Franklin County Schools: Budget, No Teacher Guns

At the May 13 meeting the Franklin County School Board approved the 2024-2025 budget, with one board member abstaining. In response to the legislative update, Director of Schools Cary Holman weighed in on the new law allowing teachers to carry guns.

Deputy Director of Finances Jenny Phillips presented two budget scenarios: a 3 percent raise versus a 5 percent raise for teachers and support staff. The district is required by law to offer a starting teacher salary of \$50,000 by the 2027-2028 school year. For the 2023-2024 school year, the starting teacher salary was \$44,660. "Over the next three years there will have to be a 12 percent increase in salaries," Holman said. County employee wages were expected to increase 3.2 percent in the coming year, Phillips said. Both budgets will require a significant withdrawal from the reserve fund balance, \$2,456,868 and \$3,147,226 respectively.

"We might as well get there [to the \$50,000 goal] sooner instead of later," said board member Sarah Marhevsky. "We continually talk about the teacher shortage." The larger increase would help with retaining current staff and attracting new teachers, Marhevsky pointed out.

"I'd rather go to them [the county commission] and say, 'we have to be at X," argued Vice Chair Lance Williams. "Three years from now the county commission can't say no."

"[The 5 percent budget] will come right back to us," said Board Chair Cleijo Walker. "You can't keep dipping into the fund balance until it's gone. You can't live out of a savings account."

Holman reminded the board under the new TISA funding formula only 70 percent of the per-pupil allocation came from the state. The budget asks the county commission for an additional \$308,000 from property taxes. County Mayor Chris Guess cautioned, "People think property tax is a windfall."

Marhevsky abstained from the budget vote.

Alerting the board to another financial concern, Holman said the state had not updated its funding formulas since 2017. "As a result, some districts were overpaid, and some were underpaid. We were overpaid. The state has instituted what it calls a 'smooth payback.' For the next seven years we will be decreased by \$25,000 in Title I funds and \$10,000 in IDEA funding."

funds and \$10,000 in IDEA funding."

The law allowing school faculty and staff to carry concealed handguns on school grounds stipulates permission be granted by the chief of local law enforcement, the director of schools, and the building principal. "No teacher in Franklin County School District will be allowed to carry guns in our schools," Holman insisted. "We will continue to rely on the support of our sheriff's department and other trained professionals in that line of work. Our teachers will continue to have only instructional expectations." Mayor Guess, a former law enforcement officer, voiced support for Holman's position.

Marhevsky provided an overview of two other legislative actions impacting public schools. The Freedom Scholarship Act was tabled. The Senate and House versions of the bill "were too far apart," Marhevsky speculated. The legislature left money funding the program in the budget to avoid the need to revote the financing if the bill passes in the next session.

Another bill provided a process enabling students retained in the fourth grade to move on to fifth grade. "The parents, principal, and teachers can meet and if they feel like there's enough evidence this child will be fine in the fifth grade, he or she can move on," Holman explained. High density tutoring will be required in the fifth grade. The bill has not been signed by the governor yet.

Human Resources Supervisor Roger Alsup announced the district would initiate an "exit survey" for teachers not renewed, retiring, or resigning. Teachers not renewed will have the option of requesting a meeting to discuss the decision.

Unlock Comfort and Savings

If you're working on your summer to-dos, consider adding home weatherization to your list.

We typically think about weatherizing our homes during winter months when we're standing next to a chilly window or a drafty exterior door. But weatherizing your home provides comfort and energy savings year-round, especially during summer months when your air conditioner is working overtime.

According to <energystar.gov>, a home with insufficient insulation and air leaks wastes more than 20 percent of the energy used to heat or cool the home — that's essentially throwing money out the door. Fortunately, most weatherization tasks are easy do-it-yourself projects and can be completed in a day.

The simplest and most cost-effective weatherization strategies include air sealing around windows and exterior doors.

If you have older windows, odds are you have air escaping through tiny cracks and gaps around the frame. Do a quick visual inspection. If you can see any daylight around the frame or the windows rattle easily, you likely have air leaks. Also check for any small cracks around the frame that might not be visible with sunlight.

If you suspect you have leaky windows and plan to apply new caulk, be sure to remove the old caulk and clean the area well before application. Caulking materials vary in strength and properties, but you'll likely need a half-cartridge per window.

Silicone caulk is a popular choice and can also be used to seal joints between bathroom and kitchen fixtures. If you have any leftover caulk, use it to seal those areas.

Another effective but simple weatherization project is installing weather stripping around exterior doors. The most common types of weather-stripping options are V-channel, felt and foam tape. To choose the best type for your home, consider temperature fluctuations and weather exposure. Most homeowners opt for felt or foam tape; both options are easy to install but will need to be replaced every couple of years, depending on wear and tear. Weather stripping should be installed around the top and sides of doors.

If you see daylight around the bottom of an exterior door, consider installing a door sweep in addition to weather stripping. Door sweeps are available in aluminum, plastic, vinyl and felt options.



Tigers Fall to WashU in **Tourney**





NATURENOTES

Spring Bird Migration

Most of us are aware of the spring migration of birds to and through our area. Some come to stay for the breeding season and some are passing through to other breeding grounds. The BirdCast map of bird migration showed almost 30 million birds in flight as I write this, and that is down from the highs earlier in the season, which peaked last week in our area. I am always happy to hear the Eastern Wood-Pewee that showed up last week, one of the last migrants to return from its winter range, which is in South America. It will continue to sing all summer until it migrates back. We have been enjoying using the Merlin app to learn the songs of some of the migrants who are passing through. The Swainson's Thrush delighted us for a few days on its way to Canada. A visiting ornithologist recorded the presence on our property earlier this month of a Nashville Warbler and a Tennessee Warbler which, despite their names, were also on their way north. The longer day length in northern latitudes and the seasonally abundant plant and insect life allows these birds to raise larger broods than if they remained in the tropics.

Deral Walker of Alto reports that she has had Rose-breasted Grosbeaks at her feeder all last week. They are still present. She has made the top of her pumphouse into a big feeder in addition to her other four feeders. She's really enjoying watching them.

Freddy Tucker of Sewanee reports that he saw four Evening Grosbeaks at his feeder yesterday. (He also reports two chipmunks doing acrobatics to try to get sunflower seeds.) He wasn't thrilled about the chipmunks, but says, "We've got to keep feeding our




