New Staff Roles at University

Vice-Chancellor John M. McCardell Jr. recently announced changes in the administrative structure of the University of the South. The adjustments will take better advantage of the skills possessed by individual staff members in advancing the work of the university.

Effective July 1, Jerry Forster became vice president for finance and administration. "This new title reflects my deep appreciation and respect for the work Jerry has done for the University and also more accurately represents the range of duties he carries out," said McCardell. Forster will continue to hold the position of treasurer of the corporation in accordance with the provisions of the university's constitution and ordinances.

Donna Pierce, who has for several years held the positions of both university legal counsel and director of human resources, will transition out of the latter role over the next six months in order to devote her energies to her work as counsel, and will assume some new responsibilities in the executive office. Forster will have administrative oversight for the human resources office.

Sarah Stapleton, who for the last 10 years has served as executive assistant to the vice-chancellor, has accepted a new position as assistant director of institutional research at Sewanee, effective July 18.

Caroline Tanner, C'11, will work as a fellow in the vice-chancellor's office for the coming year. During her time as a student at Sewanee, Tanner served as a student trustee and as a firefighter; those experiences will be helpful in addressing campus issues and projects this year.

TDEC Reports on Regional Water Resources Study

Raising the level of the dam on Big Fiery Gizzard Creek Reservoir in Grundy County is one of the recommended solutions for future drought conditions endorsed by the South Cumberland Regional Water Resources Study released last month. The study, which was conducted by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), was the subject of a July 7 meeting in Monteagle. TDEC officials presented an overview of the study's findings to the public and to representatives from Sewanee Utility District of Franklin and Marion Counties, Tracy City Public Utility, Big Creek Utility and Monteagle Utilities.

The study was conducted after drought conditions in 2007 created concern among the utility district boards that additional water resources were necessary and being interconnected was key to the entire plateau's water supply. More than 15 government and nonprofit agencies participated in the study, including the Land Trust for Tennessee, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency.

The other suggestion deemed feasible was the purchase of Ramsey Lake near Coalmont as an alternate water source for the region's future water needs.

Elaine Boyd, project manager for the study for TDEC, and Lynnis Roehrich-Patrick, with the Tennessee Advisory Commission on Intergovernmental Relations, presented an overview of the study's findings.

The Plateau, because it is located at the head of the watershed, is more dependent on rainfall than other areas of the state. According to their study, water costs are higher on the plateau while incomes are lower than in other parts of Tennessee. Based on population projections for 2030, the water resources currently available to the four area water utilities—Sewanee, Monteagle, Tracy City, and Big Creek—will not be sufficient.

The study considered two additional solutions: constructing a pipeline to transport water from South Pittsburg (for Monteagle Utility), and constructing a new reservoir on Big Creek (for Big Creek Utility). There were concerns about costs for both the pipeline and the new reservoir, and concerns about water quality associated with the pipeline.

TDEC officials reported at the Monteagle meeting about the environmental impact that could be expected to result from decreasing the minimum release and raising the dam on Big Fiery Gizzard Creek (BFGC) Reservoir, the water

WISDOM IN EDUCATION

To the Editor:

Knowledge is knowing a tomato is a fruit. Wisdom is knowing that you don't put it in fruit salad! So use your knowledge to make wise choices.

A great teacher can turn mundane facts and figures into exciting, useful information. If we simply teach to the test, real world translation gets lost. Kids lose interest if they can not relate to what they are learning. History lessons suggest what we should continue doing as a country and when to change our course. Science encourages exploration. Art and music let the right brain shine for a time. With tougher accountability standards, our teachers will face greater pressure to stick to the standards. They may feel they don't have time for the occasional "outside the box" activity. The raised hand becomes an irritation rather than an opportunity to hear the clicking of a young mind at work. It would be a tragedy to miss this.

