### MSSA Program Highlights for June 19-25

The Monteagle Sunday School Assembly in Monteagle continues its 140th consecutive summer season of enrichment with an interdenominational worship service at 11 a.m. in the Assembly's Warren Chapel. The eight-week season will continue through Sunday, Aug. 7, featuring numerous visiting lecturers who will present morning and evening programs in the Auditorium that are free of charge to the public; unless otherwise noted, morning lectures begin at 10:45 a.m. and evening lectures at 7:45 p.m. Anyone interested in a full schedule of the Monteagle Assembly's 2022 program is welcome to pick one up at the Assembly Office (tel. 931-924-2286), or to peruse the schedule on the Assembly's website at <www.mssa1882.org>.

The Wayne & Virginia Jervis Bible Week brings friend of the Assembly, Dr. Tom McCullough, back to Monteagle for a week of lectures around the topic: "In the Footsteps of a Wandering Galilean: Putting Jesus in the Land Called Holy in Life and Death." Lectures Tuesday-Friday at 10:45 a.m. in the Auditorium will trace the life of Jesus from the desert to Galilee and on to Jerusalem. McCullough is the Nelson and Mary McDowell Rodes Professor of Religion Emeritus at Centre College and the Director of the Osher Lifelong Learning Institute at Coastal Carolina University. He also directs archaeological projects in the Middle East. He's written several books and articles on Galilee, archaeology, and the relationship between history and current events.

Three performances will delight attendees this week, with something for everyone on the schedule. Tuesday evening in the Auditorium, the Nashville Shakespeare Festival brings the Bard to Monteagle with workshops for youth and a special performance, "Macbeth, a crucial conversation," which presents the story of "Macbeth" as a dialogue between the actors and the audience. The objective is to view the characters' issues through a contemporary lens while demonstrating the clarity and power of Shakespeare's poetry. Four notable songwriters from Nashville will perform Friday evening in the Auditorium, sharing their music and expences with attendees. Scheduled to perform are Bruce Arnston, Michael Kelsh, Jack Sundrud, and Thom Schuyler. Finally, the award-winning After Hours Barbershop Quartet group will perform Saturday evening in the Auditorium. The group got its start at Bradley University in Peoria, Ill., in 2007; since then, they've placed in the top 10 in the International Quartet Contest multiple times and won the gold medal in 2018. Thursday evening, join Dr. Molly Worthen from the University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill as she lectures on North American religious and intellectual history in a talk titled, "The Holy Ghost and American Politics." After attending Yale University for her doctorate, Dr. Worthen has published books, articles, and recently released an audio course for Audible called Charismatic Leaders Who Remade America. ### Will Sewanee's Legendary Hospitality Shop Close?

For more than 60 years the Hospitality Shop has been a Sewanee fixture, although its role has shifted to accommodate changing times. But now, changing times may force the Hospitality Shop to shutter the doors. The Hospitality Shop had it origins in the Emerald-Hodgins Auxiliary,

The Hospitality Shop had it origins in the Emerald-Hodgins Auxiliary, said Board Chair Julia Bates. "The auxiliary was a group of women who wanted to support the community and focused on Emerald-Hodgson Hospital where they were having their babies." The women served as Candy Stripers and served meals in the basement of Thompson Union to raise money, as a sideline operating a thrift store. Revenue went toward scholarships for high school seniors pursuing a medical career. The Auxiliary also gave "tens of thousands of dollars" to purchase equipment for the hospital, rescue squad, and fire department, Bates said. When the hospital became a for-profit entity, the Auxiliary decide to focus on providing scholarships, rather than assisting the hospital. In the early 1970s, the Hospitality Shop moved to the "yellow house" on University Avenue. The Auxiliary continued to serve meals until 2006, but energy increasingly turned toward operating the thrift store.

Now, two difficult, possibly insurmountable challenges confront the Hospitality Shop. One, the building rental contract has expired and the building needs an estimated \$100,000 in repairs. "We were not told to evict," said Bates, "but the contract needs to be renegotiated." Under a "gentleman's understanding," the Hospitality Shop pays no rent, and it was "assumed" the Auxiliary would fund interior repairs. Three years ago, though, the Auxiliary reimbursed the University for putting on a new roof. "That seems to be the model," Bates said. The University has offered to make the needed repairs on the condition the Auxiliary reimburses them.

