

Writers' Conference Begins 22nd Year

Jill McCorkle kicks off 12 days of readings and lectures

Celebrating its 22nd summer session, the Sewanee Writers' Conference will take place from Tuesday, July 26, through Saturday, August 6, featuring readings, panels and lectures by a distinguished faculty and nationally recognized editors, publishers and literary agents.

The conference will begin with a reading by fiction writer Jill McCorkle at 8:15 p.m., Tuesday, July 26. The reading is free, open to the public, and will be in the Mary Susan Cushman Room of the Bairnwick Women's Center.

McCorkle is the author of four story collections: "Crash Diet," "Final Vinyl Days," "Creatures of Habit" and "Going Away Shoes"; and five novels, all cited as notable books by the New York Times: "The Cheer Leader," "July 7th," "Tending to Virginia," "Ferris Beach" and "Carolina Moon." A recipient of the New England Booksellers Award, the John Dos Passos Literary Prize and the North Carolina Award for Literature, McCorkle teaches at North Carolina State University.

The conference will continue with readings by a number of highly acclaimed authors, including National Book Award winners (Alice McDermott will read at 4:15 p.m., Wednesday, July 27, and John Casey will read at 8:15 p.m., Saturday, July 30) and Pulitzer Prize winning authors (Claudia Emerson will read at 4:15 p.m., Thursday, July 28, and Beth Henley will read at 8:15 p.m., Thursday, July 28).

Among the award-winning poets who will read are Daniel Anderson, B. H. Fairchild, Debora Greger, Mark Jarman, William Logan, Charles Martin and Mary Jo Salter. Acclaimed fiction writers Tony Earley, Randall Kenan, Margot Livesey, Christine Schutt and Steve Yarbrough, as well as esteemed playwright Dan O'Brien, will offer readings during the conference.

Editors from Penguin, Knopf, Grove/Atlantic, Algonquin Books, Poetry, The Atlantic, The Kenyon Review and many other journals and publishers will offer panels on publishing and editing.

Writers Tom Franklin, Erin McGraw, Christine Schutt and Bob Shacochis will take part in a tribute to the late Barry Hannah, legendary Southern writer and longtime friend of the conference.

Music Festival Final Weekend Events

The Sewanee Summer Music Festival presents its final events this weekend. In all, six concerts will take place in the final three days, today (July 22) through Sunday, July 24.

The final student chamber music concerts are at 7:30 p.m., today (July 22) in Guerry Auditorium, and at 2:30 p.m., Saturday, July 23, in Guerry Garth. These free concerts are the last opportunity to hear the 2011 festival students play in their chamber music groups.

At 7:30 p.m., Saturday, July 23, the Faculty Chamber Music Series will have its final concert, followed at 10 p.m. by the annual Festival Brass Concert in All Saints' Chapel. The faculty concert will feature Beethoven's "Archduke Trio," the performance of which is dedicated to the memory of SSMF faculty artist Tom Moore. Also on the program are Charles Martin Loeffler's "Two Rhapsodies for Oboe, Viola and Piano" and Walter Piston's "Divertimento" for nine instruments.

On Sunday, July 24, Maestro Donato Cabrera, resident conductor of the San Francisco Symphony and music director of the San Francisco Symphony Youth Orchestra, will open the afternoon with a conductor talk, free to the public, at 1:30 p.m., in Guerry Hall. Later in the afternoon, he will conduct the Sewanee Symphony in Gustav Mahler's colossal Symphony No. 1, "Titan." The program opens with Christopher Rouse's "The Infernal Machine." This concert begins at 3:30 p.m.

The Cumberland Orchestra will open the afternoon at 2:30 p.m., under the direction of Jason Altieri, assistant conductor of the Reno Philharmonic and director of orchestras at the University of Nevada. The orchestra will perform works by Saint-Saens, Mussorgsky, Delius and Sibelius.

Unless otherwise noted, concerts will be in Guerry Auditorium. Tickets can be purchased for \$12 at the door or online at <sewanee music festival.org>. WUTS 91.3 FM, the University's campus radio station, will offer live broadcasts of most of the major concerts of the festival. These concerts will also stream live via the station's website, <www.wutsmf.org>. Live video streaming is available for most concerts on the SSMF website.

Special School Board Meeting on Budget

The Franklin County Board of Education will have a special called meeting to discuss the budget at 6:30 p.m., Tuesday, July 26, at the Board of Education offices, 215 S. College St., Winchester.

On July 19, the Franklin County Commissioners rejected the school board's budget for next year. The Franklin County School System is projecting a \$3 million shortfall in the 2012-13 budget. The Commissioners asked the school board to cut \$300,000 for the 2011-12 budget, 10 percent of next year's anticipated deficit, as well as to start preparing for adjustments to balance the 2012-13 budget. Among items under consideration are raising taxes, implementing a wheel tax, reducing busing service for students or closing at least one school.

Sewanee's representative to the school board is Chris McDonough. Johnny Hughes and Arthur Knoll are representatives on the County Commission.

