Local Food Movement Grows as Food Hub Begins

Local organic food production and education continues to expand in Sewanee and across the plateau. The USDA grant of \$43,000 (matched by funds from members of the Sewanee community) which begins in July and was given to the Cumberland Farmer's Market, will create the South Cumberland Food Hub, a nonprofit organization designed to help farmers gain access to local institutional markets, including the University food services.

The Sewanee Farmer's Market on Saturday mornings has been a key part of life on the Mountain for decades, and many area residents are avid gardeners. Locally produced food offerings expanded when Jess



Wilson started the Cumberland Farmer's Market (CFM) in 2007 with 10 suppliers, based on an online system she learned about while living in Athens, Ga. CFM had annual sales of \$80,000 in 2011. Darlene Seagroves founded the Tracy City Farmer's Market in 2009, and it continues to grow each year as well.

The University has restarted its farm after a 40-year hiatus. Domain manager Nate Wilson is working with the new farm manager, Gina Raicovich, on the project. This effort builds on a student-run farm initiated more than 10 years ago by biology professor David Haskell's "Food for Thought" course. Raicovich, who began in May, is in charge of 20 head of cattle grazing on 40 acres, as well as a half-acre garden to be expanded onto another acre.

"The farm is not interested in competing with local farmers," Nate Wilson said, "and will not make the University self-sufficient." Rather, he said, it will serve as a "model of small-scale agriculture, an educational tool for both students and the surrounding community.

The 15 rows at the Blue Heron Garden at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School is in its second year of operation; it is part of SAS's five-year sustainability initiative. SAS faculty member Vivian Gray also directs its use for a student afternoon gardening program. She hopes to one day provide food for the SAS dining hall, which now boasts no soft drinks, better signage in its cafeteria (nutritional content, ingredients) and locally baked bread day once a week.

Grundy County Joins Appalachian Quilt Trail

The unveiling of Grundy County's first two barn quilts took place on May 24. Created by schoolchildren and adults, the barn quilts were installed by artist Ron van Dyke. Since then, two more blocks have been added at different locations. Jana Barrett, director of the Barn Quilt Project, explained the project.

"A barn quilt is a replica of a traditional quilt block painted onto a piece of primed sign board," Barrett said. "These blocks are then attached to the outside of businesses, working farms and historical buildings."

Those who host a block may have their addresses and the block names on he Appalachian Quilt Trail website.

"When these people visit our barn quilts they contribute to Grundy County's economy by purchasing food, gas, lodging and works from area artists," Barrett stated. "It is simple, gentle on our resources and enjoyable for Grundy County citizens as well.

Oliver's Feed and Farm Supply in Pelham, owned by Mike, Melody and Judd Oliver, is the first local business to have a quilt block. The feed store also has a growing inventory of plumbing, farm supplies and plants. The Olivers are also authors, and their books are available at the store. Their block, "Starburst," can be seen at 82 Ball Field Road just past Pelham School.

The second quilt block is "Boxes" at Flury and Sons' Grocery, in Tracy City, owned and operated by Paul (P.C.) Flury. Flury's, which has been in business for 107 years, is located in a historic building. P.C. is the grandson of the original owner, Henry Flury, who passed it down to his son. With antiques, fixtures and pictures, as well as a sandwich shop, Flury welcomes guests to come by for a visit.

In Altamont, Dr. and Mrs. Joe Gray, who own the Manor Bed and Breakfast, host the block "Indian Trails," on the side of the log cabin behind Moffitt Manor, which served as Grundy County's first courthouse. The cabin was built in 1835. The Manor was constructed in 1885 and is a Federalist-style building with an Italian flavor. It sits between State Highways 50 and 108. The bed and breakfast is closed, but the Grays still enjoy chatting with passersby about their historic property. Dr. Gray is the minister of the Church of Christ at Altamont.

The fourth block, "Mountain Star," is at Laurel Leaf Studio, located between Altamont and Beersheba Springs, and owned and operated by Jana and Gerald Barrett. Jana is the art teacher for all six of Grundy County's elementary schools. Laurel Leaf Studio offers a variety of art classes for adults and her elementary students who want to spend a little more time creating than the regular school

The second annual Cumberland Folk School will be at Laurel Leaf Studio on The first week of the 2012 season features a keynote lecture, "A Republic July 18–20. Participants pick and choose from three days of quality instruction in watercolor, sketching, creative writing, drama, quilting, arts and crafts, and this year, sign language will be added to the curriculum.

Laurel Leaf Studio partnered with the Grundy Area Arts Council to secure an Arts Builds Communities grant for the barn quilt project. The grant was designed to provide schoolchildren and adults educational experiences and opportunities to serve Grundy County by painting and donating the barn quilts back to the community.

More blocks are being planned for Beersheba Springs, Palmer, Gruetli-

Laager, Coalmont and the Farmer's Market in Tracy City. With the assistance of Ron van Dyke, Renee' Corley and Elizabeth Bell, the barn quilts have been produced and installed quite efficiently.

While local businesses, historic buildings and family farms are the most common sites for barn quilts, anyone may host a block. Hosts are not required to register their block with the Appalachian Quilt trail; however, there is a registration form to submit for those who do.



