Bachelder and Thiel Public Readings Scheduled by School of Letters

The series of readings and lectures sponsored by the Sewanee School of Letters will continue this week with appearances by two faculty members in the program. At 4:30 p.m. on Wednesday, June 23, novelist Chris Bachelder and poet Diane Thiel will read from their works. The readings are free and open to the public in Gailor Auditorium.

Bachelder is the author of the novels "U.S.I.," "Bear v. Shark" and "Lessons in Virtual Tour Photography"—an e-book available free at <www.mcsweeneys.net/bachelder/>.



Bachelder received an M.F.A. in fiction from the University of Florida and has held teaching positions at New Mexico State and Colorado College before joining the faculty of the M.F.A. Program for Poets and Writers at the University of Massachusetts, where he has taught since 2006.

Thiel is the author of eight books of poetry, nonfiction and creative writing pedagogy, including "Echo-locations" (winner of the Nicholas Roerich Prize), "Resistance Fantasies," "The White Horse: A Colombian Journey," "Crossroads: Creative Writing Exercises in Four Genres" and "Winding Roads: Exercises in Writing Creative Nonfiction." Thiel is associate professor of English at the University of New Mexico and Writer-in-Residence for the Environmental Institute at Sewanee.

Shakerag Lecture Series Features Pam Dorr

Pam Dorr will give the second presentation in the Shakerag Lecture Series on Wednesday, June 23, at 7:30 p.m. in the James Agee Memorial Library in Simmonds Hall at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School.

These public Wednesday evening lectures are followed by a reception in the St. Andrew's-Sewanee Gallery honoring the Shakerag lecturer and the Shakerag faculty artists.

Dorr is the executive director of the Hale Empowerment & Revitalization Organization, Inc. (HERO), Housing Resource Center. HERO is a rural grass-roots nonprofit that supports underserved families with housing and community resources, serving 1,500 families a year in Hale, Sumter, Perry, Wilcox and Marengo counties through partnership with the Alabama Tombigbee Regional Commission. HERO provides information on housing and community resources to area families, including home ownership, home repair and rental information. Community resources include food pantry, thrift store and utility assistance.

Dorr grew up in Half Moon Bay, Calif., and left San Francisco after a successful 18-year career as a lingerie



designer in the apparel industry to find a way she could contribute more to her world. She joined the Auburn University Rural Studio Outreach as a Fellow in 2003-04, to study innovations in architecture. After completion of the outreach program Dorr stayed on in Hale County to found the Housing Resource Center at HERO and Habitat for Humanity, Black Belt. HERO has \$6.8 million in housing assets and has completed 67 energy efficient, innovative, cost effective homes, focusing on well-designed houses built for area residents for less than \$20,000 each.

Prior to the lecture, a "Locally Grown Feast" will be offered in the SAS Dining Hall at 6 p.m. The fee is \$23, and reservations are required. Call director Claire Reishman at (931) 968-0210, ext. 3165.

Join Sewanee Butterfly Census

On Sunday, June 27, University biology professor David Haskell and local fantasy author David Coe will lead Sewanee's 14th Annual Census of Butterflies. The census will be sponsored by the North American Butterfly Association (NABA), and will be similar in both method and purpose to the Christmas bird counts, organized by the National Audubon Society. Should it rain on June 27, the count will be held on Monday, June 28.

Anyone interested in participating in the count is welcome. There is a \$3 per person administrative fee mandated by NABA. The count will begin at 9 a.m. in the Lake Cheston pavilion and will continue until late afternoon. Participants are invited to remain with the census organizers for as long as they wish. Those wishing to join the count later in the day can do so at the Memorial Cross located at

SSMF Begins 54th Season on Sunday

The Sewanee Summer Music Festival launches its 54th season at 2:30 p.m. on Sunday, June 20, with a festive opening performance in Guerri Hall. The concert features a long-time Sewanee favorite, Paul York, performing Saint-Saëns's elegant Cello Concerto. Also on the program are the famous overture to Mozart's "Marriage of Figaro" and the comic yet maudlin

dances of Stravinsky's "Pulcinella."

