Community Council Special Election

The Sewanee Community Council will be conducting a special election to fill a Council Representative position for District 4, the boundaries of which are Tennessee Avenue, University Avenue, Texas Avenue, and down Alto Road/ Roarks Cove Road to the edge of the Domain. The term will run until December 2022.

To be a candidate, residents must reside in or on a boundary of District 4, be a registered voter place there. in Sewanee, and turn in a petition with the signatures of 10 resident voters in District 4 to the Provost's Office by noon on Thursday, Feb. 3. Petitions are available at the Office of Leases and Community Relations (Blue House). If there is more than one eligible candidate, District 4 resident voters will be able to vote from Monday, Feb. 7 to Friday, Feb. 25 during business hours at the Office of Leases and Community Relations (Blue House).

SAS Receives Significant Gift to Endow Performing Arts Facility

John S. Zeigel, "Jack," a member of the St. Andrew's class of 1952, stepped up to the challenge. In 2007, Zeigel informed SAS that the school had been included as a beneficiary of his estate. When he died in March 2021 at age 86, St. Andrew's-Sewanee was informed that Zeigel had left more than \$1.8 million to provide for the general endowment of the school and to establish the John Stoufer Zeigel Fund to permanently support the operation and maintenance of SAS's McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts and the music and drama programs which take place there.

A native of Colorado and longtime resident of Santa Fe, Zeigel was born into a prominent New Mexico family. His father was a ranchowning physician, and his mother a classically trained pianist. After graduating from St. Andrew's, Jack received his undergraduate degree from Pomona College and pursued advanced studies in the classics at Harvard. He would go on to teach at Cal Tech, in the University of Colorado system in Grand Junction, and ultimately gained distinction as Professor of English Emeritus at Mesa State University. Influenced by his mother, Jack's musical proficiency was with the violin. He publicly performed the Mendelssohn Violin Concerto as a teenager. Decades later, in retirement, Jack maintained a strong interest in musical organizations, frequently attending concerts and opera performances, and serving on the board of the Grand Junction Symphony. Dedicated in 2009, McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts was made

Dedicated in 2009, McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts was made possible through the generosity of Martha McCrory, longtime director of the Sewanee Summer Music Center at the University of the South, and the many donors who joined McCrory in wanting to provide St. Andrew's-Sewanee and the surrounding community with an outstanding space for musical performance. An arts venue for the region, as well as an auditorium for the school, the building also provides space for the school's music classes, rehearsals, private lessons, theatre, technical theatre, and songwriting and recording programs.

The facility includes a 300-seat, acoustically rich auditorium, a music classroom, and a recording studio. Each year, thousands of patrons come to McCrory Hall to enjoy plays, musicals, speakers, and concerts. The SAS student body gathers in the hall several times a week for all-school assemblies. In recent years, McCrory Hall has welcomed performances by the Sewanee Summer Music Festival. McCrory Hall for the Performing Arts has also hosted a variety of professional performances, including Amanda Shires, the Vega Quartet, the Blakemore Trio, Jack Pearson, Act of Congress, Emma King and the Heart Sets, the Tennessee Fiddle Ensemble, the MTSU Guitar Quartet, the Anima Baroque Ensemble, and more.

"Many years ago," said SAS Head of School Karl Sjolund, "Jack told a member of our staff 'Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also.' We are grateful that Jack's heart and treasure were at St. Andrew's-Sewanee. We look forward to honoring his memory with beautiful music for many generations to come."

Thanks to the generosity of its alumni and friends, the St. Andrew's-Sewanee School's endowment currently exceeds \$25 million.

Robert Gardiner Hynson, age 76, of Laurel, Miss., died on Dec. 21, 2021, in Big Sky, Mont., of undetermined causes. He graduated from the University of the South with a B.A. in Political Science, and was a member of Phi Delta Theta, the Visiting

Committee, the Capital Campaign and the Board of Trustees. He was a veteran of the U.S. Army, serving in South Vietnam in Americal Division, 198th Light Infantry Brigade, 5114 Artillery, and received a Bronze Star for Meritorious Service and an Army Commendation medal for Valor, completing his service in Fort Hood, Texas in the Second Armored Division. He was a Life Member of the Americal Division Veterans Association. Afterward, he was director and officer with his family's companies, and founded Tallahoma Companies for oil and gas properties, real estate and construction. 




