

New Highway Signs and Trailhead Names Mark the Way to SCSP Trailheads

More than 70 new highway signs and a more logical naming system for South Cumberland State Park (SCSP) trailheads are part of an effort to help Park visitors more easily find their way around the Park. "This new naming system is more logical and geographically-based," said SCSP Manager George Shinn. "It will make it much easier for visitors to quickly grasp where our trailheads are, in relation to each other, and in which part of the park each trailhead is located."

"The Friends' website has been completely updated to reflect the new names," he said. "The Tennessee State Parks website has also posted a new trailhead map, which also includes the park's most popular features and highlights, listed below each of the new trailhead names."

A free copy of the new map, which includes the new trailhead names, lists the major natural features accessible from each trailhead, driving directions to each trailhead and other useful information, is also available as a free download from the Downloadable Maps page of the Friends' website https://www.friendsofsouthcumberland.org/downloadable-maps.html>.

From Sept. 22–24, Rudloff will be back on the Plateau to paint the mural, with the help of many hands. Everyone is invited to be part of the mural painting, with the schedule to be announced in September. The board and staff of SCCF invite all who live on the Plateau to be a part of the special project for a special place.

On Oct. 22, the mural is to be unveiled at the Round the Mountain Fest.

SUD Discusses Highway Reimbursement

At the Aug. 16 meeting of the Sewanee Utility District Board of Commissioners, SUD Manager Ben Beavers reported on SUD's final cost for the U.S. Highway 41A project, prompting a discussion about requesting reimbursement from the University. The board revisited SUD's request for American Recovery Plan (ARP) funds from the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation.

In conjunction with narrowing Highway 41A to accommodate University plans for the downtown, the Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) required SUD to put money in escrow to cover water and sewer line relocation costs. TDOT has billed SUD for \$209,000, Beavers said, and SUD's out-of-pocket expenses for engineering and inspection will bring the total to a quarter million.

In a 2020 verbal agreement negotiated by Beavers and SUD Board President Charlie Smith with University Treasurer Doug Williams and Frank Gladu, who at the time oversaw downtown planning, the University committed to help SUD pay for relocating the water and sewer lines.

"We're hoping to get 80 percent [of the cost reimbursed]?" asked commissioner Donnie McBee. "We are," Beavers said. Beavers suggested a letter from Smith to University Treasurer Williams reminding him of the commitment. The board will collaborate on the letter.

In a recent conversation with a Southeast Tennessee Development District lawyer, Beavers confirmed separate pools of TDEC administered ARP grant money were available to counties and cities. Beavers also learned the money could not be used for maintenance items. SUD has already purchased all the items on its ARP grant list, except for replacing water plant membrane filters, a maintenance item. SUD will work with the Tennessee Association of Utility Districts to modify its application and request replacing 10,000 feet of water line with cast iron fittings, which by law SUD must undertake in the next few years. Beavers estimated the cost at \$500,000-\$700,000. "I'll ask for replacement of all the line, but we may need to settle for investigation and design costs ... I don't expect we'll get any less than \$200,000-\$300,000." Of the \$3.2 million available to Franklin County, the county has already committed \$1.2 million.

SUD accountant Don Mills presented the 2021 audit. The audit contained no negative findings. "You made a nice rebound," Mills said. "In 2020 you lost money. You can't do that two years in a row or the utility review board will get on us." In 2021 SUD reported a net positive change of almost \$78,000. Beavers commented the difference was due almost entirely to lost revenue in 2020 because of the pandemic and students not being on campus.







After four straight weeks on the Domain, the Tigers will hit the road for the next two weeks as they take on Centre and Hendrix on Oct. 8 and 15, respectively.

The Purple Tigers return home for a contest under the lights as Birmingham-Southern makes the trek to the Domain on Oct. 22. Kickoff is slated for 6 p.m. The Panthers, who earned an at-large bid to the NCAA Championships, is ranked 25th in the preseason <D3football.com> poll.

The 68th edition of the Orgill Cup will take place in Memphis, as the Tigers take on the Lynx in Rhodes College on Oct. 29.

Sewanee's home finale will take place on Nov. 5 for Homecoming versus Berry College. Kickoff is slated for 1:30 p.m.

The regular season conclues with the battle of the Tigers, as Sewanee heads to San Antonio to take on defending SAA Champion Trinity (Texas) on Nov. 12. Trinity is ranked ninth in the preseason <D3football.com> poll.

Sewanee's opponent in Chicago will be against a Maroons team that finished 25th in last year American Volleyball Coaches Association (AVCA) Division III Poll. Finishing with a 17-10 record and a third-place finish at the University Athletic Association (UAA) Championships, UChicago qualified as an at-large for the NCAA Championships a year ago.

The Tigers return to Domain for a three-match homestand with Covenant (Ga.) on Sept. 14 for a 6 p.m. first serve. Over Family Weekend, Sept. 17-18, Southern Athletic Association (SAA) play begins as Berry and Oglethorpe are first on the slate.

Berry, who is the defending SAA Tournament Champions, advanced to the quarterfinals of the NCAA Championships after winning the Atlanta Regional. The Vikings finished seventh at the end of the 2021 AVCA National Poll.

Following Family Weekend, Sewanee will head to Danville, Ky., for a midweek match with Centre on Sept. 21 before returning home Sept. 24-25 to battle Hendrix and Rhodes for Alumni Weekend.

The first half of the SAA schedule concludes on Oct. 1-2 at Millsaps and Birmingham-Southern.

The weekend of Oct. 7-8 will be a game changer for the program. After heading to Berry on Oct. 7, Sewanee will play a doubleheader in Atlanta the next day. The Tigers will take on Oglethorpe at noon ET / 11 a.m. CT and then will head to Emory on Oct. 8 for a 6 p.m. ET / 5 p.m. CT first serve

The Eagles, who finished as a finalist in the 2021 UAA Championships, hosted the Atlanta Regional of the NCAA Championships last year. Finishing 13th in the final AVCA Poll from a year ago, Emory fell to Berry in the third round at home in straight sets.

The Purple and White return home on Oct. 15-16 for matches with Birmingham-Southern and Millsaps before heading back on the road for matches with Hendrix (Oct. 21) and Rhodes (Oct. 22).

Senior Night will take place during Sewanee's home finale on Wednesday, Oct. 26 versus Centre for a 5:30 p.m. first serve.


The regular season concludes with a non-conference match at Covenant (Ga.) on Friday, Oct. 28.






