## SUD Elects Officers, Approves Two Purchases

At the March 21 meeting of the Sewanee Utility District Board of Commissioners, the board elected officers for 2023. The board approved two purchases, one to replace a stolen utility vehicle and one to replace a beyond-repair testing device.

The board elected Charlie Smith president, Johnny Hughes vice president, and Doug Cameron secretary. Officers serve until the next commissioners election.

SUD manager Ben Beavers said SUD received \$6,400 from an insurance claim for the four-wheeler stolen from the Wastewater Treatment Plant. A utility vehicle was needed for maintenance of the spray fields, Beavers explained. The options were a one-person vehicle not designed to haul tools, estimated cost \$8,000, or a two-person vehicle with a dump bed, estimated cost \$14,000. The board approved the purchase of a two-person utility vehicle, cost not to exceed \$14,203, based on the best price Beavers has found so far. He will search for lower prices before making the purchase.

The board also approved purchase of a used backflow-testing kit, cost \$500. SUD requires backflow devices to prevent water from irrigation systems and other operations from re-entering the drinking water supply. SUD must test the devices for accuracy. Beavers said SUD's testing unit was 25-30 years old and could not be calibrated or repaired. A new testing unit costs \$895. Beavers owns the used unit. The unit has only been used twice. The unit has just been recalibrated and carried a warranty on the calibration, Beavers said.

Reporting on other business, Beavers said he reviewed and approved for submission to the state the engineering plans for a 1,200-foot water line extension with six taps in the Deep Woods

development. Developers pay for water line extensions which must be engineered according to SUD's standards. Following approval and inspection, SUD assumes ownership and maintenance. The developer anticipates beginning construction in May, Beavers said.

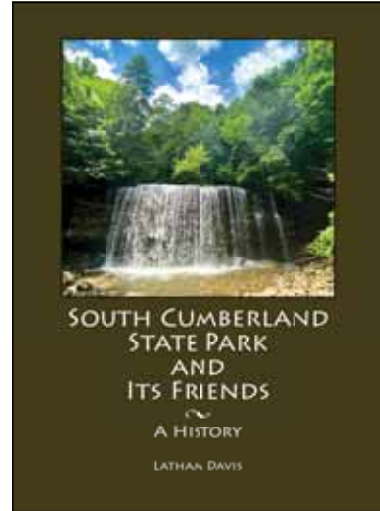
Updating the board on SUD's American Recovery Plan (ARP) grant administered by the Tennessee Department of Environment and Conservation (TDEC), Beavers said the deadline for TDEC requesting clarification had passed.

## 'Waco: American Apocalypse': A Complex Truth

Interrupted from reading the Sunday morning paper by her editor's instruction to head for Waco, "These are your kind of people," disaster-beat Dallas Morning News reporter Lee Hancock arrived just past noon midst an unfolding tragedy, with four federal agents and two Branch Davidian cult members dead in the worst gunfight on American soil since the Civil War. The religious cult holed up in the Mount Carmel compound had weapons that could penetrate body armor. The 51-day siege that followed ended in a fiery inferno fulfilling the prophecy of cult leader David Koresh, with over 70 Branch Davidians dying including 28 children. A Sewanee resident and University graduate (C'81), Hancock sums up the subsequent Hollywood film and conspiracy-theory documentaries recounting the story as "B.S." She was there for the duration, in the early days sleeping in her car and breakfasting on Salvation Army coffee and donuts. Hancock's terms for participating in the



## History of South Cumberland State Park Book Launch

Latham Davis, past president of the Friends of South Cumberland State Parks, has just completed the "South Cumberland State Park and Its Friends: A History." ## The Frame Gallery: Five Years of Art

Reflecting on her first five years as owner of the Frame Gallery in downtown Sewanee, local businesswoman Harriet Runkle is most proud of the fact that her business is thriving.

"I'm proud I've hung in there," Runkle said. "It's not easy to have your own small business in Sewanee."

Barely two years after opening her custom framing business in the old Jackson's Garage Esso station in January of 2018, Runkle found herself faced with the devastating loss of her beloved friend and fellow "Frame Gal" Rea Ching Mingeva, a master framer and artist, in February of 2020. This loss was almost immediately followed by a mandatory two-week shutdown in March at the start of the Covid pandemic.

