Leadership Transition at Children's Center

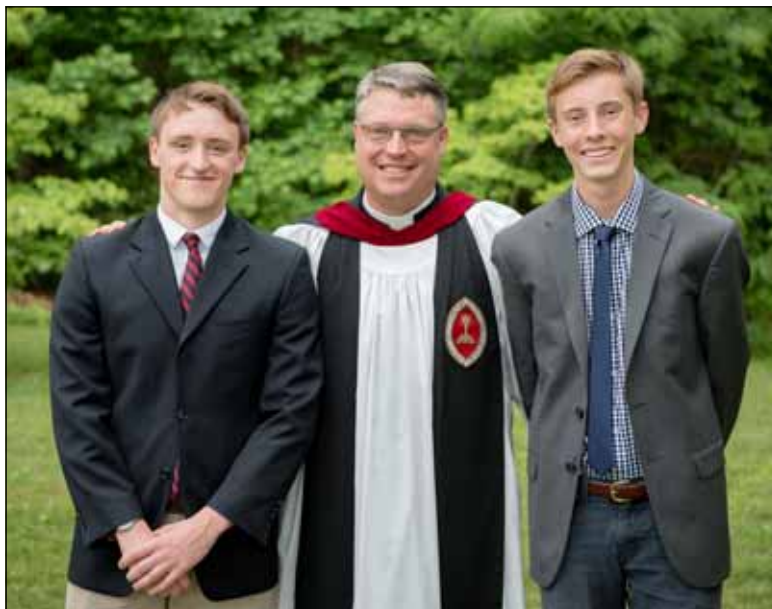
The Sewanee Children's Center (SCC) will say goodbye to director Larry Sims when the school year comes to an end on May 28. Sims came to the Sewanee Children's Center as the interim director in the fall of 2012 and assumed the position of director in 2013. Sims came to Sewanee from Middlebury, Vt., where he was a longtime educator, having been a teacher, curriculum coordinator and elementary school administrator.

The SCC has named Harriett Runkle as its new director. Runkle received her B.A. in art history and museum studies from the University of Tennessee-Knoxville, and she began her teaching career as a museum educator. She received a master of arts in teaching degree from Mary Baldwin College in Staunton, Va., and has 14 years of teaching experience in kindergarten and first grade. She moved back to Sewanee last June after being away for 16 years. She, her husband, John, and their son, Jac, lived in Sewanee in 1996-99, while John was a student at the School of Theology. Runkle was an active SCC co-op parent, when Jac was in Carrie Mauzy's class.

The Sewanee Children's Center is constituted as a parents' cooperative and operated by parents through a board of directors. The school offers a comprehensive early learning program designed to meet the developmental needs of each child and is responsive to the needs of local families and children. SCC is generously supported by Otey Parish and the Sewanee Community Chest.

Free Summer Meal Program for Children Across the Plateau

The University of the South is sponsoring a food program for children this summer, an effort administered in Tennessee by the Department of Human Services under an agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture. The program is called the South Cumberland Summer Meal Program. It will provide free meals for young people who qualify for free/reduced-price meals during the school year who may go hungry during the summer. The program's goal is to improve the health and well-being of young people across the Plateau while providing good food and summer fun at the same time.

According to data from the Tennessee Commission on Children and Youth, 48 percent of young people in Franklin County qualify for the free/reduced-price lunch program; in Grundy County, 68 percent of young people qualify. Statewide, 44 percent of students qualify for the program. This idea was first envisioned by Rick Wright, executive chef at the Sewanee dining program. He is a longtime advocate for healthy eating. Kelly Farina, an AmeriCorps VISTA member with the University, is the program organizer.

In addition to the meals, at each site there will be a program that will last a minimum of one hour. Some summer meals are being served in partnership with library reading programs, vacation bible schools and other summer programs, and may include such information as nutrition education, gardening activities and art workshops.

