Arcadia at Sewanee Considering Developers, Sites

This summer, the Arcadia at Sewanee Board of Trustees will work to reach an agreement with one of three developers to build a planned assisted living facility. Developers will visit Sewanee and tour potential sites this summer, and the

board has requested proposals by Sept. 5, said Thomas Phelps, vice president of the Arcadia Board of Trustees.

'That's what the summer's going to be all about, evaluating developers and the developers evaluating us," Phelps said.

All three developers, which includes one nonprofit, are located within two hours of Sewanee, Phelps said. The board selected the trio based on each fully completing the required application process out of about eight developers con-

The timeline and site for Arcadia, as well as the size and design, are still undetermined, Phelps noted. The University has identified three sites for consideration—off Castleberry Drive near IvyWild restaurant; in a wooded area off Alabama Avenue and Highway 41A; and off Missouri Avenue behind the Convenience Center, said Frank Gladu, University of the South vice president for administrative services and ex-officio member of Arcadia's board.

SUD Approves New Sewer Adjustment Policy

"In order to qualify for an adjustment to their sewer bill, the customer needs to be able to verify the water did not enter the sewer collection system," said SUD Board President Charlie Smith, reviewing the stipulations of the new sewer adjustment policy approved by the board at the May 23 meeting.

Formerly one policy covered sewer and water bill adjustments, but SUD's recent decision to offer leak insurance made separate policies necessary.

To qualify for an adjustment to their sewer bill, the disputed bill must be greater than the customer's average bill over the course of the last 12 months. For qualifying adjustments, the sewer portion of the bill will be recalculated to the amount of the average bill.

On the suggestion of commissioner Randall Henley, the board limited adjustments to one per calendar year. "The sewer adjustment policy and water adjustment policy should match," Henley said, citing the water adjustment policy, which also limits adjustments to one per calendar year.

Under the new water adjustment policy, customers covered by leak insurance will only be responsible for the portion of leaked water equal to their 12-month average bill. All customers will be automatically (Continued on page 8)

61st SSMF Season Begins June 17

In just a couple of weeks, more than 200 musicians from around the globe will flock to the Mountain for chances to hone in on their skills and gain performance experience.

The Sewanee Summer Music Festival (SSMF) will enter its 61st year, kicking off music classes and performances on June 17. Since 1957, the SSMF has been a space for student musicians to gain knowledge via instrumental lessons and experience performing for the community.

Every student participates in private lessons, chamber ensembles and one of the two student orchestras. More than 30 concerts are presented during the four-week festival by the student musicians and their mentor artist faculty.

Ruth Cobb, assistant director of marketing and development, has been involved with the SSMF for three summers. Cobb said that, though there have been changes through the decades, the festival's purpose first and foremost is always the students.

"The festival is known for the attention and focus given to students, with many faculty maintaining contact with their students throughout the year, offering guidance in auditions and college applications," said Cobb. "Musicians from all over the globe

land here, and the festival is where many of these students will get their start, making valuable connections and gaining performing experience."

Some familiar faces, along with a few new international musicians, will fill the role of conductor each week for the 61st season of the festival.

"Everyone involved loves and is concerned with the success of the festival. It offers so much for so many people," said Cobb.

Fans of the festival will have seven opportunities to catch a performance by the faculty chamber music orchestra and four more by the student orchestra throughout the season. Winners of the Jacqueline Avent Concerto Competition will perform on Thursday, July 13 at 7:30 p.m.

Patrons of the Sewanee Summer Music Festival should note several changes in this year's ticket sales and take advantage of considerable savings by purchasing online in advance. Tickets are available for purchase prior to the concerts on the SSMF website <ssmf.sewanee.edu> for \$15. Entry will be \$20 at the door.

Season tickets are available for \$90 online at <ssmf.sewanee.edu>. Payment is made by credit card and the tickets may be picked up prior to any concert in the lobby of Guerry Auditorium.

