its goal.

The Yeatmans lead community nature walks, co-write "Nature Notes" each week in the Messenger and give naturalist talks at local summer camps, community and University events or along the sidewalk, if you encounter the couple and have a question. Anytime someone has something from the natural world to be identified, the Yeatmans are the experts to call.

Jean, a botanist, taught horseback riding at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School for many years, and Harry retired from the University of the South in 1981 after 31 years as a professor of biology. But Jean and Harry Yeatman have "never stopped teaching," said Civic Association co-president Elizabeth Clark Duncan, who presented the award. The Yeatmans frequently receive phone calls about animals perceived to be a nuisance. On one occasion, Harry rescued a bat who had taken up residence in a local building. Harry was bitten by the creature and, as a result, needed to take a series of rabies shots to keep from acquiring the disease. The Yeatmans have saved hundreds of snakes, both poisonous and nonpoisonous, relocating them to safe habitats. In 2010, Harry Yeatman was the first recipient of the Trails & Trilliums Environmental Education Award established in his honor. The Yeatmans have been residents of the Sewanee community for 61 years.

The Civic Association also recognized Community Chest chairs Laurie and Jay Fisher; co-chairs Susan and Bob Askew; Bill Harper

Council Reviews Trails, Garbage Service, Dog Park

At its May 16 meeting, the Sewanee Community Council reviewed updates on the Natural Resources Advisor Council, alternative garbage service providers for Sewanee and the proposed dog park.

Mary Priestley reported that Fred Saussy presented the NRAC with a proposal for construction of additional trails on the Domain. Saussy consulted with Domain manager Nate Wilson and forestry professor Ken Smith, who reviewed Saussy's proposed trails, some of which have historical significance and one that was formerly used. Reporting on other NRAC topics, Priestley said the council was investigating the environmental impact of the proposed spur extension to the Mountain Goat Trail; an NRAC committee was drafting a description for an Environmental Welcome Center; and the Shakerag Hollow trail parking lot on Highway 41A was being enlarged to accommodate eight cars.

In response to the garbage services discussion at the April Community Council meeting, University Chief Financial Officer Jerry Forster reported on his research into possible Sewanee area providers. Forster said that the City Public Works crew provides garbage services in Cowan and is not interested in extending service to Sewanee. Tim Holt, a small rural hauler from Estill Springs, expressed interest in providing Sewanee's residential garbage service. Waste Management, a private municipal hauler, will present Sewanee with a cost quote. More information will be available at the

June meeting, he said. Several council members spoke in support of the current Sewanee garbage service provider, Joe B. Long. Forster reassured the council that Long would have an opportunity to match any bids presented. A visitor asked why Sewanee residents could not opt out of garbage pickup service. Forster said the council would take up that question when the discussion continued in June.

In 2010, a committee formed to investigate construction of a dog park in Sewanee. The group, chaired by council member Phil White, conducted a community survey to determine interest and worked with John Vineyard, director of physical plant services, to identify prospective sites. Vineyard reported that sites under consideration had to have adequate parking, drinking water for dogs and minimal environmental impact. Four possible sites were identified: a wooded area on Georgia Avenue across from the University Day Care Center, a wooded area adjacent to the lower Lake Cheston parking lot and two sites adjacent to the ball fields on Ballpark Road. Vineyard said the size of the proposed dog park would be 250 feet by 250 feet, close to an acre.

White said the area would need a fence high enough to contain the dogs and that most of the trees could remain at any site selected. White added that the dog park would have

SUD Board Amends Policy

At the May 17 business meeting, the board of commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties voted to amend the adjustment policy approved at the April business meeting.

After SUD attorney Don Scholes reviewed the new policy, which dictates the procedures and qualifications that apply when a customer seeks an adjustment to his or her bill, he recommended clarification on several points.

The new policy stipulates that customers will be eligible for one adjustment every three years with no more than three adjustments over the life of the service. Scholes recommended that, for the purpose of this rule, if a single leak caused an adjustment to both the water bill and the sewer bill it should count as one adjustment. Scholes also recommended that if a meter was determined to be faulty, the adjustment to the prior month's bill be calculated according to the percentage of meter error. The board voted to amend the new policy in keeping with Scholes recommendations.

SUD President Doug Cameron reviewed the manager's report submitted by **Na** manager Ben Beavers, who could not attend the meeting. Due to the 17-hour power outage during heavy rainfall on April 28-29, about 200,000 gallons of wastewater were bypassed at the Alto Road and Mikell Lane lift stations. The incident was reported to the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation. No penalties apply, as SUD was not at fault.

