SUD Commissioner Election: Meet the Candidates

The three candidates scheduled to appear on the ballot for the upcoming Sewanee Utility District Board of Commissioners election are Ronnie Hoosier, Donnie McBee, and Phil White. Two seats are open to be filled. SUD customers can vote Jan. 2 through Jan. 20 at the SUD office during regular business hours. Other prospective candidates who wish to appear on the ballot must submit a petition signed by 10 SUD customers no later than Dec. 30. Read on to earn about the candidates' quali-

Ronnie Hoosier grew up in Sewanee and in 1979 went to work for the University as an electrician, a position he held until his retirement after 43 years. Hoosier also served 40 years as a volunteer fireman with the Sewanee Fire Department. He cites his mechanical skills and knowledge as valuable assets he will bring to the SUD board, as well as the experience gleaned from serving two prior terms as a SUD commissioner. Hoosier was forced to step down because he was term limited by the rules in place at the time. "I want to serve the community as a board member and to continue the great work the Sewanee Utility district is already doing," Hoosier said. "SUD's challenges are no different from anyone else's high inflation and the cost of doing business. I have confidence SUD can meet these challenges head-on and continue to supply safe, clean drinking water to Sewanee and the

surrounding area."
Current SUD board member Donnie McBee is seeking reelection. Aside from two years in Winchester, McBee has lived in Sewanee his entire life. "I care about SUD customers and their concerns as well as the sound operation of the water department as a whole," McBee said. "This sometimes requires making tough decisions," McBee acknowledged, "but I enjoy the challenge." He has a track record of bringing customer concerns to the table bridging the ing. 

SUD: Commissioner Election, University Apartments, Water Pumps by Leslie Lytle, Messenger Staff Writer

At the Dec. 16 meeting, the Sewanee Utility District Board of Commissioner approved a slate of three candidates for the upcoming commissioner election. The board also approved the University's request for availability for water and sewer service for 48 apartments and the purchase of two raw water pumps to replace aging pumps at

the water treatment plant.
Two seats on the SUD Board of Commissioners will come open in January. As required by regulations, the board nominated a slate of three

Critical Park Inholding Purchased for **Protection**

The Tennessee State Parks Conservancy and Friends of South Cumberland State Parks today announced that they have partnered to purchase a critical inholding within the Grundy Lakes area of Fiery Gizzard State Park. The groups intend eventually to transfer ownership to the state park.

Although small - only about an acre - protecting the property has large implications. Particularly because it is completely surrounded by the park, potential private use and development could have disrupted visitors and park management alike. The property has significant recreational, ecological, cultural, and historical value. It contains portions of an important archaeological site (Lone Rock Stockade); a park trail crosses the property; and it is in plain view of Grundy Lake and the beach.

"The Conservancy is thrilled to join forces with the Friends of Parks. Together, we are preserving an acre of ground that preserves placed. The one on my road is over 100 years old. SUD will need to renessee's history," said Alex Wyss, Executive Director of the Tennessee State Parks Conservancy.



He is survived by his brother James Waring McCrady; sister, Sarah "Sally" McCrady Hubbard; wife, Diane McCollum Mc-Crady; sons, Edward Heath (Victoria Holt) and John Waring (Bethany Alice) McCrady; grandsons Robert Theron, John Roland, and Tucker Hunan McCrady; and adopted son Billy Browning.

John was an electrical engineer and part of the team that developed the first hand-held electronic calculator; a musician and one of the founders of the Dallas Folk Music Society; a teacher of computer science and other sciences at several schools; a scoutmaster for multiple Boy Scout troops; a lover and restorer of musical instruments; an active member of first the Episcopal and later the Unitarian Church; and a loving support to everyone who knew him. He had a great love for the outdoors, and particularly for his childhood home of Sewanee and its many caves. He also had a great love for his "curiosity bug" and many patented inventions. His life was defined by a profound love of music; the sheer joy he took in learning, teaching, and maintaining a properly scientific attitude; and his unstinting care for the people around him. He will be deeply missed.