Community Council Reviews Dog Policy and Council's Role

"I think it's time we put teeth in the dog policy," said council representative rector of Schools Amie Lonas turned tention to concerns of a local resident who has repeatedly suffered harassment and been bitten by unleashed dogs. The Council also discussed strategies for increasing the council's realm of influence, received an update on the proposed Greenhaw quarry and learned about plans to locate nine historical markers in he Sewanee area along the Bell Trail of Tears route.

Coe called for rigid enforcement of the current dog policy, signage making dog owners aware of the policy, and favored amending the policy to require ogs be restrained on a leash.

"Under the current dog policy, dogs must be under the owner's control," said council representative Theresa Shackelford. "I think that's adequate. Dogs on a leash can't get exercise."

"If your dogs on a leash, you must exercise with your dog," Coe countered. Franklin County Commissioner Helen Stapleton said dogs needed a larger area than the dog park to run. "One trail ignated for off-leash dogs," Stapleton

uggested. The council will take up the dog policy at a future meeting, with a view o possible amendments.

Revisiting the frequently discussed topic of the council's role, Shackelford said, "the council has become stagnant and impotent. Some council members don't participate except for coming to meetings." She attributed the apathy, in part, to the decision to meet less frequently and to the practice of the

GAMBLING WITH HEALTHCARE


To the Editor:

I have never gambed at a casino and I do not like to gamble. But gambling is legal; that is, fair gambling. Unfair gambling is cheating, and is illegal, and might be dangerous. It has been pointed out by many people that an insurance is a (legal) gamble. You pay your premium to ensure that you will have your medical bills covered, if need be. Or, you go without paying your premium, and risk financial or physical disaster if you get sick. That is how the game is played and that is fair and legal. But suppose the insurance company decides they are not going to insure a certain segment of the population, say people who have illnesses or have a history of past illnesses. This lowers the insurer's risk and essentially "stacks the deck." The sick people have to "ante up" more money to get in the game, and the rules are different for them. This amounts to unfair gambling, which is illegal. It is cheating.

Apparently, the Republican led House of Representatives does not recognize unfairness or illegality in that the American Healthcare Act recently and narrowly passed, allows insurers to again cherry pick customers and create high risk pools of historically ill people. Excluding people from insurance who have been ill was made illegal by the Affordable Healthcare Act ("Obamacare"). Now the Republican led House seeks to make cheating legal again.

Do you want to play poker with someone who cheats and plays with a stacked deck? If your answer is no, call or write Senators Alexander and Corker and urge them to remove high risk pools from the House's version of healthcare legislation.







A survey process conducted by Areenrolled in the ServLine leak insurance program effective Aug. 1.

Customers will receive information about the program with their next three water bills. To decline participation, customers should phone (931) 386-3885. Customers declining coverage will not qualify for water bill adjustments. The insurance costs customers \$1.30 per month.

To qualify for a water bill adjustment, "the leak must not be readily evident meal service, a space for gardening, to a reasonable person," commissioner Karen Singer stressed. For full details on the leak adjustment policy visit the SUD website <www.sewaneeutility.org>. Smith said SUD manager Ben Beavers reported customer response to the decision to offer leak insurance had been "favorable."

The leak insurance does not cover waterline repair, sewer line repair, or high sewer bills resulting from leaks. Customers can independently enroll in ServLine plans offering water line repair (\$4.40 per month) and sewer line repair (\$6 per month) by phoning (931) 386-3885

"I expect a close vote," Hughes said. Unswayed by the promise of 10 newjobs, Greenhaw residents strongly oppose the rezoning, according to Hughes. Proponents of the quarry argue competition with the other area rock provider, Rogers Group, will save the county \$70,000 to \$500,000 annually. Hughes, however, pointed Council representative Flournoy out that the county owns a quarry and crusher-run rock, the quarry could be upgraded to produce all types of rock at a cost of \$2-3 million.

said. "Two months ago the provost, a personal friend, contacted me. There was a position open, although different from the position I applied for previously. He asked if he could resubmit my resume."

