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Monteagle: Competitive Bidding; Tent Dwellers; **Lost Ring**

At the July 31 meeting, city engineer Travis Wilson alerted the Monteagle Town Council to competition for and a likely shortage of contractors to implement the town's grant-funded sewer rehabilitation project. The council also entertained a discussion about affordable housing sparked by reports of people living in a tent. During announcements, Monteagle residents learned about a wedding ring found in the Country Mart parking lot.

The sewer rehabilitation work will be funded by America Rescue Plan (ARP) and Appalachian Regional Commission grants. Explaining the competition for contractors, engineer Wilson said many communities received ARP grant money for sewer rehabilitation. Monteagle must identify contractors by November 2024 and spend the ARP money by November 2026. "We're well posed to proceed," Wilson said. "Your project is not hard, but your location is not easy, and it's going to be a small project. Your location hurts you and the size of the project." He stressed his firm had a good relationship with trenchless contractors who performed the specialty services needed for the project and that would help facilitate scheduling.

Reporting on codes violations, Travis Lawyer said regarding the tent dwellers, "They've been in a tent for a few months. We're trying to remediate it with a heart to get them where they need to go. We're pursuing having the property owner take action." Alderwoman Dorraine Parmley said she found a tent near her house "that had sleeping stuff in it, cooking stuff, and a machete." Mayor Greg Maloof email Tom Phelps with any quesasked Lawyer to "look into" the other instance of tent dwelling, as well. During the comment period, resident Dean Lay said, "According to the census, 25 percent [of area residents] are below the poverty line. Affordable housing is a problem ... There's a dire shortage of workers in the businesses in Monteagle. There're no people up here to work because there's no place for them to live." Alderman Nate Wilson said the Community by Design initiative sponsored by the American Institute of Architects had identified affordable housing as an area needing addressed in the town planning process. Maloof recently signed a \$10,000 Lyndhurst Foundation grant to facilitate the planning project.

Resident Katie Trahan reported on finding a wedding ring in the Country Mart parking lot. She advised the person who lost the ring to phone her (931) 924-3301. Trahan will ask for a description.



mileage federal vehicles for use by the police department, cost \$14,100. Police Chief William Raline said finding suitable vehicles at such a low cost was "very rare. All we'll need to do is stripe them and put lights on them." The department's current vehicles have 97,000-100,000 miles. One will be rotated out of service. Money in the capital budget will fund the purchase. Raline also reported a significant decrease in the number of calls which he attributed to increased police presence and traffic control. From April 15-May 15, the police made 503 calls. From June 15-July 15 the department made 363 calls. Thefts were also down, Raline said.

The council convened at 4:30 p.m., a change from the regular meeting time of 6 p.m. Maloof said the earlier time was more convenient for department heads who did not "have to hang around until 6 p.m. for the meeting." Alderpersons Jessica Favaloro, Parmley, and Wilson favored returning to the 6 p.m. meeting time. Favaloro and Wilson said they were contacted by residents whose jobs prevented them from attending at the earlier time.

At present for R-1 residential, the minimum is 800 square feet and 600 square feet for R-2 and R-3. Commissioners Richard Black and Rollins maintained the 600 square foot minimum was too low. Alderman Nate Wilson said the commission should consider the impact on affordable housing before increasing the minimum. "It will raise the bar for local people to afford housing," Wilson said. Increasing the size from 600 to 800 square feet would increase the cost by \$40,000. "What problem are you trying to fix?" Wilson asked. Provost said concerns about tiny homes prompted the discussion. Wilson pointed out Monteagle had size rules for tiny homes, only allowed them in R-4, but had no R-4. The



Coach Max has shaped many lives, and his legacy will continue to ripple, inspiring future generations of swimmers for years to come. — by Anna Obermiller


Fowler Center Summer Hours

Giant Silk Moths and a Weasel

National Moth Week last week brought some impressive sightings. **Teesha Tiller** found three Imperial moths on her porch and a Polyphemus. That same day I found both those species on my porch plus another large, colorful Regal moth. These are all members of the Saturniid or giant silk moth family of moths, named for the rings around the eyespots of some of them, compared with the rings around the planet Saturn. The adults of moths in this family do not eat and therefore live only a short time, their purpose only to reproduce. The Imperial moths have impressive cryptic coloration and can look just like a browning tulip poplar or other leaf. Polyphemus moths are named for the one-eyed giant cyclops in Greek mythology. Teesha noted that the eyespots are transparent and that the feathery antennae of the male are larger that those of the female. All these moths have large, colorful caterpillars with knobs or spines. The caterpillar of the Regal moth is known as the Hickory Horned Devil and is especially impressive.

Trail Friends are stationed at these trailheads during periods of high visitor traffic to welcome hikers, provide information and answer questions about the trails.

Since implementation, Trail Friends have assisted thousands of park visitors with information about the special attractions in the parks, the range and specifics of what is here, and about critical safe behaviors. Fall Season 2022 marked the beginning of the sixth year of service to the park.

In Savage Gulf State Park, trailheads Trail Friends typically staff include Savage Gulf North (Stone Door) in the Beersheba area; Savage Gulf West (Greeter Falls), near Altamont; Savage Gulf East (Savage Falls). In South Cumberland State Park, Trail Friends typically staff Fiery Gizzard North (Grundy Forest), in Tracy City; and Fiery Gizzard South (Foster Falls), between Tracy City and Jasper.

Volunteers are generally needed from 8 a.m. to 4 p.m. on weekends and holidays, during peak Park visitation periods. Volunteers sign up on the Tennessee State Parks volunteer website (Galaxy Digital) to work at the trailhead of their choice, at times and on days of their choosing. Trail Friends volunteers wear identifying apparel and identification badges; and set out signage at the trailhead so park visitors know that the Trail Friends are there to help.

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