Due to the heavy rainfall, inflow and infiltration (I&I) of rainwater into the sewer system was exceptionally high in April, Cameron said. Since the Abbo's Alley area typically experiences erosion and high I&I during heavy rain events, the University has proposed constructing a catch basin in the area of Cathy and Harry Clark. The evening that would divert the water to a storm drain to minimize the problem. SUD's exploratory video recording of the sewer in the area found that customer lines no longer in use but connected to the SUD main line are channeling rainwater into the SUD system. SUD plans to replace these faulty connections, as well as deteriorated main lines, prior to the catch-basin construction.

THE ALLEY NEEDS YOUR HELP!

Abbo's Alley, one of Sewanee's favorite woodland retreats, was set aside by University Trustees in the late 19th century as a permanent parkland. For many years this place remained in its original state a wooded ravine garden.

In the early 1940s Professor Abbott C. Martin of the English department began refining the area, using students who sought work-study income, some volunteers and even German prisoners of war from nearby Tullahoma. The "Alley" was named for "Abbo.

Local Efforts Support

Rebuilding Haitian Churches

The School of Theology at Sewanee and the churches of the Southeast
Tennessee Episcopal Ministry (STEM) are helping to rebuild Holy Trinity Cathedral in Port-au-Prince, Haiti, as part of a national, grass-roots effort

through local fund-raising events.

The Episcopal Church's "Rebuild Our Church in Haiti" was launched on the first anniversary of the 7.0 earthquake that decimated Haiti in 2010. Terri Mathes, C'82, is spearheading the campaign for the Episcopal Church

The STEM churches will host a fund raising event at 6 p.m., Friday, May 27, at Trinity Episcopal Church in Winchester, as part of this effort. Pierre Gabaud, T'11, was born and raised in Haiti and will give a talk about Haitian life and culture. James Cantrell, county commissioner, owner of J.C.'s Butcher Block and member of Marble Plains Baptist Church, will speak about his recent mission trips to Haiti.

A barbecue dinner by the Estill Springs Lions Club will be provided, with side dishes and fixings. The event is free and open to the community. Donations will be accepted for the "Rebuild Our Church in Haiti" campaign.

The School of Theology learned about this national effort, and Jessica Babcock, T'13, organized a fund-raiser that initially raised \$320—\$10 in honor of each member of the seminary graduating class of 2011. With additional contributions, the total amount raised was \$1,500. Sewanee's School of Theology was the first seminary to respond to the appeal. Babcock said when she learned that rebuilding churches was not included within the Episcopal Relief and Development's mission, and that the Haiti cathedral was not insured by the church insurance program, she knew she had to help. 'I've worked with mission programs for eight years in Cuba, where I've seen the Episcopal Church thrive as the center of many small villages," she said. "I felt that without the Cathedral in Haiti, the capital couldn't heal. We had to do something as a community."

The Episcopal Church in Haiti supported more than 200 schools, medical clinics, a music school and a symphony orchestra before nearly all these properties were destroyed in the earthquake of January 2010. Holy Trinity Cathedral, home to the famous murals that depicted the Biblical narrative, served as a spiritual center for Episcopalians and non-Episcopalians.

STEM is a collaboration between four area congregations in Winchester, Sherwood, Alto and Monteagle led by the Rev. Bill Barton.

Sewanee to Host CUAC Triennial

The University of the South will host the triennial meeting of the Colleges and Universities of the Anglican Communion (CUAC) May 22-26. CUAC is a worldwide association of over 120 institutions of higher education and a network of the Anglican Communion. CUAC's mission is to promote crosscultural contacts and educational programs. CUAC has met in the United States. Approximately 100 CUAC members will be in Sewanee representing countries from all over the world.

The theme of the Triennial is "Sustainability: A New Context for Higher Education." Vice-Chancellor John McCardell will give the opening address. John Gatta, dean of the college, will lead a panel on Sustainability and Environmental Education at Sewanee, with a number of Sewanee faculty and staff. Other notable speakers will be Anglican scholar and theologian Kwok Pui-Lan, Voorhees College President Cleveland Sellers and the Most Rev. John Gladstone of the Church of South India.

The public is invited to Evensong at 5:30 p.m., Sunday, May 22, and a Festival Eucharist at 4:30 p.m., Wednesday, May 25, both in All Saints' Chapel.





World's Top Coin Collectors in Town Next Week to Purchase All Types of Coins!

ICCA will be placing ads in newspapers, radio and running television spots next week asking people to bring in any old silver and gold coins made before 1965. Those that bring in their coins will be able to speak with collectors one on one and have their coins looked at by a specialist. With the help of these ICCA members, offers will be made to those that have coins made before 1965. Offers will be made based on silver or gold content and the rarity of the coins. All coins made before 1965 will be examined and purchased including gold coins, silver coins, silver dollars, all types of nickels and pennies. Those that decide to sell their coins will be paid on the spot.

