SUD Board of Commissioners Amends Developer Policy

The Board of Commissioners of the Sewanee Utility District (SUD) of Franklin and Marion Counties held their regular monthly business meeting at 5 p.m. on Aug. 24 in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road.

The board voted to approve an amendment to the Developer Policy recommended by the SUD attorney Don Scholes. The amendment rectified uncertainty regarding the water resources development charge discount for new developments that meet Leadership in Energy and Environmental Design (LEED) standards. As amended, the policy stipulates that new connections with LEED certification shall receive a credit as specified in the district's rate schedule. (At present, the credit amounts to a 30 percent discount, in keeping with the projected water use savings for LEED-certified buildings and homes.)

The board entertained a request by residents of Wild Heart Lane who wanted water service extended to their homes. Most of the wells drilled in the area are not reliable and not acceptable for drinking water, SUD Manager Ben Beavers noted. Beavers estimated that extending a 4-inch line approximately 3,000 feet from the SUD water main on Old Sewanee Road to the end of Wild Heart Lane would cost from \$30,000 to \$50,000. The SUD Line Extension Policy stipulates that developers pay for all costs related to line extensions, which must be engineered according to SUD

standards, and that SUD assumes maintenance of the line once the work is complete. Five residences would be serviced by an extension down Wild Heart Lane. There were no homes on Wild Heart Lane when service was extended to Old Sewanee Road as part of the Jump-Off project, so the present residents did not have the option of participating in the program. (Jump-Off residents paid an extra fee until the debt for the Jump-Off extension was retired.) A Wild Heart Lane resident asked why the policy applied to them since they were not developers. SUD commissioner Cliff Huffman explained that it would not be fair to make SUD customers bear the cost of the extension. Commissioner Karen Singer suggested the Wild Heart Lane residents investigate rainwater collection. The board also discussed the option of the residents running separate lines from each home to the SUD water main at a substantial cost savings compared to paying for a SUD water main. Several lines could be housed in one trench, smaller pipe could be used and an engineer would not be needed, as is the case to meet the state requirements binding SUD water main line extensions. The residents would, however, need to acquire public right-of-way permission and would still be required to pay a tap fee for each connection, Beavers stressed, although SUD allows 18-month interest-free payoff for taps, which

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Sewanee Tops Earlham in Football Action

The Sewanee Tigers took the football field and struck first on Saturday, Sept. 4, going up 23-7 at the half and never looked back, topping the Quakers of Earlham College 33-14.

On their second drive, the Tigers needed only one play before freshman running back Chad Morehead galloped 65 yards down the field and barreled into the end zone untouched. Geoffrey Marolda's extra point was good and the Tigers took the first lead of the day, up 7-0, and never looked back.

The momentum clearly belonged to the Tigers going into the second quarter. On their first drive of the

quarter, the Tigers gained 54 yards and five first downs before junior running back Zeke Wilson carried the ball two yards into the end zone to put the Tigers up, 13-7. But that wasn't the only time Wilson would find the end zone in the second quarter as he capped a 25-yard Tiger drive with a one-yard run into the end zone. Trey Knighton came in to kick the extra point and put Sewanee ahead 20-7.

Knighton added a 38-yard field goal with 22 seconds left in the half to put the Tigers up 23-7 heading into the locker room. In the second half the Tiger offense's 2:36 minute

University Presents Goldstone Lecture on Global Trends

Noted scholar and author Jack Goldstone will present "Global Trends in the Quality of Governance and Democracy" at 4:30 p.m. on Monday, Sept. 13, in Gailor Auditorium on the University campus. The public is invited.

Goldstone's work on issues of social movements, revolutions and international politics has won him international acclaim. His lecture will address such timely questions as: Has recent momentum toward spreading democracy stalled? What is the quality of democracy and governance in countries around the world? What is the likely future for democracy in various regions and in global governance?

Goldstone will be at the University as a Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar. The Virginia E. and John T. Hazel Professor of Public Policy at the George Mason University School of Public Policy, he has written more than 100 research articles and is the author or editor of 10 books, including "Why Europe? The Rise of the West in World History" and "States, Parties, and Social Movements." His essay "The New Population Bomb: Four Megatrends That Will Change the World," led off the January/February 2010 issue of Foreign Affairs.