We must allow our teachers time to find creative ways to teach. No child learns at the same pace. Teaching styles are all different. Let us never feel so rushed and pressured to teach knowledge that we don't have time to instill wisdom.

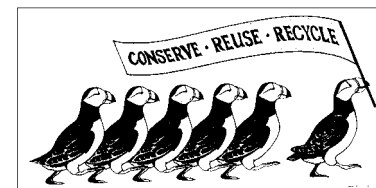

supply source for the Tracy City Public Utility.

The study concluded that the combined sources of raising the Big Fiery Gizzard Creek (BFGC) Reservoir dam and purchasing Ramsey Lake could meet the regions projected needs, if interconnectivity was improved between the utilities to allow for water sharing, and the utilities implemented a drought plan to maximize water conservation in drought conditions. Raising the dam at BFGC Reservoir would satisfy the regions needs without the Ramsey Lake resource if the BFGC reservoir did not have a minimum release requirement.

Robert Baker, of TDEC's Natural Resources division, discussed the impact of altering the reservoir's release amount. The purpose of the minimum release requirement was to insure a sufficient flow for aquatic life in the streams and creeks below the dam.

Baker also explained that the proposal to raise the dam called for a circulation mechanism that would minimize oxygen depletion and the resulting mineral deposits in the water. This will improve the quality of the water released and the quality of the water drawn off for public use.

Tracy City Public Utility is waiting for TDEC to approve its application to raise the BFGC dam. A request to reduce the minimum release would require a modification of the utility's permit, Baker pointed out, but would not affect the pending application for construction.

Lawsuit Against University Moving Toward Trial

The University of the South is being sued for more than \$1 million by a former student who contends that the University forced him to withdraw from school after he was accused of rape in August 2008. The case appears to be headed for a jury trial later this month.

Attorneys for the University and for the student, known as John Doe, met with U.S. District Judge Harry "Sandy" Mattice in Chattanooga on July 11 for a final scheduled hearing before the trial. Mattice reviewed jury selection and court rules for the trial, set the trial date and heard arguments for recent filings by both sides.

The student argues that the accusation against him was false, that the University did not follow its own federally mandated due process rules for sexual-assault cases, and that by forcing him to withdraw from college, the University harmed his reputation and career prospects. The student was not charged with any crime after the alleged rape. He is seeking more than \$1 million in compensatory damages.

"The university strongly disagrees with the allegations made in the complaint," said Donna Pierce, University counsel. "We believe, for example, that the former student did receive a fair hearing by the University. We are pleased that the court has dismissed many of the claims, including all of the parents' claims, made in the original complaint."

The trial is scheduled to begin on July 28.

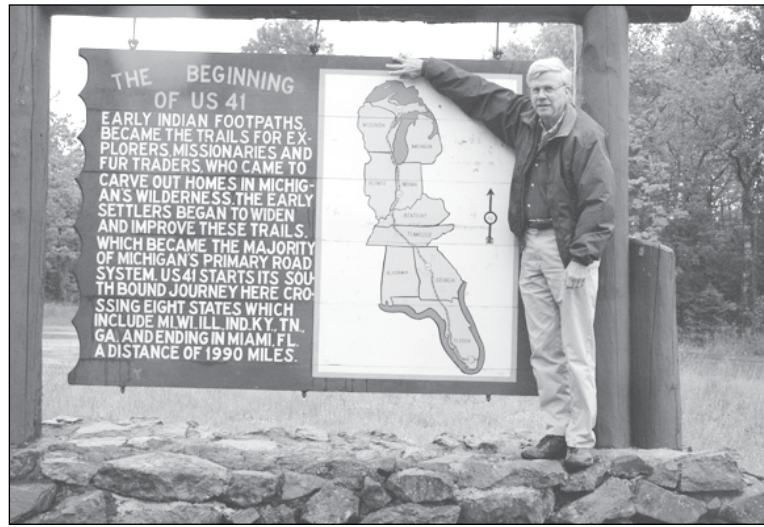

Happy 50th Birthday, John (Part II)

It was almost 10 years ago when I stepped foot on this Mountain for the first time. Like many high school students, I was making my college visit to Sewanee, trying to figure out if this was the place I wanted to spend the next four years. While visiting, I met a man I did not yet realize would be such a big part of my life, nor did I know the role he played in the life of so many others. As I walked out of Fowler that day after my meeting with Coach John Shackelford, I knew Sewanee was the place for me and could not wait to return in the fall.

