## Monteagle Planning Considers Usage Leniency in Zoning

At the Aug. 3 meeting, the Monteagle Planning Commission recommended the city council adopt a zoning amendment allowing for additional non-conforming uses of C-2 commercial property upon review by the planning commission. The commission also considered zoning amendments to allow for single family dwellings on R-3 property designated for multi-family dwellings and to allow multi-family dwellings on C-2 property designated for commercial use.

A request by property owner Frank Maxwell to build on to his residence and build accessory structures prompted the amendment to allow for additional nonconforming uses on C-2 commercial property. Prior to Maxwell's ownership, the property's zoning changed to commercial to accommodate a military museum on the same tract. The two tracts are now separate properties (See Messenger May 7, 2021). The commission approved the language of the amendment drafted by town planner Garret Haynes which allows building onto existing residential structures and building accessory residential structures on C-2 property. The council will need to approve the proposed

amendment on two readings.
Revisiting Jerry VanHooser's request to rezone his South Central Avenue lot from R-3 to R-1 to allow him to build a single-family dwelling (See Messenger June 4, 2021), building inspector Earl Geary instead recommended the commission amend the zoning ordinance limiting R-3 property to multi-family dwellings to allow for single family dwellings as well.

"If you want a single-family residence and you don't mind townhouses or apartments, go for it," Geary said. Geary noted a large number of properties in Monteagle were zoned R-3. Before the 2018 zoning ordinance passed, Geary said R-3 allowed any type of residence permitted on R-1, which specifies single-family homes only. Haynes will draft the proposed amendment and present it to the council for review.

Dean Lay, owner of seven West Main lots zoned C-2, proposed the commission consider amending the C-2 commercial zoning ordinance to allow for multi-family dwellings upon review by the commission. Lay argued feasibility studies showed Monteagle's population would not support retail growth. Lower income people had been "priced out of Monteagle," Lay said. Pointing to Monteagle's housing shortage, he observed increasingly people did not want to be homeowners, and many commu-

## University Masking Policy Update

Last week, the Centers for Disease Control (CDC) updated its recommendations around masking due to the spread of the Delta variant—which is markedly more transmissible than earlier strains of the COVID-19 virus.

Now, the CDC recommends that both fully vaccinated and unvaccinated people wear masks indoors when in areas with "substantial" or 'high" transmission of COVID-19. Three counties constitute our area of concern and, according to the CDC, Franklin, Marion, and Grundy counties currently meet those conditions.


Based on that guidance, the University is updating its masking policy. Effective on Aug. 3, 2021, and until further notice, all students, employees, and visitors must wear face coverings/masks over their nose and mouth when they are in public spaces inside all University buildings. While outdoors, masks are not required unless otherwise indicated by the University.

The University urges everyone who has not yet been vaccinated to do so at your earliest opportunity to help protect yourself and your loved ones. #### **HELP TO KEEP CHILDREN SAFE**

To the Editor:

All parents want their children to be safe and healthy and to get a good education. They buckle them into car seats, take them to the pediatrician, and send them to school, where most of them learn masking for all children, teachers, best. Last year, transmission of CO-VID was limited in schools with a layered approach of masking, social distancing, hand washing, and good ventilation, among other efforts. This year we have a far more effective strategy to add to these ef- mask is as basic as wearing a seatbelt forts: vaccination. Unfortunately, Tennessee has one of the lowest vaccine rates in the U.S. (only 39 percent fully vaccinated, 43rd in the nation), and Franklin County has one of the lowest vaccine rates (30 percent) in Tennessee. Only 23 percent of teenagers ages 12-17 in Tennessee have had their first dose -this is the 5th lowest in the nation.

