## Historic Piano Given to St. Mark & St. Paul

When Rob Lamborn called Julian Price in late 2020 to ask about a television Price had listed on Sewanee Classifieds, the conversation went differently than he expected. Lamborn, Rector of the Parish of St. Mark & St. Paul (formerly Otey Memorial), was interested in the large-screen TV to help the church establish teleconferencing capability because of COVID. Price told him the TV was already spoken for, but asked if the parish might be interested in a grand piano. Lamborn and Parish Organist Kathy Sturgis visited the Prices' home to see and try out the piano, and immediately said the church would love to have it.

"I am thrilled that parishioners Lane and Julian Price generously donated this piano," Lamborn said. "It is a wonderful addition to the church and its music program. Since the piano was built shortly before the Otey Memorial Church was constructed in 1891, its appearance fits perfectly. More importantly, the instrument is in excellent condition and has a superb tone quality."

Delivery of the piano was arranged in 2021 and it began to be used in services, but a formal inauguration of the instrument did not take place until now because of COVID. On Sunday, June 26, prayers of dedication will be included in the 10 a.m. service, and a dedicatory recital will take place at 11 a.m. The Prices are dedicating their gift in honor of two couples who have been longtime members of the parish, Brown Patterson and his late wife Evie, and George Ramseur and his late wife Ruth.

The recital will include music of a variety of styles and time periods to showcase the piano's flexibility in solo and accompaniment work. Sewanee Summer Music Festival piano faculty members Amy I-Lin Cheng and Steven Beck will perform solo works, OperaFest Sewanee participant Suzannah Waddington will sing accompanied by Theron Masters, and Sturgis will accompany violinist and local string teacher Tamara Hurd, clarinetists (and church members) John Gatta and Beth Wiley, and trombonist Lamborn.

"It's particularly exciting to bring people together from across our community in this musical celebration," Sturgis said. "Not all music for worship 'fits' on an organ; some is better suited to the tonal color of a piano. In addition, many singers, particularly the young or amateur, have problems with pitch when they sing with an organ. The piano is perfect in our smaller sanctuary for singers. The Prices' gift has provided us wonderful options and versatility."

The 10 a.m. service and the 11 a.m. recital on June 26 are free and the public is invited. The church is located at 216 University Ave., Sewanee; a festive reception will follow the recital.

## 'Parks Czar' Burnett Steps Down After 10 years

Stephen Burnett recently stepped down from nearly 10 years of service heading up the parks committee, first, for the Sewanee Civic Association and in its new incarnation as a committee overseen by the Sewanee Community Council. In jest, Burnett sometimes referred to himself as the "Parks Czar." A better title might be Parks Sisyphus given some of the uphill struggles Burnett helped navigate. Burnett talked about the birth and evolution of the parks committee at the May 23 Sewanee Community Council meeting.

More than 10 years ago, then Provost John Swallow contacted Burnett and asked if the Sewanee Civic Association (SCA) could help with parks. The dog park was the current hot topic. But the SCA soon found itself confronted with an even more daunting challenge: renovating Elliott Park. "There was an old fort there with splinters and nails," Burnett said, pointing out the dangers to children. "Elliott Park was an absolute mess. It was quite embarrassing. It was the centerpiece of the campus." The SCA

## Franklin County School Board Approves \$10,000 Bus Route Increase

After long debate at the June 20 meeting, the Franklin County School Board voted to give the bus owner/drivers the \$10,000 increase per route they requested at the May 16 budget workshop. How the increase will be funded rests in the hands of the county commission.

The draft budget called for a 15 percent increase for all three components of owner/drivers pay (base rate per route, seats per bus, and mileage). The draft budget also lowered the fuel bonus trigger point from \$3.73 to \$3.

"That won't work," said Jan Lappin, spokesperson for the owner/drivers. At the May 16 workshop some drivers said they would find work somewhere else if they did not receive a substantial increase. Lappin pointed out her total increased earnings for the past four years was \$8,000. Repair, fuel, and bus purchase costs had increased dramatically. "We have no health insurance, no liability insurance, no life insurance, no retirement, and we're on call from 5:30 in the morning to 5:30 in the afternoon," Lappin said. She argued the owner/drivers would receive little benefit from the lowered fuel bonus trigger

## SUD's Waiting-for-a-Decision Plans

Sewanee Utility District manager Ben Beavers learned at a recent Franklin County Finance Committee meeting that SUD would not receive a decision on its request for American Recovery Plan (ARP) funds until the new administration took office following the August county commission and mayoral elections. At the June 21 SUD Board of Commissioners meeting, the board and Beavers strategized on how to proceed.

