"Woven Wind" brings together photography and video, sculptural installation, music, genealogical research, oral histories, and community clay workshops. It does so in order to activate archival materials, and in order to read past those materials and attend to other voices, specifically those of the enslaved and their descendants. "Woven Wind" invites us to remember together, and to work interviews with the Toles family, towards community and healing in the present.

The project began in 2018, when artist Vesna Pavlović joined Dr. Woody Register and his students in a critical archival investigation of the Lovell Quitman Family archive, housed in the William R. Laurie University Archives and Special Collections of the University of the South.

Sewanee and its community are intimately tied to other places, including the Lovell plantations in Mississippi and the people once enslaved there.

The "Woven Wind" collaborative team includes photographer Vesna Pavlović, social practice artists Courtney Adair Ĵohnson and Marlos E'van, musician Rod McGaha, community advocate Mélisande Short-Colomb, and Mississippi civil rights veteran and family history researcher Jan Hillegas.

The exhibition will feature video descendants of the enslaved connected to the Lovell-Quitman archive, as they consider repair and their own efforts to understand and share their family history. Idiosyncratic clay "cypress knees," built during community workshops, stand as emblems of memory and connectedness to place. Clay knees placed outside will dissolve over time, and the daffodil bulbs

Patterson and Poe to Present at the EQB Club Meeting

On Wednesday, Sept. 6, 2023, the EQB Club will welcome University of the South Professor Emeritus of History, W. Brown Patterson, who will present "The C. S. Lewis I Knew." In addition, renowned C. S. Lewis scholar, Dr. Harry Lee Poe, will join Dr. Patterson in a dialogue. As a Rhodes Scholar from 1953-1955, Dr. Patterson studied English

As a Rhodes Scholar from 1953-1955, Dr. Patterson studied English Language and Literature at Magdalen College, Oxford, where C.S. Lewis was a Fellow and served as Dr. Patterson's tutor. Within the Oxford tutorial tradition, these instructional periods involved just the two of them and were held once weekly for several terms. In his presentation, Dr. Patterson will connect his remembrances as a college student at the University of the South and his experience studying under C. S. Lewis at Magdalen College, Oxford.

Dr. Patterson's talk appears as "C. S. Lewis: Personal Reflections" in C.S. Lewis Remembered, edited by Harry Lee Poe and Rebecca Whitten Poe (Zondervan: Grand Rapids, Michigan, 2006).

Dr. Harry Lee Poe is the Charles Colson Professor of Faith and Culture at Union University in Jackson, Tenn., where he has taught a course on C. S. Lewis for more than 20 years. Dr. Poe has published and lectured widely on the life and writings of C. S. Lewis, both in the U.S. and abroad. With his latest publication, "The Completion of Lewis; From War to Joy (1945-1963)" (Crossway: Wheaton, Illinois, 2022), Dr. Poe has completed a trilogy on the life of C. S. Lewis. Harry Lee Poe is a descendant of Edgar Allen Poe and cousin of University of the South Professor Emeritus of French, Dr. George Poe.

Among his many and varied publications, C. S. Lewis is best known for his Christian writings during and after WWII, his children's book series, "The Chronicles of Narnia," as a preeminent literary historian and critic of Medieval and Renaissance literature, his science-fiction trilogy, and his spiritual autobiography, "Surprised by Joy."

Beerhsheba Spring Historical Society Meeting

Tree rings can tell us more than the tree's age - they can be proxies of climate and related environmental conditions where historical records are lacking. We use the term "proxies" for these natural archives, which can include formations such as stalactites and stalagmites, geologic sediments, ice-cores and even volcanic ash. While many of these proxies are restricted to specific places or regions on the landscape, trees have some advantages as much of the earth has been or is covered by forests.

Scott Torreano, Professor of Forestry (University of the South, Sewanee) will speak on results of a continuing research program in the Savage Gulf Natural Area that is providing a fascinating view into the past and helping understand what the future may hold.

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'FESTIVAL' by Josiah Golson at the Carlos Gallery

The Carlos Gallery in the Visual Art Building at the University of the South is pleased to present "FESTIVAL," an installation by artist Josiah Golson. The exhibit will be on display through Oct. 13. An artist talk and reception will be at 5 p.m., Monday, Sept. 18.

