Thiel is the author of eight books of poetry, nonfiction and creative writing pedagogy, including "Echolocations" (winner of the Nicholas Roerich Prize), "Resistance Fantasies," "The White Horse: A Colombian Journey," "Crossroads: Creative Writing Exercises in Four Genres" and "Winding Roads: Exercises in Writing Creative Nonfiction." Thiel is associate professor of English at the University of New Mexico and Writerin-Residence for the Environmental Institute at Sewanee.

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

## 68th Congress of the GCNA

Dateline: Naperville, Ill. The 68th gathering of the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America (GCNA) has taken place this week. Some 140 people registered for the congress, a number that included more than 10 from Europe and Australia. The guild was formed 74 years ago so that carillonneurs, who so often sit alone in towers not even being able to see their audiences, could get together and share ideas and listen to music. Some of you may remember that the 65th congress took place in Sewanee in 2007.

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



The grants may be used for non-routine maintenance and restoration of existing trails, development and rehabilitation, trailside or trailhead facilities such as restrooms, kiosks and parking lots, construction of new trails and land acquisition for recreational trails or corridors.

Funding for RTP grants is provided by the Federal Highway Administration through the federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act. The Department of Environment and Conservation administers this grant program for the state of Tennessee.

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


# **South Cumberland Regional Land Trust Annual Meeting**

# Nature Notes

#### **Describing Tick-Borne Ehrlichiosis**

**Henrietta Croom** reports that the most common tick-borne disease of human beings in Sewanee and surroundings, named Ehrlichiosis for pioneer German physician and Nobel Laureate of 1908 Paul Ehrlich, is caused by an obligate intracellular parasitic bacterium, Ehrlichia chaffeensis. Like the organism that causes the better-known Rocky Mountain spotted fever, this rickettsia must live within cells—in this case, white blood cells of an infected mammal. Though first observed by Ehrlich in white blood cells, it was first found in human beings in the U.S. in 1986. Like all rickettsia, the organism must reside on a long-term basis in the cells of a reservoir population—in this case, white-tailed deer that are thought to be somewhat, if not completely, resistant to its effects. It can only be transmitted to human beings by a vector—primarily the Lone Star tick (rarely, the dog tick)—which feeds on infected deer and, subsequently, on a human host. The probability of these two events in succession has been greatly increased by the burgeoning populations of white-tailed deer in the Southeastern U.S. It is not well-understood how many infections result in milder symptoms that are never identified, but it is known that individuals whose immune systems are weakened by cancer chemotherapy, steroid therapy or other causes are highly susceptible to cases with 2-3 percent fatality. It is also not known how long a tick must feed before transmitting the rickettsia to the host's bloodstream, but it is suspected that the feeding must occur for several hours. Nonspecific symptoms occur 5–10 days after infections and may include fever, lack of appetite, malaise, nausea, headache and muscle pain. Occasionally a skin rash in seen, most often in children. Often mistaken for flu, the disease can go unheeded until abnormal white blood cell counts and certain elevated liver enzymes alert a physician to the high probability of infection. A confirmative test that detects the organism in the patient's blood requires several days, but treatment with tetracyclines—primarily doxycycline—is begun immediately and usually quells most overt symptoms within three or four days of treatment. Sixty percent of cases require short-term hospitalization. Complete recovery often requires several weeks during which the body replaces the damaged tissues.

Prevention requires vigilance to avoid infection by ticks by wearing long sleeves and long pants tucked into socks, spraying repellents containing permethrin on boots and clothing, and repellents containing at least 30 percent DEET on skin (consult a physician first about the use of DEET on children). Following forays outside, check immediately for ticks on skin, and remove quickly. Be aware that pets could introduce ticks into the home. Attempts to coax ticks to dislodge first are discouraged by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Use fine-tipped tweezers or fingers protected by latex gloves or paper towels—grasping as close to the skin as possible, pulling upward with steady pressure, and avoiding twisting or any attempt to crush manually. Disinfect hands and freeze the tick in a plastic bag in case symptoms occur.