"I've asked for a couple small things," Beavers said. "The big thing is the waterline replacement. What we might consider doing is purchasing the smaller items and ask for the whole thing on the waterline replacement project." SUD already purchased one request item, variable speed drives to cut power consumption at the Water Treatment Plant. SUD is researching the cost of another request item, a bar screen to filter

## Grand Marshals Announced for Sewanee Fourth of July

Nancy J. Berner and David B. Coe met and married while in graduate school, and moved to Sewanee in 1992, when Nancy was hired by the University as an Assistant Professor of Biology. She wasted no time making herself an integral part of the University community. In just her second year as a faculty member, she proposed and helped establish "Scientific Sewanee," which later developed into "Scholarship Sewanee," an annual event that highlights undergraduate research, scholarship, and artistic works. She served as Chair of the Department of Biology, and secured many grants that allowed her to maintain an active research laboratory where she mentored undergraduates. In 2009, she was named the William Henderson Professor of Biology.

In 2012, Nancy joined the University Administration, serving as Associate Provost, Vice Provost for Planning and Administration, and then Provost. During her time in these positions, she was Title IX coordinator for the University and eventually established the Title IX office. She led efforts to diversify the University's faculty, staff, and student body, and she oversaw the reaffirmation of the University's accreditation.

In January of 2022, with the resignation of Vice-Chancellor Reuben Brigety, nominated by President Biden to become U.S. Ambassador to the Republic of South Africa, Nancy became Acting Vice-Chancellor of the University of the South, the first woman in the history of the school to serve as Vice-Chancellor.

David, after completing his Ph.D. in United States history, embarked on a career as a writer of fantasy. Over the past 25 years, David has published, under his own name, and also under the pen name D.B. Jackson, more than two dozen novels and as many short stories. He is a recipient of the William Crawford Fantasy Award as well as an Audie Award. His novels have been translated into a dozen languages. He has also edited four short story anthologies, and has published a collection of his own short fiction.

Together, Nancy and David have raised two daughters, Alexis (Alex) and Erin. Both attended Sewanee Elementary School and St. Andrew's-Sewanee before leaving Sewanee to attend college, Alex at New York University and Erin at Elon University.

Nancy has been a soccer league referee, and a summer swim league timer and scorekeeper. David has been treasurer of the soccer league, and a swim league stroke and turn judge. He has also served as Vice President and President of the SAS Parents' Council and as coordinator of the Sewanee Food Buying Club. Both Nancy and David have served on the Sewanee Community Council.

They are proud and honored to be chosen as Grand Marshals for the 2022 July Fourth parade.

For 2022, there are three sales tax holidays. The Tennessee General Assembly has approved two more sales tax holidays in addition to the traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies, and computers.

Tennessee's traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 29, 2022, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, July 31, 2022.

For 2022, Tennessee's General Assembly has approved a sales tax holiday on food and food ingredients (grocery sales tax suspension) which begins at 12:01 a.m. on Monday, Aug. 1, 2022, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Wednesday, Aug. 31, 2022.

For 2022-2023, the Tennessee General Assembly has approved a sales tax holiday on gun safes and safety devices that begins at 12:01 a.m. on July 1, 2022 and ends at 11:59 p.m. on June 30, 2023.

point as she expected the cost of fuel to decrease.

Board member Sarah Marhevsky suggested leaving the fuel bonus trigger point the same and putting the money budgeted for the lowered trigger point toward increasing the base rate, making the base rate increase \$5,000 per route.

Board member Chris Guess proposed leaving the trigger point the same and increasing the base rate to \$10,000 per route. "What's wrong with doing this and being told 'no' by the county commission?" Guess asked.

"They won't necessarily say 'no,'" said Director of School Stanley Bean. "They'll say take it out of the fund balance."

"Why can't we make them tell us that?" Guess said.

At the outset of the budget discussion, Board Chair Cleijo Walker stressed "recurring expenses" should not be taken from the fund balance reserve.

"I'm super excited about more money for the bus drivers," Marhevsky said, "but it makes me feel like we're short-changing the rest of the employees."

Guess said county departments were budgeting 5 percent for employee raises.

"Why should we ask for less than they're giving county employees?" asked Board member Linda Jones.

Linda Foster, Human Resources Supervisor, said teachers' average wage increase was \$2,000, almost 5 percent, and all classified employees except for cafeteria workers had been brought up to at least \$12 per hour.

"Twelve dollars an hour is nothing," said Board member Christine Hopkins. "We shouldn't be paying anyone less than \$13-\$14 per hour."

