

Sewanee Students Conduct Domain Plant Community Assessment

Under the direction of Jonathan Evans, professor of biology, Bourne and Qualls will be conducting surveys of species found in a variety of habitats across the Domain. They hope to produce a comprehensive list of all of the unique plant communities and to quantify these communities by

Along with being useful for the Qualls, a rising junior from Claremore, composition of the "Flora of the Do-Okla., are both environmental studies: main," a project composing a list of all of the plant species of the Domain (now over 1,020), this data will serve as a catalyst for future student research, providing detailed community information and providing raw data to be used later for other floristic or overall community studies. To undertake this task, the researchers will be visiting dozens of different sites that are representative of the great diversity of habitats found on the Domain and will be composing comprehensive species lists for each site to be augmented by location, abundance, land use and data pertaining to a variety of abiotic factors.

The detailed community information obtained through the project will also be used in the creation of a new Domain Management Plan for Biodiversity. Created in part by students, this plan will help to guide the University in its management of the Domain's 13,000 acres. While this project will be immediately relevant in terms of the publication of the "Flora of the Domain," it will also have a lasting impact as it guides the management plan, provides data to be used in classes in the future and serves as a set of raw data to be used by future student research focused on the great richness of plant life on the Domain.






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Philmont Trek Teaches Scouts and Their Parents A Lesson in Leadership

"It's one thing to say you're going to make the decisions, but it's another thing to do it," said St. Andrew's-Sewanee School (SAS) senior Seth Burns. Seth recently led five members of Troop 14, the SAS Boy Scout troop, on a 10-day 86-mile trek through rugged northern New Mexican wilderness. He was accompanied by SAS scouts Ethan Burns and Will Évans of Sewanee, Alex and Sidney Durant of Coalmont, two scouts from Pennsylvania, and four adults, including parents Doug Burns, Jon Evans and Veronique Durant. The adults had to promise to go along as observers and participants, but not to interfere in the scouts' decisions about how to handle daily challenges.

The boys made the trek at the Boy Scouts of America's Philmont Scout Ranch in July. Philmont is located on 214 square miles of rugged northern New Mexico wilderness where scouts can backpack, trek and train. The summer, the boys elected Seth as luck that our packs were heavier, but Philmont treks are numbered and ranked from 1-35, with 35 being the hardest. The route the boys chose was #32. 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Nature Notes

Wildflowers Blooming at Lake Cheston

On Monday, Aug. 2, **Harry Yeatman and Joy Dog** went to Lake Cheston to see what flowers were in bloom. Below the wooden bridge, just past the dam, a large mass of Virginia Meadow Beauty was in bloom (top left). Yellow Ludwigia alternifolia was mixed in with the purple of the Meadow Beauty (top right).

They walked a short distance to the iron bridge where the Floating Heart water lily was still in full bloom, and Harry also saw a single blue Monkey Flower (bottom right). Two petals form the upper part and three form the lower part. This combination remotely resembles a monkey's face, to which the common name refers. Sewanee has the square-stem species which has longer-stalked flowers.

A few yellow-flowered Bladderworts (bottom left) were in bloom in the mud and shallow water. Most of this plant lives in the water, and it has little bladders that catch tiny water animals and digest them for nitrogen. Blooms are unusual except in August.

The sun's heat finally drove the two observers away, but Joy Dog cooled off with four "relief swims."

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
