Franklin **County Schools** Return Budget to Commission

At the Aug. 8 meeting, the Franklin County School Board decided to return the rejected 2022-2023 budget to the Franklin County Commission unchanged. The commission voted down the budget at a special called meeting

Aug. 1.
"If the school budget goes to they send it back, the school board has 10 days to send it back to the county commission," explained County Finance Director Andrea Smith. "If the county commission turns it down again, if it can't be worked out by Aug. 31, it will go to the state. We're [currently] operating off the prior year's budget. If it goes past Aug. 31, we have to get approval from the comptroller."

Although rejecting the school budget, the county commission amended the county budget to include pay raises for school employees, as reported by the Herald

Chronicle, Aug. 1, 2022.
Reviewing the pay raises called for in the school budget, Human Resources Supervisor Linda Foster stressed the need to be "competitive" with neighboring counties. Certified employees with a bachelor's degree will receive a \$600 salary increase, while those with higher degrees will receive a \$500 annual increase. Previously, years-of-service wage increases stopped at 20 years, but the 2022-2023 budget calls for wage increases through the 22nd year. All classified employees will receive at least a 2 percent wage increase. Contract bus drivers will receive a \$10,000 per route

Commenting on the budget, Director of Schools Stanley Bean said, "It's a solid budget. We've got the biggest fund balance we've had in years. We did not ask the county for any new money."

Reporting on personnel at the start of the school year, Foster said, "We have teachers in all classrooms." Eight teachers have bachelor's degrees, but no certification, so will require a permit from the state. Some of these teachers have lapsed certification and others are pursuing certification. Last school year, only one teacher needed a non-certified permit.

Bean recognized two departing school board members. District 1 representative Christine Hopkins will step down after 12 years of service. Sandy Shultz was elected to fill the vacancy in the recent election cycle. District 4 school board member Chris Guess, who has served since 2008, will step down to serve as county mayor. The county commission will appoint a representative to finish out Guess' term.

Isaiah 117 House Has a Home!

Three years ago, operating on a wish, prayer, and a dream, Susan Johnson rallied volunteers to host lemonade stands and talked to anyone who would listen about the need for a safe, welcoming place for children awaiting foster care placement. Grundy County has no Department of Children's Services office. Children removed from the home often waited for a foster care placement in the judge's chambers or county jail. Johnson's plan was to establish an Isaiah 117 House Coffee-Franklin-Grundy based on the national model, providing a transition place where children could receive food, comfort, and love.

Johnson's prayers were answered, and her dream has come true in a grander fashion than she ever imagined. She hoped to raise enough money to buy or to receive a donation of a three-quarters acre of land, with or without a house. Christ Church in Monteagle donated 3 acres of land at the rear of their property on West Main. Thanks to their generosity and that of a multitude of other donors and volunteers, on Aug. 10, a beautiful home snuggled against the tree line opened its doors to welcome children in need.

Isaiah 117 House is staffed primarily by volunteers, with just two paid employees, Johnson who serves as program coordinator and an on-call assistant. Volunteers sign up to be on-call for six-hour shifts. When the Department of Children's Services contacts Johnson, two volunteers join her at the house to welcome the DCS staff member and the children awaiting foster placement. The DSC staffer remains with the children the entire time supervising their care. "The volunteers are there to lend an extra hand and love on the kids," Johnson said.

Children can wait for hours or days before foster placement is found for them. Isaiah 117 House Coffee-Franklin-Grundy has a bedroom for both boys and girls, each with two twin beds with trundles beneath them, a playroom, and an outdoor playground with slides and swings.

Johnson highlighted the generosity of three area furniture stores. Halls Furniture furnished the bedrooms, back porch and office. Factory Furniture furnished the front porch, living room, playroom, and visitors space, and Badcock Furniture provided appliances, a TV, weed eater, and mower. Generous contributions from churches and private donors, both in the form of cash and elbow grease, raised the roof on the house. With the doors officially open, Johnson intends to apply for grants to help with costs. Isaiah 117 House also sends children on their way with supplies to help out the foster families who take in the children.

Asked about security, Johnson said the house is equipped with an alarm system, three panic buttons, and cameras, and police regularly patrol the site. She stressed there had not been security breach issues at any of the other Isaiah 117 House locations.

"We're so glad to be open and serving," Johnson said.
How can people help? "We always need volunteers," she acknowledged, adding, "I ask people to set an alarm for 1:17 p.m. each day and pray for the children, caseworkers, and foster families."

Petropoulus Ends **Community Center Service**

Rachel Petropoulos began her work with the Sewanee Community Center in 2007, just five years after its doors opened. She described her work as a combination of bookkeeping, keeping all the spaces scheduled and making sure the building was stocked for the various groups that came through the door. Over the years, however, it became more than just maintaining a building.