Friends of the South Cumberland State Park—\$9,225.00 to assist in the redevelopment of the original CCC campsite and to create signage to help isitors understand the historical significance;

City of Gruetli-Laager—\$10,000 for building a new amphitheater designed for larger audiences to use for community and county-wide events including



LOOKSATBOOKS

Summer Reading

As they aim their rain boots toward summer, Sewanee Elementary School children have plans. They've signed up to read under a tree, on the beach, to a pet or with a friend. Some will read in a funny voice, no doubt enlivening road trips. Most plan to read 20 minutes or more daily.

Third grader Eliot Sparacio recommends "The Day the Crayons Came Home," sequel to Drew Daywalt's hilarious "The Day the Crayons Quit" when disgruntled crayons walked off their crayon box job site. After giggling through Annie Barrows' first three "Ivy and Bean" books about well-intentioned girls whose schemes often land them in trouble, my granddaughter is ready for the next three, all perfect for early readers ready for chapter books. SES fourth grader Saida Thomas' choice of "Land of Stories: Mother Goose Diaries" would be fun for reading with kids old enough to enjoy the iconic figure's gossiping with Elizabeth I and rocking out at Woodstock.

Saida's book is a companion to Chris Colffer's "Land of Stories" series. "The Wishing Spell" introduces 11-year-old twins Alex and Conner who fall into their grandmother's cherished storybook, discovering Queen Snow White and King Charming, a Big Bad Wolf pack, and Jack of beanstalk fame and boyfriend of fugitive Goldilocks. (The bears pressed charges!) Popular with strong readers in upper elementary school, the tale of adventure can be read aloud to children who recognize the updated fairy tale figures. Colffer, TV show "Glee's" actor-singer turned writer, creates engaging characters, but his debut work is written in uneven style with some details inappropriate for listeners under age 8.

Rising St. Andrews-Sewanee eighth grader Autumn Welch will hip-hop into summer singing lyrics from the play "Hamilton." She is fond of composer/lyricist/star Lin-Manuel Miranda's presentation of the libretto in a gorgeous book with photos, more than 200 footnotes and the account of an idea's transformation into a Broadway hit about a founding father. The musical's CD is available in duPont Library's Main Music Collection; the book is on order. Lisa Hartmann and her family enjoyed a performance of "The Curious Incident of the Dog in the Night-Time" and recommend the book for ages 12 and up. Mark Haddon's novel features a mathematically gifted, autistic 15-year-old whose investigation of the murder of a neighbor's dog turns up a secondmystery with clues pointing toward his own house. This young adult novel is on the SAS summer reading list for ninth graders, and it's on my list too.

Switching age groups and genre, neighbor Tommy Hewitt tells us that Tom Clavin's "Dodge City: Wyatt Earp, Bat Masterson, and the Wickedest Town in the American West" is a great read with "fascinating stuff about Wyatt, Bat, Doc {Holliday} and Katy Elder." For a vastly different setting, consider Molly Delorme's suggestion, "Into Thin Air: A Personal Account of the Mt. Everest Disaster" by Jon Krakauer. The journalist uses his talent for vivid detail as he chronicles the 1996 ascent when eight climbers were killed.

Mysteries are popular vacation reading, but even our favorite authors can disappoint. In G. M. Maillet's sixth Father Max book, "Devil's Breath," a body washes up near Nether Monkslip, drawing the vicar into the investigation. Hollywood stereotypes on a yacht cruise supplant the usual zany villagers; I confess to leaving the scene before glamour and greed led our hero to a solution. Much more satisfying was "When the Music's Over" by Peter Robinson. Set in Yorkshire, his latest Alan Banks novel brings an engaging plot and strong characters, plus a view of the area's social issues. Suspenseful and graphic, not for the faint of heart.