Meals will be provided to all children without charge. Acceptance and

SUD Board Learns About Flawed Meters, Midway Booster Station

At the May 19 meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties, SUD Manager Ben Beavers told the board that 8 percent of the new meters installed to facilitate computerized meter reading had failed. Beavers also updated the board on the plans to install a pressure-boosting station to increase water pressure in the Midway community.

SUD began installing new meters system-wide last August, in conjunction with the upgrade to automated meter-reading technology. Beavers said the manufacturer recently acknowledged some of the meters had faulty radio transmitters. SUD has replaced 70 flawed meters so far. According to the manufacturer's warranty, if the failure rate exceeds 5 percent, the company bears labor and fitting-related replacement costs, in addition to supplying replacement meters. Beavers will also request an extended warranty.

Updating the board on plans to install a pressure-boosting station to increase water pressure in Midway, Beavers said he had again encountered difficulty in acquiring the necessary easements. The plan called for the station to be located on Leaky Pond Road.

"We could move it up toward St. James Church," Beavers said, "but

six Midway residents would lose the benefit of the increased water pressure." Moving the station in the other direction would result in problems with getting overhead electric power to the site, due to trees.

"The good news is the price of the pump and controls has dropped to \$26,000," Beavers said. This could make money available to explore other options like putting the power underground. SUD has \$48,000 budgeted for the project.

The board reviewed the design plans for the trial wetlands slated for construction at the SUD wastewater treatment plant, in conjunction with a research project undertaken jointly by the University of the South and the University of Georgia. The Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation has requested additional information from Golder and Associates, the engineering firm in charge of project design. The company is still working out flow and mechanical issues, Beavers said.

On May 19, the firm Sani-Tech began cleaning and video surveying SUD's sewer lines for possible damage. Residents may observe Sani-Tech crews working in the community over the course of the next three weeks, Beavers said.

The next meeting of the SUD board is set for June 16, a week earlier than its normally scheduled date.

DREMC Updates

Tree Trimming in Sewanee

Vegetation management contractors for Duck River Electric Membership Corporation (DREMC) began work in Sewanee on May 18 to trim limbs and branches growing around power lines. Clearing the rights-of-way occurs on a regular cycle across the DREMC system in order to reduce service interruptions due to vegetation growth into circuits.

Crews will work for two months in the area. Trimming has started on two circuits serving the University of the South and adjoining neighborhoods. Later, crews will move along the Sewanee Highway circuit toward Monteagle, also trimming the feeders and taps.

In some cases, trees will be marked for removal, but DREMC will contact property owners when this is necessary. Door hangers will be distributed in neighborhoods where trimming is scheduled.

DREMC's line clearance program conforms to best management practices set by the International Society of Arboriculture and the American National Standards Institute. In addition, DREMC is recognized by the National Arbor Day Foundation and Tennessee Division of Forestry for meeting standards required for Tree Line USA designation. Not only does DREMC's vegetation management program help keep on the lights, there is a safety aspect to power line trimming. Trees in contact with energized lines can conduct high voltage under certain conditions or cause fires.

TVA Outage in Sherwood

The Tennessee Valley Authority (TVA) has scheduled a power outage for DREMC members living in the communities of Sherwood and Anderson of Franklin County.

The outage is planned for 6 a.m. to 10 a.m. on Saturday, May 30.

This is necessary for TVA to replace several bad poles. It will affect all consumers in the Sherwood and Anderson area, but will not affect consumers in Sewanee, Cowan and Sinking Cove. In the event of inclement weather on either date, the necessary repairs will be completed in the fall.

Duck River Electric appreciates the cooperation and understanding of its members during this planned outage as it strives to improve the reliability of the electric system.

Lecture on Consumerism in a Christian Context

The Rev. Don E. Saliers will present “Christian Liturgy in a Time of Excess” at 7 p.m., Tuesday, June 9, in Hargrove Auditorium. The talk is part of the school’s Advanced Degrees Program and will explore consumerism in a Christian context. The lecture is open to the public.

Saliers is the William R. Cannon Distinguished Professor of Theology and Worship, emeritus, at Emory University’s Candler School of Theology. He taught at Yale Divinity School before joining the faculty at Emory in 1974. He has served as pastor to local churches in rural Ohio and the inner city of New Haven.