Community Chest Spotlight: Sewanee Community Center

The 2021-22 Sewanee Community Chest Fund Drive is underway. Sponsored by the Sewanee Civic Association, the Sewanee Community Chest raises money yearly for local charitable organizations serving the area. This year's goal of \$102,291 will help 20 organizations that have requested basic needs funding for quality of life, community aid, children's programs, and those who are beyond Sewanee but still serve our entire community.

This week we shine the spotlight on the Sewanee Community Center. The purpose of the Sewanee Community Center is to improve the quality of life in Sewanee by providing a space for community-initiated programs and projects. The Center is truly a space that unites the community. Everyone from college students to senior citizens to young children of all ages use the space. A sample of the programs include the South Cumberland Farmer's Market, yoga, tai chi, gymnastics, dance classes, Scout meetings, meditation workshops, chair exercise and dog obedience training. The Sewanee Community Center supports small business enterprises through the local online farmer's market in addition to those who teach classes for income. Approximately 800 individuals are using the Center for various purposes each month.

The Sewanee Community Center will receive \$4,000 from the Sewanee Community Chest for general operating support in the quality-oflife funding area. This grant will be used for the general operating costs of keeping the Center open including utilities, insurance, maintenance, mowing and manager's salary.

Since 1908, the goal of the Sewanee Community Chest has been to help citizens by funding the community. With Community Chest donations, local organizations provide for basic needs such as books, food, animal care, housing, scholarships, recreational spaces, elder care, children's educational needs and more. Sprinter in Age Group

William Yelverton, age 61 of Sewanee, finished the year as the world's fastest 400m sprinter over age 60, running 56.23 in his last meet, breaking the 32 year old Ontario Masters meet record in Toronto last August. The recently completed 2021 World Masters 400m Rankings list in the M60 (60-64) age group included performances from over 460 competitors representing 36 countries. At the 2021 USATF Masters National Championships in Ames, Iowa, Yelverton won National titles in the 400m and 200m, as well as a Silver in the 800m and a Bronze in the 100m, becoming the first person in USATF Masters history to medal in all four events at a National Championship in his age group. His world leading 400m time is 1.33 seconds ahead of the next fastest. Yelverton competed in 16 track meets in 2021, including three college meets, a total of 28 races. William Yelverton is a Visiting Professor Music at The University of the South.

January Jottings

Earlier this week, Deborah Tucker sent in this beautiful photo of a jelly fungus "glinting in the snow." Interestingly, this type of fungus is parasitic on another fungus which grows on dead wood.

Looking out my window at the snowy landscape last Monday, the only creature I saw moving was a "snowbird," a junco. They are mostly dark gray, sparrow-like birds and easily identifiable by the white on their bellies and under their tails and the flash of white outer tail feathers as they fly away. The common subspecies in our area is the slate-colored junco. Many of our songbirds have migrated south for the winter to Central and South America, but the juncoes have migrated south to us here in the eastern United States from their breeding grounds in the coniferous forests and mixed woods of Canada. Since they prefer more open areas in the non-breeding season, we have the pleasure of their company in our yards and around our feeders.

The full moon last Monday is called by some the Wolf Moon, due to hearing wolves howling in the winter around villages in Europe and North America. Other cultures had other names: Old Moon, Cold Moon, Holiday Moon (China), and Hay Moon (Southern Hemisphere). Perhaps in Sewanee we could start calling it the Coyote Moon?

A minor mystery: our small pond shows circular areas of differences in icing and melting. Why circular? Why differences? Perhaps it has something to do with differences in the pond depth and related water temperature. Nature Note would be happy to hear from anyone with an explanation.