The energetic Benjamin Rous, newly named associate conductor of the Virginia Symphony, will lead the opening Festival Orchestra concert. Rous is the summer's first guest conductor and will work with the Sewanee Symphony students for their June 27 performance of Brahms' Second Symphony. For patrons attending Sewanee Sundays, Rous will lead conductor talks on both June 20 and 27, each at 1:30 p.m. preceding the afternoon's concert. Tickets for this Sewanee Sundays event are available at <musicfestival.sewanee.edu>.

The first week of concerts will continue with the first of seven faculty chamber music events on Wednesday, June 23, at 7:30 p.m. (Faculty chamber music continues every Wednesday and Saturday evening, except July 3, through the festival). Wednesday's program is diverse, including Bach's Cello Suite in C Major, featuring York, Eugène Bozza's Sonatine for Brass Quintet, Poulenc's Sonata for Clarinet

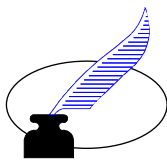

Local Hydrant Flushing Begins

The Sewanee Utility District will be flushing fire hydrants within the district during June and July.

During flushing, the hydrant is opened to allow any sediment and stale water to be removed from the main. Flushing must be performed annually to comply with state law and to ensure the highest quality of water possible. During flushing, some discoloration may be noticed but is of no health risk. Additionally, there may be a momentary loss of water pressure

while the hydrant is open.

SUD anticipates beginning flushing at the water tanks and moving out toward outlying areas. Therefore, areas near town will be flushed first and the areas of Sherwood Road, Midway and Jump-Off will be flushed in that order.

Flushing will be performed between the hours of 9 a.m. and 3 p.m. to reduce inconvenience. If you have any questions, please contact the utility office at 598-5611.

EPF Plans Vigil on June 18

the end of Tennessee Ave. at 1 p.m.

As with the Christmas bird count, participants in the census will count not only the number of different species seen, but also the number of individual butterflies. The final count will be sent to NABA so that the results can be tabulated with other censuses taking place throughout the continent around the July 4th holiday. Last year's count in Sewanee turned up 30 butterfly species and 165 individual butterflies. In past years, counters have seen as many as 350 butterflies.

This is the 36th year NABA has organized the counts. Last year, the association sponsored 463 counts in 49 U.S. states, four Canadian prov-

inces and one Mexican state.

Participants in Sewanee's count need only a sharp eye, a bit of patience and a willingness to learn. No prior knowledge of butterflies is necessary. A pair of binoculars is recommended, although not required. It is suggested that participants wear long pants and sturdy shoes, and that they bring along insect repellent. Participants should also bring a snack and something to drink. Those who intend to continue counting through the afternoon should bring lunch, as well.

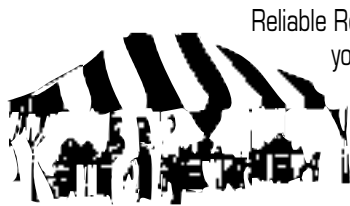

Doctor's Inn, owned by John and Carole Sergent, was designed by architect Mark Harrison of Nashville and landscaped by Dan Pate of Monteagle. Gooch-Beasley contractors built this stone and glass house using only local artisans. Featured on its walls are works of Tennessee artists, including Arlyn Ende, Jack Hastings, Claire Reishman, Paul Harmon and Red Grooms. The four Sergent grandchildren might be heard but not seen in their hidden play space.