Petropoulos, who relocated to her native Ohio at the start of the summer, said she always enjoyed being a part of offering space to anyone

"While the amenities may be limited, the space is light-filled, walkable to downtown and the elementary school, with room to explore a variety of activities. And that is what people have done. Many people have tried out a new idea, whether that be a meeting, class, a music session, and if a community formed around the idea, it grew. Some classes have been meeting for decades now," Petropoulos said.

President of the board, Trae Moore, described the center as a space where the entire community — both the University community and the greater Mountain community — could come together and share in daily life together. And Moore said because Petropoulos was such a big part of that community-building effort, filling her role won't be easy.

"Rachel loved the center and put a lot of time and thought into making sure everything ran efficiently and that people who use the center had a good experience. Rachel will be greatly missed, as she ran the center so effectively and with so much love," Moore said.

As for her hopes for the future, Petropoulos said she doesn't see the

work of the center stopping anytime soon.

"The center has always been more than the building. It has been the people and activities and relationships that form from the community coming together. This is what makes a town strong," she said.


Tennessee Sales Tax Holidays

Hospitality Shop News

The afternoon of Aug. 5, four members of the Hospitality Shop Auxiliary took a field trip to Tullahoma to visit The Attic, a 501(c)(3) thrift shop and food pantry. The Attic is in a 22,000 square foot warehouse off of a side street near a school. Sewanee citizens should be aware that The Attic will take electronics, like computers, and furniture that is in good condition. The Attic can also take mattresses that are clean and less than seven years old. The business has a truck that can pick up donations in the tri-county area.

Director Lisa Cardwell led the group through the sales floor and into the behind the scenes working core of the enterprise. Two people receive donations at a side door. Items are quickly sorted into bins on wheels, according to the categories set up in the shopping area: clothing, household goods, electronics, furniture. Another team inspects each item to determine if it is the quality the Attic accepts. Hanging from the ceiling is a large display of famous brand names. The team keeps items with these names; clothes from sources like WalMart are set aside. These go into a semi-trailer behind the warehouse. Every six weeks that trailer is filled and taken to Atlanta where the clothes are baled and sent to Africa and the middle East.

Tullahoma is about 10 times bigger than Sewanee and the Attic is similarly bigger than the Hospitality Shop will ever be, but the board members picked up several ideas for more efficient operations. For instance, pants can be hung sideways on a leg so that the size tags are easier to see. If the Auxiliary can find one level housing for the Shop, we could use a similar system of bins on wheels for sorting.

As we build our plateau-based program, Sewanee Youth Soccer will be using the academy soccer model that allows players to participate without following the rules of team formation. Players will gather for practices and game day by age group, rather than team, to play small sided games. Players will get more touches on the ball and by having a variety of different groupings during practices and intramural games the kids get to enjoy playing soccer with all of their friends. Little Kickers, U6, U8, U10, and U12 age groups are available in Sewanee. Depending on enrollment, some age groups may combine. Best practices for health and safety will be followed.

Arts Inside, headquartered in Tracy City, uses art as a tool for expression, healing, and connection for incarcerated individuals and their families in rural middle Tennessee. While being mindful of systemic injustices, we aim to create spaces outside of and within correctional facilities for personal and communal healing through multidisciplinary arts and writing programming.

In 2017, AmeriCorps volunteer Hilda Vaughan founded Arts Inside in response to the lack of art programming in the Grundy County Jail in Altamont. Since then, our volunteers have led classes in creative writing, painting, and other art forms in Grundy, Franklin and Maury counties. In addition to arts education, our organization seeks to improve the quality of life on the plateau by focusing on mental health, especially that of justice-involved individuals. We regularly hold public art exhibitions for our artists to celebrate their creative achievements and connect with their friends, family, and community.

This Q&A features Liz Rector, a former art class participant at the Grundy County Jail. She is now a Certified Peer Recovery Specialist at Centerstone, and a volunteer with Arts Inside.

What is your relationship to/experience with Arts Inside?

Originally, I was incarcerated at the Grundy County Jail. I was accepted into the Arts Inside classes. Presently, I am a board member and also a volunteer.

What artistic hobbies/pastimes do you enjoy?

I think what I liked the most while incarcerated was the Striped Creations project, where you make a collage and take a look at yourself and your life.

Do you regularly create or make anything? If so, do you share it with others?

Recently, my daughter Ella and I have started tie-dyeing clothing. That's really fun!

When do you feel most creative?

I don't create anything regularly. My work schedule is so full it's hard to find time for art projects. I feel most creative on the weekends. I don't work on the weekends so that's when me and Ella tie-dye.