When the shutdown ended, Runkle had to adapt to a new normal. "People would leave their art outside the door and text or talk on the phone," Runkle said, adding that during the first pandemic year Sewanee alum Matt Costello worked with the Sewanee Business Alliance to set up a general relief fund to help downtown businesses keep their lights on during the toughest times.

"The support from the community was amazing," she said.

As the pandemic slowly stretched into its second year, she went to appointment only. An unexpected benefit from people being at home during this time was that they were doing projects that required framing, so sales began inching up.

In August of 2021, a man made disaster hit — the downtown road construction project, which limited access to the shop just as Covid restraints were lessening.

"I had orange barrels around my shop for a year," Runkle said. "They finally finished last fall, and I've had a really great year."

Runkle, who has a degree in art history with a concentration in museum studies and gallery management from UT-Knoxville as well as a Master of Arts in teaching, said an art appreciation class in high school and her mother's love of the arts inspired her passion for the field.

"My mother was in the arts," she noted, "That was something we just did — go to art shows and museum openings. Art history was like a balm for my soul."

She met her husband, John, at UT, where he was studying architecture and then came with him to Sewanee for the first time in 1996, when he got the calling to attend seminary. Like many young spouses who accompany seminarians to the mountain, Runkle did whatever she could to contribute to the family finances: she worked at The Sewanee Mountain Messenger, tutored at St. Andrew's-Sewanee School, and even catered.

Through the years, she followed him to new each job posting: Roanoke, Va.; Chapel Hill, N.C.; and eventually Arlington, Va., where he worked as a conservator at the Washington National Cathedral. She taught kindergarten, worked in a frame shop, did art consulting, and served as a director of art gallery.

When budget cuts hit the National Cathedral, her husband returned to Sewanee in 2013 as the director of St. Mary's Sewanee Retreat Center. Runkle finished out her teaching contract in Virginia and then joined him here. Unable to find a teaching job, she went to work for Marjorie Burnett at Mountain Outfitters.

"I learned so much from her about running a woman-owned business," Runkle said. "She and Tabitha Stines, who runs a Sewanee hair salon, were two who I looked to for advice and encouragement."

When a local frame shop, Corners, became available five years ago, Runkle was ready to make her move. "I really hit the ground running," she said. "I bought it on a Monday and opened the next day. I made \$27.42 that first day."

Runkle set three goals for herself: to provide a place for custom framing, a gallery space for local artists, and a place for children to create art.

"Custom framing is my bread and butter, but I wanted to provide a space for artists to show their work," Runkle said. She strives to support local artists and tries to build an audience of collectors for them. "It's so fulfilling to show and then sell artists' works."

She kicked off her fifth-anniversary year with a digital-arts show in January followed by a collage and metal sculpture show featuring whimsical and thought-provoking art in February.

Upcoming events include an April exhibit by the Nature Journaling Group from the Sewanee Herbarium and the annual summer show featuring the works of students from Martha Keeble's Sewanee Art Works studio.

The Frame Gallery is located at 12569 Sollace M. Freeman Highway in Sewanee. Hours are 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Tuesday through Friday and 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Saturday.

Beavers has several questions and hopes to initiate a meeting with the Franklin County grants coordinator. Beavers wants to begin work on the Asset Management Program required by the grant, but TDEC has not yet provided criterion for the program. Beavers also wants to know if SUD can engage different engineers for different projects to be funded by the grant, since qualifications will differ. SUD anticipates receiving a \$1.5 million grant with 15 percent coming from Franklin County, 15 percent paid by SUD, and the remainder coming from the ARP.

Reporting on operations, Beavers said unaccounted-for water loss was decreasing, due to SUD finding and repairing leaks. Unaccounted-for water loss is water produced at the plant that does not register on customer meters. Beavers said SUD recently addressed a “meter blowout” and leak on Jump Off Road. Part of the ARP grant money will be used for leak detection and evaluating pressure zones. Beavers hopes unaccounted for water loss for 2023 will be 2-2.5 percent less than last year.