The second challenge, lack of volunteers, exacerbates the repair issue. The drop off bins for clothes and housewares fill up twice daily, requiring unloading, sorting, and labeling, far more work than two part-time employees can handle. The volunteer staff of eight, all but one over 70 years old, invests inordinate amounts of time and energy to keep the thrift store open.

Bates estimates it will take eight to 10 years to repay the University for repairs. "Do we want to commit to paying back \$100,000?" Bates said. "In eight to 10 years, most of us won't be on the board and able to volunteer." Equally concerning is whether it is wise to commit to paying back \$100,000 when the University rental contract policy limits renters to a 3-year lease. The Hospitality Shop has a small savings that might pay 20 percent of the loan, but the money is earmarked for scholarships, Bates stressed. The Hospitality Shop gave two \$1,000 scholarships to graduating high school seniors this year, one from Franklin County and one from Grundy County.

"We could close the shop and continue to give scholarships for 10 years," Bates said. "By then we would all be in our 80s or 90s."

Looking to solutions, Bates hopes to attract three to five volunteers willing to commit to working one day a week and to compile a list of substitute volunteers to work during high volume times or when regular volunteers need time off. A Bonner and a Canale scholar help with social media and enlisting sorority and fraternity volunteers to work a few hours on Saturdays. Bates would like to see professors encourage students to take on the Hospitality Shop as an academic project, bringing more "entrepreneur interns" into the fold.

The Hospitality Shop has been a 501(c)(3) nonprofit since the 1970s. Bates cites the mantra of nonprofits: "Give us your time, your talent and your treasures." "My focus isn't treasures," Bates said. "Give us your talent and your time." The Hospitality Shop promotes "sustainable energy by encouraging recycling and by giving those with less means access to resources," Bates insisted. "You're contributing to the community when you volunteer." The Hospitality Shop will have a luncheon to gather community input on what direction to take at noon, Friday, July 8, in Kennerly Hall at the parish of St. Mark and St. Paul. 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



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### Women's Tennis Wraps Up Season in Top-10 Nationally

The University of the South women's tennis team recorded a top-10 finish for the 10th time in program history, as the Tigers finish the 2022 season ranked 10th in the final Division III National Rankings of the season, administered by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) and sponsored by Tennis-Point.

The Purple and White wrapped up the season with a 21-4 mark en route to the program's eighth Southern Athletic Association's Regular Season and Tournament titles.

The team also wrapped up the campaign second in the Atlantic South Region.

In the Individual National Rankings, Alice Hall appears on both the Singles and Doubles listings, joining partner Brooke Despriet.

In Singles, Hall is ranked 35th in the nation and eighth in the region. The Isle of Palms, S.C. native recorded an 11-5 mark, including 9-4 in spring competition. She was named the SAA's Player of the Year and a First Team selection.

In Doubles, the freshmen duo finished in ninth place in the national Doubles rankings and second in the region. Playing as the top doubles team in the Atlantic South for the second half of the season, Hall/Despriet recorded a 17-5 overall record and 14-3 at the No. 1 position.

The ITA also announced that Brooke Despriet and Alice Hall were named ITA All-Americans for their success in 2022.

In the region rankings, Despriet, and Emma Smith were ranked in Singles, while Natalia Nassar and Ansley Carpenter were listed in Doubles.

Despriet finished 11th in the region as she tallied an 8-9 overall record, including a 5-8 mark at the No. 1. The Cumming, Ga. native was named the SAA's Newcomer of the Year and a First Team All-Conference member.

Ranked 17th in the region, Smith posted a 13-5 mark in Singles in 2022, including winning 11 of 15 spring contests. Ending the campaign on a five-match winning streak, the Mount Pleasant, S.C. native collected First Team honors on the All-SAA Team.