Goldstone has been a consultant for the U.S. State Department, FBI and Agency for International Development, helping devise measures and strategies to cope with failing and failed states. His current research focuses on conditions for building democracy and stability in developing nations, the impact of popula-

tion change on the global economy and international security, and the cultural origins of modern economic growth.

While on campus he will meet with students and faculty, and will lead discussions on topics of global governance and U.S. efforts to spread democracy. His visit is sponsored by Sewanee's Phi Beta Kappa chapter and the political science department.

Founded in 1776, Phi Beta Kappa is the nation's oldest academic honor society. It has chapters at 280 colleges and universities. The Sewanee chapter, Beta of Tennessee, was established in 1926. The Phi Beta Kappa Visiting Scholar Program makes available distinguished scholars who visit colleges and universities, meeting informally with students and faculty members, taking part in classroom discussions, and giving a public lecture, with the purpose of contributing to the intellectual life of the institution.

University Welcomes New Faculty

The University of the South has announced seven new tenure-track faculty members in the College. New faculty members are Melody Crowder-Meyer, Mila Dragojevi, Rodelio Manaca, Rongson Pongdee, Matthew Rudd, Katherine Theyson, and Kelly Joan Whitmer.

Among three new tenure-track faculty in the political science department, **Melody A. Crowder-Meyer** will teach courses that focus on American politics. Beginning in the Easter term of 2011, Crowder-Meyer

will offer courses involving U.S. political processes, including social movements, elections, parties and interest groups, and women's roles in political representation. Crowder-Meyer is a graduate of Vanderbilt University and holds an M.A. degree from Princeton University, where she will soon complete her Ph.D., and has served as a teaching assistant both at Princeton and Vanderbilt. In 2009, she received the Sophonisba Breckinridge Award for the best paper on women

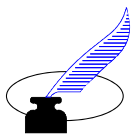

politics presented at a national conference of political scientists.

Newly appointed instructor **Mila Dragojevi** will offer courses in international politics with an emphasis on ethnicity in Eastern Europe. Her courses will include broad introductory offerings in world politics and comparative politics as well as more specialized courses focused on European politics, immigrant identity, ethnicity and refugee dynamics in Eastern Europe. She will also contribute her expertise to Sewanee's international and global studies program. Dragojevi is a graduate of Wilson College and holds an M.B.A. degree from the University of New Hampshire, an M.A. from Northeastern University, along with both A.M. and (soon-to-be-received) Ph.D. degrees from Brown University. Her experience includes service as a teaching assistant at Brown and at Northeastern University, as well as fieldwork in Serbia and an assignment at the Watson Institute for International Studies at Brown.

Rodelio Manacsa, newly appointed to a tenure-track post as assistant professor of political science, has taught in the College for the last two years under a term appointment. In 2010–11 he will continue to offer courses in world politics, human rights, the European Union and international law. After graduating with a B.A. at Ateneo de Manila University in the Philippines, Manacsa completed an M.A. at the Amsterdam School of International Relations and a Ph.D. (along with a second M.A.) at Vanderbilt University. His teaching experience includes previous appointments at Vanderbilt and at Ateneo de Manila University. He has also served as a program fellow at the University of Michigan, and as a Fulbright Scholar with the Institute on American History and Law at Boston College.

Rongson Pongdee, newly appointed assistant professor of chemistry, will be principally responsible for staffing the College's course in organic chemistry, a key curricular element both for chemistry majors and for pre-med students. Pongdee will offer entry-level and advanced courses in this subfield. He previously served in the chemistry and biochemistry department at Colorado College. Pongdee studied at Vanderbilt University and

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the University of Michigan and completed his Ph.D. at Texas A&M University. He was a postdoctoral research associate at the College of Pharmacy, Division of Medicinal Chemistry, at the University of Texas, Austin. He has been honored as the recipient of fellowships for travel and research from the National Science Foundation, National Institutes of Health and American Chemical Society.

Matthew B. Rudd is the newly appointed assistant professor of mathematics. Previously he taught at the University of Idaho. In 2008 he was honored for teaching by the University of Idaho Alumni Association. Rudd took his B.S. degree from Wake Forest University, completed a master's degree at the University of Chicago, and a Ph.D. at the University of Utah. He served for three years as a postdoctoral fellow at the University of Texas, Austin.

