Dreves Receives the Jim Prince Award

Rick Dreves, of Sewanee, received the 2021 Jim Prince Award from the Friends of South Cumberland State Park (FSC) during the annual meeting held June 19.

Dreves was recognized for his wide-ranging volunteer efforts, which include his work as secretary and Strategic Planning Committee chair, as well as former chair of FSC's Communications Committee. Dreves has provided leadership on several FSC projects, including its 2014 committee structure reorganization; 2018 renovation and interpretation of the historic CCC Camp in Grundy State Natural Area, with Project Lead Rob Moreland; development in 2020 of FSC's 5-year plan; the recent creation of a series of historical and informational interpretive panels, now installed throughout the park; and an initiative to make it easier for park visitors to navigate to SCSP's 12 trailheads, via a network of nearly 70 new highway signs that will be installed across the region later this summer.

Dreves remains an active member of FSC's Strategic Planning, Communications and Trails committees.

During the meeting, Park Manager George Shinn presented FSC Board Member Bruce Blohm and Dreves with his Golden Shell Awards, recognizing their joint efforts to create and implement a location-coded mile-marking system, now being installed by the FSC Trails Team across 85 miles of SCSP trails; and for their ongoing leadership efforts to maintain, repair and rebuild sections of the park's trail network.

FSC also elected new officers to serve on its 2021-2023 leadership term. Trae Moore was elected president. He previously served as vice president and chair of the FSC Development and Membership Committee.

Tom Sanders was elected vice president, and will succeed Moore as chair of the Development and Membership Committee. Blohm was elected as FSC Corporate Secretary, and also takes over as chair of FSC's Strategic Planning Committee, succeeding Dreves, who has most recently served in both of those positions.

Elected as new directors were John Collins, who will succeed Blohm as chair of the FSC Trails Committee; Dave Matherly, who will chair its Volunteer Resources Committee; and four at-large directors: Deb Dreves, Mary Priestley, Chris Van de Ven and Keri Watson. Outgoing FSC President John Hille and Dreves are closing out six years of service on the FSC Board. Rich Wyckoff concludes a 2-year term as treasurer.

Monteagle: Building Codes, Street Names, Dumping Policy

At the June 28 meeting, the Monteagle Council adopted new building codes, took steps to rectify street names with the 911 map, and clarified the usage policy for the convenience center. The council also announced Independence Day celebration plans.

Following the recommendation of Codes Enforcement Officer Earl Geary, the council adopted on first reading the 2018 building codes and appendix fee schedule. The city had been operating under the 2012 codes and 1997 fee schedule. Geary said state law requires municipalities use codes "within seven years of the latest edition." Alderman Nate Wilson noted "the recommended fees may be more geared to urban areas." Geary said 80 percent of the new home builders were coming to the area "from somewhere else" and were likely accustomed to higher fees. Mayor Marilyn Campbell Rodman said the municipal zoning codes committee could review the fees before the second reading of the building codes ordinance.

Also on Geary's recommendation, the council approved business permits for The Scoop ice-cream shop, High Vibes Healing Yoga and Sound Healing Studio, and Whimsy Willow home décor

and accessories. Geary observed it was "exciting" to see so many new businesses.

Resident Mike Roark brought to the council's attention that street signs were inconsistent with the 911 map. "911 says there is no such street as North Bluff Drive," Roark insisted. Roark experiences difficulty receiving deliveries. Roark will work with utilities manager John Condra and street superintendent Keith Butner to rectify the discrepancies.

In discussing the recent announcement that the convenience center does not allow commercial dumping, Rodman said, "We had residents who could not dump their garbage," because the compactor was full. The order to forbid commercial dumping came from Marion County Mayor David Jackson, according to Rodman. Marion County supplies the compactor. Nunley Sanitation owner Kenneth Nunley said the previous Marion County Mayor, John Graham, gave him permission to dump in Monteagle since there was no landfill on the Mountain. Rodman noted Graham served 10 years ago. She stressed Nunley operated a commercial business, so the no commercial dumping rule applied to him. Nunley said

he was not presently picking up his customers' trash and was exploring fee-based dumping at landfills. "Monteagle did not stop anyone from dumping or from running their business here," Rodman insisted. "It [the convenience center] is a service for residents."

