Monteagle Planning Approves Hideaway Development with **Conditions**

At the March 7 meeting, after long debate, the Monteagle Planning Commission approved the site plan for the 82-lot Hideaway subdivision with site-plan modifications and conditional stipulations. The commission also voted to approve the site plan for a Taco Bell and to recommend the council adopt a zoning ordinance amendment that will allow alternatives to a 30-foot rear setback in some circumstances.

Residents challenged the initial motion to approve the Hideaway site plan expressing concerns about water and sewer capacity and excessive traffic at the Wren's Nest Avenue entrance, especially given the motel proposed for a neighboring location. Town Planner Annya Shalun pointed out Monteagle Engineer Travis Wilson had recommended the Hideaway project satisfy two conditions: one, each lot have a sewer maintenance agreement regarding the sewer STEP system; two, lots crossed by the forced main must have an easement shown on the final plat. Planning Commission Chair Ed Provost noted concerns about traffic at the Wren's Nest entrance had been discussed at the workshop prior to the meeting and a proposal made that the Wren's Nest entrance be gated and for emergency access only.

The developer cited safety concerns for Hideaway residents if there was only one entrance and argued traffic from Hideaway would "migrate" to the Highway 41 entrance in the event of congestion at the Wren's Nest entrance.

'We need to look at the best interest of the local people that have a history and established residence," insisted commissioner Greg Rollins.

The original motion was withdrawn. The commission approved the Hideaway site plan conditional upon Engineer Travis Wilson's two recommendations being met and using the Wren's Nest entrance exclusively for emergency access.

The commission approved the Taco Bell site plan with only one change, the addition of a front sidewalk. The business will be located at the current Jesse's Grill site.

The developer for a West Main convenience-retail market requested the ordinance amendment allowing the planning commission to consider a 12 feet by 50 feet loading and unloading zone as an alternative to a 30-foot rear set back for service when the property's shape, size, topography, or other issues hamper construction, as is the case with the West Main property.

Commissioner Richard Black questioned amending an ordinance

Temporary Restrictions to Take Effect at Franklin State Forest

Visitors to Franklin State Forest will only be allowed to enjoy the forest on foot beginning March 11, 2023.

The Tennessee Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry (TDF) is instituting temporary restrictions for 120 days to assess the damage caused by off-road vehicles driven in restricted areas. This practice has jeopardized the protection of the forest and the safety and welfare of visitors. Once the assessment is complete, TDF will determine a course of action to protect the integrity of the forest and its natural resources.

"This is not a decision we came to easily or take lightly," State Forester David Arnold said. "The Tennessee Department of Agriculture Division of Forestry is committed to the proper and responsible management of the state's land and forest resources. Our agency has carefully protected, conserved, and enhanced state forests for decades to provide an abundant supply of high-quality timber, demonstrate sustainable forestry practices, and allow for multiple uses, including recreation. The damage witnessed at Franklin State Forest from off-road vehicle use in non-designated areas is setting us back, and we intend to correct that."

Off-road vehicle use has increased significantly on state forests in recent years. Per state regulation, the use of motorcycles, trail bikes, all-terrain vehicles, bicycles and other off-road vehicles in any area of a state forest is strictly prohibited, except on designated roads or trails maintained by TDF. The department's Agricultural Crime Unit patrolled Franklin State Forest every weekend in February to educate visitors about appropriate areas to ride. Unfortunately, violations continue.

Under these temporary restrictions, recreation at Franklin State Forest will be limited to people on foot and only within the visiting hours of thirty (30) minutes before sunrise and thirty (30) minutes after sunset. Motorized vehicles must be parked in designated parking areas and exit the forest once visiting hours end. Hunting will be allowed on foot and in accordance with existing Tennessee Department of Agriculture and the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency rules. No off-road vehicle driving, biking, horseback riding, or camping will be allowed during this assessment period.


Failure to comply with this use restriction is a violation of state law and may result in civil penalties and/or criminal charges. This order expires on July 8, 2023, unless extended or otherwise rescinded by the State Forester.

"We don't want to penalize everyone based on the actions of a few," Agriculture Commissioner Charlie Hatcher, D.V.M. said. "However, this situation has become critical. In addition to the temporary restrictions to assess Franklin State Forest, we are monitoring use and damage at other state forests and will take further action if necessary."

Pi, Planets and Spring Ephemerals

Bill Mauzy sent this photo of Spring Beauties on March 5, which are in bloom in the lawns of campus and town. If you are lucky and hit the day and weather just right, you may also see masses of them in Shakerag Hollow. These are two different species. In Shakerag you are seeing the Carolina Spring Beauty, a more northern species (ironically) reaching here the southern end of its range in the higher elevations. The leaf is more oval and has a distinct stalk. The Virginia Spring Beauty is more widespread and has a narrower, almost grass-like leaf. The pink lines on the white petals guide bees to the nectar at the flower's center. These flowers are among the true spring ephemerals, blooming and setting seed early while the sun still reaches the forest floor and storing energy in their underground corms, then dying back, ready for the big show next spring.

Latham Davis sent a photo of another true spring ephemeral, Virginia Bluebells, first sighting them on Feb. 28. These plants like moist places and can form spectacular large colonies. Be on the lookout for information about the South Cumberland Regional Land Trust's trip to Bluebell Island on March 25.

Venus and Jupiter have been putting on a good show after sunset, with Venus being the brighter object, above Jupiter in the sky. Jupiter will be disappearing into the sunset by the end of the month but Venus is climbing higher as the Evening Star.

Pi Day is Tuesday, March 14 (3.14-3/14)-celebrated by mathematicians around the world and now declared a national holiday by the U.S. Congress. It is also, serendipitously, Einstein's birthday. Various eateries offer pizza and other "pies" for \$3.14 to celebrate.

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