At the top of my list is "Mockingbird Songs: My Friendship With Harper Lee," by Wayne Flynt, Auburn history professor and confidante of the supposedly reclusive author of "To Kill a Mockingbird" and "Go Set a Watchman." I was hooked when I opened the book and saw a facsimile of a letter from Ms. Lee transferred to the front and back endpapers. Drawing heavily from their correspondence, Flynt's account is reviewed as the only work that the late author might have accepted, and one that brings a fuller sense of the mysterious and beloved literary figure. I don't dare begin reading until the time is right for pots of tea and a muted phone.

Most titles are available or on order for duPont Library. I wish you all a summer filled with tea and books.

SAS Res Opens June 5, **Pass Required**

The "Res," a man-made lake at the St. Andrew's-Sewanee School campus is restricted to school use during most of the year. However, for a small portion of the summer (June 5 through July 31) members of the extended SAS community may use the Res if they have a permit.

To be eligible to apply for and purchase a Res pass and parking permit, community members must have an SAS sponsor employed by the school (signature will be required) and be at least 18 years old. Application can be made at the SAS Administrative Offices in Langford Hall between 8 a.m. and 4 p.m., Monday -Friday. Season permits are \$75. A one weekend permit may be purchased for \$25. SAS alumni and current parents may purchase a season permit for \$25. The Res may not be used by permit holders until June 5.

Group rates for those not affiliated with SAS or the University of the South will be \$150 per half day for up to 25 individuals. Groups must provide lifeguards and proof of insurance. To apply for group use, contact Andrea Booher,

Sewanee Announces Its 2017 Hall of Fame Class

The Sewanee Athletic Department and Athletic Director Mark Webb announced that five individuals and one team have been selected for induction into the Sewanee Athletics Hall of Fame.

The Class of 2017 will be honored during Hall of Fame Weekend, Sept.

The class will also be introduced at halftime of the Tigers' home football game against Hendrix on Saturday, Sept. 30. The 2017 Class inductees:

Kim Fauls, C'97—Lettered in women's basketball from 1994-97. Fauls ranks third all-time on the career scoring list with 1,559 points. She also ranks seventh in career rebounds (690). Fauls was a four-time All-Southern Collegiate Athletic Conference (SCAC) selection. She was a second-team All-SCAC member as a freshman and was then awarded a spot on the All-SCAC First-Team her final three seasons.

Mike Lumpkin, C'73—Lumpkin was a four-year lettter winner in football from 1970-73. Lumpkin was an outstanding defensive end for the Tigers where he earned All-American honors in 1973. Lumpkin was captain for Sewanee in 1972 and 1973. Lumpkin's grandfather and father also played football for

Doug Paschall, C'66—Lettered in football from 1963-66 where he was two-year captain for the Tigers. Paschall was a key part of the 1965 team that finished 7–1 and won the CAC Championship. As a freshman, Paschall was a letterwinner on the 1963 Tiger team that finished 8-0 and outscored their opponents 275-45. Off the field, he was a 1966 NCAA Postgraduate Scholar and a Rhodes Scholar. During his career, Sewanee finished with a 25-8 record.

Jim Startz, C'85—Startz lettered in men's basketball for the Tigers from 1982-85. Startz ranks among the program's best in career points and rebounds. Startz ranks sixth all-time in scoring with 1,457 career points and 10th all-time in rebounds with 650 career boards. He also ranks among the program's top-six in three other statistical categories. During his junior and senior seasons, Startz was an All-conference and All-South selection.

Katie Teague, C'93—Teague lettered in field hockey from 1989-92. She was selected as the first player in program history to play in the North/South All-Star game. Teague led Sewanee to a 15–2 record as a senior and to the 1992 KIT Championship. That season, Teague scored a team-high 11 goals and had seven assists. she was also a 1992 Regional All-American. Teague was a fourtime KIT All-Conference selection and was named the 1992 KIT Tournament MVP. She also led Sewanee to the 1991 KIT Championship.