"Sewanee Elementary School is ready for another fantastic school year," said Mike Maxon, SES principal. "We are ready to welcome everyone back!" he said. With the opening of SES approaching on Monday, Aug. 8, Maxon said class rosters will be posted no later than August 1.

And with the departure of Courtney Gibson, Alicia Wall will move to second grade, he said. Most teachers have been in their rooms making preparations for opening day. The PTO, with the assistance of Citizens State Bank, will be completing the landscaping around the SES campus.

Prekindergarten Application Deadline July 29

Applications for the prekindergarten classes in Franklin County are being taken now at the Board of Education office in Winchester. There will not be pre-K registration at individual schools.

If you have a child who will turn 4 years of age on or before September 30, you are encouraged to apply for the preschool program. With the application, you must provide proof of income, proof of residency, a certified birth certificate, social security number, immunization and physical record and insurance card. Priority

HIROSHIMA AND YOU

To the Editor:

On August 6, 1945, on a calm, sunny morning, a B-29 bomber released a 9,700-pound uranium bomb over the city of Hiroshima, Japan. The city was bustling: commuters on foot or on bicycles, women and children clearing firebreaks. 70,000 people died instantly, their bodies reduced to charred cinder. 200,000 more died from burns and radiation sickness.

In the hope that the world will never again witness such a tragedy, the Cumberland Center for Justice and Peace will host a free screening of the documentary "The Forgotten Bomb," at 7 p.m., on Friday, Aug. 5, at the Sewanee Community Center. The film explores the rationale behind bombing Japan, the ongoing campaign to sell children on the necessity of a nuclear arsenal, the lingering health effects on military personnel and civilians from nuclear testing and exposure at bomb plants where the weapons are made, and takes viewers behind the scenes into the homes of hibakusha (A-bomb survivors) in Japan.

In today's world, the only check on the use of nuclear weapons is the threat of Mutually Assured Destruction—that is, any nation launching a bomb can be assured that the targeted nation will retaliate with a counter nuclear attack before the bomb strikes.

If you have concerns about nuclear weapons or are just remotely curious, "The Forgotten Bomb" is a must-see. The film will be followed by a discussion on the current state of nuclear policy. Special thanks to the Sewanee Community Chest for the funding to make this film possible.

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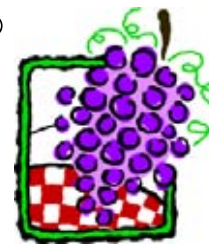

EHH News

For the month of June, utilization of Emerald-Hodgson Hospital's (EHH) facilities met or exceeded expectations in all departments except for emergency room visits.

Compared to June of 2010, general admissions were above the budgeted prediction by 18 percent, observation visits were above projections by 37 percent, and outpatient visits were 6 percent higher than anticipated. Skilled care admissions matched budgeted levels. Emergency room visits were 12 percent lower than anticipated, but only down 3 percent compared to last year.

EHH did not select an employee honoree in June, but will resume the recognition program in July.

King Appointed to Historical Society Board

The Rev. Dr. Benjamin J. King, assistant professor of church history at the School of Theology at The University of the South, has been appointed to the board of directors of the Historical Society of the Episcopal Church.

"My own research into the first centuries of Church history, as well as into nineteenth-century writers from across the Anglican Communion, puts me in an interesting position regarding the debates that affect our Communion today," King said.

"I hope the Historical Society can help inform the discussions in the Episcopal Church as well as worldwide as to what are the essentials of our common faith."

Tax-Free Days in August

The State of Tennessee's annual sales tax holiday is held every year on the first Friday in August and ends the following Sunday night. This year's tax-free holiday weekend begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, Aug. 5, and ends Sunday, Aug. 7, at 11:59 p.m.

During the holiday, clothing with a purchase price of \$100 or less per item is exempt from sales tax. Clothing items costing more than \$100 or any clothing purchased for use by a trade or business is not exempt from tax. There is no requirement that purchases be made only for students.

School supplies (including art supplies) with a purchase price of \$100 or less per item are exempt from sales tax. Specifically excluded are items such as instructional material, including reference books and computer supplies (compact discs, printers, and printer ink).

Computers with a purchase price of \$1,500 or less, not for use in a trade or business, are exempt from tax during the weekend. Laptop computers, if priced at \$1,500 or less, also qualify as well as tablet computers. Additionally, there is no requirement that purchases be made only for students.

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CCJP Screens Hiroshima Film

The anniversary of the dropping of an atomic bomb on Hiroshima, Japan, will be observed with a screening of the documentary, "The Forgotten Bomb," at 7 p.m., Friday, Aug. 5, at the Sewanee Community Center. The film considers the political and legal implications of nuclear weapons, as well as the cultural and psychological reasons behind the existence of the nuclear arsenal. Filmmaker Bud Ryan goes into the homes of survivors in Japan, to an abandoned uranium mine in New Mexico and to an underground Titan missile silo in Arizona.

Taking into account the 14-hour time difference, the screening of the film will coincide with the release of the first atomic bomb over Hiroshima at about 8:15 a.m., Aug. 6, 1945. More than 70,000 people died immediately; the death toll from burns and radiation sickness exceeded 200,000.

