CAC Clients Preregister Friday for Mobile Food Pantry

The final day for preregistration for the Community Action Committee's 2010 Mobile Food Pantry will be Friday, July 23, 8–10 a.m. in the CAC office in Otey parish hall.

This year's Mobile Food Pantry will be on Saturday, August 14, in Cravens Hall.

To ensure that CAC clients receive food, they are allowed to preregister. No one may preregister another person or family—everyone must register in person. If these times

are not convenient, please contact Laura Willis, director of the CAC, at 598-5927.

Only one registration will be allowed per household and an ID will be required. No one living outside CAC's service area (Sewanee, Sherwood, Jump-Off, Midway, Deepwoods, with either a 37375 zip or a 598-prefix phone number) can preregister, even if they have been receiving food on a regular basis.

Sewanee Leaseholders Launch Public Safety Project

The Sewanee Leaseholders Association is initiating a public safety project to facilitate identification of commercial and residential residences on the Domain. Leaseholder leadership has been concerned about a number of leaseholds that lack any numerical markings to pinpoint their location. This is due, in large measure, to a number of people who get their mail at either the U.S. Post Office on University Ave. or the University's Student Post Office (SPO) in Bishop's Common and, therefore, lack mailboxes with house numbers. This has and is causing critical delays for emergency responders to reach a caller in case of an emergency—the Sewanee Volunteer Fire Department, Police Department or Emergency Medical Service (EMS).

Stephen Burnett, president of the Leaseholders Association, confirmed the depth of this issue with public safety leadership, residents and responders and is now pleased, with University staff approval, to offer a cost-effective solution.

The leaseholders have commissioned Gnarled Oak in Coalmont to duplicate the prototype crafted by the University's Physical Plant Services and will offer this marker for sale to leaseholders (and beyond) at cost plus a small handling charge. The charge will be \$20, divided into a \$10 deposit and a \$10 remainder. Visible house numbers will be available and included in the fee.

Look for the Sewanee Community Center open house information in the August 12 issue of the Messenger. The leaseholders are planning two open houses near the end of August. At either open house, leaseholders may inspect the post, fill out a brief reservation form and pay their deposit.

Monteagle Mountain Arts and Crafts Show July 24–25

The Monteagle Mountain Chamber of Commerce and the Town of Monteagle announce the return of the 51st annual Mountain Market Arts and Crafts Show, which will be held on Saturday, July 24, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. and Sunday, July 25, from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. in the Hannah Pickett Park. The event is free to the public.

This craft show is one of the oldest recurring festivals of the South Cumberland Plateau. This year 92 vendors will exhibit handmade crafts and art from all over the United States. Visitors will enjoy pottery demonstrations, archery demonstrations, a kids' moon walk, aero-bungee jump, train rides and gospel music singing. Sarah Mallory and Trapper Haskins will perform.

Food vendors will offer barbecue, funnel cakes, Italian ice, Polish sausages, fried Oreos, grilled corn, Japanese dishes, homemade ice cream and kettle corn.

Sewanee Writers' Conference Wraps Up This Weekend

The 21st annual Sewanee Writers' Conference continues on Thursday, July 22, with a lecture by Jill McCorkle at 10 a.m. Poet Rachel Hadas will read at 4:15 p.m. and fiction writer Randall Kenan at 8:15 p.m. All lectures and readings are held in the Mary Sue Cushman Room of the Bairnwick Women's Center on Mississippi Ave., one block south of University Ave. Admission to all public events is free, but space may be limited.

McCorkle is the author of four story collections, "Crash Diet," "Final Vinyl Days," "Creatures of Habit" and "Going Away Shoes," and five novels, all cited by the New York Times as Notable Books: "The Cheer Leader," "July 7th," "Tending to Virginia," "Ferris Beach" and "Carolina Moon." A recipient of the New England Booksellers Award, the John Dos Passos Literary Prize and the North Carolina Award for Literature, McCorkle teaches at North Carolina State University.

Hadas is a poet, essayist, translator and professor. Her publications include "Classics: Essays," "The Ache of Appetite," "Halfway Down the Hall: New & Selected Poems," a finalist for the 1999 Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize; "Indelible," "Laws," and "The River of Forgetfulness." Since 1981 she has taught in the English department of the Newark campus of Rutgers University. Among her honors are a Guggenheim Fellowship, Ingram Merrill Foundation grants, the O.B. Hardison Award from the Folger Shakespeare Library and an award in literature from the American Academy and Institute of Arts and Letters.

