Belinda Morgan, the school nurse, and members of the Healthy Schools Team began planning this project last October. "We are very excited to see it finally come to life," Morgan said.

Matthew and Cammie Monroe of TransPlants Inc. in Beersheba designed the garden, which consists of several raised beds and gravel pathways to provide a safe area for students to move around the garden as they work. Monroe planned the orchard with peach, pear and apple trees as well as grape, blueberry and raspberry bushes. Rain barrels will provide water throughout the year.

The Road Map for a Healthier Appalachian Tennessee has awarded a grant for a greenhouse.

"This exciting project is an extension of our classrooms and a catalyst to teach nutrition education," Morgan said. "We will offer a 'Garden Club'

after school this fall as a hands-on approach to nutrition, food preparation, fitness, and community involvement. Our programs will be sustained by growing plants to use in our garden and also sold as fund-raisers."

The Bridge Program in Math and Science, June 22–July 12, is a three-week residential experience for rising high school seniors to get a head start on college. The program is designed to encourage students whose backgrounds and experiences would contribute to and enrich the diversity of our academic community and who are interested in math and science.

The Sewanee Summer Music Festival begins on June 21 and lasts until July 20. More than 150 aspiring young musicians from around the United States and abroad join with teachers, performers, and internationally recognized guest artists to create a musical community in Sewanee. Students receive musical training of the highest caliber and draw from the wealth of experience held by a distinguished and dedicated faculty. Sewanee Summer Music Festival fosters an atmosphere of collaboration and inspiration and promotes the belief that all people are elevated through the experience of making and hearing great music together. The first session of the Sewanee Summer Seminar begins on June 22. This week-long program offers lectures on a variety of topics taught by University professors. Program participants tend to be alumni, friends of Sewanee or anyone with curious minds. Participants may either stay in the dormitory or stay only for the lectures, but are encouraged to engage in activities on the Domain such as hiking, tours and informal gatherings to encourage conversation.

Girls' High School Lacrosse Camp is June 24–28. The camp is designed to provide quality instruction in both team and individual play. Campers have a fun but intense experience meant to challenge them to become more complete players. A three-session mini-camp for goalkeepers will provide quality, individualized instruction designed to increase their level of play prior to the field player arrivals.

The Sewanee Environmental Institute begins on June 29. This is a summer residential program for talented high school students who are passionate about the outdoors and interested in studying the environment. Students participate in ecological exploration with senior Sewanee faculty examining the plant and animal species that inhabit these ecosystems and use archeological techniques to study how people have used and changed these ecosystems over time. Students learn how conservation strategies are being used to protect Plateau ecosystems.

The Sewanee Young Writers' Conference is from June 29 through July 12. The conference provides ninth-, tenth- and eleventh-graders with opportunities that are hard to find, either at high schools or at other summer programs. Workshops in play-writing, fiction, poetry and creative nonfiction are led by writers of significant accomplishment and promise. Former workshop leaders have won the Roerich poetry prize, been recognized by the New Yorker as among the 20 best young American novelists and been featured by "Oprah's Book Club." Students spend most mornings in workshops and most evenings in discussions or readings by faculty, special guests and fellow participants.

McCardell Joins Liberal Arts College Assessment

The University of the South announced that Vice-Chancellor John M. McCardell Jr. has been named to a new steering committee of college and university presidents that will assess the future of independent colleges. The Council of Independent Colleges (CIC) has organized the 22-member panel to develop a plan that encourages independent colleges and universities to revitalize their missions and business models. The project on the "Future of Independent Liberal Arts Colleges" is funded by the Lumina Foundation.

With the guidance of the steering committee, the project will explore new approaches to higher education, alternative college business models, and potentially disruptive trends in American society and education, along with the traditional characteristics and missions of independent liberal arts colleges that are regarded as essential to their success. The project will offer an opportunity for CIC members to lead the national conversation about what it means to provide a high-quality education in the 21st century.

"This is an exciting opportunity for me and presidents of other liberal arts institutions to discuss current issues and innovations," said McCardell. "The University of the South seeks to educate in ways that go far beyond the classroom and to impart not simply a set of marketable skills, but ways of thinking critically and making informed decisions. I believe that liberal arts institutions like Sewanee will continue to serve society very well in the 21st century."

"Predictions about the future of higher education by politicians, journalists and policy analysts often disregard or deride the effectiveness of traditional colleges and universities," said CIC president Richard Ekman. "CIC, however, has always tried to find an appropriate balance between innovations in higher education that show real promise for the future and the existing features of member institutions that have long demonstrated their value. In this spirit, CIC's new project will explore the future of independent colleges."

At a September meeting, the steering committee will focus on the development of a research agenda for the coming year. CIC staff and others will conduct the research. The committee's second meeting will be devoted to development of an action plan to help CIC member institutions re-examine their missions and long-term strategic plans in intentional ways.

