Franklin **County School Board Debates COVID Issues**

COVID-19 issues preoccupied the Franklin County School Board at the Aug. 9 meeting. The board grappled with mandated masking, reinstating COVID leave for employees, and the location of a proposed \$4.4 million Wellness Center to be paid for with federal Elementary and Secondary School Emergency Relief (ESSER) funds.

Addressing the board, Sewanee Pediatrics physician Amy Evans called the more contagious CO-VID Delta variant "a category five Advisory Team Secretary. hurricane." Every infected person spreads the disease to eight or nine others, Evans said. "We have to prepare for the onslaught...Masks are the most important thing." "[COVID] is a respiratory virus. The best way to keep children safe is to cover your nose and mouth," she insisted.

"We don't have the authority" to mandate masking," board Vice Chair Lance Williams said.

Board member Sarah Marhevsky quoted from the Tennessean https://www.tennessean.com/ story/news/politics/2021/08/09/ school-mask-mandates-tennesseesummarized a statement made that morning by Governor Bill Lee: "Under state law, local school right to make decisions about masks in school."

Williams argued the legislature made the laws, not the governor.

Board member Sarah Liechty called for seeking clarification from the district's state representative and the school attorney.

Bean strongly recommended students and staff mask. Bean said attorney Chuck Cagle advised him any directive must be a "reasonable request. Determining what was reasonable would be the issue," Bean observed.

Liechty said Metro Nashville voted to mask.

"Don't worry about lawsuits. Do the right thing," Evans said.

"That's easy to say when you don't have any skin in the game," Williams said.

Our children deserve 100 percent of safety, whatever form and shape it takes," board member Christine Hopkins said.

Taking up Marhevsky's recommendation to reinstate COVID leave for school employees, Bean said the county's ESSER 3 fund application did not provide for CO-VID leave and the money would need to come from the school system's operating expense budget. Williams concurred, "It wasn't our policy, but the state's, and they provided the funding." Williams said employees with COVID would need to draw on their sick leave.



In 1992, she and Chappell retired to Sewanee, on the mountain where the White family had vacationed since the 1920's. There they were very active in the music and cultural scene at the University of the South and with the former Otey Memorial Parish Church in Sewanee (now the Parish of St. Mark and St. Paul). She also served devotedly with community service organizations, including the Sewanee Woman's Club and the Hospitality Shop of the Emerald Hodgson Hospital Auxiliary. She was preceded in death by her parents; husband of 45 years, E. Chappell White; sister, Flora Patricia Tyler; and in-laws, Goodrich C. and Helen Chappell White.



Students with COVID (Protocol)

School Attendance and/or School Nurse are to be notified, Bonita Nolan (CHS) will be notified for Data.

Quarantine begins on positive diagnosis from Doctor or Medical authority.

Students must stay home at least 5 school days & return on the 8th day with no symptoms unless medical guidance states otherwise. strongly recommend wearing mask for 5 days after.

Medical diagnosis is to be provided to School Attendance and/or School Nurse.

COVID verified absences will be excused.

Student with close contact of another student or adult.

School shall notify students deemed to be close contacts (within 6 feet for 15 minutes).

Close contacts with students, parents should watch for symptoms. Household positives with verification will be excused.

May return after 5 school days of no symptoms. Mask strongly recommended.

If symptoms occur, seek medical attention and begin COVID protocol if positive.

Employee with COVID (Protocol)

Principal shall be notified, notice shall be sent to Linda Foster. Medical diagnosis shall be provided.

Employees must stay home 5 school days and may return on the eighth day with no fever or symptoms without symptom-reducing medication, unless medical guidance states otherwise.

Employees must use sick leave, no COVID leave available.

Employees are strongly encouraged to wear a mask for 5 days after

Employee with close contact (Self-Reported) (Notified by Principal/ Nurse).

Consider 6 feet for 15 minutes rule.

Watch for symptoms.

May choose to use sick days until return.

If no symptoms occur, employee may report to work and is strongly recommended to wear a mask if not vaccinated.

Sewanee Football Announces 2021 Schedule

Head football coach Travis Rundle has released the 2021 schedule for the University of the South. 10 games highlight the schedule, with the Orgill Cup returning to the Domain in early October.

Sewanee's first three games will be non-conference games, and the Southern Athletic Association (SAA) schedule will rev up on Oct. 2. With the departure of Austin College (Texas) to the American Southwest Conference as an affiliate member, there will be seven conference contests on the docket.

Four conference opponents, Trinity (10th), Berry (16th), Hendrix (17th) and Birmingham-Southern (23rd) are ranked in the Lindy's

The Tigers will be the road warriors to open the 2021 campaign, as they will make the 1,035-mile trek to Duluth, Minn., to face The College of St. Scholastica on Sept. 4. This will be the first-ever meeting between the two teams, and it will be Sewanee's 104th opponent faced in the 126 years of football on the Domain.

This will be a part of a home-and-home series between the Tigers and the Saints, as St. Scholastica will return the trip on the opening weekend of the 2022 schedule.

Week 2 of the season will see a familiar face in Washington and Lee University in Lexington, Va. on Sept. 11. The 69th meeting of the series is the longest non-conference series for Sewanee football, the Stormy Petrels, the Tigers and despite missing their annual get-together in 2020, the teams will meet for the 65th time in the last 67 years.

The Tigers' home opener will occur in Week 3, Sept. 18, as Westminster College (Mo.) comes to town as a part of Family Weekend for a 1 p.m. kickoff from historic Hardee-McGee Field at Harris Stadium. The teams will match up for the first time since 2008, when the Tigers downed the Blue Jays, 26-14.

Following a bye week on Sept. 25, the Tigers will open SAA action on the road at Birmingham-Southern College on Oct. 2 under the lights. Sewanee will play at General Krulak Stadium for the first time since 2017, where the Purple and White brought a 34-13 win back to the Domain.

The 67th meeting of the Orgill Cup will be held during Week 6 of the season on Oct. 9, as Rhodes College will bring the trophy back to the Domain at 1 p.m. In 2018 at historic Hardee-McGee Field at Harris Stadium, the Tigers edged the Lynx 27-14.

Dating back to 1954, this will be the 67th meeting of the Orgill Cup Trophy game. However, the two teams first met during Sewanee's historic 1899 run. Prior to the Tigers winning six games in seven days on the road, all by shutouts, they blanked the Lynx on Nov. 3, 1899, 54-0, on the Domain.

The 2021 edition will be the 88th meeting all-time between the two schools.

Week 7 of the schedule will see Sewanee make the trek to Rome, The 2021 SAA Tournament Ga., for a contest with Berry College, the five-time SAA Champions,

Cicadas

One of the delights of summer is the singing of cicadas in the trees. There are actually several different species of cicadas, besides the 13- and 17- periodic cicadas that were so much in the news earlier this summer. Our "ordinary" cicadas of summer have a 2 to 5 year life cycle, but different broods mean some emerge as adults each year after spending their time as a nymph feeding underground on the roots of perennial plants. The adults have two compound eyes on the sides of the head and three ocelli, or simple eyes, on the top of the head. Only the males sing, a sound produced by vibrating membranes on the abdomen. Judging by the song recordings on the Cicadamania website, I've been hearing the Morning Cicada and the Scissor Grinder, but different species peak at different times of the summer and sing at different times of day. It can be fun to try to pick out their various songs.




