Historic Highlander Library Opening May Be Delayed

A June press release announced the August opening of the historic Highlander Folk School Library in Monteagle. Tennessee Preservation Trust (TPT), which spearheaded the restoration project, has applied for inclusion in the National Register of Historic Places. In an Aug. 16 interview, project director David Currey said plans for open-ing had changed — "I think I'm going to wait until the National Register nomination is complete. I don't know exactly when that's go-ing to be." The state of Tennessee has approved the nomination and forwarded it to the National Park Service, which gives final approval. Highlander Research and Education Center in New Market, Tenn., has challenged the National Register nomination claiming TPT is an "unfit steward" of the Highlander legacy. Will the Center's petition to the National Park Service to "Reject the Nomination of the Highlander Folk School Library to the National Register of Historic Places" stymie approval of the TPT application and plans to open the site to visitors? Highlander Center's legacy and historic relationship to Highlander Folk School has bearing on the question.

For the most part, the TPT and Highlander Center accounts of the school's history agree. The school opened in the Summerfield community of Monteagle in 1932 to educate the region's miners and other exploited laborers and help them organize for better wages and working conditions. In its focus on labor struggles, the school held integrated workshops as early as 1944, rare in the South, and in the 1950s took up the cause of civil rights. Citizenship Schools rights leaders learned strategies for non-violent civil disobedience. Rosa Parks spent two weeks at Highlander before refusing to give up her seat on a Montgomery bus. being targeted as a communist training school. In 1961, the state revoked the school's charter and confiscated the property. The very next day, Highlander renamed

For 2022-2023, the Tennessee General Assembly has approved a sales tax holiday on gun safes and safety devices that ends at 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 2023.

TDAPC: "How will you protect us?"

After listening for nearly one and a half hours to Tennessee Division of Air Pollution Control (TDAPC) officials explain permitting requirements and enforcement mechanisms, but acknowledged no prescribed inspection schedule would be in place at the Grundy County Tinsley Sand Plant if a permit was granted, neighboring resident Mike Ford asked in desperation, "How will you protect us?"

As with many other questions raised at the Aug. 23 virtual meeting, Grundy County residents expressed frustration with the answers.

Elaborating on permit requirements designed to protect public health, TDAPC permit writer Hernan Flores said, during the crushing process, dust would be controlled by "wet suppression" equipment and record keeping by Tinsley Sand & Gravel, LLC, would verify the equipment was not operated longer than allowed and sand production did not exceed the allowed amount. The permit also regulated the amount of allowable visible dust, determined by opacity.

'The facility cannot emit visible emissions across the property line for more than five minutes per hour or 20 minutes per day," said TDAPC Deputy Director Jimmy Johnston. TDAPC Environmental Manager Will Collins said, by the permit being considered, Methods 1, 4, and 9 would be used to measure visible dust.

Hernan encouraged area residents to contact TDAPC if they observed dust they believed to be in excess and an investigation would follow.

We're not interested in visible dust," insisted Dr. Arthur Davies. He cited respiratory impairment and lung damage from the small silicate particulate blowing from the 100-foot piles of sand. "There are 280 homes in the immediate vicinity," Davies stressed. The Tinsley property on Chevy Road, just off Clouse Hill Road, borders Deerlick Falls Retreat, Highland Bluff and Timberwood Trace residential communities.

Johnson said he would need to consult with the TDAPC staff about requirements for dust suppression on piled sand.

Ford said he lived less than 100 feet from the operation, has seen truck loads of sand removed for months, and had videos of the dust.

"What good was fostered by allowing Tinsley to file his air permit application four months after he's already begun operation?" asked laude Stuart. According to Stuart, in court documents owner Eddie Tinsley acknowledge the facility had been operating four months before it sought an application.

Bruce Blohm and Lucy Keeble asked where Tinsley would acquire water for the wet suppression process. Keeble pointed out that although Hurricane Creek ran through the property, drought could impede water supply from the creek. Flores acknowledged he did not know what the water source would be. Keeble also questioned the environmental impact on Hurricane Creek. Collins replied TDAPC did not regulate water third novel, "A Separation," was a finalist for the Premio von Rezzori quality issues which were the purview of the water division.

Johnson said TDAPC had heard the claims about Tinsley operating without a permit and would investigate.

Grundy County regulations prohibit operating a sand and gravel quarry within 5,000 feet of a residence. Whether the Tinsley operation violates county authority will be addressed Sept. 16 in Chancery Court.

Johnson insisted a TDAPC permit, when granted, did not give permission to operate in violation of state and local authorities. However, if the permit holder operated in compliance with the permit, TDAPC could not "impede operations or intervene," Collins said

The public comment period on the Tinsley permit application con-

itself Highlander Research and Education Center and reopened at a new location in Knoxville. Repeated racial harassment throughout the 1960s prompted the Center to relocate to its current headquarters in New Market in 1971.

The Center's challenge to TPT's application for inclusion in the National Register argues the Center was never "formally notified" of TPT's plans to purchase the Highlander Folk School property and seek National Register inclusion, yet TPT used text from the Center's website for the nomination form; TPT has not involved the Center in planning, fundraising or programming for the historic library site; the TPT nomination form contains historical inaccuracies; and the Center holds exclusive rights to the name "Highlander" and "Harry Lasker Memorial Library" - the alternative name listed for the library on the TPT nomination form and a name still in use at the Center's New Market location.

Currey said TPT would not have become involved if the organization had not been contacted in 2013 by the Tennessee Parks and Greenway Foundation and concerned citizens. The property's historic value had been undermined by past owners and the property was again listed for sale. Currey contends the Highlander Center participated in some of the early phone conversations among the parties involved. "In 2013, nobody stepped up to the plate to save this property, and TPT did."

In response to rumors TPT was dissolving, Currey said the president of the board's battle with cancer and subsequent death led to a lapse in tax filings, but TPT was in the process of securing reinstatement of its nonprofit status.

The Highlander Center maintains, since 1932, Highlander has "directly-impacted people in our region, knowing that together, we have the solutions to address the challenges we face in our communities and to build more just, equitable, and sustainable systems and structures ... TPT is best known for its efforts to preserve Civil War history ... wholly disconnected from Highlander's multiracial and working-class history, as reflected in its board of directors and leadership that is overwhelmingly white."

Miebach's work asks us to consider the representation and interpretation of data. It makes overwhelming events intimate and personal, and asks us to connect numbers with experience.


Climate change and its devastating impact on communities, Covid-19 and our distance from our loved ones are made visible. Aesthetics is used to further the understanding of complex scientific systems.





At the behest of Everest Kitzrow to remove "something alive" from the SCC sliding board, which her mother had dismissed as a wild strawberry or wineberry calyx — a Limacodidae "slug caterpillar" was discovered, named so for their "sluglike movement" on suckers rather than legs. Many of this specimen's tubercles were cast around its body, lost to a heavy rain event earlier that day. We believe it may be the hag moth larva, absurdly named the "monkey slug caterpillar.'

Lewenhart Kitzrow came across this grisley scene of a garter snake fastened to a toad's hindquarters while hiking the Perimeter Trail and implored the toad, chirping sweetly like the ones in our backyard, be rescued. Though we all accept the circle of life and the garter snake's carnivorous diet, his parents believed the snake had bitten more than he could swallow, or had at least chosen an inappropriate dinner location, and agreed to the request to intervene on behalf of the toad and the child.



Greeter Falls Staircase Volunteer Opportunity