Josiah Golson explores personal and collective narratives of identity and advocacy through drawing, painting, poetry, performance, and video. He is the creator of 800 Collective, an organization that creatively inspires and organizes civic discourse and engagement.

"FESTIVAL" is a work of poetry, installation, and performance through which Golson explores identity and belonging in his relationship with popular music and its imagery. Through visual and textual narrative contextualized in the space of a teenage music lover's bedroom, Golson shares his experience of negotiating the complexity of influence and seeking authenticity amid the power structures of popular culture.

In "FESTIVAL," Golson reimagines his teenage bedroom as a space of world-building with the iconography of popular music. Through the assemblage and collage of photos sourced from magazines, posters, and pop music media, he designs "stages" or scenes inspired by the "genre" or styles of music associated with the subjects. Over time, Golson revisits, reconstructs, and removes images to transform the layered and evolving scene, as the bedroom endures as a space for conjuring and constructing identity and community. As he releases the mass-produced images of his "heroes," these icons populate the floor and are replaced with photos, markings, and materials that reflect his authentic experiences and world, the music no less present.

The installation is documented in an Artist's Book that contains poems for each of the 12 "stages" of the bedroom.

Josiah Golson is the founder of 800 Collective, and the Programs Director at Stove Works in Chattanooga, Tennessee. Golson received his B.A. in Communication from the University of Tennessee at Chattanooga and his law degree from the University of Texas School of Law in Austin. Developing his artistic practice while studying law, Golson expanded his projects from individual works to collaborative workshops and projects inspired by civic themes. Golson has taught and facilitated workshops at the Harvard Graduate School of Education, the Curb Center at Vanderbilt University, and Project Row Houses in the Third Ward of Houston, Texas.

Carlos Gallery in the Visual Art Building is located at 105 Kennerly Rd. Gallery hours are 8 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday-Friday, and 1–5 p.m., Saturday.





NATURENOTES

Insect Songs

We are mostly familiar with some of the insects we hear singing through the summer. Various species of cicada sing at different times of the day and the season. The Northern True Katydid begins its night-time chorus around the Fourth of July and continues until it gets too cold. But there are other insect sounds that can be distinguished from the katydid chorus and that have mystified me for a while. An article in the July/August edition of The Tennessee Conservationist led me to a website, LEAPS, that has descriptions and recordings of various nighttime singers in our area. The Lesser Anglewing is in the group of the False Katydids, although it looks a lot like the Northern True Katydid. It seems to be the one making the short, loud, rapid-fire song I've been wondering about and it sings late into the season. Crickets are another group of singers that one can begin to pick out once familiar with the songs. The Broad-winged Tree Cricket has a lovely trill and the Snowy Tree Cricket is one that can be used to estimate the temperature by the number of chirps in 13 seconds plus 40 — it slows down as the temperature drops. The Columbian Trig, a kind of cricket, has a faint chorus that is common, but usually unnoticed, in the South. I will be listening more carefully to these nighttime sounds to expand my grasp of the repertoire.

Free Vaccine and Microchip Clinic

Marion Animal Resource Connection (MARC) will have a vaccine and microchip clinic from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m., Saturday, Aug. 26, at Hannah Pickett Park Pavilion, 24 Dixie Lee Ave., Monteagle.

This clinic is for dogs of people living in Grundy County and in the counties of Marion and Franklin on the mountain (and down to Sherwood, and Jump Off Road, to around the Franklin State Forest area). One shot including distemper, adenovirus, parainfluenza, and parvo, a microchip, and an ID Tag will be available, free, for dogs of people who cannot otherwise afford them. Distemper and parvo are deadly and contagious to other dogs and mostly are preventable. Microchipping and providing ID tags will help reunite the many wandering or lost dogs seen in our communities with their families. This clinic is sponsored by South Cumberland Community Fund and Petco Love.

Join the Trail Friends

The Friends of South Cumberland State Parks, in conjunction with the park managers and rangers, have implemented a volunteer program, called Trail Friends, at five popular trailheads in the parks.

Trail Friends are stationed at these trailheads during periods of high visitor traffic to welcome hikers, provide information and answer questions about the trails.

Since implementation, Trail Friends have assisted thousands of park visitors with information about the special attractions in the parks, the range and specifics of what is here, and about critical safe behaviors. Fall Season 2022 marked the beginning of the sixth year of service to the park.