Alderwoman Jessica Favaloro announced Monteagle would celebrate Independence Day on July 3 with parade lineup at 9 a.m. at the VFW. Parade entries can register that morning. The parade will be followed by a "cruise in" at 11 a.m., and fireworks at 9 p.m. Looking ahead, Favaloro cited the \$31,000 parks and recreation budget for the coming year and the need for \$30,000-\$40,000 in repairs at the ballfield. Janet Miller Schmidt is exploring grant opportunities.

The council approved the 2021-22 budget on second reading. Accountant Stephanie Brandon said \$65,000 was transferred to the capital replacement fund from the general fund, which had a \$106,000 surplus.

The council also approved the appointment of Travis Lawyer as assistant fire chief. Lawyer will receive a \$400 per month stipend and will help the department seek reimbursement for fire-fighting efforts when homeowners' insurance provides for compensation. Lawyer served as incident command for the SmokeHouse fire and the chemical spill.

Reporting on fire department needs, advisor Greg Maloof said the department's 25-year-old engine was out of service. Maloof estimated repair cost at \$8,000-\$12,000, and the cost of a new used engine at \$280,000, with grant funding a possibility.

Frank Maxwell expressed concern about lack of access at the Laurel Lake property he intends to develop. "We don't want to landlock anyone," Rodman said. She will have the attorney review the circumstances. Several of Maxwell's lots are not in the city limits.

Along with free summer meals, free books for children of all ages will be available next week at meal sites throughout Grundy County. Books will be available at Grundy County Elementary Schools on Wednesday and Thursday (July 7-8) during regularly scheduled meal distribution times. Books will also be available at Monteagle Greene Apartments and at the Grundy County Housing Authority. Please see schedule below for exact times and locations.

Books are available at Grundy County meal distribution sites thanks to a generous donation from Discover Together, "We are extremely grateful to Discover Together for generously supplying Grundy County children with free books. Moving forward we expect more books to be available at all meal distribution sites across the plateau, including locations in Franklin, Marion, and Grundy Counties," said VISTA Coordinator, Vicki Borchers.

Schedule Change: Please note that meal distribution at Coalmont, Pelham, and Tracy City Elementary Schools will now take place on Wednesdays from 10 a.m.–noon.

Free meals are available for all children 18 and younger, regardless of need. All families are encouraged to participate. At most locations, meals are distributed in drive-thru, grab-and-go fashion with as many as 10 meals per child available at one time. Children need not be present during meal distribution and any adult may pick up meals for children. This means grandparents, neighbors,

and parents are welcome to pick up free meals for children in their home or neighborhood.

The popular program prevents summer learning loss in children by providing nutritious meals and supplementary reading materials during the summer months. The program is a joint venture of the University of the South, the University's McClurg Dining Hall, the South Cumberland Community Fund, and the South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps VISTA Project. The VISTA Project administers the USDA-funded program and staffs meal distribution locations across the plateau each summer with up to 20 AmeriCorps Summer Associate VISTAs.

The University of the South in partnership with the South Cumberland Community Fund, operates the South Cumberland Summer Meal Program. The program is participating in the Summer Food Service Program (SFSP) administered by the Tennessee Department of Human Services under an agreement with the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA). The program operates through July 30, 2021.

New Bridge in Fiery Gizzard Trail Being Installed

Construction is now underway on the replacement footbridge that marks the start of the Fiery Gizzard Trail in the Grundy Forest State Natural Area near Tracy City, park officials have announced.

The previous wooden bridge washed out during heavy winter rains in early 2020. The new bridge, with all-aluminum construction, will feature a slightly longer span and aluminum piers, set in concrete; the new design is less likely to be impacted by periods of high water in the creek.

