

Writers' Conference Begins 22nd Year

Jill McCorkle kicks off 12 days of readings and lectures

Celebrating its 22nd summer session, the Sewanee Writers' Conference will take place from Tuesday, July 26, through Saturday, August 6, featuring readings, panels and lectures by a distinguished faculty and nationally recognized editors, publishers and literary agents.

The conference will begin with a reading by fiction writer Jill McCorkle at 8:15 p.m., Tuesday, July 26. The reading is free, open to the public, and will be in the Mary Susan Cushman Room of the Bairnwick Women's Center.

McCorkle is the author of four story collections: "Crash Diet," "Final Vinyl

Days," "Creatures of Habit" and "Going Away Shoes"; and five novels, all cited as notable books by the New York Times: "The Cheer Leader," "July 7th," "Tending to Virginia," "Ferris Beach" and "Čarolina Moon." A recipient of the New England Booksellers Award, the John Dos Passos Literary Prize and the North Carolina Award for Literature, Mc-Corkle teaches at North Carolina State University.

The conference will continue with readings by a number of highly acclaimed authors, including National Book Award winners (Alice McDermott will read at 4:15 p.m., Wednesday, July 27,

and John Casey will read at 8:15 p.m., Saturday, July 30) and Pulitzer Prize winning authors (Claudia Emerson will read at 4:15 p.m., Thursday, July 28, and Beth Henley will read at 8:15 p.m., Thursday, July 28).

Among the award-winning poets who will read are Daniel Anderson, B. H. Fairchild, Debora Greger, Mark Jarman, William Logan, Charles Martin and Mary Jo Salter. Acclaimed fiction writers Tony Earley, Randall Kenan, Margot Livesey, Christine Schutt and Steve Yarbrough, as well as esteemed playwright Dan O'Brien, will offer readings during the conference.

Editors from Penguin, Knopf, Grove/Atlantic, Algonquin Books, Poetry, The Atlantic, The Kenyon Review and many other journals and publishers will offer panels on publishing and editing.

Writers Tom Franklin, Erin McGraw, Christine Schutt and Bob Shacochis will take part in a tribute to the late Barry Hannah, legendary Southern writer and longtime friend of the conference.

on Budget

The Franklin County Board of Education will have a special called meeting to discuss the budget at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, July 26, at the Board of Education offices, 215 S. College St., Winchester.

On July 19, the Franklin County Commissioners rejected the school board's budget for next year. The Franklin County School System is projecting a \$3 million shortfall in the 2012-13 budget. The Commissioners asked the school board to cut \$300,000 for the 2011-12 budget, 10 percent of next year's anticipated deficit, as well as to start preparing for adjustments to balance the 2012-13 budget. Among items under consideration are raising taxes, implementing a wheel tax, reducing busing service for students or closing at least one school.

Sewanee's representative to the school board is Chris McDonough. Johnny Hughes and Arthur Knoll are representatives on the County Commission.

Applications for the prekindergarten classes in Franklin County are being taken now at the Board of Education office in Winchester. There will not be pre-K registration at individual schools.

If you have a child who will turn 4 years of age on or before September 30, you are encouraged to apply for the preschool program. With the application, you must provide proof of income, proof of residency, a certified birth certificate, social security number, immunization and physical record and insurance card. Priority

HIROSHIMAAND YOU To the Editor:

On August 6, 1945, on a calm, sunny morning, a B-29 bomber released a 9,700-pound uranium bomb over the city if Hiroshima, Japan. The city was bustling: commuters on foot or on bicycles, women and children clearing firebreaks. 70,000 people died instantly, their bodies reduced to charred cinder. 200,000 more died from burns and radiation sickness.

In the hope that the world will never again witness such a tragedy, the Cumberland Center for Justice and Peace will host a free screening of the documentary "The Forgotten Bomb," at 7 p.m., on Friday, Aug. 5, at the Sewanee Community Center. The film explores the rationale behind bombing Japan, the ongoing campaign to sell children on the necessity of a nuclear arsenal, the lingering health effects on military personnel and civilians from nuclear testing and exposure at bomb plants where the weapons are made, and takes viewers behind the scenes into the homes of hibakusha (A-bomb survivors) in Japan.

In today's world, the only check on the use of nuclear weapons is the threat of Mutually Assured Destruction that is, any nation launching a bomb can be assured that the targeted nation will retaliate with a counter nuclear attack before the bomb strikes.

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



EHH News

For the month of June, utilization of Emerald-Hodgson Hospital's (EHH) facilities met or exceeded expectations in all departments except for emergency room visits.

Compared to June of 2010, general admissions were above the budgeted prediction by 18 percent, observation visits were above projections by 37 percent, and outpatient visits were 6 percent higher than anticipated. Skilled care admissions matched budgeted levels. Emergency room visits were 12 percent lower than anticipated, but only down 3 percent compared to last year.