Many aspects of Sewanee helped shape who I am, but none more than being a part of Tiger Tennis. Like the other freshman players, I stepped onto the courts for my first practice not knowing any of these guys who seemed to be such good friends. The first thing Coach Shack did was send us on a run to the Cross and back. Once we returned, we sat down to stretch while Coach Shack gave us a life lesson I had no idea would come true so many times. He said, "The joy for the raindrop is entering the river."

To a certain degree I knew what he meant. As players we were all a part of something bigger, a team. It took me that whole year to understand we did not just join a team. We were a part of the Tiger Tennis family that Coach Shack and Conchie created many years ago. During my years as a student athlete my teammates and I grew close, and many remain great friends today. What truly gave me this sense of family was getting to know the Tigers that came before and after me. We all left a part of ourselves to the program; we all joined the river.

Several years ago I explained to Coach Shack my desire for a career in college coaching and in no time he helped me find a job. One year ago I took over my own program as a head coach and began to think what kind of atmosphere I wanted to create for my players. The answer was easy, a program centered on family and the greater whole like at Sewanee. While I was trying to create this sense of unity in our program, I was lucky enough to have a former Tiger Tennis player join my coaching staff. Although we never played on the same team, a strong bond existed because of the connection between the different generations of Tigers. Our relationship displayed to my team what it truly means to be a part of a tennis family. It was not easy for my players to think of the big picture, but at the end of their first season, just like myself, they were able to realize the importance of the whole over the individual.

Looking back on my Sewanee career, I don't really remember the wins or the losses. What sticks out in my memory is the way Coach Shack taught us how to grow from boys to men, not only on the court, but demonstrated also in the way he worked, his devotion to his family and his commitment to us as players. This is something all of us are thankful for and will carry with us for a lifetime. On behalf of all the players over the last 25 years, we cannot thank you enough for opening your heart so we could join the river that is Tiger Tennis.

Red-eyed Vireo

Sewanee's springs and summers are blessed with the wonder of a small bird that is olive green and has an ash-colored crown with a dark margined line below it. It sports a white line over the eye with a brownish stripe through it. The ventral throat and breast are whitish, and the eye is ruby-red. Its bill is dusky above and light below, and its feet are dun-colored. These attributes will only be evident if you see the bird up close. It is easy to identify by its song, conveyed from treetops. It consists of a series of warbling notes that have been described as sounding like a long-winded preacher, which gave it the name "preacher bird." The call is described as "wang," which is heard in trees or bushes when the bird is disturbed. The nest is cuplike, hanging and placed in the forked branch of a maple and orchard trees. It is constructed of bark fibers, cobwebs and bits of paper. Usually four eggs are laid, white with brown spots at the larger end. It migrates in the fall to South America. Listen for its warbled series of notes.

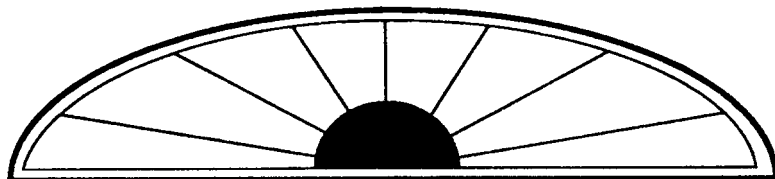

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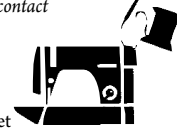
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BARD TOVERSE