There is an alarming rise in COVID cases in Tennessee (+222 percent in the last 2 weeks) as a result of the rapidly spreading learn from Delta variant, which is far more thing too. contagious than the original strain. Additionally, this strain causes more severe disease, resulting in hospitalization in younger people. Currently we are experiencing a "pandemic of the unvaccinated," and all children under 12 remain at risk as they are not yet eligible to be vaccinated. Children now make up 20 percent of COVID cases in the U.S. as compared to 2 percent last year. To protect our children, we need to surround them with vaccinated individuals as we have done for other infectious diseases. Fortunately, the vaccines are effective against this new strain. Most children did not get severe disease with the original strain of COVID, but more children are being hospitalized with the Delta variant in the

Southern U.S., where the vaccination rate is low. Recently, a healthy 5 year old boy died in Chattanooga from COVID: <a href="https://www.">https://www.</a> cbsnews.com/news/covid-death-5-year-old-boy-georgia/>. Death is still very rare in children but every pediatric death due to COVID is heartbreaking and preventable.

Both the CDC and the AAP (American Academy of Pediatrics) recommend universal indoor staff, and visitors to K-12 schools, whether or not they are vaccinated. We should heed the advice of our leaders in health care and follow the science for opening schools safely to protect our children. Wearing a and using car seats for younger children. Parents love their children and want to protect them from car accidents and infectious diseases, like COVID. Even if masks are not required at school this year, please encourage your child to wear a mask to protect themselves and others. Most children have adapted to wearing masks, understand the need for masks, and wear masks willingly. Our children have readily done the right thing; we can



nities now favored apartments in downtown commercial corridors.

"What's your vision?" Chair Iva Michelle Russell asked Lay who served as Monteagle mayor in the 1980s and played an active role in drafting Monteagle's original zoning ordinances.

"The vision should be what the people here want," Lay said. If zoning regulations change to allow for multi-family homes, Lay is considering constructing apartments, condominiums, and possibly assisted living dwellings.

"We need housing, for sure," Russell said.

Lay noted increased internet sales made brick-and-mortar retail use of his lots less attractive, but he did not advocate rezoning the corridor, which adjoins Clifftops, to R-3. Mayor Marilyn Campbell Rodman cast a favorable nod to Lay's suggestion to amend C-2 zoning to allow for multi-family dwellings. The commission will take the proposal under consideration.

Revisiting Lakeside Collision's request for final site plan approval, discussion focused on fencing. Attorney Paul Cross said, "We're here because [owner Christian Ojeda] was stopped in doing what he thought was complying with a plat approved about a year ago." Ojeda purchased chain link fence and intended to cover it with largely opaque material.

Haynes said a security fence was permitted for this type of use, a body shop, but if inoperable vehicles were behind the fence, a screening fence was required. Haynes recommended a wooden fence

Geary said, according to the city zoning ordinance, a chain link fence could not be used for a screening fence.

Ojeda said no inoperable vehicles were parked outside.

Commissioner Dorraine Parmley suggested Ojeda erect a wooden fence outside the chain link fence satisfying both criteria.

Rodman commented city attorney Sam Elliot was reviewing a number of zoning discrepancies inherited from the prior administration.

The commission asked Ojeda to submit a revised site plan.

At the meeting's outset, Russell announced commissioner Mary Jane Flowers had resigned.



#### The First National Bank of Tracy City

Tracy City was a thriving town in 1904 with some 3,000 citizens in a county of more than 8,000. The First National Bank of Tracy City opened its doors in temporary quarters on July 18, 1904, across Depot Street from Grundy Bank. Behind those doors were men like F.B. Martin of Tullahoma. The group he headed applied on May 30, 1904 to federal officials for authority to commence banking. That authority was granted June 24, 1904. The new bank was so successful that its competitor Grundy Bank, closed within six months.

The first board of directors included F.B. Martin of Traders National Bank of Tullahoma and Alan Parker of the First National Bank of Tullahoma; Martin Marugg, F.M.C. White, W.A. Haynes, W.B. Holt and Victor Flury, all of Tracy City; and E.W. Holcombe and L.V. Woodlee of Altamont.

F.B. Martin purchased 50 of the bank's original 250 shares, valued at \$100 each. The bank's first cashier, W.G. Dillon of Tracy City, who had been principal of James K. Shook School for 10 years, bought 25 shares. Board members and citizens from Grundy County and beyond purchased stock. The initial capital stock of \$25,000 would grow in seven years to \$250,000 and eventually to almost \$8 million.