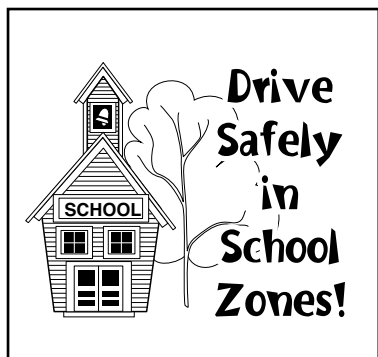
## The Rev. Dr. Mark Oakley at All Saints’ Chapel

All Saints’ Chapel will welcome the Rev. Dr. Mark Oakley, Dean of St. John’s Chapel at Cambridge University as the guest preacher for the 11 a.m. service of Holy Eucharist on Sunday, March 26.

A gifted preacher and widely respected scholar and leader in the Church of England, Dr. Oakley read Theology at London and Oxford before being ordained in St Paul’s Cathedral in 1993. He has served as Chaplain to the Bishop of London; Rector of St Paul’s, Covent Garden; Archdeacon of Germany and Northern Europe and, from 2010 to 2018, Chancellor and Residentiary Canon of St Paul’s Cathedral. Rowan Williams, reviewing a book of Oakley’s sermons said, “Mark Oakley is one of the most distinctive, intelligent and refreshing voices in the Church of England, always illuminating, never stale or second-hand.”

Dr. Oakley is a Visiting Lecturer in the Department of Theology and Religious Studies, King’s College London and Visiting Scholar at Sarum College. He is also Canon Theologian of Wakefield cathedral and Canon Emeritus of Holy Trinity cathedral, Brussels. He was appointed Dean of St. John’s Chapel, Cambridge in 2018.

Dr. Oakley is the author of several books, including “The Collage of God” in 2001 and, more recently, “My Sour-Sweet Days: George Herbert and the Journey of the Soul” (2019) and “The Splash of Words: Believing in Poetry” (2016). His interests include poetry, theatre and human rights. He is an Ambassador for StopHate UK, Patron of Tell MAMA (supporting those affected by anti-Muslim hate crime) and a Trustee of the Civil Liberties Trust.



## The Rev. Dr. Katherine Sonderegger to Lecture

On Thursday, March 30, the School of Theology of the University of the South welcomes the Rev. Dr. Katherine Sonderegger, Professor of Theology at Virginia Theological Seminary. Dr. Sonderegger will deliver a lecture titled, “Strongly unique? How Christ’s humanity is like and unlike our own.” The lecture will take place at 3:30 p.m. in Cravens Hall on the campus of the University of the South (435 Kentucky Avenue). The lecture is free and open to the public. All are welcome and encouraged to attend.

The lecture explores contrasting theological portrayals of Christ from medieval and modern times. While modern theologians portray the human nature of Christ as strongly conformed to our own traits and habits—in limited knowledge, in temptation and struggle, in cultural patterns and assumptions, even in moral growth and change—medieval theology portrays Christ as sinless, morally pure and in possession of perfect knowledge. “This lecture will explore the sea-change in Christology that has made Christ representative of nature rather than unique, and advocate for a theology of His humanity as ‘strongly unique,’” explained Sonderegger.

“Kate Sonderegger is one of the most distinctive and creative theologians writing in English today and is currently embarked on an ambitious multi-volume systematic theology. We are honored to have her address us on the essential topic of the doctrine of Christ, with material drawn from the next volume in her series,” said the Rev. Robert MacSwain, Associate Professor of Theology at the School of Theology.

In 2015, Sonderegger began work on a systematic theology, publishing two volumes with Fortress Press, “The Doctrine of God” (2015) and “The Doctrine of the Holy Trinity” (2020). A third volume is underway. The dogmatic theology of Karl Barth remains a central research interest, and she was recognized by the Evangelical Church in Germany with the Karl Barth Prize in 2022.

Sonderegger earned her Ph.D. from Brown University, where she completed a dissertation on Karl Barth’s Doctrine of Israel, and a Doctor of Divinity (honorary) from King’s College at the University of Aberdeen, awarded in 2022. She is also a priest of the Episcopal Church, resident in the Diocese of Virginia.

and Firearms (ATF) orchestrated the initial attack to arrest Koresh and search for illegal firearms. The ATF chose to ignore information the cult had been tipped off about the surprise attack and went in anyway, Hancock said, “knowing ‘these guys were armed to the teeth.’” Offering a possible rationale she observed, “Cops had been going in and doing paramilitary raids like this in the United States for years, but there had never been this kind of armed reaction to law enforcement.”