Katherine C. Theyson is a new assistant professor of economics. Among the courses Theyson will teach include international trade, introduction to economics and international finance. Theyson earned her B.A. degree from North Carolina State University and her Ph.D. at the University of North Carolina, Chapel Hill. She has previously taught at Frostburg State University and the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, where she was honored in 2002–03 with the Tanner Teaching Award for Excellence in Undergraduate Teaching. Before pursuing advanced studies in economics, she completed an undergraduate degree major in chemistry—and subsequently went on to serve as an organic and medicinal chemist at the Research Triangle Institute.

Kelly Joan Whitmer, a historian of early modern European history, is assistant professor of history. Previously she held a postdoctoral research fellowship at the Max Plank Institute for the History of Science in Berlin. She has been a visiting scholar in the history of science department at Cambridge University, and a Fulbright Teaching Fellow in Halle, Germany. Whitmer earned her B.A. degree in history and German at Colgate University, an M.A. in history at Western Washington University and her Ph.D. at the University of British Columbia. Among the courses she will be teaching in the College are topical offerings in children and childhood in history, early modern Europe and the scientific revolution.

Coalition Seeks Grant Proposals

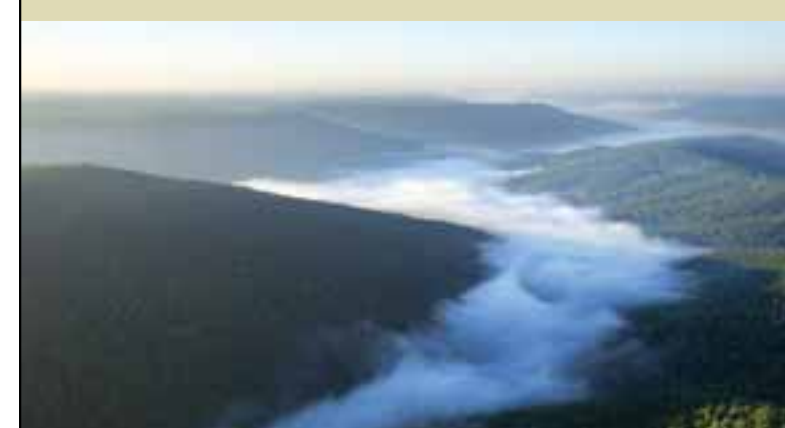

Ende's Textile Panels Grace Murfreesboro Medical Center

Sewanee artist Arlyn Ende's latest textile work, "The Forks of the Stones," commissioned earlier this year for the new Middle Tennessee Medical Center in Murfreesboro, has been installed above the grand staircase in the main lobby. The medical center will open for patients and visitors on Oct. 1.

Ende's textile spans 16 feet across a curved wall, in five panels of varying lengths, from 12 feet to 7 feet, echoing the risers of the grand stairs. On the panels, Ende charts three branches of the Stones River, spreading over rich Tennessee landscape from the Nashville Basin to the Highland Rim and the distant Cumberland Plateau.

White doves hover above the hills as symbols of hope and healing. The artist uses her signature hand-tufting and surface sculpting to create textures and depth from tightly packed wool. This technique allowed her to add a moment of magic by releasing

two doves to fly free of the textile's edge.

Ende was selected for this commission by Fogle Fine Arts & Consulting of Nashville and Jacksonville, Fla. She worked closely with colleague Paul V'Soske of PWV Studios in Grand Rapids, where his workspaces are equipped for fabricating fine art textiles beyond the dimensions of Ende's frameloom in her Deepwoods studio.

The artist's prizewinning textiles are installed around the country in private residences and public interiors, such as Vanderbilt Hospital, the Little Havana Center in Miami, and the headquarters of Unum Provident in Chattanooga and Bridgestone

Firestone in Nashville.

I use what she taught me every day in a busy life, as hers has been, of playing, teaching and presenting, and organizing concerts and festivals. I could never have had a better example, and it is with great pleasure that I dedicate this concert to her with admiration, appreciation and affection."

Sewanee Cross Country Action

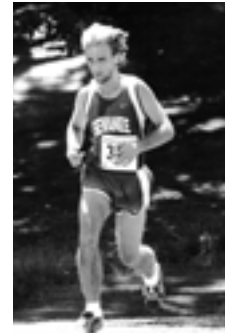

In the fall of 1995, I received a letter from a teaching pro in Atlanta describing a wonderful girl that our tennis program could not do without. This was a time when a letter was actually written on paper and stuffed inside a handy device known as an envelope. The letter arrived at my office mailbox just a few days after he had dropped it in the mail. This was not an unusual note or process. Coaches routinely get references about players, and the subject is usually one step from sainthood.