The board elected F.B. Martin as the bank's first president. In the opening announcement for the bank, W.G. Dillon, cashier, stated:

"If you have money laid away in various hiding places, bring it to the bank where it will be absolutely safe and at the same time bring you 4 percent interest, provided you deposit for a period of at least 6 months.

"As cashier, I will add, that if I did not feel that the business of banking demands the same degree of honest and fair dealing as teaching, I would not undertake the business at all.

"Come and see us and, if you entrust your business to us, we promise to give you the best service in our power."

Successors to F.B. Martin as president were Martin Marugg, R.B. Roberts, Sam Werner, Carl Roberts, Everett Roberts, John Stiller,

David Tyrone, Ray Trussell and Jerry Don Thomas. The person most closely associated with the bank for the longest period of time was Alvin L. Henderson, cashier from 1934 to 1971. During his 37 years there, he became the face of the bank. A colorful bachelor who wore thick horn-rimmed glasses and smoked cigars, Henderson could be quite garrulous. If anyone had something to talk about, he did. He was at the center of a bizarre attempt on May 28, 1947, to rob the bank. In the early hours of that day an intruder at his home with a .45 caliber automatic pistol and forced Henderson to drive to the bank. The abductor wanted the \$50,000 payroll of the coal company at Palmer that was to be paid to the 500 employees there the next day. Henderson explained that he could not open the bank safe without his eyeglasses that had been left at home and even if the outer door were opened, the inner door to the vault was protected by a time lock device. As Henderson ostensibly was being returned home for his eyeglasses, the bandit forced him to turn back on the "old Jasper Road" in the direction of Foster Falls. Not far from Tracy City another car fell in behind Henderson's car. Near Foster Falls, Henderson was directed into a side road, told to stop, forced to lie down in the back seat, and covered with a coat. The bandit took the keys to Henderson's car, and got into the trailing vehicle, which then drove off. Henderson freed himself and started walking toward Tracy City. Soon he was picked up by a car that included a practicing naturopath, whose office was on the second floor of the bank building. In the meantime, alerted by Henderson's mother with whom he lived, Grundy County Sheriff, D.F. Grooms, and Tracy City Marshall, Ike Sartin, Jr., arrested two men from New Jersey in Chattanooga and charged them with attempted bank robbery. Henderson identified the older of the two as his kidnapper. Two days later the naturopath was arrested and charged with conspiracy in connection with the attempted bank robbery. The younger of the men, who was 17 years of age, told the story of how he and his companion had come to Tennessee from New Jersey for "a money deal." He had been assured by his older companion that the Tracy City job would succeed because they had a doctor in Tracy City who was making all the plans, had an office in the building, and was familiar with the building. The younger man was sentenced to the state reformatory until age 21. The older companion was convicted of attempted bank robbery and the naturopath with complicity. Henderson continued to serve at the bank as cashier until his retirement.

The bank opened a branch in Monteagle on July 18, 1969. Barry Griswold was named assistant vice president and manager of the branch operation. In August 1973 a permanent building was opened for the facility.

By 1972, when John Wilson purchased the bank, it had survived the Great Depression, two fires, three attempted burglaries and one embezzlement by its own president. Charles N. Turner acquired the bank in 1978 and converted it from a national bank to a state bank, becoming the First Bank and Trust of Tracy City and Monteagle. In 1985 the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation seized the bank and it was merged it with First National Bank of Shelbyville. In 1998, First National Bank of Shelbyville merged with Union Planters Bank, N.A., which in 2002 sold the Tracy City and Monteagle facilities to Citizens Tri-County Bank.

In 2009 the bank building that had been built in 1904 and related facilities were sold by Citizens Tri-County Bank to Grundy County Historical Society who restored the 1904 structure to its original state and converted the facility into the Heritage Center.





