Everyone picking up backpacks at the upcoming Grundy County Back to School Bash will also receive a week's worth of bulk lunch supplies per child as part of the 2023 South Cumberland Summer Meal Program.

Hosted jointly by the Grundy County Health Council and the Grundy County Health Department, the drive-through event, scheduled from 8-11 a.m., Wednesday, July 19, will take place at Grundy County High School. The Back to School Bash is free for all county residents with school-aged children (Pre-K through grade 12). Anyone in Grundy County who needs school supplies is welcome to attend the event.

Children will receive backpacks filled with school supplies and educational/health information as well as a week's worth of free lunches. Parent attendees will receive resources from local community agencies.

"The annual Back to School Bash helps students to be prepared emotionally, mentally and physically for their first day of school. We are very excited to partner with local organizations to serve children and families in Grundy County. I would like to give a special thanks to all the agencies that helped with donations for the event," said Sofia Leon-Meza, Assistant Health Promotion Director for the TN Department of Health-Southeast

Region.
South Cumberland Community Fund Community Development Director Katie Goforth is also looking forward to the event. "Each year, organizations across the Plateau partner with the Grundy County Health Council and Grundy County Schools to distribute free school supplies to students," Goforth said. It's an exciting and ambitious venture, with a goal to distribute 3,500 lunches to Grundy County children."

If you want to check out MARC's facility, please let me know and we will arrange a tour.



Tennessee Sales Tax Holidays

For 2023, there are two sales tax holidays. The Tennessee General Assembly approved a three-month sales tax holiday on groceries. The traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies, and computers will also take place the last weekend of July

Tennessee's traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers is the last full weekend in July. For 2023, it begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 28, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, July 30, 2023.

For 2023, Tennessee's General Assembly has approved a threemonth grocery tax holiday on food & food ingredients which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 1, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 31, 2023.

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

Franklin State Forest Restrictions

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture's Division of Forestry (TDF) is amending and extending the temporary restrictions of Franklin State Forest located in Franklin and Marion Counties. Public motorized vehicle use will continue to be prohibited while non-motorized traffic, such as hiking, horseback riding, and mechanical bicycles will be allowed through January 4, 2024.

"Damage from motorized vehicles, especially in non-designated areas, is extensive at Franklin State Forest," State Forester David Arnold said. "We have been assessing conditions since March and have determined significant impact to erosion control, water quality, forest health, and other forms of recreation. This extension of some restrictions will provide our forest staff time to make repairs and consider future use on all forest roads and trails to adequately protect, conserve, and enhance this public forest for future generations."

Under the amended restrictions for Franklin State Forest, all motorized vehicle use including, but not limited to, motorcycles, dirt bikes, all-terrain vehicles, and off-highway vehicles is prohibited. This restriction is mandated pursuant to Tenn. Comp. R. & Regs. 0080-07-01-.05 for the protection of Franklin State Forest and the safety and welfare of visitors. Motorized vehicles are allowed to access the three designated parking areas on the forest.

Failure to comply with this use restriction is a violation of state law and may result in civil penalties and/or criminal charges. This order expires on January 4, 2024, unless extended or otherwise rescinded by the State Forester.

Law enforcement with the department's Agricultural Crime Unit (ACU) have continued to patrol Franklin State Forest. One arrest was made following multiple notices of violations. ACU will continue to enforce restrictions.

Foresters are working to rehabilitate damaged roads and trails. So far, TDF staff have worked nearly 1,000 hours to repair 6 miles of roads damaged by motorized vehicles. Another 30 miles of roads and trails remain for repair and improvement.

Damage to forest resources from motorized vehicles is not limited to Franklin State Forest. The division is monitoring and assessing measures to correct abuses across the state forest system, which includes 15 state forests totaling 168,000 acres. For all other state forests, the use of motorcycles, trail bikes, all-terrain vehicles, bicycles, and other offroad vehicles in any area of a state forest is strictly prohibited, except on designated roads or trails maintained by TDF.

Franklin State Forest covers more than 8,830 acres on the southern Cumberland Plateau. It contains a variety of forest communities ranging from oak and hickory to plantations of loblolly pine. Within the forest boundaries are numerous caves, abandoned mines, waterfalls, overlooks, and other examples of natural beauty which have made the state forest a popular destination for recreational use.



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

She explains, "Each week, participants are given a different theme to capture or a particular technique to execute. The only real requirement, other than accomplishing the task, is that the picture must be taken during the week of the challenge. At the end of each week, 52 photographs are selected for special recognition for their quality and the technique used in fulfilling that week's challenge. To have a photo chosen for the "52 Picks" out of 3,500 entries is an honor that I have been thrilled to receive on four occasions.



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David Green: A Life of Love for His Community

Born on June 30, 1956, as Jimmy David Green, he attended Sewanee and Franklin County schools and was a member of the Franklin County High School Class of 1974. His Green family ancestors came to Sewanee in the mid-1800s.

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Men's Golf Finishes 14th and 16th in Final 2022-23 National Rankings

The University of the South men's golf team concluded the 2022-23 season with national rankings of 14th in the final GolfStat rankings and 16th in the Bushnell/ Golfweek Coaches Poll.

Sewanee finished third at the 2023 Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Men's Golf Championships with a 54-hole score of \$52 (282-277-293). The 852 they achieved set a new Sewanee record at the Championships, and it is the fifthlowest score at the event.

Additionally, the Purple and White's 277 in the second round ranks fourth in the championship records for lowest round.

In 2022-23, playing in 24 total rounds, the Tigers fired a 296.67 stroke average, as four Tigers recorded an average of 75 or lower.

Three Tigers finish the 2023 season ranked individually in the final GolfStat rankings: Pearse Lucas, Grayson Maddox and Ryan Demit.

Lucas, who earned a second straight All-America accolade earlier this month, finished the 2023 season ranked 29th. Qualifying for the NCAA Championships as an individual, the two-time SAA Player of the Year and All-SAA First Team selection averaged 73.5 strokes in 26 rounds.

Maddox had a strong second half to the schedule and finished the rankings at 55th. Earning First Team All-Conference accolades for the second time in his career, he fired a fourth place score of 210 (70-67-73) to achieve the lowest individual score for a Sewanee player at the SAA Championships and seventh overall.



Webb Greenhouse

The Webb Greenhouse is being utilized more fully now by students, and we are hoping to expand its use even further, both within the school, to disciplines in addition to biology, and within the community, exploring plants in the greenhouse, perhaps some workshops on growing.

Titan Arum Update

In a pleasant surprise for what wound up being more than 1,000 visitors, our Amorphophallus titanum bloomed for the second time in four years. The first time was just after July 4, 2020, but with little fanfare since COVID protocols weren't going to allow in greenhouse visitors. Putting up only one large leaf between the first flowering and this one is what made this a surprise. Typically two or more leaves (one per year) will be produced between flowering events. The big visitation day was Friday, with more than 800, after the inflorescence opened late Thursday afternoon. A great event for the University and the greenhouse. Unfortunately, the attempt to pollinate some of the female flowers did not result in fertilization, so we'll be back to the drawing board on this aspect in hopes of some fruit production with the next flowering.

On an additional note: the bottlebrush buckeyes are blooming, including a first time for ours. There is a nice specimen in front of the police building on campus. Take a close look at the flowersthey are lovely and attract butterflies and solitary bees. The USDA database shows it as native in South Carolina,



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