2007 Women's Tennis Team—The 2007 Sewanee women's tennis team had the highest final national ranking of any Sewanee team in athletic department history. The Tigers posted a 23-2 record and finished the season ranked third. Sewanee's two losses came against 2007 National Champion Washington & Lee and national runner-up Amherst in the NCAA semifinals. During the season, Sewanee defeated seven top-20 teams (Carnegie Mellon, Swarthmore, Emory (twice), DePauw, Denison, and Williams). The Tigers earned a trip to the Elite Eight after Sewanee defeated four-time defending National Champion Emory 5-4 in the NCAA Regional final. Two players were ranked nationally in singles while one doubles team was ranked in the top-15. The team featured two All-Americans, three All-SCAC players, five All-SCAC All-Tournament selections, four ITA National Scholar Athletes, the 2007 SCAC Coach of the Year, an NCAA Postgraduate Scholar, a CoSIDA Academic All-American, and the 2007 ITA National Rookie and National Senior Player of the Year award winners. Additionally, Gabriela Carvalho (singles) and Carvalho/Laura Fanjoy (doubles) were ITA National finalists.

SAS Track and Field **Regional Action**

On May 16 and May 18, St. Andrew's-Sewanee traveled to GPS in Chattanooga for the regional track meet.

Freshman Sarah Beth Hobby had a standout performance placing first in the Long Jump with a distance of 15'6", earning a spot in the state meet on May 25. Hobby also took third in the triple jump with a distance of 30'6.5". Other SAS athletes who had good showings in the field events portion of the meet on Tuesday were sophomore Jaylen Tillman, third in shot put with a season best 42 feet and 10.5 inches, followed by junior Justin Elgouhary who threw 40 feet for the first time in his high school career. Sarah Grace Burns took third in long jump, clearing 4'10".

On Thursday during the running events, junior Bailey McLean set a personal best in the mile with a time of 5:05.23 minutes. Freshman Jayla Mclaurin set a personal best of 53.27 seconds in the 300 meter hurdles and 20.01 in the 100 hurdles. Junior Sam Kennard took sixth place in both the 100 meter (14.25 seconds) and the 200 meter (28.95 seconds).

Despite fighting hard in the longest singles match in the 2017 NCAA Singles Championship, Sewanee women's tennis student-athlete Clementina Davila fell just short of another All-American honor with a Round of 32 loss at the Champions Club on May 25.

In a defensive contest, Davila lost twice in two straight tiebreakers falling to Kenyon's Diana Aboubakare

Davila finished the season nationally ranked and was again an All-SAA First-Team selection.

In the next round, Schober again got off to a strong start. The two-time Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Player of the Year opened play against Nikolai Parodi of Claremont-Mudd-Scripps (CMS) with an early 3-0 lead. Parodi finally broke Schober and answered back by winning three of the next four contests.

CMS's No. 1 player eventually closed out the set at 6–4 after he won the final three games.

In the second set, Schober took an early 2-1 lead. However, Parodi answered back again winning two of the next three games. From there, the CMS All-American never looked back. Schober tied the contest at 3–3, before Parodi held serve and served at the match at 7-5.

Monarch Caterpillars

Monarch butterfly caterpillars have been observed on millkweed in the Sewanee area this spring, indicating that adults do indeed migrate north through our region from their overwintering grounds in Mexico, and lay eggs here. **Yolande Gottfried** spotted a couple on the native white milkweed on their property and Mary Davis reported some on

The caterpilliars take about two weeks to mature, then enter the pupa or chrysalis stage, where they spend another two weeks before emerging as adults. The adults will travel further north, as the monarch goes through around four generations before finally migrating south to the overwintering grounds. While the caterpillars feed only on milkweed, accumulating toxins from that plant to discourage predators, the adults feed on nectar from a wide variety of flowers, many from the aster family such as thistles, coneflowers and goldenrod.