Hancock praised director Tiller Russell’s documentary not only for being “factual,” but for doing “the important job of portraying the complexity and humanity of everyone involved.” “This is not a binary good-guy/bad-guy story,” Hancock emphasized. Law enforcement agents and surviving cult members weep in recounting the Waco tragedy. Kathy Schroeder, a David Koresh true believer, talks about arming up for the siege and the honor of being selected to have sexual intercourse with Koresh who proclaimed himself the Messiah and the only male in the compound permitted to engage in intercourse, choosing child brides as young as 11. The documentary shows negotiators persuading Schroeder to leave the compound to be reunited

with her toddler son.

Hancock would later cover Hurricane Katrina and stories in Baghdad and Kuwait, but she said of Waco, “The ability to listen to complex stories and not oversimplify them started here for me. When people trust you with their stories, you’re given a gift.” Today Hancock works with student journalists on The Purple staff, hoping to impart that skill. “The effects of Waco ripple out to this day,” she said, citing the current obsession with conspiracy theory and the deep state. The Oklahoma City bombing, and Columbine massacre have date-stamp links to the final day.

When the FBI began teargassing the building, there was almost a sense of relief, Hancock acknowledged. The prevailing sentiment was, “finally this will end. They’ll come out.” No one envisioned the cult setting the building on fire and the massive arsenal stored inside exploding, fulfilling Koresh’s prophecy.

The three-part Netflix series “Waco: American Apocalypse” began March 22, the day in 1993 FBI negotiators endorsed a teargas plan. At one point, Koresh promised to come out when he finished writing his “Seven Seals” message. Should the FBI have waited? How long?

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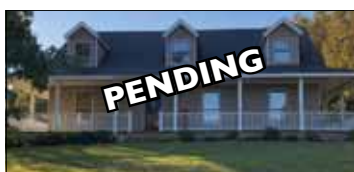

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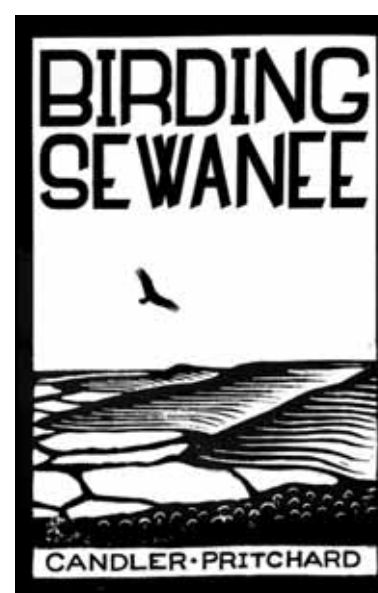

## South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps Programs Celebrate AmeriCorps Week

March 12-18 marks AmeriCorps Week, a time in which communities across America join in recognizing the commitment of AmeriCorps volunteers who unite in service to make an impact on their community and foster a sense of constructive action, civic participation and belonging.

AmeriCorps, the federal agency for national service and volunteerism, provides opportunities for Americans to serve their country domestically, address the nation's most pressing challenges, improve lives and communities, and strengthen civic engagement. Each year, the agency places more than 200,000 AmeriCorps members and AmeriCorps Seniors volunteers in intensive service roles; and empowers millions more to serve as long-term, short-term or one-time volunteers. AmeriCorps offers opportunities for individuals of all backgrounds to be a part of the national service community, grow personally and professionally, and receive benefits for their service.

As part of the annual AmeriCorps Week, the South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps and AmeriCorps VISTA Programs join with local government leaders to celebrate the valuable contributions of their AmeriCorps and AmeriCorps VISTA volunteers who pledge to "get things done" for our plateau communities.

Leaders from Grundy, Franklin and Marion counties honored the SCP AmeriCorps and VISTA members at a luncheon held at the Dutch Maid Bakery in Tracy City. Grundy County Mayor Michael Brady, University of the South Acting Vice-Chancellor Nancy Berner, Monteagle Mayor Greg Maloof and Marion County Mayor's representative Denise Mason signed a proclamation designating the week of March 12-18 as AmeriCorps Week and spoke about the impact of the SCP AmeriCorps and VISTA programs in their communities.

Speaking for the University of the South, which cosponsors the programs along with the South Cumberland Community Fund, Acting Vice Chancellor Berner praised the AmeriCorps members present and noted that an overarching effect of the program was in "communities coming together."