Crutchfield said he was very excited about the new opportunity. "I think I am a good fit for South, and I am excited to begin working with the students, staff and parents." He begins on July 1.

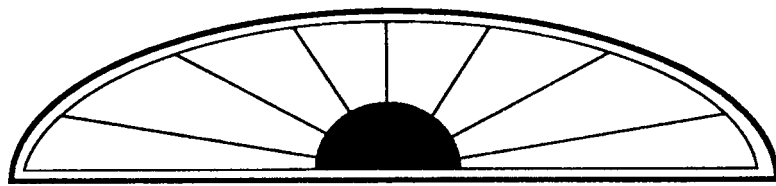
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Area FCHS Students Earn Awards and Honors

THE VILLAGE IDIOT

Summer Camplicity

Early June is generally quite eventful for me. Almost within a week, our church youth group goes on a mission trip, and hundreds of well-known musicians perform roughly 10 miles from my childhood home. Before you begin to envision exotic travels, our mission trip is within easy driving distance, and the music festival is in the next county over. Even when the globe you're hopping is perhaps the size of a basketball, you can still experience different worlds.

The music festival world is run by a professional, customer-informed organization that (with the exception of rehiring one unpopular and self-centered performer) quickly incorporates local and customer needs into a rapidly assembled infrastructure for this annual event. In a roundabout way, I must compliment their adaptive traffic management and community planning, as they provide basic needs such as water, food and toilets and move tens of thousands of vehicles in a space of roughly 10 square miles. Their motivation is nothing less than community acceptance and repeat customers.

Our mission trip, on the other hand, allows our youth to engage with people whose needs extend beyond a constructed entertainment environment. We are able to deal with organizations that are also customer-informed, as well as work with a number of their customers. The observable difference is that the use of customer information is limited by the extent of the organization's stated mission. Thus, the homeless shelter for men serves food and shelter only to men. The women's shelter only serves women and their children. The free house-painting mission only serves homeowners who cannot afford to paint their homes. While this exposure generates valuable experience, our evening discussions include questions about the lack of a comprehensive means of addressing the entirety of the need. When I pointed out the crumbling shingles to the house-painting crew chief, I was told, "We only paint houses, we don't do repairs." Sometimes when I've been pushed halfway out of the ditch, I get enough traction to drive out. Sometimes, I'm still stuck.

Recently a community survey appeared asking interested people to answer a series of questions about what they might want for their downtown in the way of new development. The almost immediate pushback included statements such as, "There's no place to list things that weren't included in the survey," and "Restrooms, we need 'open to the public' restrooms." About 15–20 years ago, as an employee of the U.S. Forest Service, I learned how to lay out and manage a fire camp. Such camps are instant communities, serving the needs of hundreds of firefighters brought in to remote areas at a moment's notice. The co-location of eating, bathing and restrooms in convenient juxtaposition are essential to success. The design is intended to maximize convenient access for the hundreds of exhausted firefighters who are working long days under adverse conditions. Without proof of this basic knowledge, one is not certified to proceed with creating a viable fire camp.

The house we painted sits on a corner lot. Many people pass by every day. A high number of these people expressed joy and thanks at the immediate and obvious change. The crew chief confided that they painted the sides facing the street first for rapid curb appeal. When I realize that part of our volunteer work is to make a donation to the house-painting mission organization, I realize we are the real customer. This year I learned from Bonnaroo that one bad act does not ruin the experience, whereas being inconvenienced and uncomfortable might. As a repeat customer in my community, I can only hope that while we admire the paint, somebody competent is also checking on the roof.

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Discussion of the Oxford American's Music Issue

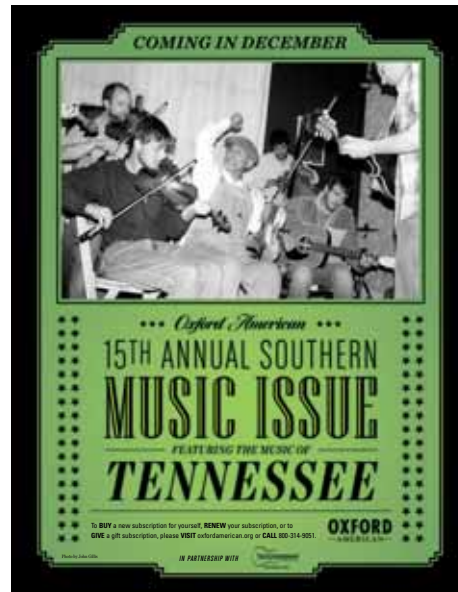

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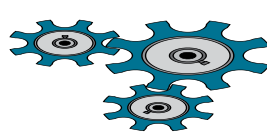
