



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

For 2023, there are two sales tax holidays. The Tennessee General Assembly approved a three-month sales tax holiday on groceries. The traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies, and computers will also take place the last weekend of July.

Tennessee's traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers is the last full weekend in July. For 2023, it begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 28, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, July 30, 2023.

For 2023, Tennessee's General Assembly has approved a threemonth grocery tax holiday on food & food ingredients which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 1, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 31, 2023.

Bridge Refugee Service to Present at Lunch and Learn

Stephanie Livigni, Executive Director of Bridge Refugee Services, is this month's speaker at Sewanee's Lunch and Learn program held in Convocation Hall on Monday, June 26, from noon to 1 p.m. The session is open to the community and to alumni. For those not able to attend in person, the meeting will be made available via Zoom. Registration (\$10 per session or \$30 for the year) can be made in person at the event.

Bridge Refugee Services was founded in Knoxville in 1982 and a branch office was opened in Chattanooga in 1996. In the past 10 years, Bridge has resettled more than 2,400 refugees from Africa, Southeast Asia, Eastern Europe, Central and South America, and the Middle East. Over the past year a significant portion of its activity has been resettling Ukrainian war refugees (parolees in government jargon) in East Tennessee.

Once refugees have been approved by the various federal agencies for travel, the U.S. State Department's Bureau for Population, Refugees and Migration program coordinates admission of refugees and their allocation to specific cities with local resettlement agencies—such as Bridge. This process happens through the auspices of nine national agencies, part of the unique public-private partnership that provides services for refugees across the country. Bridge partners with Episcopal Migration Ministries in this reception and placement process.

Sewanee has existing ties with Bridge via internships in its Chattanooga office, and last year the Rotary Club of Monteagle-Sewanee arranged a \$25,000 grant from the Rotary Foundation to help Bridge assist Ukrainian war parolees resettle in East Tennessee.

down earlier that week. The dealership said the truck needed a new motor, cost \$13,000. Beavers questioned the assessment and suspected the problem was a blown head gasket. He will visit the dealership and inspect the truck himself before making a recommendation. "It comes down to how much are we willing to spend versus how much service life is left in the truck," Beavers said.

Reporting on finances, Beavers alerted the board to an increase in chemical costs in December and again in March which has resulted in water-production costs being four percent over budget. "I'm not overly concerned at this point," Beavers said, although he anticipates production costs will be four to five percent over budget for the year. He attributed the increase to the chemicals being a petroleum-based product.

SUD's final cost for the narrowing of the Highway 41A project was \$254,187, almost half what TDOT budgeted, Beavers said. "We earned our paycheck," he insisted, commenting on SUD's careful attention to Taylor received his BA from minimizing costs. 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



Cherokee Bible Project

The Cherokee Bible Project has received a grant to allow students living and attending school on the Plateau in Grundy County to learn the Cherokee language and culture during the summer, school breaks and holidays for the 2023-2024 school year. Students must either reside within Grundy County and /or attend any one of the Grundy County Schools and/or communities within Altamont, Beersheba Springs, Coalmont, Flat Branch, Gruetli-Laager, Monteagle, Palmer, Pelham, or Tracy City. Contest Deadline is July 10, 2023.

These lessons are valued at \$1500 each and will be absolutely free to the winners.

Two winners from each school in Grundy County will receive lessons in basic Cherokee language and culture. Winners will be determined by the Cherokee Bible Project, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit.

To enter, students may submit an essay and/or a genealogical chart showing their descent from a historically recorded Cherokee person. If a family tree is submitted, students must also make a one sentence declaration statement as to why they are interested in learning the Cherokee language. If entering an essay without a genealogical chart, the student must write a 250 minimum word count essay on the subject of the importance of learning and speaking the Cherokee language. Students who enter both a family tree and an essay will receive preferential treatment.

Entrants must also enlist an adult to recommend them. The adult can be a teacher, minister or religious leader, scout leader, or political leader from the community. The recommendation is to be sent via email by the adult to <cherokee.bible.society@gmail.com> prior to the deadline of the contest.

To apply, students should send a cover letter that gives their contact information and signed permission from their parent or guardian stating they are allowed to take the course should they win.

This letter can be sent via mail, or as a PDF copy of a physical letter that has been signed.

The cover letter should clearly indicate the school they attend and their home address.

The cover letter should include the name of the adult who will be recommending them. It should also contain that adult's email address. The parent will sign the letter and state they agree to be contacted by the Cherokee Bible Project should their child win the contest.

All decisions by the Cherokee Bible Project staff as to winners are final and cannot be appealed.

Preference will be given to any enrolled Cherokee persons, whether that enrollment is in any state or federally recognized tribe.

Winners will be notified and sent a release document that their parent or guardian will sign permitting the student to attend a zoom, discord or other online session for learning the Cherokee language.



The BSMC is a nonprofit 501(c)(3) medical facility established by and for the community of Beersheba Springs and surrounding areas located in Grundy County (Tennessee). The clinic offers all its services completely free of charge. The clinic opened in 2010, averages 1,300 patient visits annually. In 2019, the dental clinic was added, which

provides monthly services and has performed over 200 extractions

The facility provides comprehensive ambulatory medical services for the community, including diagnosis and treatment of acute episodic illness as well as ongoing supervision of chronic diseases, minor wound management, injury stabilization and arrangement of hospital and specialist referrals. The clinic has an on-site prescription medication dispensary and is currently constructing a denture lab.

The paid staff includes a Physician's Assistant, LPN, Community Health Worker, Dental Assistant, Office Assistant, Bookkeeper, and Executive Director. Volunteer physicians and dentists are from St. Thomas Ascension, Erlanger Health System, UT College of Medicine, and Revive Dental. The clinic also supports an AmeriCorp volunteer who works directly with diabetic education providing education and customized resources.

Report from Oregon

We are in Bend, Oregon and experiencing a new, for us, weather event — graupel. Nor rain nor sleet nor snow nor hail, it occurs when supercooled water droplets freeze onto a snow crystal. It falls as a soft pellet, giving it other names such as soft hail and

On our way here from Portland we stopped at Trillium Lake for the view of Mount Hood. For us the surrounding vegetation was also a treat. The forest had a lot of Western Redcedar with graceful drooping branches, Douglas Fir with three-forked bracts prominent on the cones, and true fir draped in old man's beard lichen. Some of the shrubs were Twinberry Honeysuckle and Greene's Mountain Ash. Spring wildflowers were in bloom, including Columbian Windflower, Star-flowered Lily-of-the-Valley, Alpine Marsh Violet, Pacific Trillium, Oregon Anemone, and Vanilla-Leaf. Also Deer Fern. Most of these are similar enough to our spring wildflowers to enable a guess as to the genus, at least. There was also a large Western Skunk Cabbage, with leaves much larger than our Eastern Skunk Cabbage. It is in the same family as the Titan Arum of recent fame when it bloomed on the Sewanee campus.