The Sewanee Police Department (SPD) recently issued its report on activities for the month of June 2011.

Sewanee Police Report

Last month, the SPD patrolled 6,205 miles, investigated one vehicle accident and issued two moving violations. It also issued one nonmoving traffic violation and six warnings.

It made one arrest for a drug law violation, no arrests for liquor law violations, and filed six theft reports. There were no DUI arrests made in the month.

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

Tax-Free Days in August

The State of Tennessee's annual sales tax holiday is held every year on the first Friday in August and ends the following Sunday night. This year's tax-free holiday weekend begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 5, and ends Sunday, Aug. 7, at 11:59 p.m.

During the holiday, clothing with a purchase price of \$100 or less per item is exempt from sales tax. Clothing items costing more than \$100 or any clothing purchased for use by a trade or business is not exempt from tax. There is no requirement that purchases be made only for students.

School supplies (including art supplies) with a purchase price of \$100 or less per item are exempt from sales tax. Specifically excluded are items such as instructional material, including reference books and computer supplies (compact discs, printers, and printer ink).

Computers with a purchase price of \$1,500 or less, not for use in a trade or business, are exempt from tax during the weekend. Laptop computers, if priced at \$1,500 or less, also qualify as well as tablet computers. Additionally, there is no requirement that purchases be made only for students.

CCJP Screens Hiroshima Film

The anniversary of the dropping of an atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, will be observed with a screening of the documentary, "The Forgotten Bomb," at 7 p.m., Friday, Aug. 5, at the Sewanee Community Center. The film considers the political and legal implications of nuclear weapons, as well as the cultural and psychological reasons behind the existence of the nuclear arsenal. Filmmaker Bud Ryan goes into the homes of survivors in Japan, to an abandoned uranium mine in New Mexico and to an underground Titan missile silo in Arizona.

Taking into account the 14-hour time difference, the screening of the film will coincide with the release of the first atomic bomb over Hiroshima at about 8:15 a.m., Aug. 6, 1945. More than 70,000 people died immediately; the death toll from burns and radiation sickness exceeded 200,000.

Following the film, there will be a discussion of the current state of nuclear weapons policy and an opportunity to share readings and remembrances as a memorial to the suffering and loss Hiroshima occasioned.



Maybe you think my game improved after a month of Tiger Tennis Camp. Nope. I spent the last month at Governor's School where I never picked up a racquet. The truth is, my Dad is getting old.

I know my Dad does not care that he lost. He loves sports and competition, but he never looks at the result of a game as simply who won and who lost. He thrives on the action throughout the game: the heated moments, the comebacks and the pure love for playing the sport. If he can't make it to one of my or my sisters' tennis matches, basketball or soccer games, we'll call him up to tell him how it went. The first thing he asks is not "Did you win?" but, "How did you play?" It does not matter to him if there is an "L" or "W" in the book because to him the score does not define a team's success. (Of course, as a coach he loves the Ws.)

My Dad makes fun of me for being a perfectionist. While it can be beneficial because I set high standards for myself, my perfectionism can be problematic when I look solely at the result of a match or game. I'll lose a match and tell my Dad I played terrible, or make a B on a paper, and consider it a poor grade. But by looking at my defeats this way, I'm setting myself up to fail.

In May, I played in the tennis state championship for my high school's division. In eighth grade, I played in the same tournament. That year, I didn't really know what I was getting into, I knew I was playing the sport I loved. I won the tournament that year.

This year, I walked onto the court with the goal of winning again. After I lost in the semifinals, I sobbed to my Dad as if it was the end of the world. He comforted me with his gentle words of wisdom.

"Truth is," he explained, "there's only one girl that's going to go home the state champion. That doesn't make anyone else in this tournament less of a winner. You can't play tennis to be that one winner. You have to play because you enjoy it. You have to love the battle."

Like my Dad, I'll always prefer the Ws to the Ls. But he has showed me how much more there is to sports than winning. In a few years, I won't remember my win-loss record. I'll remember the long rallies, the sun's heat and my passion for competing in the sport I love.



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Japanese Beetles


Adult Japanese beetles have come out of their pupal cases in underground tunnels and are now copulating and eating various leaves, fruit and tender stems of shrubbery on many kinds of plants. This harmful insect came to America by stowing away on ships, mailed packages, etc. They were first seen in New Jersey in 1916, and quickly spread to New York, Maryland, etc., and are now everywhere in eastern North America. An effort was made to bring in the beetle's Japanese enemies, such as various parasitic flies, but these have not controlled the numbers here. Birds eat many, and funnel traps have helped to reduce the numbers. After eating plants and mating, females dig into the ground and lay eggs. These hatch into larvae that grow and moult. They feed on root juices all winter and people call them grubs. They pupate and come out in the spring. We wish they had stayed in Japan since they are so difficult to control.