The setting for Second Wind, owned by Randy and Peggy Kinnard, is Clifftops Lake, where the family can enjoy hiking, boating and fishing. 68th Congress of the GCNA

Dateline: Naperville, Ill. The 68th gathering of the Guild of Carillonneurs in North America (GCNA) has taken place this week. Some 140 people registered for the congress, a number that included more than 10 from Europe and Australia. The guild was formed 74 years ago so that carillonneurs, who so often sit alone in towers not even being able to see their audiences, could get together and share ideas and listen to music. 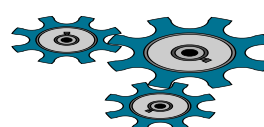

Winchester Receives Recreational Trail Program Grant

The grants may be used for non-routine maintenance and restoration of existing trails, development and rehabilitation, trailside or trailhead facilities such as restrooms, kiosks and parking lots, construction of new trails and land acquisition for recreational trails or corridors.

Funding for RTP grants is provided by the Federal Highway Administration through the federal Safe, Accountable, Flexible, Efficient Transportation Equity Act. The Department of Environment and Conservation administers this grant program for the state of Tennessee.

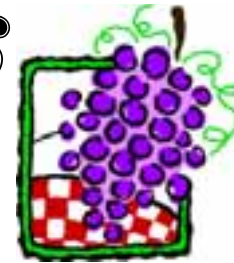

Nature Notes

Describing Tick-Borne Ehrlichiosis

Henrietta Croom reports that the most common tick-borne disease of human beings in Sewanee and surroundings, named Ehrlichiosis for pioneer German physician and Nobel Laureate of 1908 Paul Ehrlich, is caused by an obligate intracellular parasitic bacterium, *Ehrlichia chaffeensis*. Like the organism that causes the better-known Rocky Mountain spotted fever, this rickettsia must live within cells—in this case, white blood cells of an infected mammal. Though first observed by Ehrlich in white blood cells, it was first found in human beings in the U.S. in 1986. Like all rickettsia, the organism must reside on a long-term basis in the cells of a reservoir population—in this case, white-tailed deer that are thought to be somewhat, if not completely, resistant to its effects. It can only be transmitted to human beings by a vector—primarily the Lone Star tick (rarely, the dog tick)—which feeds on infected deer and, subsequently, on a human host. The probability of these two events in succession has been greatly increased by the burgeoning populations of white-tailed deer in the Southeastern U.S. It is not well-understood how many infections result in milder symptoms that are never identified, but it is known that individuals whose immune systems are weakened by cancer chemotherapy, steroid therapy or other causes are highly susceptible to cases with 2–3 percent fatality. It is also not known how long a tick must feed before transmitting the rickettsia to the host's bloodstream, but it is suspected that the feeding must occur for several hours. Nonspecific symptoms occur 5–10 days after infections and may include fever, lack of appetite, malaise, nausea, headache and muscle pain. Occasionally a skin rash is seen, most often in children. Often mistaken for flu, the disease can go unheeded until abnormal white blood cell counts and certain elevated liver enzymes alert a physician to the high probability of infection. A confirmative test that detects the organism in the patient's blood requires several days, but treatment with tetracyclines—primarily doxycycline—is begun immediately and usually quells most overt symptoms within three or four days of treatment. Sixty percent of cases require short-term hospitalization. Complete recovery often requires several weeks during which the body replaces the damaged tissues.

Prevention requires vigilance to avoid infection by ticks by wearing long sleeves and long pants tucked into socks, spraying repellents containing permethrin on boots and clothing, and repellents containing at least 30 percent DEET on skin (consult a physician first about the use of DEET on children). Following forays outside, check immediately for ticks on skin, and remove quickly. Be aware that pets could introduce ticks into the home. Attempts to coax ticks to dislodge first are discouraged by the Centers for Disease Control (CDC). Use fine-tipped tweezers or fingers protected by latex gloves or paper towels—grasping as close to the skin as possible, pulling upward with steady pressure, and avoiding twisting or any attempt to crush manually. Disinfect hands and freeze the tick in a plastic bag in case symptoms occur.

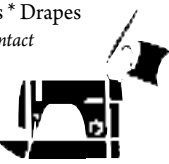
