The Sewanee Leaseholders Association is initiating a public safety project to facilitate identification of commercial and residential residences on the Domain. Leaseholder leadership has been concerned about a number of leaseholds that lack any numerical markings to pinpoint their location. McCorkle is the author of four story collections, "Crash Diet," "Final Vinyl Days,""Creatures of Habit" and "Going Away Shoes," and five novels, all cited by the New York Times as Notable Books: "The Cheer Leader," July 7th," "Tending to Virginia," "Ferris Beach" and "Carolina Moon." A recipient of the New England Booksellers Award, the John Dos Passos Literary Prize and the North Carolina Award (Continued on page 12) for Literature, McCorkle teaches at served as chancellor of the American North Carolina State University.

Hadas is a poet, essayist, translator and professor. Her publications include "Classics: Essays;" "The Ache of Appetite;" "Halfway Down the Hall: New & Selected Poems," a finalist for the 1999 Lenore Marshall Poetry Prize; "Indelible;" "Laws;" and 'The River of Forgetfulness." Academy of Poets from 2001 to 2007. Hass is professor of English at the University of California, Berkeley.

Creative writing administrator of the Sewanee Writers' Conference, Wilson teaches fiction at the University of the South. He has written a story collection, "Tunneling to the Center of the Earth," and his novel "The Family Fang" will be published next summer. Wilson lives in Sewanee with his wife, poet Leigh Anne Couch, and their son, Griff.

Wilkinson is a Sewanee native whose collection of poems, "Circles Where the Head Should Be," won the 2010 Vassar Miller Prize and will be published next spring. Her poems have appeared in The Atlantic, Poetry, Yale Review and other journals. She is working on a doctorate in English from the University of Cincinnati.

Strand has written many volumes of poetry, among them, "The Story of Our Lives," which won the Edgar Allan Poe Award, and "Blizzard of One," winner of the 1999 Pulitzer Prize. He has translated collections of poems and has written three volumes of art criticism and three children's books. He has edited "The Contemporary American Poets" and other poetry anthologies. Strand served as Poet Laureate of the United States in 1990. In 2009 he received the Gold Medal for Poetry from the American Academy of Arts and Letters. He teaches at Columbia University.

The conference closes on Saturday, July 24, with readings by poet Wyatt Prunty and fiction writer Tony Earley at 8:15 p.m.

Prunty, director of the Sewanee Writers' Conference, is Carlton Professor of English at Sewanee and the author of seven collections of poetry,

most recently, "The Lover's Guide to Trapping." He has written a critical work on contemporary poetry, "Fallen from the Symboled World: Precedents for the New Formalism," and edited a collection of essays, 'Sewanee Writers on Writing."


Earley is the author of a story collection, "Here We Are in Paradise," which won him recognition from Granta and the New Yorker as one of America's best young fiction writers, and two novels, "Jim the Boy" and "The Blue Star." Earley's collection of personal essays, "Somehow Form a Family," was published by Algonquin in 2001. He is Samuel Milton Fleming Associate Professor of English at Vanderbilt University.

At approximately 8:15 a.m. Hiroshima time on August 6, 1945, a B-29 bomber named Enola Gay released "Little Boy," its 9,700-pound uranium bomb, over the city. It was a calm and sunny Monday morning. An air raid alert had been called off, a false alarm. The city bustled with activity commuters on foot or on bicycles, groups of women and children working to clear firebreaks. Approximately 70,000 people died instantly, their bodies reduced to charred cinder. The death toll from burns and radiation sickness exceeded 200,000. Three days later, a second atomic bomb was detonated over the Japanese city of Nagasaki.

not pay state or local sales tax on select clothing with a price of \$100 or less per item, school and art supplies with a price of \$100 or less per item, and computers with a price of \$1,500 or less.

Examples of exempt items include: Clothing—Shirts, dresses, pants, coats, gloves and mittens, hats and caps, hosiery, neckties, belts, sneakers, shoes, athletic or nonathletic uniforms and scarves;

School Supplies—Binders, book bags, calculators, tape, chalk, crayons, erasers, folders, glue, pens, pencils, lunch boxes, notebooks, paper and

Art Supplies—Clay and glazes; acrylic, tempera and oil paints; paintbrushes for artwork; sketch and drawing pads; and watercolors

Computers—Central processing unit (CPU), along with various other components, including monitor, keyboard, mouse, cables to connect components and preloaded software. (Note: While the CPU may be purchased separately, other items must be part of a bundled computer package in order to be eligible.) iPad's are eligible for tax exemption; video games and consoles are not.



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Nature Notes

Passionflowers Bloom at Lake Cheston

On July 14, Harry Yeatman and Joy Dog went to Lake Cheston and parked in the lower area, crossed the dam and the wooden bridge to

the path. On the left side of the walk, two beautiful Passionflowers were in bloom. This is Tennessee's state wildflower. The bloom is three inches wide, with whitish-blue tepals, which are made up of five petals and five sepals that alternate around the corona and filaments. Most people think they are petals. They are supposed to represent the apostles—only ten, because St. Peter denied knowing Christ and Judas betrayed him. At the



top of the flower are three stigmas that represent the three crosses in the crucifixion, and the corona represents the crown of thorns. The flower was used in teaching early Christians about the passion of Christ. The blossoms grow into a lemon-sized and -shaped fruit that is multi-seeded, but very edible. It is sometimes called an apricot vine. The leaf lobes are three-lobed and pointed at their tips. Gulf Fritillary and Varigated Fritillary butterflies feed on the leaves when they are caterpillars, and various adult butterflies feed on the flower nectar. This plant is a very desirable vine when it blooms in late summer. It deserves to be our state wildflower.

Black Bear Continues to Raid Local Feeders

The black bear wandering the Sewanee area has recently been reported by **Charles Tocco** in his yard on Deepwoods Road. It probably came into Tennessee from the Bankhead area of northern Alabama. It has raided bird feeders of sunflower seed in the yards of the Yeatmans, Linda Peters, Carol Vibbarta, the Millars and the Wintons. It is not a danger to people or pets and tries to avoid them. Tocco has reported that the Monteagle police say that a mother bear and two cubs have been seen there.

Gray Fox Cubs Meet Woodchuck

Two weeks ago when **David and Marion Kearley** spotted from their kitchen window a mature gray fox in their back yard, they began putting out a plate of dog food and a bowl of water, which the fox consumed. Predominantly gray, it had a prominent snout, brown fur on its neck and a long black tail. Friday, July 16, they watched two cubs (young foxes) eating dog food and drinking water. About 30 feet away a woodchuck, about twice their size, came up to the edge of his hole and watched the cubs eating. When the cubs saw the woodchuck, their curiosity was aroused and they cautiously approached it to within 10 feet. The woodchuck reacted by retreating into his hole. After the cubs returned to the University forest, the woodchuck came out to graze on grass and eat insects. On Saturday, July 17, two cubs appeared again and ate dog food and drank water. When two more cubs arrived on the scene, they were not welcomed by the first two, who snarled, pushed them away and finished eating the food.
