

National Geographic Magazine photographer Stephen Alvarez, C'87, has the cover shot for the July National Geographic issue. The photo features Sewanee Outing Program Director John Benson. It's the deepest free fall pit in the United States. The cave is so huge, there is no way to see it all at once — unless you take a photograph. Alvarez dropped 600 feet of rope from the top of the cave, then rappelled down, using clothespins to mark where Benson was to stop and fire magnesium flashbulbs. Communicating through walkie-talkies, Benson would let Alvarez know when he reached a clothespin — then "one, two, three ... fire." Monteagle: Million **Dollar Sewer** Rehab, MGT Grants by Leslie Lytle, Messenger Staff Writer

At the June 26 meeting the Monteagle Town Council approved moving forward with sewer rehabilitation work funded by \$1.67 million in grants. The council also voted to move forward with a million-dollar Tennessee Department of Transportation (TDOT) grant for extending the Mountain Goat Trail in Monteagle and voted to apply for a second million-dollar TDOT grant to complete the trail

connection through the town. The sewer rehabilitation work to stop inflow and infiltration (I&I) of groundwater into the sanitary sewer will be funded by America Rescue Plan and Appalachian Regional System grants and will cost the town "zero," said Monteagle engineer Travis Wilson. "Specialty contractors" will repair sewer pipe flaws with cured-in-place pipe installation. The trenchless CIPP process cost \$65-\$70 per foot compared to \$250 per foot to dig up the lines for repair, T. Wilson noted. He estimated the project would take a year and hoped as much as possible could be done before winter when I&I increased. I&I increases sewer plant treatment costs. The grant funds would not be sufficient to fix all the flaws, T. Wilson acknowledged. Alderman Dan Sargent praised the groundwork done to identify the flaws and acquire the grants. "I appreciate all the efforts." The town also approved

\$105,000 for sandblasting and painting the water tank near Dubose Conference Center so the bidding process could proceed. The similar rehab work on the tank at the fire department "was com-plete," T. Wilson said. 

Tennessee's traditional sales tax holiday on clothing, school supplies and computers is the last full weekend in July. For 2023, it begins at 12:01 a.m. on Friday, July 28, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Sunday, July 30, 2023.

For 2023, Tennessee's General Assembly has approved a threemonth grocery tax holiday on food & food ingredients which begins Lake Elementary. The Checkpoint at 12:01 a.m. on Tuesday, Aug. 1, 2023, and ends at 11:59 p.m. on Tuesday, Oct. 31, 2023.



The million-dollar TDOT grant applied for in 2019 by the Mountain Goat Trail Alliance will complete the portion of the trail from Katherine Avenue to Assembly Avenue, said Alderman Nate Wilson. The grant requires a 5 percent (\$50,000) match from the town; the MGTA raised the money to pay the match and will reimburse the town for the expense. The council approved the funding mechanism so the project could proceed. The council also approved a \$76,560 contract with St. John Engineering for designing the trail section. St. John Engineering previously designed the section from Dubose Conference Center to Tracy City. The contract with St. John does not include construction, cost yet to be determined. The new I-24 bridge project will incorporate the trail from its current termination at Dollar General to Katherine Avenue. N. Wilson said TDOT might pay part of the construction cost of the Katherine Ave. to Assembly Ave. section in conjunction with the bridge project.

The second million-dollar TDOT grant the council will apply for stipulates the same funding provisions, with the town required to pay 5 percent and the MGTA reimbursing the town for the expense. If received, the funding will complete the trail from Assembly Avenue to DuBose Conference Center.

Updating the council and community on the town planning process to be facilitated by Community by Design, a cost-free program offered by the American Institute of Architects, N. Wilson said the application was ready to be submitted. He also noted the town received a \$10,000 Lyndhurst Foundation grant to support acquiring input from community stakeholders in the planning process.

The council approved the 2023-2024 budget on the second reading with Alderwoman Dorraine Parmley again voting, "No." At the May 30 council meeting and again at the June 26 meeting Parmley questioned the decision not to give employees raises.





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TennGreen Land Conservancy Celebrates Protection of 50,000 Acres

TennGreen Land Conservancy, a leading Tennessee environmental nonprofit, announced it has reached a historic milestone: protecting more than 50,000 acres of land across the state and Mid-South region. The organization's conservation efforts, both past and future, will benefit Tennesseans and wildlife at a time when Tennessee's natural world faces unprecedented risks.

TennGreen Land Conservancy is Tennessee's oldest accredited statewide land conservancy. Since its establishment in 1998, the organization has grown under the leadership of founder Kathleen Williams (Executive Director, 1998-2015), Steve Law (Executive Director, 2015-2022), and Alice Hudson Pell (Executive Director, 2022-present).