The County Finance Committee will decide on budget requests July 7, said County Finance Director Andrea Smith. Increased property assessment valuations could mean more property tax revenue for the schools, but the commission could lower the property tax rate.

Updating the board on the Extended School Program, which may be discontinued due to lack of staff, Bean said six more employees left the program. The state advised him to seek a grant to fund the ESP.

The board approved an MOU to establish a Jobs for Tennessee Grads program to teach employability skills emphasizing resume writing, financial responsibility, job interview skills, dress etiquette, and community service. The nonprofit sponsoring the program will pay the instructor's salary for the first year. The only cost to the school district will be \$3,000 for half the insurance.

Bean announced he had signed an MOU with the city of Winchester to give the city access to the Memorial Activity Center after school hours and as school scheduling allowed. The city will pay the district a one-time fee of \$46,875 and an annual fee of \$28,125.

The board approved a Tennessee School Board Association recommended change in the Attendance Policy, dropping the provision calling for students to lose their driver's license for excessive absence. The board also approved a state mandated grading scale for high school students: A (90-100), B (80-89), C (70-79), D (60-69), F (0-59). Foster said the state maintained the standardized scale would be "more fair for students competing for scholarships." On Foster's recommendation, the board voted to adopt the new scale for grades 3-8, as well.

Eliot's work will be the focus of Tuesday's programming, with Sewanee's own John Gatta lecturing on "Luminous Spots of Time in Eliot's Four Quartets" Tuesday morning at 10:45 a.m. As professor emeritus of English at both the University of the South and the University of Connecticut, Gatta has spent much of his career reflecting on theological topics, on the interplay between imaginative literature and religious faith, and on American literature and environmental history. On Tuesday evening, performer John Farrell will present a performance of Eliot's Four Quartets. Farrell, who lives with his family in their perpetually 250-year-old farmhouse in Maine, studied at Yale University and quit law school in the middle of a Civil Procedures exam to co-found Figures of Speech Theatre.

Two representatives of local nonprofit Blue Monarch will share the work of that organization to help women break adverse cycles and rebuild their families. Operations Director Kate Cataldo and Officer of Development and Community Relations Shakia Craig will talk about the work of the organization, the communities it seeks to serve, and how the organization improves the lives of those in the surrounding area and beyond.

What lies ahead for our economy? Regional executive of the Federal Reserve Bank of Atlanta Laurel Graefe will lecture on "Changing Demographics and the Future of America's Economy" Thursday evening. As the senior officer leading the Federal Reserve in Nashville, Graefe is responsible for the bank's strategic direction, economic research activities, and advises on monetary policy. She has been featured in the Wall Street Journal, the Economist, National Public Radio, and Market Watch, among many other news outlets.

raised more than \$65,000 to purchase play elements and the University contributed \$125,000 for walkways, drainage and landscaping.

"The community got involved helping to spread the chips for the surface. It got off to a really good start with a ribbon cutting and music."

Five years ago, the decision was made to transfer oversight for the parks committee from the SCA to the Sewanee Community Council. "We did it for a lot of reasons," Burnett said. "Mostly oversight, but also for liability purposes and to have some funding back up." The Parks Committee has jurisdiction over Elliott Park, the Phil White Dog Park, the Community Center Park, and the ballfields.

The Sewanee Ball Park has been the main focus. The committee addressed lighting, fencing, dugouts, and scoreboard needs. "The fields are in great shape now," Burnett said. Youth baseball and soccer have thrived.

Charles Whitmer will step up to the plate as parks committee president. Board members include John Brewster, Sallie Green, Georgia Hewitt, Sarah Marhevsky and Brent Tate. Of the committee's \$8,000 budget, 75 percent goes to mowing, Burnett said. Looking to future expenses, he cited the triannual resurfacing of Elliott Park, cost \$2,000, and the need for an additional playset. Burnett also stressed the still unmet need for a "handy restroom facility near Elliott Park." Former Vice-Chancellor Reuben Brigety concurred. "It's a matter of dignity," Brigety had insisted.

Burnett would like the parks to have a "capital reserve" for "surprise expenses if we have a problem." Burnett renumeralated some of the "surprise expenses" the parks committee has fielded in recent years—burst pipes, huge water bills from faucets and toilets left running at the ballfields, and the dugouts flooding from runoff, a problem that has since been resolved.

"We have had problems," acknowledged Burnett, no stranger to "surprises." Burnett has been busy behind the scenes for 10 years making problems disappear.