During the construction period, a portion of the Grundy Forest Day Loop has been re-routed up the hill, immediately behind the construction area. Hikers are asked to follow the arrows and stay on the temporary trail. A temporary access road is also in this immediate vicinity. Park officials are asking hikers to stay off the roadway, as it is extremely steep, not a trail and is frequently used by construction machinery as crews bring bridge sections and other materials down to the construction site.

Park officials say they hope and expect the initial bridge construction work to be complete within several weeks, after which new approach trails will need to be constructed to connect the bridge with the existing trail system in this area of the park.

Swimming & Diving Teams Achieve CSCAA Scholar All-America Honors

Announced by the College Swimming & Diving Coaches Association of America (CSCAA), both the Sewanee men's and women's swimming and diving teams achieved the Scholar All-America Team for the Easter Semester.

For the University of the South, this is the 55th straight semester the men's and women's teams have successfully earned this award.

More than 721 institutions were named to the CSCAA's Scholar All-America team for their grades during the Spring 2021 semester.

In terms of NCAA Division III, Sewanee is one of 133 men's teams and 163 women's teams to secure the honor for the term.

The women's team posted a 3.56 grade point average, while the men earned a 3.29.

Five of the seven schools from the Southern Athletic Association (SAA) were named to the award. Berry, Birmingham-Southern, Centre, Hendrix and Sewanee saw both their men's and women's teams on the release.

Founded in 1922, the CSCAA, is the nation's first organization of college coaches. The mission of the CSCAA is to advance the sport of swimming and diving with coaches at the epicenter of leadership, advocacy, and professional development.

Boyd Garners PING All-Region Honor

The Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA) announced the 2021 PING All-Region Teams across six regions. The University of the South's Basil Boyd of the Sewanee men's golf team has been chosen for this award.

The senior from Martinsville, Va., posted a 15th place finish out of 95 golfers at the 2021 NCAA Division III Men's Golf Championships with a score of 296 (75-74-72-75).

According to acquired records, Boyd holds the best individual four-round NCAA Championship score in program history. His third round score of 72 is a championship-low for the history of the program.



NATURENOTES

Fireflies

After the fireworks of the Fourth of July, we still have the fireflies that put on a nightly, though silent, light show. The firefly or lightning bug is one of the official insects of Tennessee, along with the ladybug, the honeybee, and the zebra swallowtail butterfly. Fireflies are actually a kind of beetle, not a fly or a bug, and belong to a family with about 2,000 species throughout the world. The fireflies in our area are able to produce light through a chemical reaction, called bioluminescence, in special organs in their abdomens. Bioluminescence is especially remarkable in that it produces almost entirely light and little to no heat. Fireflies are unique among luminescent insects in that they can flash this light off and on. The males of different species use different patterns of flashing to signal to mates, females that are generally flightless and respond from the ground with their own flashing pattern. In some species, the females “fake” the pattern of another species to attract and then consume the male! In the western part of the U.S. this type of firefly bioluminescence does not occur, so enjoy the show we are privileged to watch in our own backyards.

Denny Cove Closure

Denny Cove will be closed from through July 31 for road repairs. However, the climbing areas at Foster Falls will remain open. Contractors will be removing trees on the Denny Cove Access Road in preparation for widening and improving the roadway. Following that effort, and through July 31, the National Guard will take over the project and bring in large, earth-moving equipment to remove tree stumps and create the improved access roadbed.

During these time periods, the Denny Cove Access Road will be closed, with no public access to Denny Cove. This is necessary to ensure a safe construction site, as many trees will be coming down to widen the one-lane road from Highway 41 to the Denny Cove parking lot, and large earth-moving machines will be in use to create the grade for the new road. As a result, climbers and other visitors will not be allowed to enter the area, but instead are encouraged to climb and hike at neighboring climbing areas such as Foster Falls.