Some of Tennessee's most famous parks and natural areas have been created or expanded by TennGreen Land Conservancy, including Virgin Falls State Natural Area, Rock Island State Park, South Cumberland State Park, Fall Creek Falls State Park, Justin P. Wilson Cumberland Trail State Park, and the soon-to-be-open to the public Ducks Unlimited Park. In addition to protecting land for public enjoyment, TennGreen Land Conservancy holds more than 60 conservation easements that perpetually protect over 12,000 acres of privately owned land. Additionally, the organization has been publicly recognized for its innovative annual fundraising event, the Hike-a-Thon, and its workplace culture, a winner of the Nashville Business Journal 2021 Best Places to Work award.

This announcement comes at a time when Tennessee's rich biodiversity, open spaces, farms, and forests face unprecedented risk. According to the American Farmland Trust's Farms Under Threat report, Tennessee could lose more than one million acres of high-quality farmland by 2040 if current trends continue.

Loss of farms and forests throughout the state will significantly affect Tennessee's economy. The Tennessee Department of Agriculture notes the economic impact of forestry in Tennessee totaling more than \$21.7 billion annually, and the American Farmland Trust projects a loss of nearly 6,000 jobs in its "best case" 2040 projections.

"We've reached this milestone at a crucial time when it's becoming clear to so many of us in Tennessee just how fragile our ecosystems are—the ones that provide us with food to eat, protect the water we drink, keep our air clean, and leave us in awe of nature's beauty," said Alice Hudson Pell, TennGreen Land Conservancy's Executive Director. "Our state is facing astonishing growth, and many who come here seek a high quality of life that's dependent on our ability to protect Tennessee's natural character. We need the help of all Tennesseans to protect our vulnerable lands and waters before it's too late."

Guided by its Strategic Land Conservation Plan, TennGreen Land Conservancy directs its resources towards efforts that significantly impact the Tennessee landscape. The organization focuses on four key priorities: Tennessee's waters (headwaters, land along rivers and streams, and wetlands); connected corridors of open spaces; areas with high biodiversity that face immediate risks from urban and suburban encroachment; and areas in need of publicly accessible nature (e.g., parks, wildlife management areas, state natural areas, etc.).

In total, TennGreen Land Conservancy has completed 153 conservation projects—with more than a third of those projects completed in the past five years. This astonishing pace is reflective of people in communities across Tennessee seeking to protect their natural assets.

"Often, our parks and outdoor areas serve as centers for community, which is essential for a flourishing society," continued Hudson Pell. "Without these shared natural spaces to convene, we risk losing opportunities to connect with nature and with each other. Also, conserved land can create outdoor recreation opportunities, such as hiking, fishing, and camping, which drives tourism and enhances the quality of life for all of us living and working here in Tennessee."

Local Student Awarded Scholarship to Study at Oxford

Seven recent University of Richmond leadership studies graduates are heading to the University of Oxford to pursue one-year master's degree programs through the Jepson Scholars Program.

Sophia Hartman of Sewanee, Tennessee, a leadership studies major, will pursue the Master of Science in evidence-based social intervention and policy evaluation.

The Jepson Scholars Foundation, in collaboration with the Jepson School of Leadership Studies, awarded the 2023 grads full scholarships covering tuition, room and board, and fees.

Students apply for the competitive program, and the scholarships are awarded to graduating seniors who are either majoring or minoring in leadership studies through the Jepson School, the nation's first undergraduate school of leadership studies.

Founded in 2019 by Jepson School benefactors Robert S. Jepson Jr. and Alice Andrews Jepson, the Jepson Scholars Foundation typically funds up to four scholarships per year. This year, an unprecedented number of leadership studies students were accepted into Oxford graduate programs. In response, the Foundation decided to award three additional scholarships.

Pearse Lucas Named PING All-American for Second Straight Season

The University of the South sophomore golfer Pearse Lucas collected a second straight PING All-America accolade, announced by the Golf Coaches Association of America (GCAA) on June 20.

The two-time Southern Athletic Association (SAA) Player of the Year and PING All-Region selection was selected as an Honorable Mention after earning Second Team laurels in 2022.

Entering the National Championships ranked 14th according to the GolfStat rankings, the Charlotte, N.C. native played in 26 rounds for the University of the South, posted a 73.5 stroke average.

Also, for the second straight year, he qualified for the NCĂA Championships. After the team took ninth place in 2022, he qualified as an individualist in the 2023 event.

During the 2022-23 season, the rising junior participated in the 12th Annual Patriot All-America Invitational, which is an event for only for individuals who were named All-Americans during the 2022 season. Over the three-day event, he carded a 215 (66-76-73), and his 66 in the opening round was tied for the lead.