Kenan is the author of five books, including "A Visitation of Spirits"

and "Let the Dead Bury Their Dead," which was a finalist for the National Book Critics Circle Award, nominee for a Los Angeles Times Book Prize for fiction and a New York Times Notable Book for 1992. He teaches creative writing at the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill.

On Friday, July 23, events include a craft lecture by Robert Hass at 11 a.m., a reading at 4:15 p.m. by fiction writer Kevin Wilson and poet Caki Wilkinson, and a reading at 8:15 p.m. by poet Mark Strand.

Hass received the 2007 National Book Award and the 2008 Pulitzer Prize for his book, "Time and Materials: Poems 1997–2005." A two-time winner of the National Book Critics Circle Award, Hass has also received a MacArthur Foundation Fellowship. From 1995 to 1997, he was Poet Laureate of the United States, and he served as chancellor of the American

The Academy for Lifelong Learning at St. Mary's Sewanee is pleased to announce that Lee Allsbrook will be the speaker for the Lunch and Learn program on Thursday, Aug. 12, at noon. His topic will be "The Case for Play: My Experience on the President's Council for Physical Fitness and Sports."

Physical fitness for children, according to Allsbrook, "may be a lot more about process than product. Adults work all their lives trying to be fit, but children, in the process of playing, accomplish the product of fitness much more simply."

Allsbrook served on the President's Council during the administrations of Richard Nixon, Jimmy Carter, Ronald Reagan and Bill Clinton. He is a graduate of East Carolina State University and earned a master's degree in education from the University of North Carolina.

Allsbrook came to Middle Tennessee State University as a faculty member and focused his career on

Academy of Poets from 2001 to 2007. Hass is professor of English at the University of California, Berkeley.

Creative writing administrator of the Sewanee Writers' Conference, Wilson teaches fiction at the University of the South. He has written a story collection, "Tunneling to the Center of the Earth," and his novel "The Family Fang" will be published next summer. Wilson lives in Sewanee with his wife, poet Leigh Anne Couch, and their son, Griff.

Wilkinson is a Sewanee native whose collection of poems, "Circles Where the Head Should Be," won the 2010 Vassar Miller Prize and will be published next spring. Her poems have appeared in The Atlantic, Poetry, Yale Review and other journals. She is working on a doctorate in English from the University of Cincinnati.

Strand has written many volumes of poetry, among them, "The Story of Our Lives," which won the Edgar Allan Poe Award, and "Blizzard of One," winner of the 1999 Pulitzer Prize. He has translated collections of poems and has written three volumes of art criticism and three children's books. He has edited "The Contemporary American Poets" and other poetry anthologies. Strand served as Poet Laureate of the United States in 1990. In 2009 he received the Gold Medal for Poetry from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. He teaches at Columbia University.

The conference closes on Saturday, July 24, with readings by poet Wyatt Prunty and fiction writer Tony Earley at 8:15 p.m.

Prunty, director of the Sewanee Writers' Conference, is Carlton Professor of English at Sewanee and the author of seven collections of poetry,

most recently, "The Lover's Guide to Trapping." He has written a critical work on contemporary poetry, "Fallen from the Symboled World: Precedents for the New Formalism," and edited a collection of essays, "Sewanee Writers on Writing."

Earley is the author of a story collection, "Here We Are in Paradise," which won him recognition from Granta and the New Yorker as one of America's best young fiction writers, and two novels, "Jim the Boy" and "The Blue Star." Earley's collection of personal essays, "Somehow Form a Family," was published by Algonquin in 2001. He is Samuel Milton Fleming Associate Professor of English at Vanderbilt University.

Supported by the Walter E. Dakin Memorial Fund established through the estate of the late Tennessee Williams, the annual Sewanee Writers' Conference offers instruction and criticism to developing writers through a series of workshops, readings and craft lectures in poetry, fiction and playwriting.