For the past 35 years he has been organist and choirmaster at Emory University’s Cannon Chapel, and has contributed to the United Methodist Hymnal, the Book of Worship and to the recent Upper Room Worship book.

The author of ten books, Saliers received Emory University’s Scholar/Teacher Award in 1999. He was inducted into the Emeritus College of Emory University in 2010, and honored as one of that year’s Distinguished Emeriti of Emory University. Among his recent publications are “Music and Theology,” “Worship as Theology: Foretaste of Glory Divine” and “Worship Come to its Senses.” In 2005 he co-wrote “A Song to Sing, A Life to Live,” with his daughter, Emily, who is part of the Grammy-Award winning duo Indigo Girls.

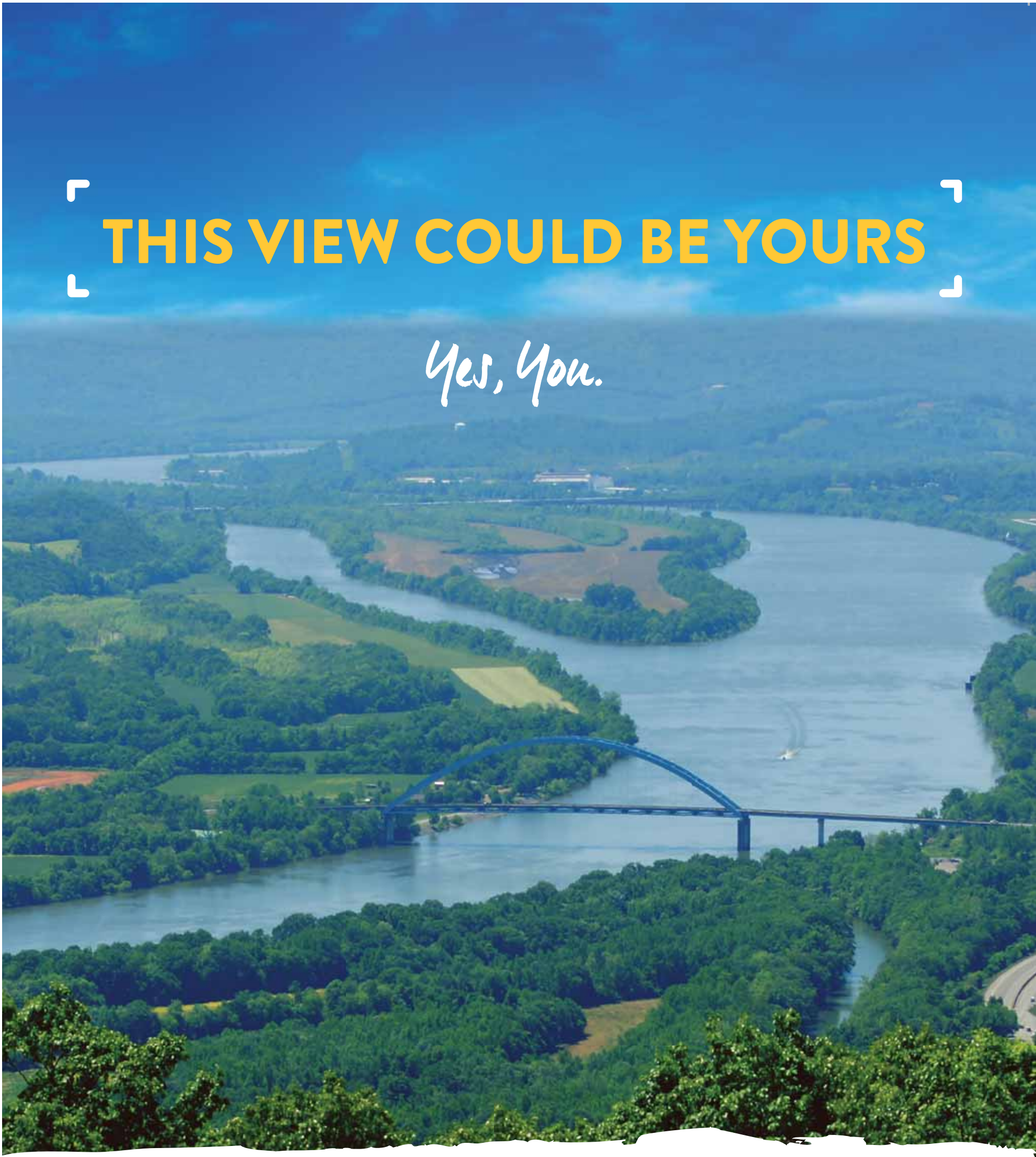

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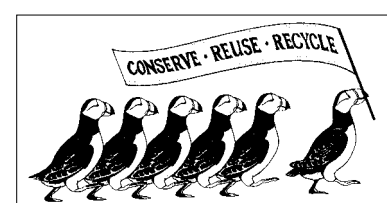

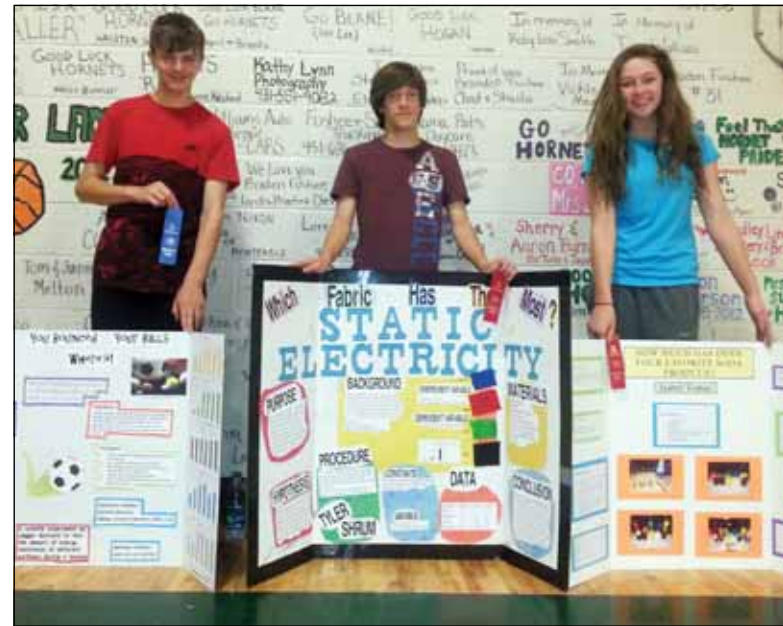

The Franklin County Arts Guild is pleased to announce that Tom Cowan, a well-known woodworker specializing in fine furniture, will be showing his work in a member show at the Artisan Depot in Cowan from May 28 through July 11. 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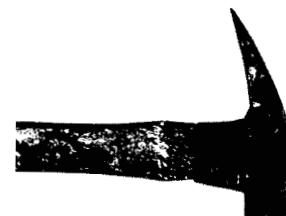


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TigerSharks Registration

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Sewanee Announces 2015 Hall of Fame

The Sewanee athletic department and Athletic Director Mark Webb announced on May 15 that six individuals and one team have been selected for induction into the Sewanee Athletics Hall of Fame.

The Class of 2015 will be honored during Hall of Fame Weekend, Oct. 23–24.

The 2015 Class inductees:

Ian Cross, C'98: Three-time All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) selection in track and cross country. He set the SCAC record time in the 1,500-meter run and 5,000-meter run in 1996. He was the 1996 SCAC 1,500- and 5,000-meter champion. Cross was named the 1996 SCAC Male Track Athlete of the Year and earned the 1995 SCAC Cross Country Runner of the Year honor.

Elizabeth Epps, C'87: Epps becomes the first volleyball-only athlete to be inducted into the Hall of Fame. She was a four-time conference selection and led Sewanee to 63 wins during her career. She also ranked among the program's leaders in kills, matches played and matches started.