If you are like a lot of people you might have a few old coins or even a coffee can full lying around. If you have ever wondered what they are worth now might be your chance to find out and even sell them if you choose. They could be worth a lot according to the International Coin Collectors Association also known as ICCA. Collectors will pay a fortune for some coins and currency for their collections. If it is rare enough, one coin could be worth over \$100,000 according to Eric Helms, coin collector and ICCA member. One ultra rare dime, an 1894S Barber, sold for a record \$1.9 million to a collector in July of 2007. While that is an extreme example, many rare and valuable coins are stashed away in dresser drawers or lock boxes around the country. The ICCA and its collector members have organized a traveling event in search of all types of coins and currency. Even common coins can be worth a significant amount due to the high price of silver and gold, says Helms, Washington quarters and Roosevelt dimes can be worth many times their face value. Recent silver markets have driven the price up on common coins made of silver. Helms explains that all half dollars, quarter and dimes made before 1965 contain 90% silver and are sought after any time silver prices rise. Right now it's a sellers market he said.



Citizens State Bank to Break Ground for New Offices

Citizens State Bank (CSB) is readying for its newest branch in Monteagle. The new building will include a large community room for public use and an outdoor plaza that will serve as a hub of the Mountain Goat Trail from Sewanee to Tracy City. Ground breaking for the new bank will be at 11:30

a.m., Wednesday, June 8, at the Monteagle Inn. All are welcome to attend.

The 3,000-squarefoot structure will occupy a central location on the corner of Main Street and Assembly Avenue. Designed by Beth Holt McCurdy of Landmark Design to complement the existing Mountain architecture, McCurdy emphasized the innovative aspects of the design.



'In Monteagle, we are using natural stone and echoing existing Mountain architecture. A 25-foot tower with arches, similar in design to others in Sewanee and Monteagle, will serve as the entryway from the 400-square-foot plaza into a spacious community room." With a fireplace and comfortable seating, this area will have an inviting lounge, a place for Rotary, Scouts and other organizations to meet, and a venue for community events.

"Our bank was founded on the idea that a local bank could make a difference in the quality of life of the community it serves, and our Monteagle bank will live out that mission," said Geoffrey J. Post, CSB president and CEO. "Two exciting aspects of the design are the Mountain Goat Plaza and the community space, which we believe will enrich life on the Mountain. By making direct investments in the communities, schools, projects, infrastructure and people we serve, we hope to make a difference ... making the Mountain a better place to live, work, and raise families."


Monteagle branch manager Barry Rollins said, "Given that this site was once the Monteagle train station and given the proximity to the historic Assembly Grounds, this new bank has been designed as a landmark that the Mountain can be proud of." The deep overhang will be reminiscent of old southern train stations, he noted. The existing trailer that has served as the temporary CSB bank has been moved to the rear of the lot and will remain open for business while construction on the permanent facility takes place. once the new bank is completed, the parking area will be located in the back in order to make the site more attractive from Main Street.

This focus on community is a continuation of the history of CSB said bank founder and longtime chairman of the board Robert R. (Bob) Thomas, now president of the CSB Holding Company.

"In 1970, the mission of the original Marion County bank was to be completely local, owned and controlled by local citizens," Thomas said, "a bank responsive to local needs and to its community." Thomas, who is a graduate of the University of the South, has been a part of the Mountain for half a century. "This building is one of the most important additions to Sewanee and Monteagle in my lifetime," he said.





NATURENOTES

Cicadas Swarming

Jean and Harry Yeatman report that small cicadas are swarming in the bushes and trees of Sewanee now. These insects have been incorrectly called 17-year locusts. Locusts are grasshoppers that are mentioned in the Bible. The southern states have 13-year cicadas, whereas northern states have 17-year cicadas. These numbers tell us how long the nymphs

live underground, feeding on the juices of grass and plant roots. The cicada's life cycle is interesting. The adults are flying around now for a few weeks. The males try to attract females with a loud drone noise and mate. The mated females slit twigs of various trees and lay their eggs in the gashes. The eggbearing tree twigs often drop off, and fruit trees are injured.



The tiny young larvae hatch out in about six weeks and enter the ground There they eat roots, etc., and moult about six times during their 13 years underground. These larvae are called nymphs and appear now, climbing on trees, etc., and shed into flying adults. Birds are having a feast eating the nymphs and adults. Copperhead snakes swallow the nymphs as they come out of the ground. There are millions of cicadas here now. Look for them and listen to the calls.

There are also problems with broken glass and litter on the ground. Unlike the rest of the facility, there is no attendant to monitor the glass recycling station.

"If everyone does their part, glass recycling can be a success," Pate said.