As this process begins, you are never sure if the person you are reading about will ever become more than just a name on the page, a visitor with whom you will spend a few minutes or if the relationship will grow into a person who is an integral part of your team. Mary Missbach did visit with us and thought everything on the Mountain was "awesome." When she became a freshman the next year we soon learned Mary thought everything was "awesome." She approached life with such a positive attitude and an eagerness to be involved that her enthusiasm spilled over to all of her teammates. When she decided to go on a no-fat diet, none of us could eat any fat while traveling with the team. (I think I need her back.) When she decided to run, she had to run marathons. Mary did everything with passion and always at full gallop, including her tennis game. She was a three-time All-American, an Arthur Ashe Sportsmanship Award-winner, and the National Senior Player of the Year in 2000. Along the way she gave all of herself to us. Making our days funnier, our trips to Hilton Head more pleasurable and our victories that much more "awesome." Mary is family to us. She traveled to the beach one summer with us to care for another family's children and to a wedding of a former player to care for mine. She was just the kind of student you always knew would say yes and say it with gusto.

Tomorrow night Mary Missbach Dressler will be inducted into Sewanee's Athletic Hall of Fame, along with Jen Bulkeley Staats, Billy Cunningham, Frank Greer, Hank Haynes and both the 1953-54 Cross Country Teams and the 1963 Football Team. They will be honored for their athletic achievements as part of a recent tradition that helps tie our athletic history to the connection these former students still feel with life on the Plateau. Two weeks ago, Mary extended her family, the Shackelford's, and Sewanee's, with the birth of her first child, a daughter, Addison, who I believe is "awesome." Conchie was kept up to date on the birth as Mary texted updates with great excitement during her labor and delivery.

I need to find an envelope, a stamp and the address of this long-forgotten tennis pro to send an old-fashioned letter, thanking him for introducing us to someone who is now a part of Sewanee's past, one who led us to who we are now, and one who is serving up Sewanee's future. If Mary is one step away from anything, I can promise you she is running there.

would make financing easier.

Reporting on the operation of the utility, Beavers said that the first two sewer lateral rehabilitation jobs had been completed, and he anticipated receiving more applications for participation in the program, approved by the board in March, as there had been a number of inquiries.

The new water plant had been up and running for the past two weeks, feeding the old plant, according to Beavers, with some downtime for chlorine disinfection in this test phase. Beavers anticipated that final inspection by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation would take place next week.

Updating the board on finances, Beavers said the utility saw a 10 percent increase in water sales for July due to the hot, dry weather; year to date, expenses were flat compared to 2009, and revenues were up.

Beavers presented an overview of the recently completed 2009 audit, noting that the auditors commented that the district was in good shape financially, and they were impressed with the rate studies SUD had done. SUD met the state requirement of showing a profit, with a net income of \$194,000. Net assets increased \$123,000, largely due to construction of the new water plant. SUD retired \$92,000 in debt and had current debt of \$1.63 million.

The auditors reported three problems with SUD's record keeping. One, inadequate disbursement of funds documentation: SUD had receipts

on file, but not statements. To rectify the problem, SUD now electronically attaches receipts, checks and invoices. Two, violation of the new three-day bank law, requiring all revenue be deposited within three days: SUD now makes bank deposits daily. Three, violation of the segregation of duties requirement, which stipulates that the various stages of the acquisition and handling of money be performed by separate individuals: the auditors explained that all utilities had difficulty complying with this rule, since it required seven office employees (SUD only has two).

Commissioner Ken Smith reported on SUD's investigation into water recycling. Preliminary testing of the water samples collected by University students was done by the Tennessee Tech Water Resources Center. Results showed trace quantities of methamphetamine in one stream. Other substances being tested include estrogen, caffeine and antidepressants. Testing of the samples has not yet been completed. Smith stressed that the sampling would continue over a full year, to get a more complete picture. He also noted that recent research showed a new area for concern was the presence of the substance used in antibacterial hand soap in drinking water supplies.

The general manager's evaluation by the board was deferred to the next meeting, rescheduled for 5 p.m. on Oct. 5, in the SUD office building on Sherwood Road.

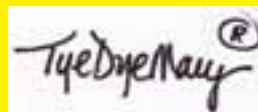