Jason Forrester, C'93: Forrester was a four-year starter and a three-time All-SCAC selection. He was a 1992 NCAA Postgraduate Scholar and also awarded the 1992 National Football Foundation Scholar-Athlete award. He led Sewanee to the 1992 SCAC Championship and was a captain in 1992. Forrester was one of the key blockers for fellow Hall of Fame member and Sewanee rushing record holder Carl Cravens.

John Guerry, C'49: Guerry joins his father, Alexander Guerry, brother Alex Guerry Jr., and son Pat Guerry as a member of the Hall of Fame. He lettered from 1947 to 1949 and was a captain in 1949. He led Sewanee to the conference championships in 1947 and 1949 and was the conference runner-up in singles in 1948 and the conference doubles runner-up in 1949.

Guerry led numerous financial drives for the tennis program, including the building of the current tennis pavilion (which bears his name), updated landscaping and the construction of three new courts built in the fall of 2013. He served as the University alumni president, as a trustee and board of regents member.

Guerry was past president of the Tennessee State Tennis Association and Manker-Patten Tennis Club. He also served as a four-time chairman of the U.S. Tennis Association Southern Team Organization and was a member of the Tennessee Tennis and Chattanooga Sports Halls of Fame.

Kevin Lenahan, C'74: Lenahan led Sewanee to three conference wrestling championships. He was 16-1 in 1973–74 and 12-3 in 1971–72 and also lettered in football for four seasons.

Kent Rhea, C'57: Rhea earned 12 letters in cross-country, wrestling and track. He was a captain for all three programs and was part of the 1953 and 1954 undefeated cross country teams. Rhea helped set the school mile relay record in 1957 and was voted as Sewanee Outstanding Male Athlete in 1957.

1970 Mens' Golf Team: Won the 1970 conference championship. The team finished the season 8-6 in dual matches. Edward White was a conference medalist, while Mike Turner was the runner-up. George Waterhouse was a conference medalist, with Rob Chapman as the runner-up.

Members of the team include White (captain), Chapman, Felix Drennan, Nim Long, Jack Steinmeyer, Jock Tonissen, Turner, Waterhouse and coach Walter Bryant.

OUTSIDEIN

I went for a trail run recently in the Hoh Rainforest of the Olympic Peninsula in Washington state. The Hoh is the only rainforest in the lower 48 states. It receives more rain than just about anywhere else on the continent, and the result is almost unbelievable lushness.

The fresh, green smell of wet, rainy woods surrounded me—a mulchy, aromatic richness as I crunched along the trail. Mosses and bright green foliage dripping with moisture formed a cocoon of springtime, a burgeoning of new life. Small streams chuckled over grey-green rocks ...

Wait.

I'm lying.

I wasn't in the Hoh rainforest.

I've been there, twice, and each time was an unforgettable experience. But the day I'm describing happened right here in Tennessee on the Cumberland Plateau. The reason for my deception? As I made my way along the trail just three miles from my house, a piney, mulchy, resinous smell enveloped me, one that anyone who spends enough time in the woods will recognize. And that one fragrance instantly took me back to the coastal region of the Pacific Northwest, among the 5-foot-tall ferns and moss-covered downed spruce trees of the old-growth rainforest.

When we go to someplace special—a national park, a wilderness area—we prepare ourselves mentally. We put ourselves in a state of openness, of readiness to be awed and pleased and impressed by what we see. It's a national park, so it must be special, right?

We tag the sensory details in our brains: the sights, the smells. We take photos. We do everything we can to tell ourselves, to alert our memories, that we need to catalog and hold on to the experience.

So encountering that specific smell right here at home made me think that perhaps we do the opposite of being open when we're at home. Perhaps we (unconsciously) think, "Oh, there's nothing special here. No need to pay attention. It's not the Olympic National Park or anything."

Until your nose wakes you up.

Then, you realize what's in front of and around you. The frantic cheeping of the chipmunks, warning the neighborhood of this large intruder. The infused air, pungent and thick. The heaviness of light and sound. The electric greens of brand-new foliage.