According to GolfStat, Lucas finished 29th in the final Division III rankings with an adjusted scoring average of 73.34 and a 76.07 rank of schedule.

Lucas is the sixth All-American in the history of the men's golf program, and he is the first studentathlete to earn the award twice.

The University of the South men's golf team, who finished in the top-20 in the final national polls, took third at the SAA Championships this past spring.

Michael Curcio Selected to Lead Cross Country, Track and Field Programs

Announced on June 21by Director of Athletics John Shackelford, long-time coach at Appalachian State University Michael Curcio has been chosen to lead the University of the South cross country and track and field programs.

"Mike Curcio brings a wealth of successful experience to our cross country and track programs," said Shackelford. "He is a proven winner with a long history of building meaningful relationships with his student-athletes, their families and Appalachian State's alumni base. We're confident that our student-athletes will benefit from his knowledge and passion for running."

Curcio spent the last 28 seasons as head coach of the cross country teams at Division I Appalachian State University and assisted with the distance athletes on the track and field squads. Over his tenure, he has won 13 men's titles and four women's championships. Additionally, he was named the Coach of the Year 14 times between the Southern (SoCon) Conference and the Sun Belt Conference.

His men's distance team from 2000-12 won ten SoCon Men's Cross Country titles, including three straight from 2000-02 and six in a row from 2005-10.

Individually, he has coached 12 Freshmen of the Year winners and four individual champions. Posting 167 All-Conference standouts in his career, he has seen 38 All-Region selections between cross country, indoor track and field and outdoor track and field. Along with a USATF Junior National Champion in Sean Soderman in the 3,000 steeplechase in 2009, he has coached four All-Americans.

As a part of his coaching career, six athletes have gone on to represent their native countries at the World Championships, while three participated in the Olympic Games.

"I would like to thank John Shackelford, Carrie Austin, the search committee and the administration of the University of the South. It means a great deal to my family and I that they put their trust in me to lead these programs. I see this as a mountain of opportunity to continue the student-athlete experience of a successful liberal arts college like Sewanee. I look forward to embracing the storied history and traditions that make up Sewanee athletics," said Curcio.

With the track and field squads at App State, Curcio coached 70 individual conference champions and 273 All-Conference selections between the indoor and outdoor seasons. In 2003, the U.S. Track and Field and Cross Country Coaches Association (USTFCCCA) named him the Division I Men's National Assistant Coach of the Year.

He was a part of a staff that won 21 indoor conference championships and 22 during the outdoor season.

In the classroom, he has seen 20 named Academic All-Americans by the USTFCCCA and two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients.

Along with his work in directing the App State Distance Camp, he has served as Meet Director for a number of events, notably the ACC Outdoor Championships, the USATF Five Nations Junior International Track Meet and the USATF World Cross Country Championship Trials.

Prior to his time in Boone, N.C., he served as an assistant with the cross country and track and field programs at the University of South Florida from 1993-95 and an assistant cross country coach at Eastern Kentucky University in 1992.

Along with working as a graduate assistant with the cross country and track programs at Florida State, he began his career as a high school track and field coach at St. John the Baptist High School.

"I look forward to meeting the team and learning more about their athletic and academic goals. The expectations for myself will be to help individuals reach those goals," added Curcio. Earning a Bachelor of Science in Physical Education with a Psychol-

ogy minor from Appalachian State in 1987, he completed a Master of Science in Administration and Physical Education in 1992 from Florida State University.

Curcio is married to JoLynn and they have two children, Christopher and Marcie.



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


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

Notes from the Road

We are camping in southern Oregon in Collier State Park amid the Ponderosa and lodgepole pines. There was a forest fire here three years ago that killed many of these trees. The Ponderosa pines have very thick bark, built to survive fires, but a couple of drought years following the fire has caused many of them to succumb. Both living and dead conifers are often covered with wolf lichen, bright yellow-green and shrubby. The most exciting thing we have seen was river otters feeding in the Williamson River. Birds in the campground are the familiar and ubiquitous robins, song sparrows, house finches, and red-winged blackbirds, but we have also seen ravens and Stellar jays, and heard the Western wood pewees calling constantly in the treetops. All the vehicles in the campground keep their hoods up to deter western chipmunks and Golden-mantled ground squirrels, which infest the campground, from chewing the wires. The river bank is bright with colorful giant red Indian paintbrush, white bog orchid (Platanthera), Oregon checker-mallow (pink), western Jacob's ladder (blue), and slender cinquefoil(yellow). It has been fun to recognize plants as similar to their eastern relatives, as well as learn new ones unfamiliar in the East.

Freddy Tucker of Sewanee says he now has four hummingbirds coming to his feeders regularly, and that if you haven't put your feeders out, it's time. He also saw a gray fox in his yard recently, and wonders if others in the community have seen one too.