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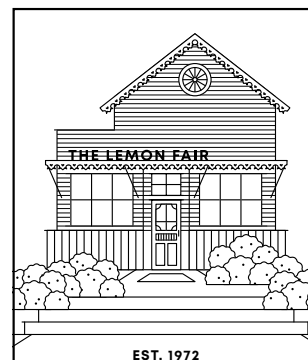
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

out disposable wipes and face masks which clog and damage sewage pumps and create a health hazard for employees tasked with repair.

Beavers questioned the wisdom of waiting for ARP funding to purchase the bar screen. "What are the consequences in the meantime to our operations?" he asked.

SUD President Charlie Smith agreed with Beavers about "doing projects we've got to do, that we know we've got to do, out of pocket."

Beavers pointed out SUD has two to three years to comply with the federal law to identify waterlines with lead fittings and longer still to do the actual waterline replacement. SUD only has 25,000 feet of cast-iron pipe which may have lead fittings. To Beavers knowledge SUD never had lead service lines.

Beavers said the hydro-excavator SUD requested ARP funding to buy would be used for the waterline replacement project. He suggested other water utilities might want to join with SUD for a cost-share purchase.

Commissioner Johnny Hughes brought a question to the board raised by his constituents: given the push for low-income housing in Sewanee, would SUD offer a lower tap fee for low-income builders? "SUD's policy has always been everybody pays the same amount," Beavers said. "Even when selling water to Monteagle during the drought, we had to sell it at the same rate," said Commissioner Doug Cameron.

Beavers commented that the tap fee might increase "depending on the University's response to our request for reimbursement on the highway project."

Updating the board on the lagoon's inspection, Beavers said, "There are a few issues. Nothing unexpected or catastrophic. The biggest thing is to get the vegetation off the dams so the sunlight can get to them and dry them out. We have to do [vegetation control] by hand, because it's so wet." The dampness was caused by seepage and shade from vegetation and large trees, Beavers explained. Smith proposed some tree cutting. Beavers concurred. He observed SUD employees would likely welcome firewood from the trees and in the past SUD had tree removal done at no cost in exchange for the timber.

Beavers encourage the board to consider updating the 2008 long range plan created when the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation cited SUD for a spray fields runoff violation. "Creating a plan made us examine our operations and decide where we wanted to go and how to get there," Beavers said. The plan looked at the entire district and how many people the water plant and wastewater treatment plant could support. At present, SUD has roughly 200 more customers than projected. "A lot of the footwork [for the long range plan] has already been done," Beavers said. "We would just need to update the data."

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# NATURENOTES

## Diana Fritillaries

Last week we saw our first male Diana fritillaries, large orange and chocolate brown butterflies. This is the largest of the Greater Fritillaries, larger than the Great Spangled Fritillary. The males appear first, followed by the strikingly different black and blue females. Their life history is rather unusual. Females lay their eggs in the fall, seemingly at random, among grasses in a meadow, not on the caterpillars' food plant, violets. The eggs hatch and overwinter as tiny caterpillars, not eating for seven or eight months. Few survive the winter, but those that do then seek out violets and grow through several stages to large (about 2 inches) black spiny-looking caterpillars that hide out on the ground and feed at night. These are the ones that have pupated and are now emerging as adults.

# Construction to Begin on the First of Two New Staircases at Greeter Falls

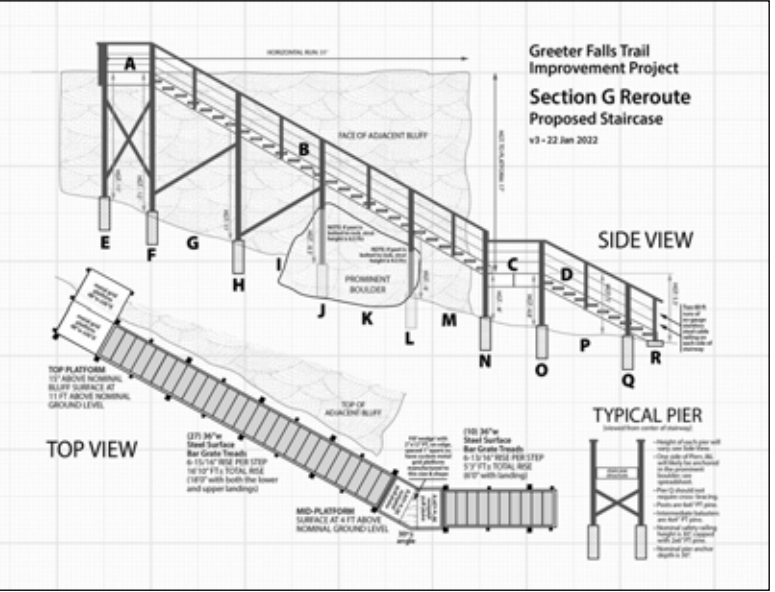
As part of a Friends of the South Cumberland led effort to improve the main access trail to Greeter Falls in Savage Gulf, construction will begin within the next month on a new trail staircase, the first of two that will ultimately be added to the Greeter Falls Access Trail. The staircase structure will be built with lumber, but with metal stair treads for extra traction and durability.