A memorial service was on Oct. 11 at First Unitarian Church of Dallas. John's funeral service will take place Saturday, Jan. 17, at 2 p.m. in the chancel of All Saints Chapel, followed by interment in the Cemetery next to his wife of 56 years, Martha Fogarty McCrady. A reception will follow at McGriff Alumni House.





The Mountain Lions will resume regular season play on Jan. 12 at Whitwell before hosting Whitwell at home Jan. 16.

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


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SAS Varsity Boys' Basketball Update

The second half remained tight through the opening minutes, with Sewanee pushing ahead 61-53 after a Reid Carrier three and a layup from Aidan Treacy. However, the Scots responded with a decisive 22-7 run fueled by seven Covenant players registering points. Covenant scored 37 points off turnovers and finished the night shooting 46 percent from the field.

Covenant was led by Logan Patterson's 23 points and five steals, while Noah Pence and Korbin Long each added 14 and 13 points, respectively.

Sewanee dominated the glass 61-40 and scored 46 points in the paint, but Sewanee shot just 15% from behind the arc and Covenant's pressure and perimeter shooting proved the difference late.



Sewanee set the tone early, jumping out to a 12-3 lead behind 11 quick points from Falvey and baskets from Boyd and Cleveland in the opening two-and-a-half minutes. The Tigers forced six steals and nine Covenant turnovers in the opening quarter, closing the period on a 15-3 run highlighted by scores from Boyd, Cleveland, Micha Lovelace, and Falvey to take a 32-13 lead after one.

The Tigers continued to control the game in the second quarter, opening the period with a steal and fast-break layup from Everett. Sewanee shot 69.2 percent from the field in the quarter and knocked down three three-pointers from Grace Gavin and Brianna Keating-Rendon. Covenant found some success in the paint late, but Sewanee answered with a 10-3 run over the final three minutes to carry a 55-29 advantage into halftime.

Sewanee maintained momentum in the third quarter, opening the half with five unanswered points to extend the lead to 31. Boyd and Falvey continued to pace the offense as the Tigers capitalized on Covenant turnovers. Despite an 11-3 run by the Scots late in the quarter, Sewanee held a 30-point lead heading into the final period.

The Tigers maintained control in the fourth quarter, scoring eight points while limiting Covenant to 13, to close out the 90-65 victory.

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NATURENOTES

Hawks (and a Kestrel)

Now that the trees are bare, it seems that we notice more frequently the hawks hunting from their branches or other perches. The most common one in the Sewanee area seems to be the Redshouldered Hawk. It is a resident of deciduous woods, especially around water. One hangs around our pond, keeping the frog population, especially the bullfrogs, under control. An adult in flight has a narrowly banded tail in black and white. Its call, a repeated "kee-yur," is imitated by Blue Jays. In general, the most common roadside hawk is the Red-tailed Hawk, which indeed has a red tail. It is stockier than the Red-Shouldered and hunts in more open areas, feeding mainly on small rodents. These two hawks are in the group called buteos, hawks with broad wings and wide, rounded tails. A third hawk in this group, the Broadwinged Hawk, is seen less often in our area but can sometimes be spotted by its distinctive high-pitched whistle while soaring. Otherwise it lives mainly in the tree canopy. Its banded tail has only two or three white bands as compared with the more narrowly banded tail of the Red-shouldered Hawk. It is also smaller. This is the hawk that has been observed migrating in great numbers at Hawk Mountain in Pennsylvania in the fall heading to tropical South America. The other two mentioned here are year-round in our area. Another group of hawks, the accipiters, are smaller, with short, rounded wings and long, barred tails. In our area one may see the Sharp-shinned Hawk or the larger Cooper's Hawk. They feed on small birds, so they may show up at your feeder. They mostly do not soar, as the buteos do. Finally, the American Kestrel, or "Sparrow Hawk," should be mentioned, as one may see it hunting from power lines in the valley. It is not a hawk but a falcon, about the size of a large jay, with rufous coloring. It hunts by hovering and dropping on its prey. It is year-round in our area.