Transit of Venus Viewing

Mountain residents watched the transit of Venus on the evening of June 5 from the University's Cordell-Lorenz Observatory and at the Memorial Cross. This rare event, which will not happen again until December 2117, occurs when Venus passes directly between earth and the sun. Venus is seen as a small dot gliding slowly across the face of the sun.

According to Doug Durig, director of the observatory and chair of the department of physics and astronomy, there was a good crowd at both loca-

"We had 65 signatures at the Cordell-Lorenz Observatory, but we had no students manning the logbook, so quite a few people did not sign in. I saw several faces whose names were not in the logbook," Durig said.

"There were at least 75 and maybe 100 at the Observatory between 5 and 6 p.m. for the start of the transit and 50–75 people at the Cross between 6:30 p.m. and sunset," he said.

While the transit ended locally at sunset, "the actual transit lasted until around midnight, you just had to be in Hawaii, Alaska or Japan to see the whole event before the sun set," he said.



Construction Updates


"We expect these projects to cause some minor disruption to parking and traffic patterns around Fulford Hall, University Avenue and South Carolina Avenue," Vachon said.


Access to the parking lot behind Fulford Hall from South Carolina Avenue will be closed. The Fulford driveway from University Avenue will be a dead-end drive with no access to the parking lot behind Fulford or South Carolina Avenue. The Rebel's Rest driveway will be modified to allow for entry and exit traffic.

Utility work will take place at the intersection of University Avenue and South Carolina Avenue in mid to late summer (a more detailed schedule with full impact will be furnished as more details become available)

The contractor was on campus earlier this month to begin mobilization and installation of construction fencing and to stage trailers and equipment.

Vachon expects that the renovation to Cannon Hall will begin this month and be complete in December, and construction on a new residence hall next to Cannon and behind Fulford Hall will begin in July and be complete in July 2013.





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

food cultivation and food preparation, a clear grasp of the origins of the food they eat and the impact of their food decisions on themselves and others," said Christi Teasley, head of the SAS Sustainability Committee.

On July 1, the University assumes responsibility for the operation of the on $campus\ dining\ services.\ Associate\ vice\ president\ for\ administration\ Frank\ Gladu$ said there will be "fewer restrictions about what can be purchased locally," and they can "be more responsive to student wishes." Rick Wright, executive chef at McClurg dining hall, who purchases more than \$1 million in food a year for the facility, said he hopes that this change will help the entire area.

"We hope that demand [for local organic food] will increase production," Wright said. He believes in taking small steps to achieve this goal.

"A realistic next step would be all fresh local lettuces in the salad bar," he said. In addition to the University and SAS dining halls, area businesses and restaurants are making a greater commitment to buying locally.

Mrs. Elizabeth Majors used to make a commanding presence, wearing a wide-brimmed hat and parking her large car in a prominent place.

The DKG's annual meeting started yesterday and continues today and tomorrow morning. An interesting tradition is that at their Saturday morning memorial service to honor those members who died during the year, the women come out of All Saints' Chapel and form a circle. Then, the carillon plays the official society song. Laura Whipple, my teacher and former university carillonneur, told me that the women sang their song to the accompaniment of the carillon. But from inside the playing cabin, it is impossible to know what actually happens!

Each year someone gives me a phone call to tell me when to start, and I have to hope all goes well. One year I got a call just as I finished, saying the women had not all been outside at the start of the song and would I play it again. Last year I got the call and started playing. Only very recently did I learn that the call had come early, that the women were still walking out of the chapel. In following up on this information, I was told that the women did not sing the song anyway. They just listened in silence! This year I am going to observe all the activity from the ground, for the first time. Last year during a tour of the tower for the DKGs, a local woman expressed an interest in learning to play the carillon. Charlene Williamson of Estill Springs has been an excellent student, and she will play this year, thus returning the whole service to being "women only."

On Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday next week (June 13–15), there will be a carillon workshop for seven participants. Please expect to hear a lot of carillon practicing and playing on those days. Please also plan to attend a concluding concert by the participants at 2:30 p.m. on Friday, June 15. The workshop presenter is Geert D'hollander from Belgium. Geert was my composition teacher at the carillon school in Mechelen when I was a student, 2005-06. He is a recognized star in the carillon world, both for his playing and his compositions. 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




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Warm finishes 16th at **National Track & Field**


Freshman Sewanee track and field athlete Sally Warm finished 16th in the women's high jump at the 2012 NCAA Division III National Track and Field Championships in late May.

jump (1.69m—5'6.5") at the Hilltop Twilight Classic.



When it sits on a branch, it wags its tail. Its nest is made of moss, mud and various vegetable substances. If chicken feathers are used, the nest can become infested with lice and mites, which will cause death to the young. The Phoebe is a fly-catcher, so you may see it dart into the air in pursuit of insects."

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Friends of So. Cumberland Meeting


The Friends of South Cumberland State Park will host its annual meeting on Saturday, June 16, at Foster Falls. The events are open to the public, and newcomers are welcome.

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