Do you consider yourself a creative person?

I am a very creative person mentally in my head, but it's hard to put my ideas into motion.

Who is the most creative person you know? How have they influenced you?

Ms. Hilda (Vaughan) is a very creative person. She makes me think outside the box. She is a big influence in my recovery network. *Did you create things during your childhood?*

I didn't create a lot when I was a child. I was more of the playing outside type of kid.

How do you see the role of art in your life now?

Art was never big for me until jail. Through that experience, I learned how much of a benefit art has with mental health. It allows you to branch out to people you wouldn't normally associate with.

How have you seen art/creating make a difference in the lives of others?

I can speak for myself when it comes to making a difference in my life. If it wasn't for Arts Inside, art, and Ms. Hilda, I wouldn't have such a great support system for my recovery journey. Arts Inside and Hilda are amazing! I'm proud to be a part of and associated with them both!

Josh Hill Selected as Head Coach of Sewanee Men's Golf

Announced by Director of Athletics John Shackelford on Thursday, former Division III All-American Josh Hill has been named the new men's golf coach at the University of the South.

Hill becomes the 15th head coach since 1946 for a men's golf program that begins its 89th season of competition in 2022-23.

Hill arrives at Sewanee after spending the 2022 season as the head men's golf coach at Wabash College (Ind.). The Little Giants finished fifth at the North Coast Athletic Conference (NCAC) Championship. Additionally, he led Brayden Weiss to a fourth place finish to earn First Team All-NCAC honors, becoming the first player at the institution to clinch First Team honors since 2014 and the third player in the history of the NCAC Championships to finish in the top-5.

Prior to his time in Indiana, Hill served as an assistant coach for his alma mater, Guilford, in 2020 and 2021. During his tenure as a coach, he was a part of recruiting, tournament set-up, team analytics and was responsible for the golf social media accounts. At the end of the 2021 season, the Quakers were ranked third in the nation, according to Golf-Stat, and four players were ranked inside the top-50.

During the 2021 season, Guilford clinched a berth to the NCAA Championships with a conference championship within the Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC). The team finished third at the national championships.

He was a part of three Scholar All-Americans and four All-Americans as a coach with the Quakers.

A former three-time All-American, Hill played collegiately at Guilford College (N.C.), and he played in the NCAA Division III Championships three times while helping Guilford to three top-five finishes including a second-place finish in 2017. During his senior campaign in 2019, Hill fired a 293 (73-70-75-75) to earn sixth place honors en route to the Quakers' third place finish.

A three-time ODAC First Team selection, Hill was also a semifinalist for the Jack Nicklaus Award, given to the top collegiate golfer, in 2018

Hill earned a dual Bachelor of Arts in Business Administration and Economics in 2019.

Dog Days

The "Dog Days" of summer are ending and there is a shift in the feel of the weather around this time of year. Often, the dogwoods are starting to show some color and the tulip poplars are turning yellow. The preceding 40 days or so were known as "Dog Days" because the Dog Star, Sirius, rises with the sun in that time period. Sirius is a star in the constellation Canis Major and is the brightest star in our sky besides the sun, so bright that the ancient Romans thought it added to the heat of the sun and caused the hot, humid weather of those summer days.

We are hearing the song of the Dog-day Cicada, or more exactly, Davis' Southern Dog-day Cicada. It is the high, more or less monotone "z-ing" we are hearing these days. Like other cicadas, it lives most of its life as a nymph underground, feeding on sap from tree roots. You have probably seen the cast skin of the nymph on a plant stalk or elsewhere, and perhaps have seen the half-inch hole where it emerged from the ground. The adult only lives a few weeks. The "singing" is done by the males to attract a mate.

The walk to the pools is rocky with a few steep slopes, so come prepared to do some rugged hiking totaling about 2.5-miles. After the Greeter trip, we will return and set up camp in a walk-in group campsite, a short distance from the parking lot. The group camp fee is include with your registration. Indiviual campsites are available but they are a separate fee. You must make your own reservations for individual sites. Dinner and breakfast will be at the shelter. The second day is a trip to Fiery Gizzard and Foster Falls with about 4-miles of moderately strenuous walking. We will have lunch at a local eatery in Tracy Ćity. Dinner will again be at the shelter. dinner hours. The last day will be a trip to Savage East Trail-head for safe and secure. She loves to lie in the easy 3-mile hike to Savage Falls. The \$250 per person fee includes camping and reservation fees, transportation, and expert guide service. Camping equipment is not provided.

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



Just then an upstart wave, whipped up by that same wind, broke over me. I choked and came up crying, cursing him in the wordless way of children, but he was there. He'd never been away. And yet, in that split-second of emptiness, by opening his hand, he'd let me feel the sea.