## Yelverton Wins Two National Championships

William Yelverton, age 61 from Sewanee, won two National Championships at the USATF National Masters Track and Field Championships in Ames, Iowa on July 22-25. Competing in the M60 (60-64) age group, his first Championship came in the 400m which he won by more than 2 seconds in a time of 56.78, the fastest 400m time by an American over age 60 in nine years. Yelverton has held the World No. 1 ranking in the M60 400m event since July of 2020.

His second Championship came in the 200m event in a time of 25.36, presently the fastest M60 wind-legal 200m time in the World, second overall. In addition, Yelverton won the Silver medal in the 800m in a time of 2:18.74, and the Bronze medal in the 100m in 12.61. His semi-final time in the 100m was 12.43, presently ranked No. 2 in the World. It is believed Yelverton is the first man in the M60 age group in US masters track history to medal in the 100m, 200m, 400m, and 800m events at a USATF Masters National Championship meet.

The USA Track and Field Masters National Championships were attended by 1,051 athletes this year, the biggest turnout for a USATF Masters Championship in 7 years.

Yelverton is Visiting Professor of Music at the University of the South, and Professor of Music and Director of Guitar Studies at MTSU.



# 137 Student-Athletes Named to Easter Semester Dean's

The University of the South Department of Athletics saw great success in the classroom over the Easter Semester of the 2020-21 academic year. ## **NATURENOTES**

#### **Spiders Everywhere**

Starting this time of year and going into the fall seems to be the time of the spiders. It is hard to go out the door of the house or walk on the porch or get into a car parked outside with out running into a spider web. We even had one based on the side view mirror who rode all the way down to the valley and back. Currently there is a lovely orb-weaver on the porch with a web at perfect eye-level and out of the way of run-ins. It is in the genus Micrathena. These are the spiders with hard, glossy, spiny abdomens that seem to build their webs right across the trail. Another web on the porch next to the wall looks like a little spider igloo. I'm pretty sure it is in the genus Ariadna. The web has a tube extending into the crack between the floorboards of the porch and is surrounded by a complex of fine strands. At night, our headlamps pick up spider "eyeshine," most likely from wolf spiders, who don't spin webs. We only noticed this when wearing headlamps, because they shine the light at the right angle to be reflected from the eyes of the spider. You can get the same effect by holding a flashlight at the top of your head. These spiders have a special layer behind the retina in four of their eight eyes which reflects light back onto the retina and produces the green glow of "eyeshine." This gives these spiders the next best eyesight among spiders, which aides them in hunting their prey at night. We are amazed at how many there are, at times, on the road or in the leaf litter.

## Few Slots Remain in Naturalist Program

A few openings remain for this year's Tennessee Naturalist Program (TNP), set to begin Sept. 11 at the South Cumberland State Park.

The mission of TNP is to "teach Tennesseans about our natural world, instilling an appreciation of responsible environmental stewardship, and channeling volunteer efforts toward education of the general public and conservation of Tennessee's natural resources."

TNP consists of 10, four-hour courses held over two semesters, and covers a wide range of topics and disciplines unique to the South Cumberland. These include geology and ecology, plants, forests, birds, mammals, invertebrates, reptiles and amphibians, aquatic environments, nocturnal organisms and naturalist skills.

Each class features both classroom lecture and outdoor field components. All classes are integral to the core course and may not be taken individually.

Certified Tennessee Naturalists will complete all course work, and 40 hours of volunteer work. There is a \$250 tuition fee, per person, for the course. The TNP will adhere to all CDC COVID-19 guidelines, and social distancing will be maintained during classroom work.



#### Anniversary of Hiroshima (Aug. 6, 1945)

Why did such terrible events catch my eye? After Hiroshima, I turned the picture in *Life* around in circles, trying to figure out this huge wheel in the middle of the air, how it turned, like a ferris wheel, its lights burning like eyes. The atom spinning on course over the sleeping vulnerable planet. I turned it the way one might turn a kaleidoscope or prism. Even then I knew about the town lying under, like a child sleeping under the watchful gaze of a rapist, before the spasm of stopped breath, the closure at the scream of the throat, before the body is awakened along its shocked spine to bursting light, the legs closing, the arms, like a chilled flower. 