"This staircase will be the critical link in an all-new trail segment that will bypass one of the most eroded and worn-out sections of trail between the Savage Gulf West trailhead and Greeter Falls," said John Collins, FSC Trails Team Chair. "The replacement trail is needed both to make it easier for visitors to get to and from Greeter Falls, and also to improve response times for emergency personnel and Park Rangers when a rescue is needed to get an injured visitor to safety. Small ATV-like rescue vehicles will be able to get much closer to the falls once this trail opens. The Greeter Falls Access Trail is one of the three busiest trails in the Park, and improving it is a priority for the Friends' Trails Team."

Collins would like to encourage all FSC members, and the general public, to volunteer to help with the staircase construction project. "There are volunteer jobs for any age or skill level," Collins said. "Volunteers are needed for everything from site prep to carpentry to staircase finishing details, and many tasks do not involve heavy physical work."

Candidates should be at least 18 years old with a high school diploma and have experience working with children (preferably in a childcare center).

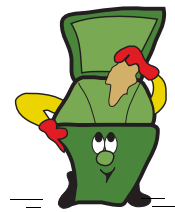

### AN ORDINANCE OF THE TOWN OF MONTEAGLE, TENNESSEE, ADOPTING A BUDGET FOR THE FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING JULY 1, 2022, AND ENDING JUNE 30, 2023

WHEREAS, Tennessee Code Annotated Title 9 chapter 1 Section 116 requires that all funds of the State of Tennessee and all its political subdivision shall first be appropriated before being expended and that only funds that are available shall be appropriated; and

WHEREAS, the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 requires that the governing body of each municipality adopt and operate under an annual budget ordinance presenting a financial plan with at least the information required by that state statute, that no municipality may expend any money regardless of the source except in accordance with a budget ordinance and that the governing body shall not make any appropriation in excess of estimated available funds; and

WHEREAS, the governing body has published the annual operating budget and budgetary comparisons of the proposed budget with the prior year (actual) and the current year (estimated) in a newspaper of general circulation not less than ten (10) days prior to the meeting where the governing body will consider final passage of the budget.

NOW THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED BY THE TOWN OF MONTEAGLE, TENNESSEE AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. That the governing body estimates anticipated revenues of the municipality from all sources to be as follows:

SECTION 6. No appropriation listed above may be exceeded without an amendment of the budget ordinance as required by the Municipal Budget Law of 1982 T.C.A. Section 6-56-208. In addition, no appropriation may be made in excess of available funds except to provide for an actual emergency threatening the health, property or lives of the inhabitants of the municipality and declared by a two-thirds (2/3) vote of at least a quorum of the governing body in accordance with Section 6-56-209 of the Tennessee Code Annotated.

SECTION 7. Money may be transferred from one appropriation to another in the same fund only by appropriate ordinance by the governing body, subject to such limitations and procedures as it may describe as allowed by Section 6-56-209 of the Tennessee Code Annotated. Any resulting transfers shall be reported to the governing body at its next regular meeting and entered into the minutes.

SECTION 8. A detailed financial plan will be attached to this budget and become part of this budget ordinance. In addition, the published operating budget and budgetary comparisons shown by fund with beginning and ending fund balances and the number of full time equivalent employees required by Section 6-56-205, Tennessee Code Annotated will be attached.

SECTION 9. If for any reason a budget ordinance is not adopted prior to the beginning of the next fiscal year, the appropriations in this budget ordinance shall become the appropriations for the next fiscal year until the adoption of the new budget ordinance in accordance with Section 6-56-210, Tennessee Code Annotated provided sufficient revenues are being collected to support the continuing appropriations. Approval of the Director of the Division of Local Finance in the Comptroller of the Treasury for a continuation budget will be requested if any indebtedness is outstanding.

SECTION 10. All unencumbered balances of appropriations remaining at the end of the fiscal year shall lapse and revert to the respective fund balances.

SECTION 11. This ordinance shall take effect July 1, 2022, the public welfare requiring it.