Hiroshima Anniversary Observance Takes Place Aug. 5

The anniversary of the dropping of the atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, in 1945 will be observed at a Hiroshima Day Ceremony on Thursday, Aug. 5, at 6 p.m., in Manigault Park. The observance is timed to coincide with the actual event, taking into account the 14-hour time difference.

At approximately 8:15 a.m. Hiroshima time on August 6, 1945, a B-29 bomber named Enola Gay released "Little Boy," its 9,700-pound uranium bomb, over the city. It was a calm and sunny Monday morning. An air raid alert had been called off, a false alarm. The city bustled with activity—commuters on foot or on bicycles, groups of women and children working to clear firebreaks. Approximately 70,000 people died instantly, their bodies reduced to charred cinder. The death toll from burns and radiation sickness exceeded 200,000. Three days later, a second atomic bomb was detonated over the Japanese city of Nagasaki.

Participants at the Hiroshima Day Observance will join in offering readings, music and prayer in remembrance of the suffering and loss Hiroshima occasioned in the hope the world will never again witness such a tragedy. Everyone is invited to attend and make a personal contribution to the ceremony.

Afterwards, there will be a potluck supper. Bring something to share, a chair or quilt to sit on, a plate and

utensils. Beverages will be provided by the Cumberland Center for Justice and Peace, sponsors for the event. For

SAS's Jackson Named Teacher of the Year in Theatre

Robie Jackson, St. Andrew's-Sewanee School Performing Arts coordinator, was recently honored as the 2010 Teacher of the Year in Theatre by the Tennessee Governor's School for the Arts. Jackson was introduced and presented with her plaque of recognition by Kami Spaulding, a rising senior at SAS, who attended the Governor's School where she studied technical theater. The Teacher of the Year was chosen from among the many outstanding teachers nominated by Governor's

School participants.

The award recognizes Jackson for excellence in arts education. In addition to her role as performing arts coordinator at SAS, Jackson teaches drama and is a co-lead house parent. Under her leadership, SAS has developed a robust performing arts program, including professional performances in McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts and the addition of courses in filmmaking. This year the school will add an orchestral ensemble to its music offerings. Prior

to coming to St. Andrew's-Sewanee School, Jackson served as performing arts department chair at University School of Nashville. She was also theater director for several Nashville youth programs.

The Tennessee Governor's School for the Arts is a four-week summer program for rising 11th- and 12th-grade students in Tennessee. Administered by the State Department of Education, the program offers intensive study programs in art, dance, filmmaking, theatre and music. Students are selected in competitive auditions, usually during the months of January or February. Those eligible to audition are Tennessee residents who attend public, private and home schools within the state. The curriculum includes individual and group instruction in music, ballet, theatre, filmmaking and visual art.

F.C. School District Launches \$1.6 Million Energy Project

The Franklin County Board of Education has just completed implementation of a \$1,595,415 energy efficiency improvement project with their energy partner—Excel Energy Group, Inc. The project involved upgrading and controlling the antiquated lighting system in the 15 major buildings within Franklin County Schools' purview. Through grant funding and low interest rate loans, the entire project is paid for with no capital outlay and solely with the energy and maintenance savings generated by the upgrades. Excel guarantees the project will generate more annual savings than annual expenses, meaning the district will retain more of its budget to devote to other necessary expenditures. If the savings generated do not cover the total cost of the project, Excel will refund any shortfall to the Franklin County schools.

The total scope of the project encompassed 15 buildings and involved the updating or replacement of nearly 25,000 lighting fixtures. To fund this initiative, Franklin County Schools has been awarded \$128,384 in Energy Efficient Schools Initiative (EESI) grant funding, plus \$139,072 in rebate incentive money from the

Tennessee Valley Authority. The balance of the project is being funded with a combination of zero percent and low interest financing.

The improvements will generate over \$213,000 in energy and demand savings per year. The project will account for nearly \$230,000 in annual savings for the district. The upgrades will ultimately eliminate over 2.3 million kilowatt-hours of electricity every year. That represents a more than 60 percent reduction in the district's current lighting expenses.

The district will realize the benefits of these upgrades for years to come. The upgrade will reduce overhead, saving a million dollars over five years, will improve light levels and the learning environment for students, and benefit the environment as well. These state-of-the-art efficient fixtures burn brighter, last substantially longer and require less money to maintain. Through grants, incentives, low interest financing and energy savings guarantees, the school district will not only be able to implement all these upgrades without capital outlay, but will also enjoy a positive cash flow throughout the life of the project.