For his part, Brady noted the significant decline in the poverty rate on the Plateau over the past nine years since the advent of AmeriCorps programs on the South Cumberland Plateau. "In 2014, over a third of people in Grundy County lived below the poverty rate. Today fewer than 19 percent do." Helping people move out of poverty is a key activity of all AmeriCorps programs.

Katie Goforth, community development director with the University of the South and South Cumberland Community Fund, noted the contributions of the SCP VISTA program and the recent addition of the AmeriCorps program. Over the course of the nine-year history of the SCP VISTA program, 28 organizations across the Plateau have benefited from the service of 99 VISTA volunteers. "This past year alone, our VISTA members gave over 20,000 volunteer hours to the community and generated over \$1 million in cash resources." Goforth also noted that statewide organizations associated with Volunteer TN, including the South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps project launched this year, leverage \$64 for every dollar appropriated by the General Assembly.

Stephanie Colchado-Kelley, SCP VISTA program director, introduced the VISTA members present:

Morgan Hornsby, an accomplished and published photographer, serves with Arts Inside, a nonprofit founded by an SCP VISTA alumna. Arts Inside aims to create spaces outside of and within correctional facilities for personal and communal healing through multidisciplinary arts and writing programming.

Alongside the community, Alondra Guadalupe Ramirez Martinez has founded ZEAL, Zeal for Education and Language. Its purpose is to develop the independence and self-sufficiency of immigrant families and members of the larger community by providing them with education needed to navigate daily life in the United States. By teaching these men and women the tools toward self-sufficiency, ZEAL improves their ability to thrive and better raise their families.

Madison Almquist is a VISTA volunteer for Mountain T.O.P. She is building a sustainable case management and data tracking system that enables Mountain T.O.P. staff to refer clients to other nonprofit and social service organizations across their seven-county service area.

Jennifer Percy is the newest member of the VISTA project. She is serving with South Cumberland Community Fund to improve systems and processes of the Fund and to support its community partners.

Not present was Maggie Willis, who serves as the AmeriCorps VISTA Hunger Relief VISTA. In collaboration with McClurg Dining, she ensures the efficient and effective operation of the massive South Cumberland Summer Meal Program carried out by AmeriCorps volunteers. Maggie is also launching a food security coalition to improve collaboration and coordination between local food banks, food pantries and other food production and distribution entities on the plateau to increase food access for low-income residents.

Ashley Cheaves, director of the South Cumberland Plateau AmeriCorps Project, introduced the AmeriCorps members present:

Presley Ratliff recently completed service as an AmeriCorps VISTA for SETHRA-CASA, increasing volunteer recruitment of court-appointed community advocates for abused and neglected children. Ratliff is continuing her service on the plateau as an AmeriCorps member, serving with the Grundy County Jail's reentry program as well as with after-school tutoring programs on the Plateau. She plans to join Peace Corps later this year.

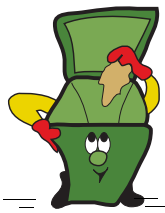

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## No. 16 Men's Golf Places Ninth

The No. 16/19 University of the South men's golf team posted its second-lowest score at the Jekyll Island Collegiate with a score of 878 for ninth place in the event last weekend.

Pearse Lucas recorded a 54-hole score of 217 (70-70-77) to lead the Tigers with a 21st place finish. In Friday's opening round, the sophomore chipped in five birdies and finished the weekend with 11 birdies, good for 10th-best.

Grayson Maddox finished 41st overall with a season-best score of 221 (75-71-75). Posting an eagle on the 18th to wrap up Saturday's second round, the senior fired seven birdies.

Grant Mahaffey chipped in a career-best 224 (73-76-75) to finish 61st overall, while Ryan Demit posted a 228 (76-81-71).

Langdon Aronson wrapped up the team scoring with a career-low of 231 (77-69-85).

Playing the individual invitational over at the Oleander, Cameron Simons carded a 234 (79-85-70) for a ninth place finish. In Sunday's final round, he ascended 11 spots to finish ninth overall thanks to five birdies.

Alex Price of Christopher Newport fired sub-70 scores in each round to finish -14 and won the tournament (202) by seven strokes.

Sewanee carded sub-300 rounds to take ninth place at the event with an 878 (294-286-298).

The Tigers secured their second-best score at Jekyll Island since 2013. Emory ran away with the event with a team score of 842, good for 22-under-par (283-275-284).