Following the film, there will be a discussion of the current state of nuclear weapons policy and an opportunity to share readings and remembrances as a memorial to the suffering and loss Hiroshima occasioned.

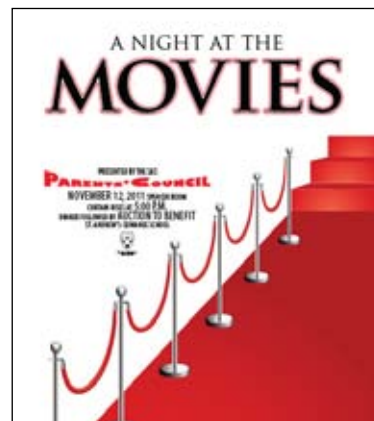

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SAS Moves to Eight-Man Football this Fall

At the end of the 2010 football season, St. Andrew's-Sewanee School faced a dilemma. With an original football roster of 19 whittled down to 11 healthy boys to play the final three games, SAS could take a week off and hope for a miracle or face the hard facts and forfeit the remainder of the season. In the end, SAS ended up forfeiting the last three games. "It was a very difficult situation," said Ellis Mayfield, athletic director and head football coach.

For much of the fall season Mayfield had struggled with a decision: to commit to playing another two years in the TSSAA Division IIA Middle East Region or to move the team to the Middle Tennessee Athletic Conference's eight-man league. The difficult end to the 2010 season made the wisdom of moving to MTAC obvious.

"Our boys love football; it is part of our school culture and our 143-year history," said Mayfield. "So when the MTAC invited us to join, we seized

the opportunity to continue to play the game but with fewer players."

"I had seen the high scores and was intrigued," Mayfield said. "I went to Nashville to watch their championship game and saw some good football—lots of offense with eight players per side going full out, running, passing, blocking and tackling. This league opens up a brand new possibility of games that are competitive, where we can play for a championship, and that's

the whole point. We want our students' athletic experience to be meaningful, safe and fun. I am very excited to get our new season going."

SAS's schedule this year will include Franklin Classical, Aaron Academy, the Middle Tennessee Heat, Sacred Heart, Christian Community School, Franklin Christian Academy, Holloway and rival Webb School in Bell Buckle. Football is a new sport for Webb.

Twelve other SAS varsity teams will continue to compete within TSSAA. The school also fields a varsity swim team, which is not a TSSAA-sanctioned sport. In all, the school fields 27 teams at the varsity, junior varsity and middle school level. As many as 60 percent of SAS students participate in interscholastic sports in a given season. The school's athletics policy encourages three-sport athletes and nurtures both the intensely driven athlete and the student who pursues athletics for fitness, discipline and camaraderie.

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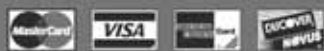

P.S. I'm only joking about your age. I have the privilege of having you as a dad, and that will never get old.

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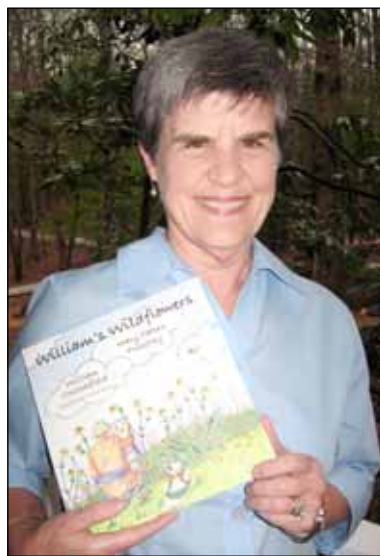

Japanese Beetles

Adult Japanese beetles have come out of their pupal cases in underground tunnels and are now copulating and eating various leaves, fruit and tender stems of shrubbery on many kinds of plants. This harmful insect came to America by stowing away on ships, mailed packages, etc. They were first seen in New Jersey in 1916, and quickly spread to New York, Maryland, etc., and are now everywhere in eastern North America. An effort was made to bring in the beetle's Japanese enemies, such as various parasitic flies, but these have not controlled the numbers here. Birds eat many, and funnel traps have helped to reduce the numbers. After eating plants and mating, females dig into the ground and lay eggs. These hatch into larvae that grow and moult. They feed on root juices all winter and people call them grubs. They pupate and come out in the spring. We wish they had stayed in Japan since they are so difficult to control.

HEARING IN MODERATION

Persons with moderate hearing loss may understand conversational speech while close up and face-to-face with the speaker. However, in most listening situations a person with a moderate hearing loss will miss 50–75 percent of speech signals. Most typically, they describe that they can hear but not understand. This can cause a strain on social, family and work relationships. In many cases, family members feel helpless not being able to communicate easily with their loved one. More recently, research is showing that moderate hearing loss, untreated, can change how the brain processes speech.

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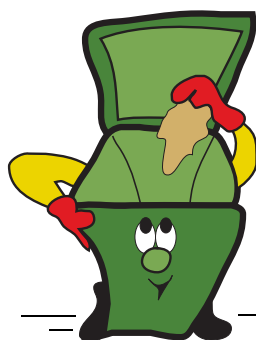
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BARDTOVERSE