The Sewanee TigerSharks nailed seven championships in a row (and 13 out of the last 15 years), with their RACE League victory at the Fowler Center pool on July 17. Sewanee out-swam their nearest competitor by 559 points to finish first in the nine-team field and complete another undefeated season.

"We had a phenomenal day," said head coach Max Obermiller. "The 10 and under age group started us off great, and the older kids just dominated the meet. A total of 72 TigerSharks scored points for the home team. Ethan Evans (12) and Anna Obermiller (18) set the pace for the champions by winning two individual events each and finishing second in their

third event. Their scores of 57 points, along with contributing legs to two relay victories each for their age groups, aided the team in securing a comfortable victory. Six-year-old "phenom" Zolan Knoll scored 55 individual points by winning the 6 and under 25m back and free races and finishing fourth in the 8 and under 25m fly. Other TigerSharks individual champions were Jacob Hanson (10) 25m back; Kayla Yokley (18) 50m free; Nick Evans (18) 50m breast; and Moira Buck (15) in the 50m fly.

Record-setters for the TigerSharks included Aidan Smith (8), who broke the 25 breast record (but finished third in the event). Anna Obermiller capped a memorable career spanning 14 years by setting the record in the women's 15–18 50m breaststroke. Over the span of her career she has established league records in every age group, many still standing. Finally, the 15–18 team of Anna Obermiller, Nick Evans, Zach Blount (15), and Kayla Yokley broke the record in the 100m mixed medley relay, swimming to a 58.88 time that bested their nearest competitor by five seconds.

Nature Notes

Passionflowers Bloom at Lake Cheston

On July 14, **Harry Yeatman** and **Joy Dog** went to Lake Cheston and parked in the lower area, crossed the dam and the wooden bridge to the path. On the left side of the walk, two beautiful Passionflowers were in bloom. This is Tennessee's state wildflower. The bloom is three inches wide, with whitish-blue tepals, which are made up of five petals and five sepals that alternate around the corona and filaments. Most people think they are petals. They are supposed to represent the apostles—only ten, because St. Peter denied knowing Christ and Judas betrayed him. At the top of the flower are three stigmas that represent the three crosses in the crucifixion, and the corona represents the crown of thorns. The flower was used in teaching early Christians about the passion of Christ. The blossoms grow into a lemon-sized and -shaped fruit that is multi-seeded, but very edible. It is sometimes called an apricot vine. The leaf lobes are three-lobed and pointed at their tips. Gulf Fritillary and Varigated Fritillary butterflies feed on the leaves when they are caterpillars, and various adult butterflies feed on the flower nectar. This plant is a very desirable vine when it blooms in late summer. It deserves to be our state wildflower.



Black Bear Continues to Raid Local Feeders

The black bear wandering the Sewanee area has recently been reported by **Charles Tocco** in his yard on Deepwoods Road. It probably came into Tennessee from the Bankhead area of northern Alabama. It has raided bird feeders of sunflower seed in the yards of the Yeatmans, **Linda Peters**, **Carol Vibbarta**, the **Millars** and the **Wintons**. It is not a danger to people or pets and tries to avoid them. Tocco has reported that the Montecagle police say that a mother bear and two cubs have been seen there.

Gray Fox Cubs Meet Woodchuck

Two weeks ago when **David and Marion Kearley** spotted from their kitchen window a mature gray fox in their back yard, they began putting out a plate of dog food and a bowl of water, which the fox consumed. Predominantly gray, it had a prominent snout, brown fur on its neck and a long black tail. Friday, July 16, they watched two cubs (young foxes) eating dog food and drinking water. About 30 feet away a woodchuck, about twice their size, came up to the edge of his hole and watched the cubs eating. When the cubs saw the woodchuck, their curiosity was aroused and they cautiously approached it to within 10 feet. The woodchuck reacted by retreating into his hole. After the cubs returned to the University forest, the woodchuck came out to graze on grass and eat insects. On Saturday, July 17, two cubs appeared again and ate dog food and drank water. When two more cubs arrived on the scene, they were not welcomed by the first two, who snarled, pushed them away and finished eating the food.