Additional Tigershark swimmers finished first place in one or two individual events: Axton Ladd (6 & U 25 freestyle and 25 backstroke); Will Turrell (13-14 boys' 100 IM, 50 butterfly); Toby Van de Ven (15-19 boys' 50 breaststroke, 50 backstroke); Lucie Watch (15-19 girls' 50 backstroke, 50 butterfly); Sam Goodpaster (13-14 boys' 50 backstroke); Archer Ladd (11-12 boys' 100 IM); Caroline Neubauer (13-14 girls' 50 backstroke); and Eli Summers (9-10 boys' 100 IM). The hard work that Tigershark

swimmers have been putting in over the past three weeks is paying off, with multiple swimmers dropping significant amounts of time between the Winchester meet on June 9 and the Fayetteville meet on June 11. Over 70 percent of the total Tigershark races in the meet reflected time improvements. Particular highlights include: Noah Allen (8) with a 49.51 sec time improvement in the 25 freestyle, Liam Barry (7) with a 30.91 sec in the 25 freestyle, Remy Garcia (9) with a 33.02 sec time improvement in the 50 freestyle; Atticus Loose (7) with an 8.60 sec drop in the 25 freestyle; and Amelie Watson with a 12.24 sec drop in the 25 freestyle.

The Sewanee Tigersharks traveled to Tullahoma on June 16 to compete against the Tullahoma Swim Club, and will host the Mc-Minnville Swim Team at home on June 18 at 10 a.m.

### Men's Tennis Finishes 33rd in ITA Division III Rankings

The University of the South men's tennis team concluded the 2022 season ranked 33rd in the final Division III national rankings, administered by the Intercollegiate Tennis Association (ITA) and sponsored by Tennis-Point, the coaches organization announced.

Sewanee recorded a 14-12 overall record and won the 2022 Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Regular Season and Tournament crowns for the eighth time. Earning the automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championships, the Purple and White finished in the Second Round of the event. Inside the Atlantic South Region, the Tigers are ranked eighth.

Individually, Noah Holsclaw, Peyton Erck and Quinn Wicklund were all listed in the Singles or Doubles rankings.

Holsclaw ends the 2022 campaign ranked 22nd in the final ITA Atlantic South Singles Rankings. The Marietta, Ga. native recorded a 9-12 overall record and 8-11 during the spring campaign.

Playing a tough schedule, he competed in six matches against nationally-ranked opponents as he finished 6-7 at the No. 1 flight. The rising senior also secured a First Team selection on the All-SAA Team.

Erck and Wicklund are ranked 10th in the region's Doubles rankings. The duo led the team with a 10-5 overall record, with all contests coming at the top flight. The team were each named to the All-SAA Second Team, while Wicklund was named the league's Newcomer of the Year.

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

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### NATURENOTES

#### Pink!

Two pink blooming plants are notable on our roadsides at this season, and they both stymied my attempts at identification when we first moved here. So, in case anyone is having the same trouble, here is an introduction. One is shrub, Japanese spiraea or Japanese meadowsweet. It has flat-topped clusters of bright pink flowers. It certainly is pretty, but it is not native and has escaped from cultivation after being introduced as an ornamental in the late 1800's from eastern Asia. It has spread through the eastern United States and Canada, but it isn't common everywhere. Only 11 counties report it in Tennessee, mostly on the Cumberland Plateau — it certainly seems to be happy here in Sewanee. The problem is that it can out-compete and replace some of the native flora. Anyone considering planting it might look into some native plant alternatives instead, such as summersweet (Clethra alnifolia) or arrowwood (Viburnum dentatum). The other pink bloomer is a herbaceous climbing vine, everlasting pea or perennial sweet pea. The second name is rather deceiving because this is not the sweet-smelling sweet pea that is familiar as a garden flower, although this attractive plant is also used in gardens. Everlasting pea is also a non-native, originating in Europe. Besides pink, the flowers can be white, yellow, or blue. This species has spread throughout the United States and can be weedy and invasive. Butterfly pea (Clitoria mariana) might be considered as an alternative.

Dad would come home after too long at work and I'd sit on his lap to hear the story of Ferdinand the Bull; every night, me handing him the red book until I knew every word, couldn't read, just recite along with drawings of a gentle bull, frustrated matadors, the all-important bee, and flowersflowers in meadows and flowers thrown by the Spanish ladies. Its lesson, really, about not being what you're born into but what you're born to be, even if that means not caring about the capes they wave in your face or the spears they cut into your shoulders. And Dad, wonderful Dad, came home after too long at work and read to me the same story every night

until I knew every word, couldn't read just recite. --Matt Mason, The Story of Ferdinand the Bull