There's a little bit of a paradox here, I guess. If I hadn't gone to the Hoh, the comparison wouldn't be there to make. Without the memory of that other place, I might never have noticed what I was sensing here at home. Experiencing the exotic, in other words, helped me to see the familiar more keenly. I had to go there, in my mind, before I could see what was in front of me.

But wait, there's another paradox too, I think. Before this particular soggy morning, I hadn't thought about the Olympic Peninsula in years, at least not in terms of all its sensory details. So you could say that I was twice lucky: I got to wake up to the awareness of the place I was in, and also to revisit a vivid, special place in the history of my travels.

On this day, in this place, my traveling had done what travel does at its best: enlarge my perspective, and help me see (and smell) with new clarity. Enveloped in experience and memory, I moved simultaneously through the rainforest and along the Caldwell Rim trail.

Having been there, I was able to be, in the fullest sense, here.

Spring Tadpoles

At the May 18 Sewanee Garden Club meeting, **Yolande Gottfried** was asked, "How long are those tadpoles going to stay in my pond?"

This prompted a little research on her part, leading her to the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency website, which offers a frog guide.

"The guidebooks I consulted said little about tadpoles, but this site gives the average times for metamorphosis for the species of frogs and toads most commonly found in Tennessee. In the American Toad, which we heard trilling so musically earlier in the spring, tadpoles (or, as I like to call them, toadpoles) complete metamorphosis in about two months. The small black tadpoles that can be extremely numerous are possibly those of the Fowler's Toad, and metamorphosis occurs somewhat more quickly, in 30–40 days.

"When they leave the water, you may see the banks of the pond covered with tiny toads. The metamorphosis of the very loud Spring Peepers takes longer, from two to four months. The Gray Tree Frogs, whose calls we are hearing later in the season, take about one to two months. All the frogs and toads mentioned so far do not stay at the edge of or in the water after reaching maturity. What can be found on the pond edges after breeding season ends are adult Green Frogs and Bullfrogs. Their tadpoles can be comparatively large and, in the case of Bullfrogs, metamorphosis takes longer, one to two years."

So, she says, the answer to the question seems to be, "It depends."

Elf Orpine and Other Bloomers

Elf orpine, a diminutive plant with a delightful name, was observed by **Gottfried** in full bloom on sandstone outcrops near Piney Point on a recent Sewanee Herbarium walk. It is also called Small's Sedum in honor of the southeastern botanist John Kunkel Small, who was one of the first to notice its difference from sedums in general. In fact, it is the only species in its genus, *Diamorpha*, and is endemic to the southeastern United States. It has a most distinctive habitat and life cycle. It grows in shallow depressions on bare acidic rock such as sandstone or granite, which hold just barely enough water and nutrients to sustain it.

To survive the summer heat and drought of these exposed places, elf orpine grows as a winter annual, germinating in the fall and surviving the winter as tiny rosettes of succulent leaves. In the spring, with sufficient rainfall and increasing day length, the flowering and fruiting stems are produced, covering the rock with masses of red leaves (due to a "sunscreen" pigment) followed by masses of tiny white flowers, and finally the fruits or capsules which contain the seeds, the form in which the plant survives until the following fall.

Also in bloom was the Appalachian Stitchwort or Sandwort, with white five-petaled flowers waving over the elf orpine at the great height of 4 inches. It is also a plant of the sandstone outcrops.

ALL THE BETTER TO HEAR

According to a National Council on Aging survey of 2,300 people over the age of 50, untreated hearing loss can lead to depression, anxiety, and social isolation. Hearing-impaired persons who did not use hearing aids were more likely to report worries, have reduced social activity, and feel more insecure. Other symptoms included fatigue and irritability. Positive effects for those who used hearing aids consistently included improved family relationships, a sense of independence, emotional stability and increased social activity. Hearing instruments do, indeed, increase the quality of life for all degrees of hearing loss, from mild to severe.