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## Russ Marr Named to D3hoops.com All-Region Team

Announced on Tuesday, Russ Marr from the University of the South was selected to the Second Team of the D3hoops.com All-Region Team for Region VI.

Region VI includes the following conferences: Collegiate Conference of the South (CCS), Old Dominion Athletic Conference (ODAC), Southern Athletic Association (SAA) and the USA South Athletic Conference (USAS).

Additionally, Asbury University in Kentucky (Independent), Bob Jones University, Christopher Newport University (Coast-To-Coast; C2C), Emory University (University Athletic Association), University of Mary Washington (C2C) and Warren Wilson (C2C) are schools that are also in the region but are not associated with the conferences above.

Winning the Southern Athletic Association Player of the Week award three times, he was named First Team on the all-conference team a few weeks ago. Additionally, he was the Most Valuable Player of the SAA Tournament.

Starting in all 29 games in his sophomore season, Marr averaged 21.1 points per game and shot 49 percent from the field. From long distance, he shot 37.6 percent and was an 84 percent shooter from the charity stripe.

Marr finished the 2023 season with 611 points, good for eighth-most in the country and the most in the region. In terms of program history, the Bryant, Ala., native became the second player in program history to score 600 points in a season, joining Kit Walsh's 648 in his senior season in 1991.

Twenty-eight of his 29 games saw him net double-digits and he scored 20 more more in 13 games. More impressive, he had five games of 30 or more points, including a career-best 50 at Covenant on Nov. 29.

Marr became the first player since the 2001-02 season to drop 50 in a game for the University of the South. Posting the second-best point total in the 10-plus year history of the Southern Athletic Association in a game, he was five points shy of breaking the school record of 55 set by Eric Ochel in 1995 versus Emory.

His 197 made field goals were second-best in program history as well. Walsh also holds that mark with 245. On a national level, he finished 35th in field goals made, and his mark was the third-most in Region VI.

From beyond the arc, his 82 triples finished as the third-most in school history. In Division III, he was the top 3-point shooter in the region and the 13th-best in the country.

At the free throw line, Marr tied the school record for shots made with 135, joining Ben Pursell, C'09, in 2008. Finishing second in the region in the category, he sits at 15th in the nation.

Players were nominated for the All-Region Team by the Sports Information Directors (SIDs) at the various schools. There were 798 players nominated nationwide across the 10 regions in Division III. The ballot was then made available to SIDs, who voted for a predetermined number of players in their region.

The University of the South posted a 19-10 overall record, won the 2023 SAA Tournament Championship and earned the automatic qualifier to the NCAA Championships.

## Women's Golf Takes Third at Jekyll Island

The University of the South women's golf team posted its second-best finish at the Jekyll Island Collegiate with a third place score of 910 as the program fired its second sub-300 score in program history. The event took place at Indian Mound.

Four Tigers finished in the top-25, and all five finished in the top-30.

Sabrina Nesbitt (75-75-78) and E.C. Niebauer (77-72-79) each scored a 228 to take 14th place in the field. S. Nesbitt posted a 3.08 average on par 3s and a 4.23 scoring on par 4s. Additionally, she totaled seven birdies for seventh-best in the field.

Niebauer was fifth-best in the field with a 4.10 average on par 4s, and her eight birdies were fourth-best.

Nicole Nesbitt finished 18th overall with a three-round score of 229 (76-73-80).

Merrick Semans recorded a 25th-place score of 231 (75-75-81), while Mary Browder Howell rounded out the scoring with a 31st-place score of 234 (75-82-77).

Rylan Kennedy carded a 10th place score of 254 (82-87-85) in the individual invitational.

Sewanee secured its second-lowest score in program history with a 54-hole score of 910 (310-295-314). The team's best score of 902 came at the 2016 Jekyll Island event, when Sewanee won the tournament.

Additionally, Sewanee's 295 in the second round is the lowest score for the program since the inception of the team in 1995.

Redlands (901) won the team event by five strokes. Sewanee was back by nine strokes.

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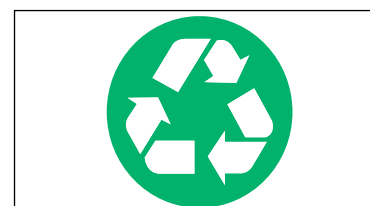
